One of the dominant factors in maintaining a high level of farm income and relatively high farm prices was the heavy export of food and continued foreign requirements for farm products. On the other side of the picture was the short corn crop, drouth stricken areas finally drenched by rain last October and November, and prospects for a shortened winter wheat crop. Farmers, knowing the present high prices will not hold, are digging in for winter and are still looking to the special session of Congress for a hint of what is to come in the future.

December 21 LastDay For Farmers To Plant Cover Crops

Farmers are again reminded that they have until December 21, 1947, to plant winter legume seed for a winter cover crop and still receive credit for same through the ACA. according to John D.
