





Few men have a more secure place in English literature than the patron saint of all fishermen....Izaak Walton...born 355 years ago this week; on August 9. In 1653, he published the first edition of his famous book, The Complete Angler, in which he pictured the delights of fishing and much of his own lovable and amusing character. For a quarter of a century, he continued to enlarge his book until in 1676 the original 13 chapters had grown to 21. Multitudes who have never put a worm on a hook, still turn to Izaak Walton's book, not for advice on the technique of fishing, but rather to enjoy its quaint phrases, happy quotations and the songs, poems and anecdotes of the kindly old fisherman-philosopher.

Space in this column is too short to go into full particulars, but will say briefly that George Brown this week. there was a state law passed making it possible for farmers to set up Soil Conservation Districts off while combining maize. Such a District has been set up for Hamilton and Coryell counties as a unit. The District is governed by five supervisors. At this time Coryell County has two men on the board, Sam Powell of Gatesville, and Virgil Lockhart of Pidcoke. All legal business of the District is handled by the five man board. They together with any assistance they might use, outline the plan of Soil Conservation work for a particular year. Every farmer in these two counties is eligible to participate.

A 1949 Conservation plan as set up by farmers from each community will be given wide spread publicity; and everyone is urged to participate. Participating may not mean to get everything done in one year. You can participate by starting this fall by planting a soil building crop—winter peas, vetch, or clovers—using superphosphate to increase the growth. You can participate by starting a pasture improvement program. This might mean deferred grazing, reseeding of grasses, and cutting all cedar or other obnoxious are Dude Ranching near Ward, vegetation.



Aid" or Waste?

Suppose your doctor should say, after having drained off about three quarts of your blood: "Why, my poor man, you look anemic. I'm sorry for you. Out of my well-known generosity I am going to give you a halfpint of blood." You wouldn't consider his reasoning to make good sense. Yet, the backers of federal aid to education, arguing that "poorer" states are not able to support adequate educational programs within their borders, fall back on that sort of thinking.

For the federal government to take from Arkansas \$98 million a year in income taxes and then offer back \$6 million in "aid" because of Arkansas poverty, just doesn't make sense. If the federal government would eliminate its present wasteful spending and reduce income taxes by only 10 per cent, that alone would be worth more to the "poorer" states than passing back to them this proposed "aid."

Operation: Wasteful

It must be remembered that Washington has no money to give anybody. The federal government can hand out only that which it collects. It to call on him for assistance in orcan only tax the states to get money with which to "aid" the states. We should remember, moreover, that such aid will always be weighted with bureaucrats and political hangers-on, to be paid for by the same states that get the "aid." The local way is not only the responsible way, it is also the economical way.

The federal government has no record for the economical operation of anything. Should our public school system become federally controlled, I would definitely expect it to become a wasteful operation. (Most of our Indians are educated in federal schools. The cost per student is several times greater than in our regular schools.) A federally operated school system would show the same waste and inefficiency that is typical of federal operations in general.

How to Become Poorer

We have a national debt so monstrous already that there is mounting concern whether we shall be able to meet present obligations and maintain economic stability. Therefore, I look upon federal economy and efficiency as an issue of prime importance. The same thinking that begs for federal aid to education can be allowed to wreck the government by adding financial burden upon financial burden, when the treasury has more debt than anything else.

As an Arkansas citizen, I am fully aware of our own educational problems, in one of these "poorest" states. Yet, we have tripled our per capita income since 1939. Scores of new industries have been started in the state, and our agriculture is prosperous. We can support an adequate school system. What Arkansas needs most is a suitable reorganization of our outmoded system, not federal aid as a crutch for all present weaknesses.

What America actually needs today is deep moral purpose in her education, rather than a more extravagant system. Our educational advantages have increased greatly in the last 40 Turnersville: 5 hits, 2 runs, 6 years, but the juvenile crime rate has increased just as fast. There are those who would make federal aid the answer to juvenile delinquency, a problem which goes back largely to home and parents. Yet, the moral purpose that America needs so much suffers a real set-back every time we hand individual freedom to federal bureau-
