TELEPHONE WORKERS WALK OFF JOBS

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 7. (AP)—Telephone workers from coast to coast walked off their jobs today, crippling the service of the nation's vast telephone industry.

The strike of 340,000 workers was the first nationwide telephone walkout in American history. The workers are demanding a \$12 a week pay boost.

TEXAS PHONE WORKERS 18,000

Texas telephone workers by the thousands left their jobs today to join in the nationwide strike for higher wages and other benefits. Officials of the National Federation of Telephone workers placed the number of Texas workers on strike at 18,000.

Except in isolated cases, long distance service was first to be curtailed and only emergency calls were accepted. These were handled by company executives and supervisors. Reports indicated the strike was orderly in all places.

Local calls in cities with dial equipment was not immediately affected.

Governor Beauford Jester offered his services to arbitrate.

SENATE PASSES BILL OUTLAWING STRIKES

AUSTIN, Texas, April 7. (AP)—The Senate today passed a bill outlaw nigsecondary strikes, picketing and boycotting in Texas.

A secondary strike is defined by the measure as 'temporary stoppage of work by concerted action of two or more employees of an employer where no labor dispute exists between employer and his employees but where stoppage results from dispute between another employer and his employees.'

GOTHAM LIMITED TRAIN WRECKED

COLUMBIA CITY, Indiana, April 7.—(AP)—The Pennsylvania Railroad's Gotham Limited train was wrecked early today at a street crossing in South Columbia City, injuring at least 40 persons.

The train was reported to have jumped the track. 13 cars were derailed and one pullman turned over.

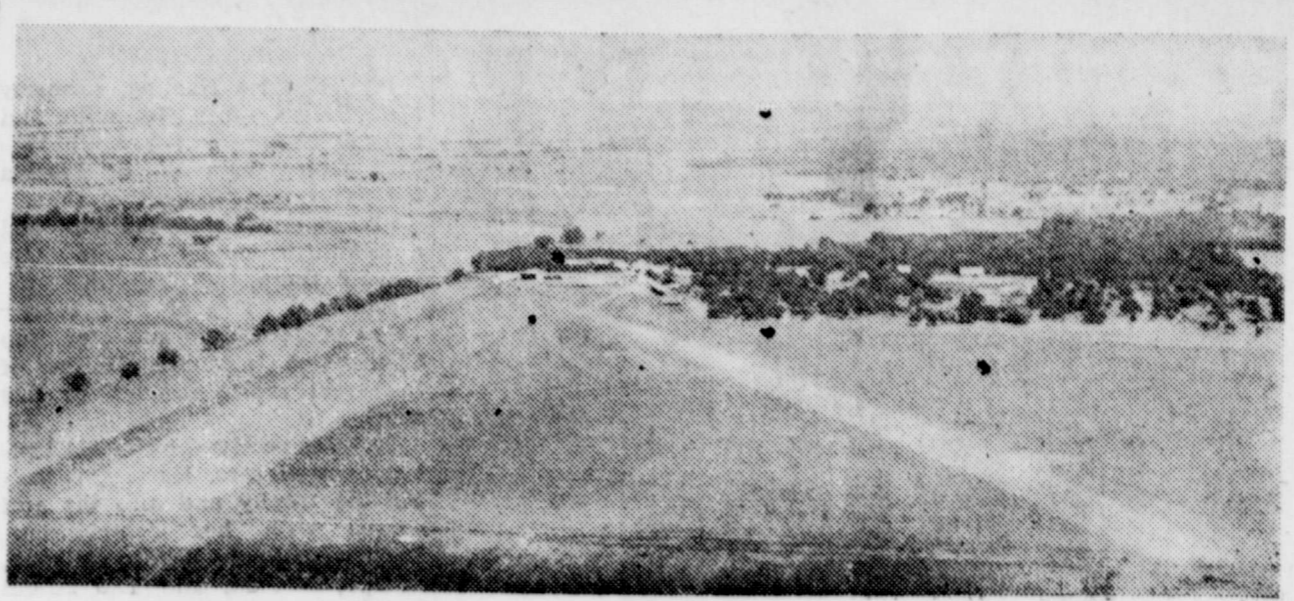

Heavy Vote Out As Copperas Cove Elects New Officers

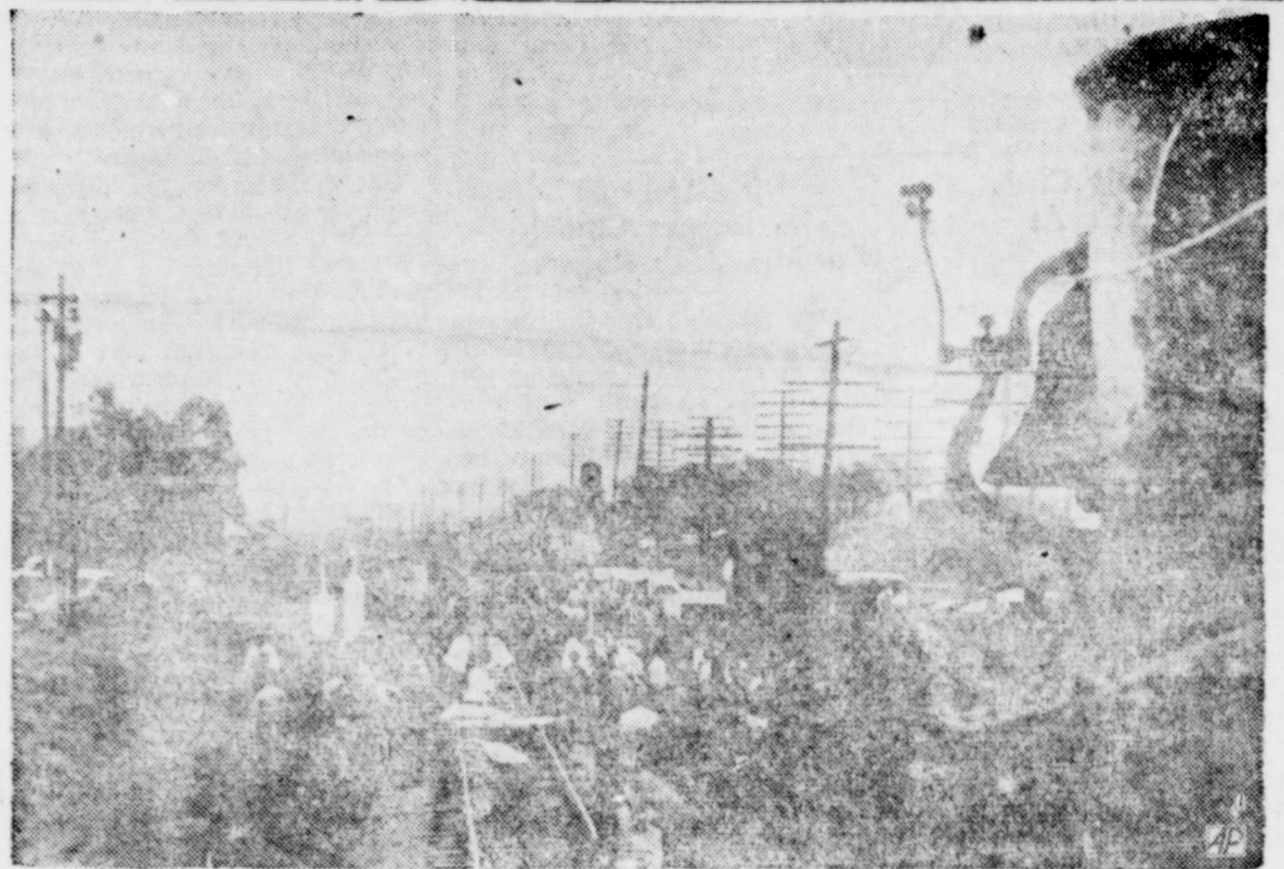

Mr. Owen Ford, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Ford of Eagle Springs passed away in Scott & White Hospital at Temple, March 27 at 1:10 p. m. after an illness of several weeks. He was confined to his home for the past month and the past week was spent in the hospital.

Surviving Mr. Ford are his wife; three brothers, Rev. Henry Ford of Hollister, Calif., R. Douglas Ford of Iredell, Claude Ford of Pearl; one sister, Mrs. R. V. Sullins of Moody.

Mr. Ford was born May 19, 1895, at Eagle Springs, living at the home of his birth until March 1942 when he moved to Moody. On March 21, 1939, he was united in marriage to Miss Nora McCauley in Denton, formerly of Whitson.

He was a veteran of World War I, having served fourteen months overseas, and was wounded on Sept. 13, 1918 in the Battle of Argonne Forest.

Sometime during this period he was converted. In 1924 he rededicated his life and united with the Valley Baptist church where his membership remained until his death.

He was very patient and resigned during his last sickness, despite his suffering. Several times in the last months of his life he assured his companion he was ready to go.

The body lay in state from 3 to 4 p. m. Friday at the First Baptist church of Moody.

The pastor, Rev. O. B. Darby, assisted by Rev. A. Loper of Waco, officiated at the funeral, using the Scripture, "If an man die shall he live again?" Job 14:14. Special music arranged by Miss Rob McCauley included, "Asleep in Jesus" and "We Will Understand it Better Bye and Bye".

Dear Friends:

There have been two outstanding party votes in the House this week. The first was on the matter of continuing an appropriation of about two million dollars for the support of a Veterans' Employment Placement Service, and the second was on the method of handling our national debt—whether to reduce taxes and carry the debt at its present level or whether to begin to pay a substantial amount on the debt while national income is high.

In the first case, it seems to me to be very poor economy to break down the agency that has been set up to help the veterans get jobs. I know that jobs are rather easy to get right now, but even now, many veterans are finding it hard to get adjusted in regular productive civilian employment. Should we suffer with any kind of depression, the need for this work would be greatly increased. I think that it is good business for the government to try to help these veterans get work rather than to pay them unemployment compensation. It was shown rather conclusively that this program was actually saving much more in compensation than it was costing and at the same time it was surely making much better citizens of our returned soldiers. I, therefore, voted with practically all the democrats, to retain the work.

The republicans are, however, pledged to make some kind of showing of reductions in governmental expenses. They, therefore, voted not to appropriate the funds for this work. Even this was hardly as senseless as the so-called savings of \$800,000,000 that they claimed to have made in the Treasury appropriation bill. This "saving" was effected simply by refusing to appropriate the money to pay tax refunds which were approved and which everyone admitted were war debts of the government. Even the republicans said they would pay them later—but in the meantime, they bear 6% interest. Inasmuch as this is far more than the rate at which the government can borrow money, and is in fact far more than most of the large tax payers to whom these payments will be made can earn, it seems possible that this procedure is simply intended to benefit a few large tax payers at the expense of the government. Certainly it is a fraud to claim any actual reduction in the budget as a result of this manipulation.

The tax bill which the House passed yesterday does not quite sink to the level of deception. Certainly it is intended to give substantial relief to large tax payers while it gives very little relief to the small taxpayers. As was pointed out in the debate, this bill

will give an increase of just 1% in the take home pay of the man who earns \$1200 per year. This is exactly \$1.00 per month or two bits per week, but for the man who has an income of \$1,000,000 per year, it will mean an increase in take home of 69.2%. While I am firmly convinced that we should maintain our income tax at a rather high level during this period of high national income and thereby pay as much as possible on the national debt now, I also recognize that there are people in the very low income group who are entitled to tax relief as a means of enjoying a minimum existence under our present higher costs of living. Therefore, it seems to me that such tax reductions as can be made should be effected by increasing the exemptions of low income citizens.

If we are to give tax relief, let's begin where it is most needed. Surely any tax on a single man who makes only \$600 per year or any tax on a family that makes less than \$100 per month is more burdensome than a much higher rate on the man or family that makes well above a living. While we are considering taxes, we should consider the debt we owe. When will we pay it? I think we should pay as much as possible while we have the money; and surely it is rather rash to try to determine the amount of tax reduction that is advisable until we have seen the total of the appropriation bills. We do not yet know within many billions of what we will spend this year. I, therefore, voted with the most of the democrats to send this bill back to the Committee with instructions to hold it until the appropriations bills are passed and then to consider more equitable relief for the low income brackets.

Rabbit Export Becomes Major Irish Industry

WEXFORD, Ireland—(AP)—During the past six years rabbit trapping has become one of Ireland's established industries and more than 45,000,000 Irish rabbits have been contributed to Britain's food requirements.

To the delight of the Irish farmer whose crops were damaged, the rabbits were taken out of the country at the rate of about 7,000,000 per annum. The total value of the exports from 1940 until 1946 was some \$22,000,000.

The rabbits were paid for by the British Ministry of Foods. The bulk of the pelts were also sent to Britain but many of them were shipped to the United States for processing in the production of hat felt and other materials.

Rabbit trapping reached its peak in Ireland in 1941. Naturally the heavy drain made great inroads

Questioned about a replacement Mr. Scott replied "There will be nothing in its place right now".

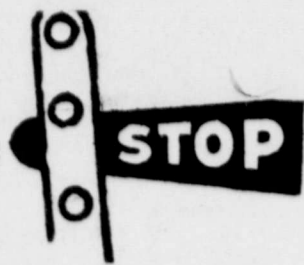

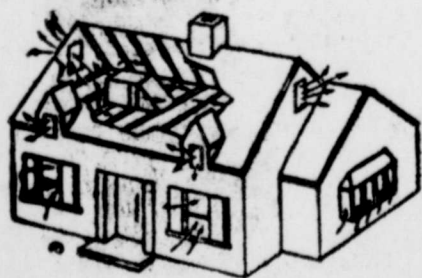
