WASHINGTON, D. C., February 2. (AP)-The Naonal Advisory Council opposed today any forced liquidation of $\$ 4,300,000,000$ [billion] of assets held in this country by citizens of European nations in line for Marshall Aid plan. The report came as Congress appeared pre pared to cut $\$ 800,000,000$ off the starting cost of the Marshall Plan.
