## ACA Announces Winter Legume Program For Farmers

The ACA office is now issuing prior approvals and purchase orders on winter legumes and rye grass to be seeded this fall on cropland, according to Clois D. Stone.

The types of seed included under the 1949 winter crop practice, and payment rates per hundred pounds, are as follows: Austrian winter and Dixie wonder peas, \$5.50; Hairy vetch, \$13.80; Common or Willamette vetch, \$6.90; Hubam Clover, \$10.20; Melilotus Indica, \$7.50; Singletary, Caley or Wild winter peas, \$6.60; Rye grass, \$6.00.

These payment rates, on an average, are about 60% of the total cost of the seed, leaving the other 40% which the farmer must pay.

Purchase orders can be issued on the peas, vetches and rye grass. Coryell County is North of the area in which purchase orders can be issued on Hubam Clover for fall seeding.

Stone said that if peas or vetch are obtained under purchase order that the farmer is required to plant the legumes on land which has been phosphated, must inoculate the seed and plant them not later than December 1, 1948, and also that there is a minimum seeding rate per acre on each type of seed.

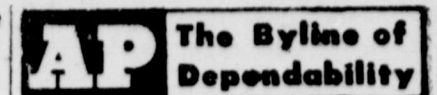

The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research's seasonally-adjusted index of Texas business activity stood at 277 per cent of the 1935-1939 base period in

July, establishing a new high for the post war period. The Index was 216 in June, 1948 and 200 in July 1947. Department and apparel store sales rose 28 percent pay rolls and electric power consumption 2 percent, and employment 1 percent. On the down-

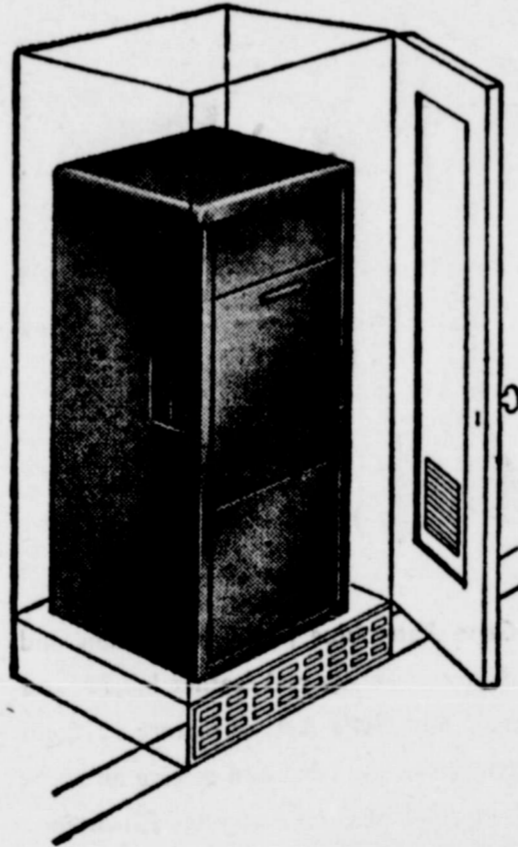

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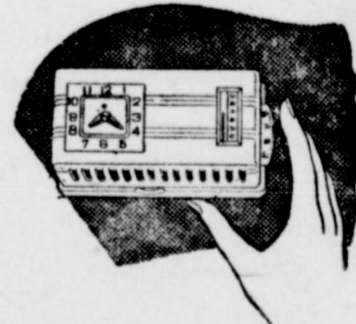

A recent arrival in the Marianas and now serving with the Far East Air Forces on the Island of Guam, is Sgt. Kenneth C. Bannister.

Sgt. Bannister is the son of Mr. W. T. Bannister of Oglesby and a brother of Mrs. E. M. Davis of Gatesville, Mrs. John Hunter of McGregor and Mr. W. T. Bannister, Jr. of Oglesby. Before entering the service he attended Waco High School in Waco, Texas, and was later employed there.

Sgt. Bannister is assigned as a clerk-Typist with the 239th Medical dispensary here in the Marianas air material area. Commanded by Colonel Charles K. Moore, Marian, as this command is known became a vital command of the air forces in September of 1944. Since that time the responsibilities of this command have multiplied until today the war-famous 374th troop carrier group, which is a part of Mariana, Amasses 1500 flying hours monthly providing airlift for essential supplies to air force units all over the Pacific.

In March 1941, Bannister entered the service and was stationed at William Beaumont General Hospital in Pomona, California as an x-ray technician until 1943 when he was transferred to Madigan General Hospital at Fort Lewis, Washington. 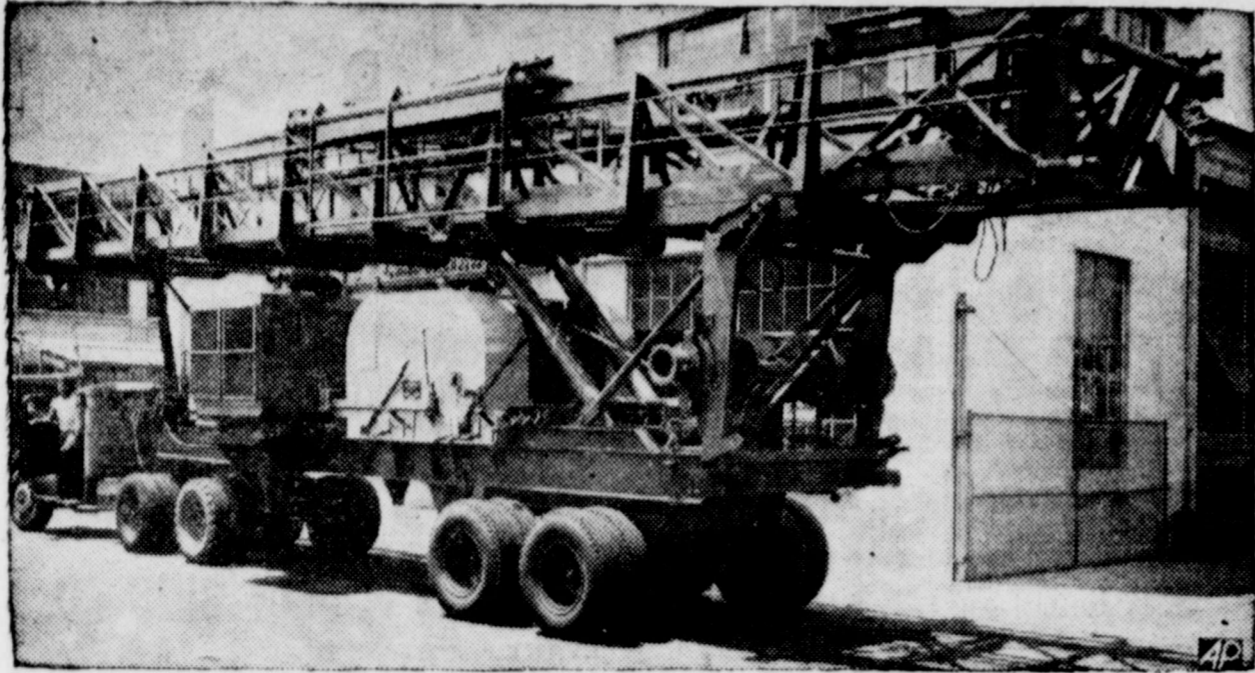

**THE NEW LOOK—IN RIGS**  
First of the new type, hydraulically raised, mobile telescope rigs to be used in West Texas, has been put in operation east of Blair in Taylor county by

the Drilling and Exploration Co., one of the more recent oil operating concerns to establish district headquarters in Abilene, Texas. In drilling position the big rig stands 97 feet high, but telescoped and lowered, as shown above, it has an overall length of 60 feet. The trailer unit on which the rig is built has a gross weight of 74,800 pounds and includes the draw-

works, power plant, light plant and derrick. The pump, tool house and sub structure are separate units. In theory, the rig can drill to 9,000 feet, but in field practice it is limited to 5,500 feet in 4 1/2 inch hole or 6,500 feet in 3 1/2 inch hole. The derrick is operated at a slight angle, so that the rotary table is outside the derrick. (AP) photo.

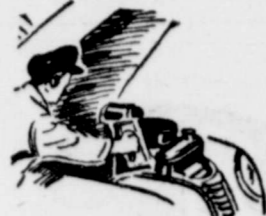
