Looks like the City-County Laird. could lease the lot across from the hospital, if necessary, and provide shady parking space for any and everybody.





AUGUST 1 to AUGUST 7

Seventl-five years ago this week-August 1-the world's first cable car jerked up steep Clay Street in San Francisco. This ingenious vehicle was the invention of A. S. Halladie of that city. Beneath the surface of the street, and between two car tracks, moved a heavy steel rope, powered by an engine in a distant building. The motorman of the car dropped a grip bar through a slot in the street. As the bar gripped the moving cable the cable car was pulled along. Horse-drawn public carriers became a thing of the past as American cities began installing cable car systems. Here was the first step in mechanizing urban transportation on city streets and to A. S. 




