Two Coryell County boys are among the 357 Texans being returned aboard the U. S. Army Transport Lawrence Victory, and they were originally interred in temporary military cemeteries in Italy.

These boys, who we have no military information on as yet are Corporal Joseph M. Orbeck of the U. S. Army, and his closest of kin is his wife, Mrs. Johnnye C. Orbeck of Gatesville and their small son.

The other boy was Pfc. Jack M. Crosby, whose closest of kin is J. Clint Crosby, of Route 1, Jonesboro.

On the ship returning to the States were 7,129 bodies in all.

Gatesville Colored School Organizes School Savings Bank

Gatesville Colored Schools with the faculty and student body have organized a Thrift Club, primarily to give the pupils an opportunity to deposit money regularly, and thus, to inculcate the habit of saving.

Operation of such a banking system also provides valuable and practical training, on a small scale, in the essentials of a business office and on banking methods. It provides a definite unit of work that involves the actual handling of money, reports that must balance, a knowledge of some business forms. The manipulation of an adding machine or other machines is not included since the school does not own any such material.

The system is operated by the following departments or divisions: Collecting, Posting, Compiling.

President of the club is Rudolph Snow; Secretary is Shirley Wade; and Treasurer is Mary Ellen Mayberry.

The system got under way on Monday, October 11, with individual deposits in family sealed banks, that is, each account is deposited separately, but each member of a family's money is banked in the same bank.

Organizing and instructing are Professor Archie J. Hatchel, who is principal and Mrs. B. L. Crain, Assistant Teacher.

Sanders ruled contempt of Court in San Antonio yesterday by Special Judge William Davis, ordered to serve a three-day jail sentence, after attempting to take over the bench.

PARIS, France, Nov. 10. (AP)—The United Nations Political Committee demanded today that Albania, Bulgaria and Yugoslavia stop aiding the Greek guerillas. Meanwhile, Russia proposed that the Security Council order negotiations between the Arabs and Jews for peace in Palestine.

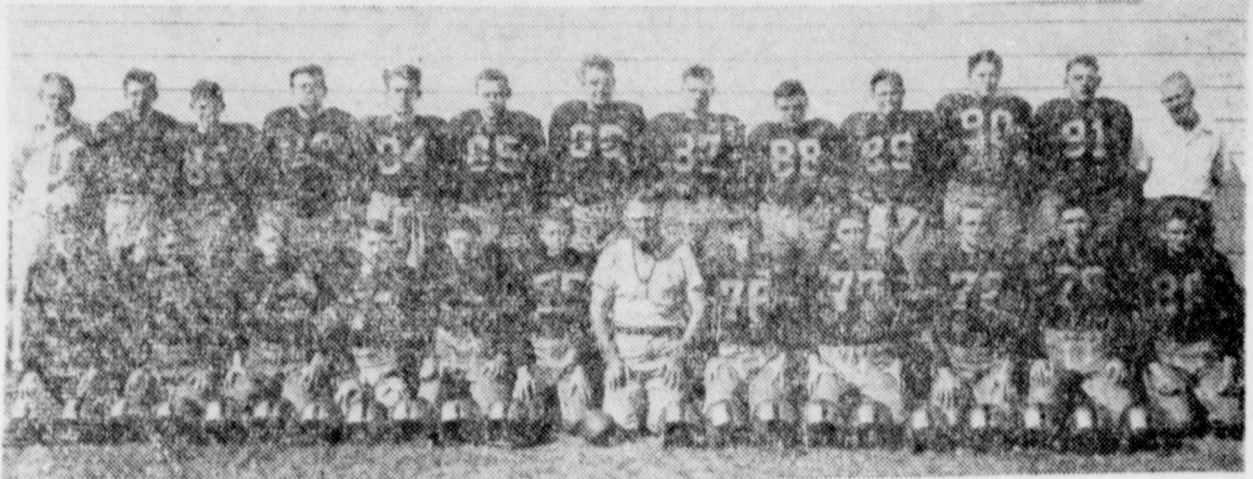

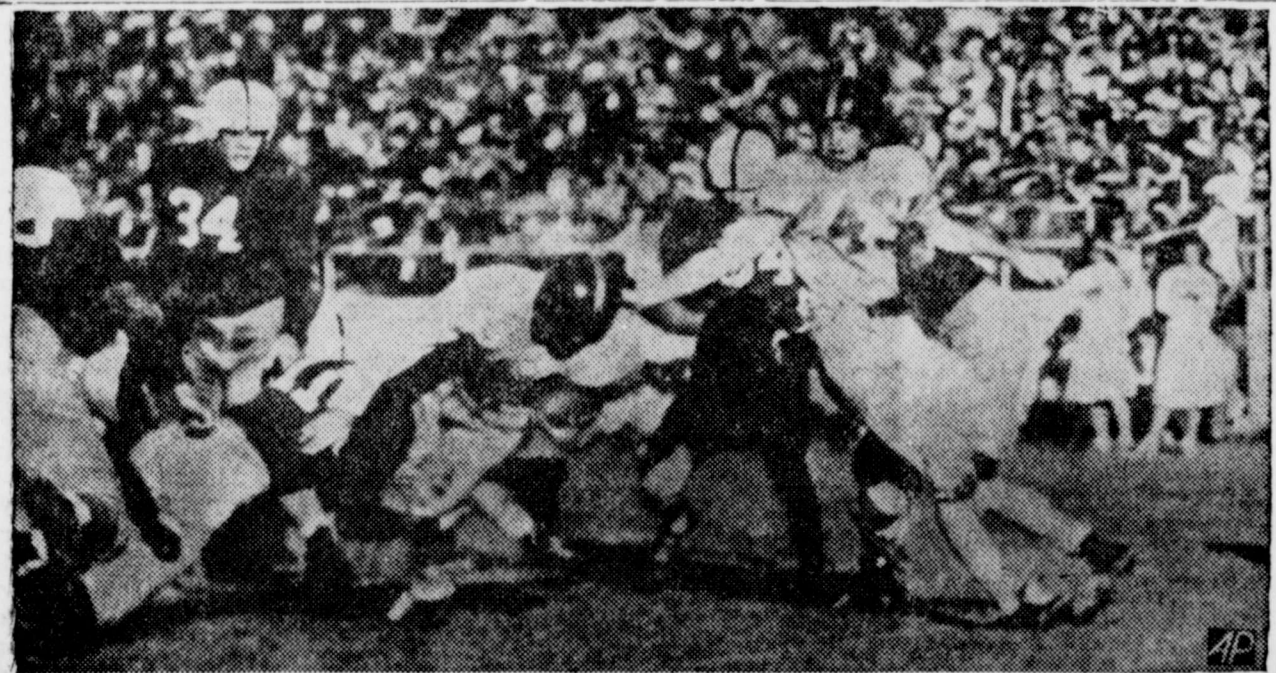

On November 7, 1867, just 81 years ago this week, Marie Sklodowska was born

in Warsaw. Later removing to Paris, she married Pierre Curie and with him discovered radium, the element used in the treatment of cancer and other diseases. In 1898, after her marriage to Pierre, the couple found a new metal, polonium, while investigating pitchblende. 6 months later they discovered radium. In 1934 Mme. Curie died, a victim of anemia, the result of long exposure to the radiations of the elements she and her husband had discovered.

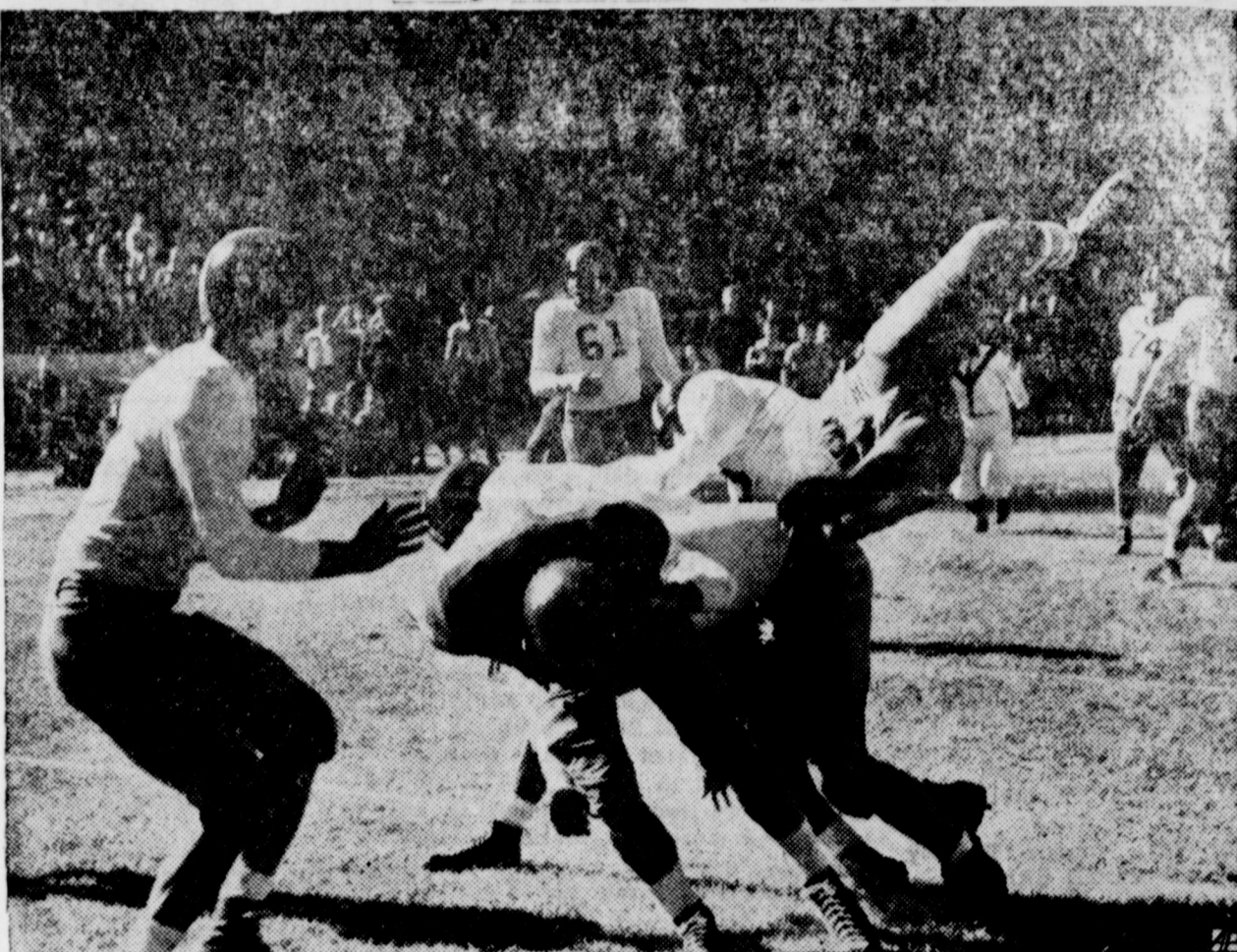

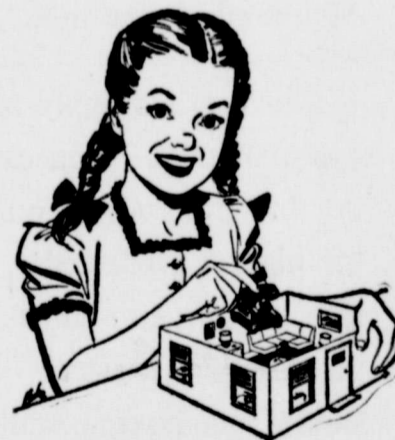
