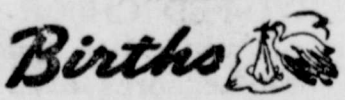

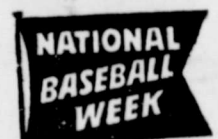
Turnersville got 17 hits, and bobbled twice, and the locals got 9 hits with about 5 bobbles.

CARRIER TASK FORCE TO VISIT BERGEN

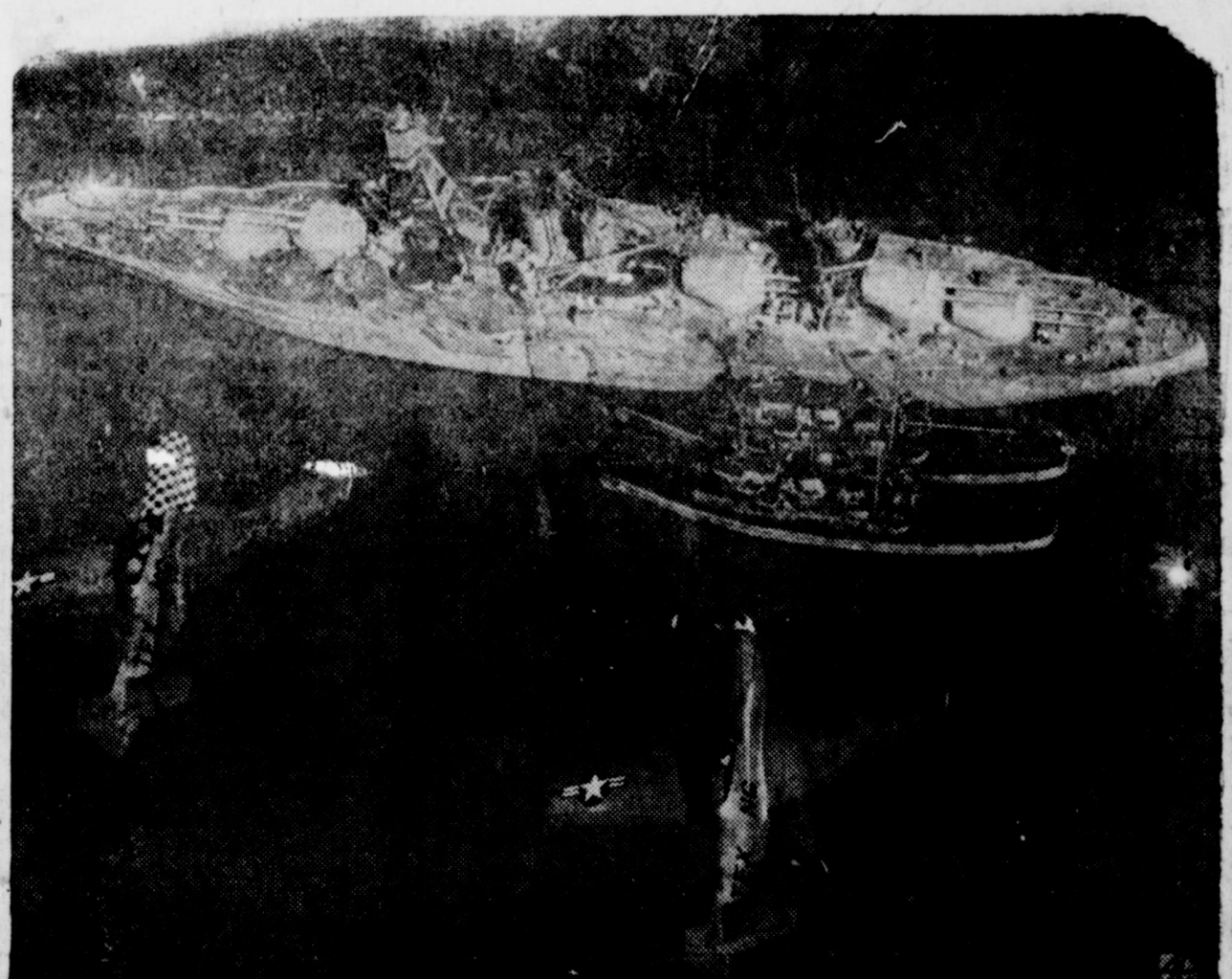

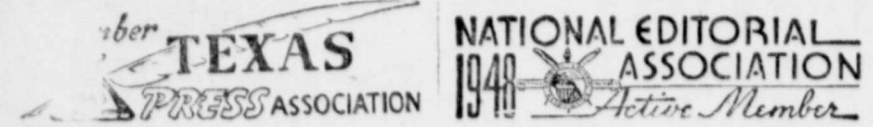

The pianist appeared under the management of William Z. Rozan, for whom she will tour next season. It was refreshing to find a musician of her generation, which is the younger, pushing early nineteenth-

century music with such enthusiasm as well as affectionate respect. When we recall the perfunctiveness with which pianists of youth and boom discharge their duties to the middle masters, the devotional approach of Miss Kendrick is a happy surprise. Although her technical equipment usually formidable, was a bit on the rusty side Thursday night, she was generally in command of her exacting music. The audience was more than pleased, in fact touched, by the deep traditionalism and simple honesty of everything, for they were hearing music that ought to get better playing than it does from the circulating artists.

A beginning was Beethoven's lovely and symmetrical "Andante Favori," originally conceived as the second movement of the "Walstein" Sonata and then detached as too elaborate for such a purpose. It stands solidly alone. None but a sincere artist would have ventured Beethoven's A Flat Major Sonata, Opus 110, for the rewards are only the satisfaction of having evoked a singular beauty. There are no dazzling bravura spots, only a deceptive melodic line of simplicity and clarity, tinted subtly by harmonic and rhythmic inspirations. Miss Kendrick's grasp of both the romantic feeling and the architecture was firm and preceptive. Six Chopin pieces, with two more as encores, were generally right in mood, tasteful in expression and technically correct. One missed relaxation, poetic feeling and the sensuousness of tone she had revealed but a few moments earlier for Schumann's "Carnival," one of the finest achievements of the evening.

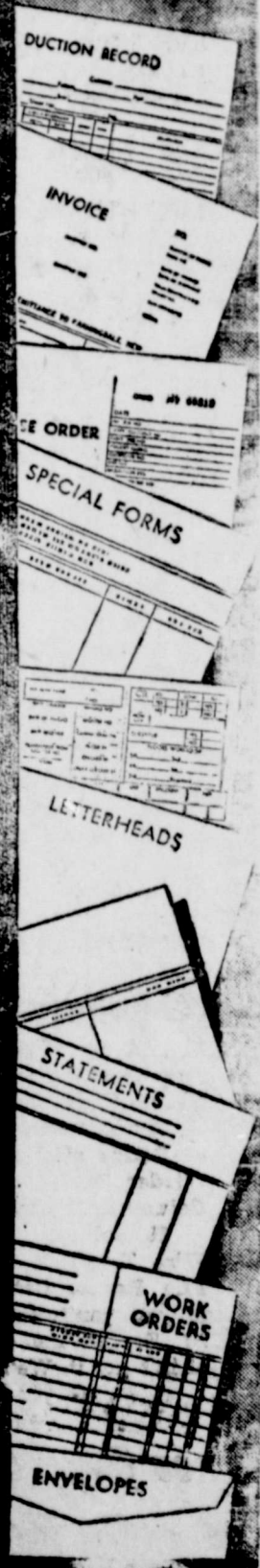

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THE SOURCE OF ENERGY

By F. F. Chamlee

We wish to concern ourselves here with only the energy affecting life on the Earth. In order to do this, one must separate the total energy into spheres of influence. Otherwise, one would find himself establishing the source of the source back as far as time has existed.

Let us start, then, with the premise that our Sun is the source of energy of the Earth.

We believe that it can be safely assumed that our Sun is our energy source. But this statement does not satisfy our mind. A closer source or concentration of the product of the Sun is required to exist before we can rationalize the demonstrations of Earth energy. We conclude that the motion of the Earth acts as a collector of the energy of the Sun there by performing the function of what we know as an electric generator. Here, then, is our immediate source of energy, for, without the generator there would be no concentration of energy.

We submit the argument that the Earth maintains a magnetic field by reason of its axial motion. We know that a magnetic field exists around the Earth, but we do not know its strength. We know that an electric generator also creates a magnetic field and

we can measure its strength. The only visible factor held in common in both cases is that both have axial motion. If axial motion creates magnetism in one case, it is safe to assume the same result from the axial motion of the Earth. Then, if axial motion does not exist, magnetism in heavy concentration cannot exist.

Our moon has little axial motion. Therefore, it must have little magnetism; yet, it is held in certain relationship to the Earth, which has great magnetism. If the Earth's magnetism is powerful enough to hold a body as large as the moon against the tremendous centrifugal force it must develop, then that the magnetism must be quite powerful. It must, then, be powerful enough to produce high concentrations of energy such as lightning, cyclones, tornadoes, etc., powerful enough to resist creation of a vacuum, powerful enough to break down or build up constructions of matter.

We know that magnetism and electricity are one. We know that electricity will break down constructions of matter by electrolysis. Why then should not this magnetic field be the immediate source of energy operating our Earth unit?

We believe the energy stored by the operation of the magnetic field of the Earth exists in two forms. The most important part, the reservoir, is filled with the elastic fluid, energy. All space in and adjacent to the Earth is filled with this fluid under tremendous pressure. The other part is attached to matter. This part of the total energy of Earth is attached almost wholly to gases or melted matter, which has been reduced to unit divisions. The same fluid exists in all outer space, so far as the imagination can apprehend.

In our study of energy, we must not make common mistakes of assuming that matter contains energy. Energy must be thought of as force without substance, matter as substance without force. One must never accept the obvious as truth until proved.

It is evident to me that matter is the female, energy the male of the universe. In their various and manifold forms, matter and energy sometimes appear to be one, but this is never true. The

truth is yet dim. Much more research is needed.

Earth energy, which is a total of the energy held in suspense by the axial motion of the Earth, exists and is maintained at a pressure, when thought of in pounds, of about 400 to 500 pounds per square inch at the equator. One must apprehend this pressure to get a correct beginning in many research on energy and matter.

The pressure is in heavy concentration through the axis of the Earth and it is the same force we call gravity. It is the force which, in pursuit of matter the female, holds the Earth together.

The compass, instead of registering the direction of the magnetic field around the Earth or pointing to a lode in the north, is activated by the heavy concentration of energy in the axis, which travels from south to north. The field which runs from north to south is a weak, diluted shadow of the main force; yet, the 'shadow' has a pressure of 400 to 500 pounds per square inch.

Until tests can be made, we can only estimate the pressure at the outer edge of the magnetic field. We assume it to be one unit. Let us say pound. If one were at that point and approached Earth, the pressure would have increased to 400 or more when he reached the Earth's surface at the equator. It is as if men, at the Earth's surface, were living under a few thousand feet of water (thinking only of pressure).

The Earth, although suspended in this magnetic pressure at upwards of 400 pounds at present, did not always exist under these same conditions. Aeons of time ago, the speed of rotation was much greater. Somewhere in this speed-scale lies the answer to the questions of mammoth plant and animal life of the past, of which we have vast evidence.

If the Earth were speeded up in axial motion, these phenomena of growth would reappear. To inject a side thought, the axial speed could be increased or slowed at man's will by certain engines. If you are interested in this thought, I would be glad to elaborate.

To get back to the main that, certain tests should be made to prove or disprove my ideas on the source of energy.

Before I describe the tests, let me say again that my theory of the source of energy provides the answers to why the Atom Bomb disconnected such a large amount of heat over Japan, was disappointing at Bikini, and is a flat failure in the Power Piles; and it will provide also the answers to the manifold problems of Medical Science. You must not fail humanity by turning thumbs down on this idea without full investigation.

STEEL PRICE RISE UNPOPULAR WITH MAJORITY OF INFORMED

PRINCETON, N. J., March 31. The reasons given by the steel companies for raising the price of certain items of steel were apparently not presented very effectively to the American people.

A coast-to-coast poll shows that among voters who have heard about the price raise, the reaction is unfavorable. Approximately two-thirds of those aware of the price change say they think the companies should not have taken this step. While steelmen might argue that the general public is not aware of all the facts involved in the price change, these voters give three principal reasons for holding the opinions they do:

1. That the increase will tend to raise the price of other things and thus contribute to inflation.
2. That steel profits were greater than ever last year.
3. That steel is priced high enough now.

About one-sixth of the voters polled called the price increase unjustified, and they gave these arguments in defense of the steel companies:

1. That high labor costs made the price boost necessary.
2. That "everything else" has gone up and that because of higher costs of production the steel companies are entitled to raise prices, too.

The poll, conducted throughout the forty-eight states by the American Institute of Public Opinion, found that approximately six out of every ten have heard about the raise in price of certain steel products. These voters were asked:

"From what you've heard on the radio, and read in the newspapers, would you say the steel companies should or should not have raised the price of steel?"

Hearings on the steel price increase were held before a House-Senate committee and three steel executives, Benjamin F. Fairless of the United States Steel Corporation, Arthur B. Homer, president of the Bethlehem Steel Company and Hiland G. Batcheler, president of the Allegheny-Ludlum Steel Corporation, denied that the raise would cause a general increase in the price of steel products of the cost of living.

The steel executives pointed out that the price rise applies only to certain semifinished steel products, representing a small proportion of the industry's output. According to some estimates, the price increase will apply about 10 per cent of the industry's production.

However, some critics of the move, including Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, have expressed concern over the psychological effect of the price raise and feared that it might touch off another round of price and wage increase.

Many businessmen have taken the position that prices should not be curbed unless at the same time some attempt is made to keep wages from going up.

The general public shows no strong disposition to favor wage increases. A recent poll by the institute found that the weight of opinion is that factory workers should not get wage boosts at the present time.

In short, the general attitude is that both price rises and wage increases are inadvisable now.

The poll on wages follows:

"Many unions of factory workers are going to ask for a pay increase within the next month or two. Do you think these factory workers should get more pay?"

A DELICACY

Walnuts toasted in butter or fortified margarine make a flavorful addition to chicken salad for a party luncheon. They are prepared by melting 2 tablespoons of butter or fortified margarine in a small skillet and adding 1 cup shelled walnut meats. They should be heated carefully and

Live in Russia?

One test of a country's economic pattern is whether you would like to live there. The advantages of the social scene, in other words, make up its strongest advertisement. Or, the proof of the pudding is in the eating. It is common scandal, naturally, that none of our American "fellow travelers" cherish the idea of actually living in Russia. Apparently, from a personal viewpoint they'll take American living any day.

On that point, these Communists and Russophobes show good judgment. Your Russian factory worker, under the new Russian prices, has to spend the income of one hour and 18 minutes of labor for a quart of milk, which the average American factory worker gets in exchange for the price of 10 minutes of his labor. A pound of butter costs the Russian 10 hours and 42 minutes; the American only 48½ minutes (not counting the time spent griping about the current price).

Spending Labor

It costs the Russian factory worker about four weeks' work to get himself a part-wool suit. If he wants a worsted suit he'll have to spend his entire pay for more than three months. His American counterpart can work out a good quality worsted suit in little more than three days. More than two weeks' pay would have to go into a pair of leather shoes for the Russian, yet the American can work them out in less than a day.

These comparisons are based upon estimates of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, and on Russian prices as reported by the Associated Press in December. The comparisons are as accurate as the iron curtain will permit. They show that prices in a communistic economy are much higher than our own, in terms of work. And those are the terms that count.

Eating the Pudding

The real pay-off of any economic system comes in the standard of living that it provides for its people. Without question, the American workingman enjoys the highest living standards of any nation. He's rightly proud of this, although he may not know the United States has 54 per cent of the world's telephones, 84 per cent of the automobiles, nearly 50 per cent of the radios, and 92 per cent of all the bathtubs on this planet!

A "capitalistic" country, contrary to Russian description, is a nation where men are permitted to have a high standard of living. This is exemplified by America. Here, men are free to work, to invent, to initiate, to experiment, to engage in the enterprise of their dreams. Unhampered by restrictions that in other nations tend to keep down any individual enterprise, an American worker can start his own factory or set up his own business.

We take all these things for granted, along with our vastly superior standard of living. What we must assuredly know is this: these things we have, these privileges of ours, exist because of basic principles that belong to the American Way. Our individual freedom of enterprise is distinctly American. No Communistic or socialistic state can offer that to its people.

DID YOU GET YOURS?

Before the war, American merchant vessels annually brought to the United States enough pepper and spices to fill 3,000 trucks and trailers, enough bananas to provide every person in the nation

with two dozen, enough chocolate and cocoa to make a bar-candy line to the moon, and enough sugar to give each person 73 lbs.

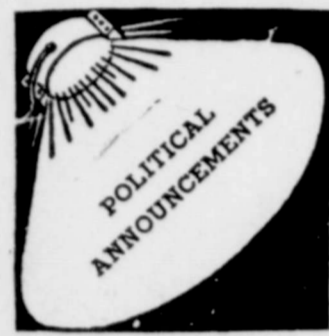
