Curtis was reading a comic book at his home, and his sister, Mary was seated by his side. She ran for help.

The bullet struck the boy in his shoulder and ranged into his neck, severing a juglar vein.

The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lowell Lofland were on their way home from Waco, at the time of the accident, and they arrived shortly after a doctor pronounced their son dead.

SHEEP DOG TRIALS ALSO FEATURE OF SHOW TO BE HERE MAY 19-20

Texas Purebred Sheep Breeders' Association, at a meeting of its leaders in Gatesville Thursday afternoon, chose Gatesville at the site for the First Annual Show of the Association.

Gatesville was chosen because of its central location between coarse-wool and fine-wool growing sections of Texas.

The information was released after association officials headed by President J. P. Heath of Argyle, spent the afternoon here

with Chamber of Commerce officials and members of the Coryell County Sheep Breeders Association, the two organizations who will sponsor the initial exhibition.

The W. T. Hix Co. building, a new 75x125 foot tile structure usjt off the public square, will house the show, which is expected to draw more than 200 entries. All entries are limited to registered sheep

The sheep dog trials will be run in the morning of the 20th in the Gatesville Municipal Stadium.

GERMAN RUINS REVEAL PRICE OF DICTATORSHIP

Berlin, Germany—What price dictatorships? That is the question that gnaws at your soul as you ride thru this mass of ruins that once was one of the world's great and prosperous cities.

You walk in and out of the demolished Reichstag building. You gaze stupefied on the charred and broken walls of the spacious Reichschancellery where Hitler ruled in the strutting elegance of Nazi glory. Then down into the now musty, damp and begrimed wetness of the bunker that Der Fuehrer built as his final retreat from the avenging justice of freedom on the march, and where he died like the ordinary hunted criminal he was.

Rows and rows of magnificent state buildings all in stark ruin—street after street without a single roofed house, only great jagged piles of brick and concrete that once were the homes

of industrious people. You know there still are hundreds, probably thousands, of bodies lying beneath all the rubble and you gasp, "In God's name, what price dictatorships?"

Does man ever learn anything from the past? Is arrogant egotism so dominant in the minds of military leaders that they can not see the lesson of Berlin and Frankfurt and Munich and Vienna? Down through all the ages of civilized man, the same thing has happened to dictators with the penalty of increasing as free men increased their willingness to fight and die that other men also could be free.

Have the Russians studied the lesson of these devastated cities or, in their blind hatred for democratic nations and intoxicated by their fanatical zeal for Soviet domination, do they believe we are not good enough to stop them as we did the Nazis? Do they think that, because of our regard for human life and our reluctance to face the reality of a new and more powerful aggressor, that we will refuse to throw the weight of all our resources, including the atomic bomb, against their plan of world conquest?

Don't they ever read history? Don't they know that man is determined to be free of all dictatorial tyranny? Don't they realize that if this be the Armageddon between reaction and freedom that America will be there fighting with all her might on the side of mercy and justice and freedom?

These are the questions that trouble your soul and make you sick at heart as you walk thru the desolation and decay that war brought to Germany.

Say Man Got Start In South Africa

LONDON—(AP)—Man probably originated in South Africa a million or more years ago, says C. Vanreit Lowe, archeologist, who has returned from South Africa. Certainly South Africa has been inhabited since the arrival of the first men, he says.

He reports finding two factories where prehistoric man made primitive tools. He believes an area at Bloemfontein near Fauresmith, South Africa, contains the most valuable collection of Stone Age relics in the world.

Howe believes he has enough evidence to work out a full picture of a prehistoric culture.

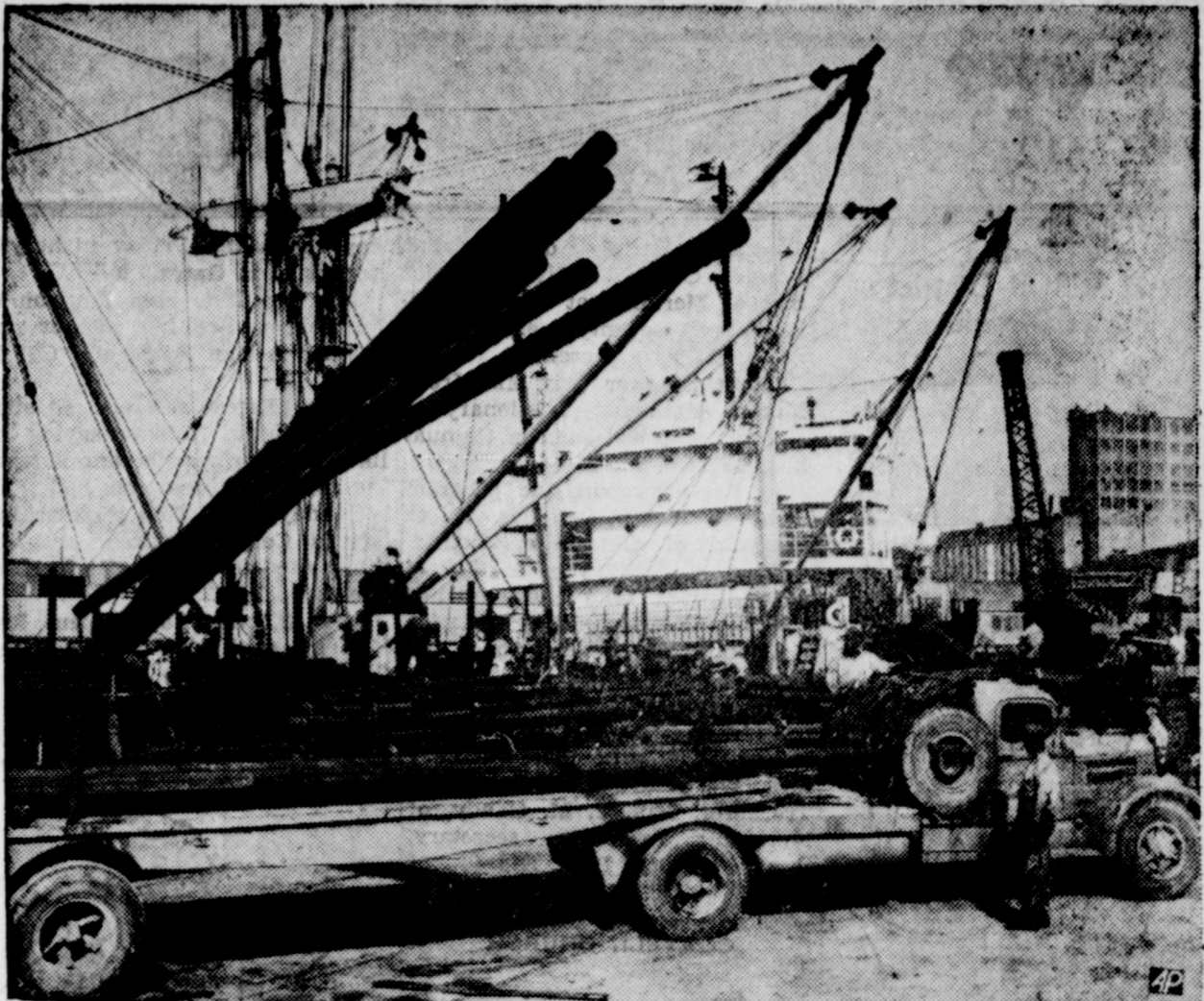

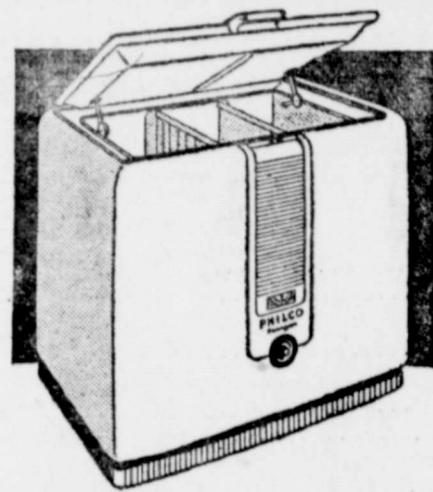

**WHAT IT MEANS—
FORGOTTEN
'E' BOND TAX**

By Alexander R. George
WASHINGTON — (AP) — Uncle Sam has a tax stake in the more than 50 billion dollars worth of "E" bonds which have been issued to date.

However, the government's income tax "take" on these bonds is probably smaller than you think. Interest on "E" Bonds is fully taxable, but three things tend to reduce the tax revenue from these popular bonds. They are:

1. Many persons cash their E bonds before interest is payable on them.
2. Many bonds are bought and cashed by persons whose annual incomes are so low they do not have to pay a federal tax.
3. Numerous bond owners probably don't know that the interest is taxable and fail to report it in their tax returns.

**Borden's Going To

D. M. Dent, G. M.**

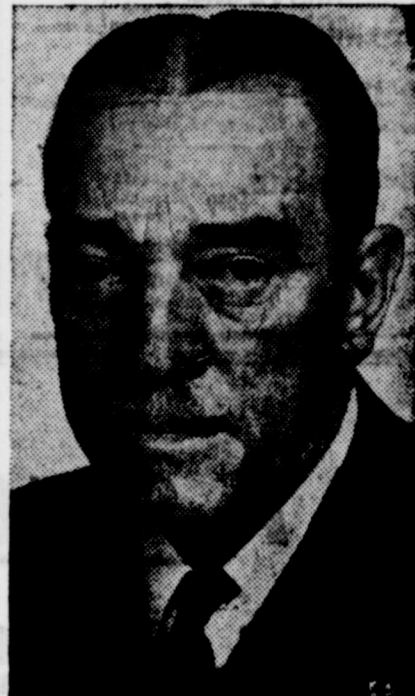
The Borden Company, with Daniel M. Dent, General Manager as the source, has advised C. of C. Manager Bill Thomson that they'll be around.

Here's the high points of a form letter received from the company.

The plant will continue to operate as a milk plant until at least March 1, 1949, and will not be sold unless a substantial price is obtained for it. In the event a substantial price cannot be obtained, the activities of the plant will be expanded to include other products in addition to evaporated milk. More fluid milk and dairy products will be needed to take care of the expansion.

If no satisfactory offer has been received by next fall, their plans are to withdraw the listing of the plant, and they will advise immediately and expand the activities of the plant.

Even the government doesn't know how much revenue it gets from the income tax on interest on "E" bonds or other federal securities. To find out would require a special check of millions of tax returns, costing considerable money and time.

Actually, interest is not paid on the bonds. Instead their redemption or "cashing-in" value increases periodically. This value increase is called interest for tax purposes.

There is no increase in redemption value until the end of the first year after the bond is purchased. So if the holder of an "E" bond cashes it before the end of a year after he buys it, he doesn't owe any income tax on it.

A table of redemption (interest) values is printed on each "E" bond. This tells how much to report as interest income. If bonds are held to maturity—10 years—the interest is a maximum of about 2.9 per cent a year.

The income tax law permits holders of "E" bonds to report the interest each year or to wait until the bonds are cashed and include all of the interest as income in that year.

Some \$19,350,000,000 worth of "E" bonds, out of a total of \$50,771,000,000 issued, have been redeemed. It is estimated interest paid on the redeemed bonds averaged about 1.3 per cent.

Even if it were the maximum 2.9 per cent, the annual interest on small bond holdings would be very small. Some tax authorities believe that many little bond holders have a tendency to forget to report interest income of 50 cents to three or four dollars a year.

The total "forgotten" probably is a sizeable sum.

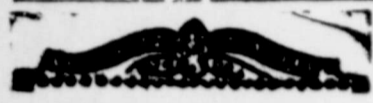

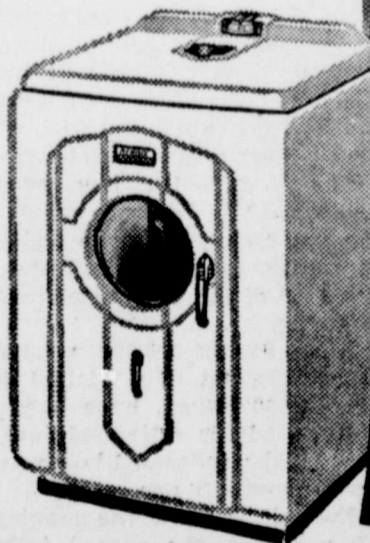

The soil removal tests were made in accordance with the Test Manual of the American Washer and Ironer Manufacturers Association, with water temperatures of 160° for the automatic machine and 125° for non-automatic type machines as specified by the Manual.

For the germ removal tests the washing procedure as above was supplemented by a pre-determined rinse procedure established from contact with authorities in the field of home laundering including the manufacturers of the machines used. The Bendix was used in accordance with the manufacturer's published instructions. Staphylococcus aureus bacteria (bacteria commonly used for test purposes) were used to measure efficiency of germ removal.

The four washers used, three non-automatic and a Bendix automatic Washer, were purchased in the open market by the Pittsburgh Testing Laboratory.
