James Edward Weeks Dies After Being Struck By Pickup

In an unavoidable accident, near Crawford Grocery on Highway 36, just out of Gatesville, James Edward Weeks, 67, was struck by a pickup, about 11:30 a. m. Friday. He was immediately carried to Coryell Memorial hospital where he died about 11:30 a. m. Saturday.

Reports are, Mr. Weeks had stopped his vehicle, or had gotten out of one opposite the store, and started across the highway. He let one truck pass, and stepped in front of one coming the other way, which was too close for the driver Vernon Wright, to avoid hitting him. Mr Wright swerved his pickup, but was unable to miss him.

Funeral services were held at 10 o'clock Sunday morning at Scott's Funeral Home, Gatesville, with Revs. W. B. Holmes and B. F. Reynolds conducting the services, and was conveyed from there to Gouldbusk Cemetery, near Coleman, where he was interred, Revs. F. M. Copeland and Gail G. Buckles conducting the services there. Morton Scott & Son, Funeral Directors, in charge.

Mr. Weeks was born February 4, 1881, and was a son of David Weeks and the former Miss Sally Busby. He was married to Miss Bettie Gideon September 12, 1902 and was a member of the Prsb- yrian church.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Bettie Weeks, and his mother, Mrs. Sallie Weeks, Gatesville, a son, Bennett Weeks, Austin; three daughters, Mrs. Vancyle Boatright, Humble; Mrs. Pauline Stone of Dallas; Mrs. Avelea Gunn, of Springer, New exico; also nine grandchildren and 1 great grandchild.

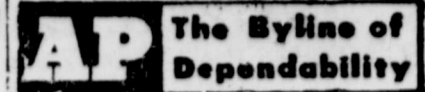
School Accepts City's Price on School Tax Collection Job

grams in that the farmer receives no money at the time he signs the purchase agreement. He merely stores his grain, either on the farm or in a warehouse, signs an option to deliver up to a specified amount of grain to the Commodity Credit Corporation next May, for which he is guaranteed the support price. If the farmer signs a purchase agreement he is not obligated to deliver any grain, or he may deliver less than the amount shown on the agreement.

The support price on No. 1 wheat for Correll County is \$2.03 per bushel, and No. 2 or better grain sorghum \$2.38 per cyt.

The final date for signing purchase agreements on grains is December 31, 1948. These forms are available at the county ACA office. Also more detailed information regarding the support price programs may be obtained by contacting the ACA office, Foote said.

The ACA office also advises that the Government loan rates on this year's cotton crop were announced last week, and that the rate on 15/16 middling for this section of the State is 30.53 cents per pound.

Coryell Man Wins First Prize At Sonora Wool and Mohair Show
 Falvey Weeks purchased a registered DeLaine ewe at the Gatsville Sheep Show last spring. He sheared 18 lbs. of wool from this ewe and shipped it to the Sonora Wool and Mohair Show and Sale. His fleece won the blue ribbon and sold for 85c per pound. This was a Sappington ewe bred at Talpa, Texas.

A second surprise was field after field of open cotton. At the present rate of opening all the cotton in that part of the county will be harvested by September 20th, assuming pickers are available. Cotton in other sections will be later. The hot weather has really lowered the yield. In most fields there is as much fruit in the middles as found on the stalk.

One of these families live in a 12 by 12 room with a dirt floor. The mother of ten children lived in America until she was thirteen years old. Russia would like to add Greece to her string of countries and when this happens the Greeks have lost all they have left—freedom.

Crape Myrtles Are Easy To Grow
 The beautiful crape myrtle, (Lagerstroemia indicia), needs less of your care than most shrubs. This native of China grows in almost any soil. It thrives on little or much rainfall. Cold kills it to the ground, but it comes up from the roots and blooms every year. You can choose white, light or dark pink, lavender, purple, or the popular ruby red.

Your crape myrtle will bloom in full sun more than in shade. Notice the small flowers on large crape myrtles which are not pruned. Take a tip and prune yours in winter. If you want your crape myrtle to bloom a long time in summer, cut off the faded flowers. Keep well watered. It may bloom several times in one year. Fertilize each plant in April or early May. Well rotted barnyard manure is a good fertilizer.

Do not fertilize in warm weather unless your plants have plenty of water. Mulch with a three or four inch layer of leaves and straw. This layer should cover a ten by ten foot square or more. The layer of mulch holds water in the soil and shades the roots.

Aphids or "plant lice" may make the leaves fall, may make honeydew or cause black mold on the leaves. Spray or dust with nicotine, derris or pyrethrum.
 White fly causes black mold on leaves and small white scales underneath. Spray or dust with 5% DDT.

Bowdery mildew looks like ashes on leaves, tyigs, and blooms. Leaves curl and blooms do not open. Wetting or shading plants makes mildew worse. Dry weather and sunshine kills mildew. Damp weather brings it back. Dust with cotton dusting sulphur. Mildew resistant crape myrtles are being advertised. Ask your local dealer about them.

Crape myrtle can be grown from seed. The new plant may or may not be the color you like. Young plants are easily killed by sun or dry soil. Half shade, moisture, and drainage will keep them growing. They are more trouble than cuttings. Cuttings give the same color as the plant from which they are taken. Cuttings set out early grow fast and bloom the first year. Avoid soft green wood or old gray wood for cuttings. The best time for setting out cuttings is from January through March.

The earlier the more plants will grow.
 Were your crape myrtles planted too near the house for your comfort? You can move them during winter safely. One half the top growth should be cut back to balance the root loss. Crape myrtle moved in the spring may not put out leaves until summer. They should be planted from six to ten feet from the house.
 A stump moved with some of its roots grows a spreading, bushy shrub the first year. It may be several feet tall by the time it blooms.

to the ground. Many people saw them off even with the ground every year. This is not always necessary. They should be pruned enough to give them a good shape and right size.

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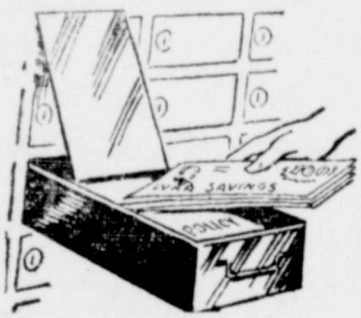

**OLD WORLD SHACKLES
 ACCENT U. S. BLESSINGS**

The blessings and privileges of free America are never so sweet as when you are forced to get along without them. Coming back to the United States after two months in the regimented atmosphere of Europe and the near East, you are overwhelmed by the sheer joy of being free again.

Free to go where you please, free to take a plane or a train without filling in a dozen forms, free to pick up your traveling bags without detailed examinations by unfriendly officials, free to go from one city to the next without consent of suspicious police, free to buy food or clothing or what have you without governmental coupons or restrictive red tape, free to express your opinions, free to voice your protests, free to say 'yes,' and free to say 'no,' free to be a free American once again. It is an amazing experience. You wonder how on earth you ever could have taken freedom for granted like the air you breathe.

The contrast between living conditions in America and almost every country of Europe and all those of the Near East is sharp and stark. The average industrial worker or the average farmer of America lives in Utopia as compared to the lot of the workers and the farmers of Europe and the Near East.

Industrial workers of America have automobiles, electric lights, radios, refrigerators, a variety of good food and warm clothing. On the continent the workers struggle to remain alive. They know nothing whatever of modern conveniences or simple luxuries. For the most part they live in one or two room hovels or in crowded flats.

The living conditions of the farm class are even worse, automobiles, and modern farm equipment are practically non-existent in the farming sections.

They live and work and struggle as the peasants of Europe 20 years ago.

Existence for the middle classes is not much better than that of the industrial workers and farmers. In prewar days the middle classes did enjoy many of the so called 'better things' of life, but their standard of living at its best was very meager compared to the American standards. But all of that is changed now and the middle classes too are fighting to stay alive. In the blackmarket countries prices are soaring and inflation is rampant. In the countries where there is rigidly controlled economy wages are low and regimentation is a stone around every person's neck.

There is no personal freedom as we know it anywhere in Europe, except in a modified form in the Scandinavian countries. Even free England is no longer free. Under national Socialism Englishmen are regimented as never before. They cannot leave the country without the government's consent and even then can take only twenty shillings with them. Elsewhere on the continent everybody is under constant surveillance. There are restrictions of almost every possible nature, restrictions meekly accepted by the people there, which if attempted here would cause a social revolution.

If they don't like all these restrictions why they rise up and rebel a friend asked me yesterday when we were discussing conditions in Europe. It is a natural question and the answer is just as simple: You don't rebel against and in the face of machine guns. In the generations gone by men could rise up against tyrants and win with clubs and forks. But not anymore. Two trained soldiers armed with machine guns can keep a thousand men cowed. In addition, the people of Europe are so tired and exhausted by war they have no heart for rebellion. Complicating their economic troubles is the evergrowing fear of Soviet war of aggression. Against the Soviets they have no adequate defense. They can only look to America and pray that we will save them.

Socialization, class privileges, regimentation and war have brought Europe to its present unhappy state. By contrast consider conditions in free America. Nowhere on the face of the earth has any country even remotely approached the American standard of living and personal liberty that we enjoy under free enterprise. Nowhere else is there so much production and plenty.

This is in fact the workers' republic because almost everybody in America works and works hard in an atmosphere of unrestricted opportunity. That is true of no

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other country in the world. It explains why so many, many millions of Europeans would give anything they possess just for a chance to come to America to live. They would give everything for what all Americans have for FREE. END.

S. J. R. No. 2

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board for apportioning the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment; providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation by the Governor; and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 28. The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, agreeable to the provisions of Sections 25, 26, and 26-a of this Article. In the event the Legislature shall at any such first regular session following the publication of a United States decennial census, fail to make such apportionment, same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) members, as follows: The Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment of such regular session. The Board shall, within sixty (60) days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, or into senatorial or representative districts, as the failure of action of such Legislature may make necessary. Such apportionment shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more of the members of the Board duly acknowledged as the act and deed of such Board, and, when so executed and filed with the Secretary of State, shall have force and effect of law. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extraordinary writs conformable to the usages of law. The Legislature shall provide necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's session in the same manner and amount as they would receive while attending a special session of the Legislature. This amendment shall become effective January 1, 1951."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"For the amendment to Section 28, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."

"Against the amendment to Section 28, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment."

Each voter at such election

shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of this state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article IV, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section to be known as Section 3a, so as to provide for succession to the office of Governor in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, or fails to qualify, before taking his oath of office as Governor; and providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended, by adding another Section to follow Section 3, and be designated Section 3a, to read as follows:

"Section 3a. If, at the time the Legislature shall canvass the election returns for the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the person receiving the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, has died, then the person having the highest number of votes for the office of Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until after the next general election. It is further provided that in the event the person with the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, shall become disabled, or fail to qualify, then the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until a person has qualified for the office of Governor, or until after the next general election. Any succession to the Governorship not otherwise provided for in this Constitution, may be provided for by law; provided, however, that any person succeeding to the office of Governor shall be qualified as otherwise provided in this Constitution, and shall, during the entire term to which he may succeed, be under all restrictions and inhibitions imposed in this Constitution on the Governor."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the date provided by law in the month of November, A. D. 1948, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes disabled, before qualifying and for such succession in other contingencies."

Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leaving the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the

State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated as "Section 60" to authorize counties of this State to provide insurance for county employees; providing for the Governor's proclamation, and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the State Constitution be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 59, to be designated "Section 60" to read as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all county employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties of this State and for the payment of the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees." and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for county employees." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

The Statewide Survey of Public Opinion

AUSTIN, Texas, August 14.—Most Texas voters believe that Thomas E. Dewey will be the next president of the United States.

Prospect of a nationwide Republican victory has become clearer to Texans amid the growing rift in the ranks of the Democratic Party. The voter opinion index of The Texas Poll has jumped 8 points—from 46 to 54 per cent—in favor of the Republicans following the major party conventions in Philadelphia and the Dixiecrat convention in Birmingham.

Two before and once after the party conventions, The Texas Poll measured voter opinion with this question:

"Regardless of your own political leanings, who do you think will win the presidential election in November—the Democrats or the Republicans?"

FARM SAFETY

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Results of the surveys reported above are based on cross section samplings of the entire electorate, including voters of all political stripes. The results show, NOT that a majority of Texas will support Dewey, but merely that a majority thinks he will win in the nation as a whole.

How Texans themselves vote will depend in part on tradition and in part on developments between now and November. Tradition will exert a powerful influence in holding Texas in line for President Truman, even the sentiment throughout the state is overwhelmingly against his civil rights program. It remains to be seen how much of this latent anti-Truman sentiment can be translated into "band-wagon" votes for Dewey or "protest" votes for Gov. J. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina, the Dixiecrat candidate, who is appealing primarily to opponents of federal civil rights legislation.

The Texas Poll is planning to make periodic surveys on this question between now and the general election.

Past surveys by The Texas Poll have shown these significant facts:

1. A large majority disagreed with President Truman over his civil rights program in March, when it was publicized in Texas. At that time many said they were ready to back a Southern Democrat "who believes in white supremacy", as said they would stick with Truman for president.

2. In Map, only 49 per cent of a cross-section of Democratic voters were willing to say that Truman should be nominated by the Democratic Party. In early July, on the eve of the party convention, only 36 per cent wanted to see him nominated, the poorest showing that Truman ever made in a survey by The Texas Poll.
