TEXAS UNEMPLOYMENT NEWS

QUESTION: I am now receiving unemployment benefits, but have been offered temporary employment. If I take it, it will probably only last a week or two, while my benefits will last ten more weeks. Should I turn it down and wait for a permanent job?

ANSWER: No. Take the job and keep yourself eligible for unemployment benefits that much longer. In other words, if you stop receiving benefits, it is like leaving your money in the bank. The benefits will be there when your job closes and you will be assured of an income longer. Also, the Employment Service will be trying to find you another job.

QUESTION: I am an employee of the city water and light plant. I am told that if I lose my job, I can draw no unemployment benefits. Is this true?

ANSWER: Yes. According to the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act, services performed in certain labor classes are exempt. If you do agricultural or domestic labor, you are not eligible for unemployment compensation. Certain other classes of labor are also not covered under the Act. If you are now working in a class not covered under the Act, the Unemployment Commission will have no "work record" for you and you will have no basis for drawing unemployment benefits if you become unemployed.

QUESTION: How do I know if my employer is "covered" under the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act?

ANSWER: When an employer is covered under the Act (which makes his employees eligible for unemployment benefits), a placard is usually posted in his office stating his coverage. Roughly, your employer is probably covered if he employs eight people and they are not doing agricultural, domestic, or a few other kinds of work. Ask him.

QUESTION: Why do I not receive unemployment benefits of \$15.00 a week? When I was working I got \$22.50.

ANSWER: Unemployment benefits are reckoned on your past record of length of employment and wages earned. Your benefits will equal one-half of your previous average weekly salary with a maximum of \$15.00 and a minimum of \$4.50. In your case you should be receiving a weekly check for \$11.25, if you are otherwise qualified.

ONLY 450 PARMER COUNTY FARMERS MAY RAISE COTTON THIS YEAR

(An Editorial from The State Line Tribune)

County Agent Jason O. Gordon has informed The Tribune that Parmer County has been allotted a cotton acreage of 17,846 acres for 1938. This acreage, according to present records, will have to be divided out among 450 cotton farmers in the county, which means that more than half the cotton producers of Parmer county will not be allowed to plant cotton this year in compliance with the Conservation Program.

These are the facts as they stand at this time. Think of it! More than half of the cotton farmers of this county are to be barred from planting cotton this year. And the fault is not with the County Agent nor the Agricultural Conservation Program—it lies with the farmers themselves.

The County Agent's office has made repeated efforts to get the legal descriptions of land to be farmed this year—and to date less than half the cotton farmers of the county have filed this information with their community committees.

The law provides that the cotton allotment shall be distributed among the farmers who have agreed to comply with the 1938 program, and unless the other half of the farmers file their legal descriptions with their committees, the County Agent has no alternative to take; he must give the 17,864 acres to the 450 farmers who have shown a willingness to cooperate.

Already the farm program in Parmer County is nearly three months behind—all because of the fault of the farmers themselves in not filing their legal descriptions.

When the "books are closed" and you are denied a reasonable cotton acreage—DON'T BLAME ANYBODY BUT YOURSELF. The County Agent cannot give you a cotton allotment unless you apply for it through your local committee. —AND THIS MUST BE DONE BEFORE THE CLOSE OF THE PRESENT WEEK.

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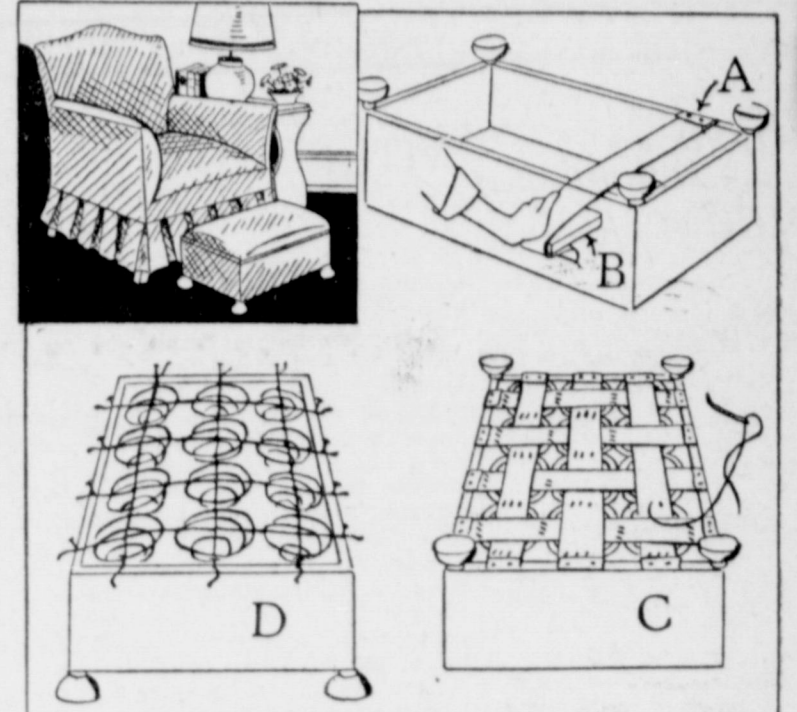
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HOW TO SEW

Why Not Fix Those Sagging Springs?

SPRINGS in furniture seldom break. The twine that holds them does break and webbing wears out throwing the springs out of position.

To set the springs you will need a ball of twine and a needle such as used by the upholsterer, enough webbing to replace the old, tacks 1/2-inch long with large heads, a block of wood for stretching the webbing, a tack hammer and a tack lifter. Remove the cover from the seat carefully so that it may either be used again or serve as a pattern. Most of the padding may also be used. Observe how each layer of material is fastened in place, so that you may put it back the same way.

Remove the springs and all old tacks. Tack the first strip of webbing to one edge of the bottom of the frame, letting the end extend 1/2 inch beyond the edge, then fold the end over the first tacks and tack again as at A. Draw the webbing across the frame using the block of wood as a lever to stretch webbing taut as at B. When all the strips have been stretched and tacked across the frame one way, stretch strips of webbing across the other way weaving these over and under the first ones as at C. Now, sew the

bottom of each spring to the webbing with the upholsterer's twine and curved needle as shown in this diagram.

Next, turn the frame right side up, drive tacks part way in along the edges; then tie the springs across each way with upholsterer's twine as shown in diagram C. The twine is tied to the tacks and to each spring and regulates the height of the springs—the outside edges usually being lower than the center to make a rounded top. When the springs are regulated evenly, drive the tacks in; then replace burlap or muslin coverings and padding.

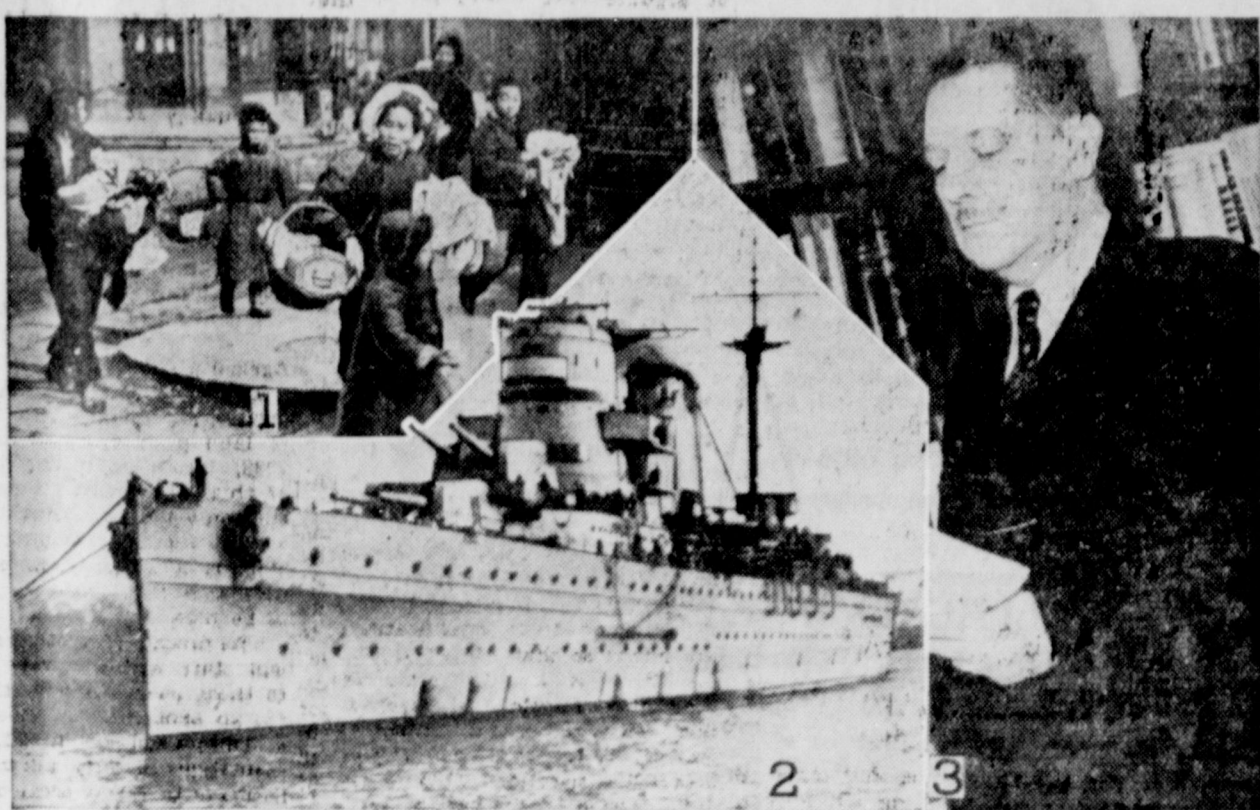

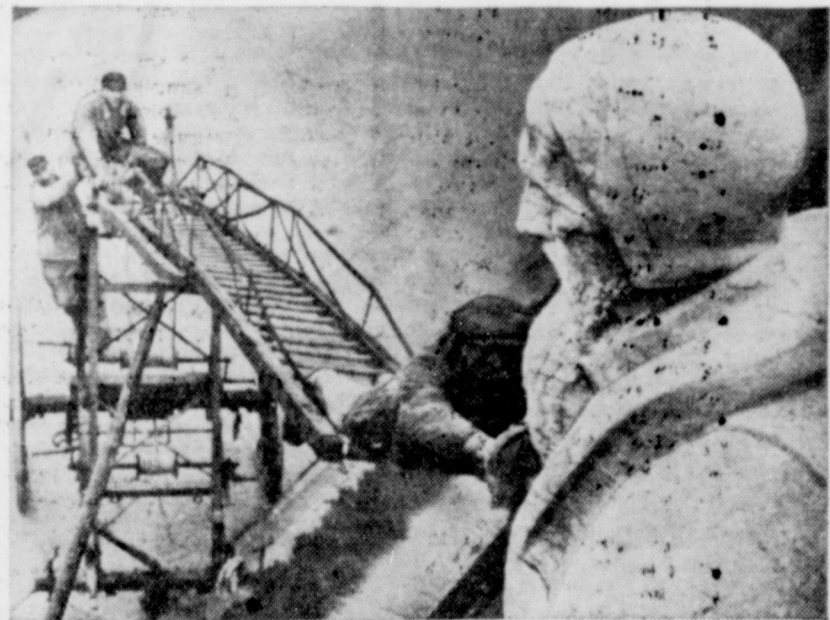

and plenty of it, and I have acquired it by my own individual efforts and calm reasonings, and I thus feel under no obligations to anyone else for their help in achieving my success. I do not want to divide my wealth with the other fellow, why should he divide with me?

Agricultural Conservation Program
This office has been requesting the legal descriptions of different tracts of land each operator will farm in 1938, since January 1. A recent check of this information reveals the fact that only 450 farms have been covered and requests for allotments filed. This is a small percentage of the estimated 1500 applications expected to be filed.

The process of allotting cotton acres will start within a very short time to those operators who have requested an allotment. The committee has a definite acreage to allot, and the regulations specify allotments shall be made to farms previously planted to cotton; provided the operator makes an official request to the County Committee.

This office has endeavored to reach each operator who filed a worksheet in 1937. We realize our mailing list is limited, and therefore, we must expect interested operators to receive their information from the county press.

A final request is being mailed from this office calling attention to sign-up days in seven communities. These dates are as follows: THURSDAY AFTERNOON at Rhea, school house; FRIONA, Buchanan Implement Company; OKLAHOMA Lane, club room; FRIDAY AFTERNOON Bovina, Martin's elevator; Farwell, District Court room; Lazbuddy, Lazbuddy store; and FRIDAY NIGHT at Lakeview, school house, regular meeting.

Operators who are receiving letters from the county agent's office regarding the 1938 Agricultural Conservation Program should understand they have filed the legal description of the land they will operate, otherwise, they would not be on our 1938 mailing list.

A trip to the north of Friona for a distance of about 15 miles, and thence east into Hereford and down highway 33 to Bovina, thence east to Homeland and north to Friona, revealed the fact that wheat fields all along this route were looking very promising, due largely to the moisture that has fallen here during the past three or four weeks.

Over in Deaf Smith county where the United States Department of Agriculture has located the conservation experiment projects and the land is either terraced or contoured the wheat appeared to be the most promising; but all of it looked good, with the exception of a few fields that had evidently been pastured down and had not been able to make the growth the other fields have made.

Many of the farmers along this drive have already done most of their listing for the spring crops and the soil appeared to have been in tip-top shape or condition for this listing, and a few fields had been gone over with a one-way plow.

It seems also, that considerable acreage of barley and some oats have been sown in the above named portion of the two counties, and the moisture conditions at present will give these crops a good and early start, which, if favorable conditions continue, will give these farmers a good yield of these two very important small grain feed crops.

Everything considered, the present prospects for good crops in this locality this season are certainly very encouraging at this time.

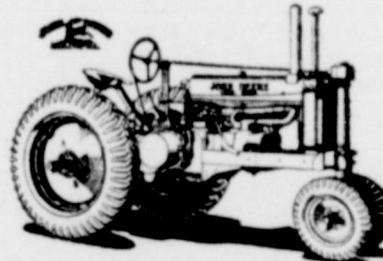

WHAT to EAT and WHY

C. Houston Goudiss Discusses CARBOHYDRATES and FATS

Foods That Provide Motive Power For the Body Machinery ★ ★

By C. HOUSTON GOUDISS

THE human body might be compared to a framework filled with machinery. It takes food to build the framework, food to run the machinery and food to keep it working efficiently and this food must be of the proper type.

Last week, I discussed the body building proteins and explained how to distinguish between those which build and repair body tissue, and those that are adequate for maintenance, but not for growth. It is equally important that you should learn something of the fuel foods which are necessary to fire the body engine and furnish motive power to propel the body machinery.

Fuel Foods Keep Us Alive

The body could not function in the absence of fuel foods any more than a machine could run without power, or a car without gas. Every breath requires an expenditure of energy, and so does every movement—from the beating of the heart to the winking of an eye. Even in repose, the body machinery is kept functioning only by an ever-present supply of fuel. For, as long as life continues—even when you are lying perfectly still—you need fuel to carry on the internal work of the body.

Activity Demands Energy Foods

Every type of daily activity, including work and exercise, requires additional fuel. If you walk slowly, you expend twice as much energy as when you sit still. And when you walk fast, you may use up four, five or six times as much energy.

The chief fuel, or energy producing foods, are the carbohydrates—that is, the starches and sugars; and fats. Protein also has some fuel value, but its primary function is to build and repair tissue.

Carbohydrates are quick burning. They might be compared to the flare of a match in a dark room, which gives bright light for an instant, but is soon extinguished. Fat, on the other hand, burns slowly, like a lamp whose wick is turned low.

Danger of Inadequate Fuel Supply

Recently there has been a tendency to minimize the importance of the fats and carbohydrates, due to the craze for dieting. Some of the results of disregarding the absolute necessity for these foods are extreme irritability, and a greater susceptibility to fatigue, nervous diseases, tuberculosis and other infections.

Too Much Fuel Causes Overweight

It is true, however, that an excess of fuel foods will tend to produce overweight. For if we assimilate them,

and do not utilize their potential energy in muscular effort, they will be stored—as fat—usually in most inconvenient locations! On the other hand, an excess of any food is a detriment. Therefore the goal should be enough, but not too much, of all necessary foods.

Since both carbohydrates and fats are energy foods, one might expect them to play an interchangeable role in the diet. To a certain extent, they do, although fat, being more concentrated, provides two and one-fourth times as much fuel value as an equal weight of carbohydrate.

But because of the variation in the way these materials are handled by the body, it is generally considered that health is best served when 40 to 50 per cent of the total energy value of foods is provided in the form of carbohydrate and 30 to 35 per cent in the form of fats.

Carbohydrates Are Quickest Fuel

Carbohydrates, which originate chiefly in plant life, are readily converted into heat and muscle energy. Foods rich in carbohydrates include bread, potatoes, macaroni, rice, cooked and ready-to-eat cereals, peanuts, dried and preserved fruits, sugars and syrup.

Sugar furnishes heat more quickly and more abundantly than any other food. But it has a tendency to dull the appetite and is also apt to cause fermentation. Therefore, a large measure of our heat and energy is best secured from starchy foods such as bread, cereals, macaroni and potatoes.

Quick energy can also be obtained from the easily digested sugars of fresh and dried fruits, such as prunes, apricots, raisins and fully ripened bananas.

Here is an interesting and important point which is frequently overlooked in unscientific reducing diets. Fat requires carbohydrates for its proper utilization by the body. That is why women who try to reduce without following a scientifically planned diet frequently become seriously ill as a result of cutting down on carbohydrates while overlooking the fats contained in milk, butter, and other foods.

Relation of Fat To Health

Fats are so necessary to the body economy that it is no exaggeration to say that without fat,

When Cooking Cheese.—In cooking anything with cheese use a low temperature, because intense heat makes cheese tough and stringy.

For Graceful Lines.—To make the hips look smaller wear dull finished fabrics. To look more slender wear one-piece dresses. A contrasting blouse and skirt will make you look shorter. The use of jabots or long scarfs will make the bust line appear smaller. Patch pockets make the hipline look larger. A contrasting belt will make the figure look shorter.

Sugaring Doughnuts.—To dust doughnuts with sugar place the sugar in a paper sack and put in six doughnuts at a time. Hold the top of the sack together and shake it. The doughnuts will then be quickly coated with sugar.

Measuring Flour.—Wheat flour is one of the easiest ingredients in baking to mismeasure. For best results always sift flour and measure by spoonfuls into a cup, being careful not to shake the filled cup.

life, in its higher forms, is impossible. The noted Arctic explorer, Stefansson, found that he could exist satisfactorily on an all-meat diet, provided he ate liberally of fat. On a diet of all lean meat, he became violently ill within a week.

Besides furnishing concentrated energy values, fats help to create the fatty tissue which cushions the nerves and abdominal organs, and forms the pleasing contours of face and figure.

Because it leaves the stomach more slowly than proteins and carbohydrates, fat retards the digestion of these food groups somewhat, and thus gives staying power to a meal. At the same time it promotes the flow of pancreatic juice and bile, thus helping in the assimilation of other foods. Foods rich in fat include butter, cheese, egg yolk, cooking fats and oils, margarine, olives, pastry, peanut butter, most nuts except chestnuts and lichi nuts, various kinds of sausage and fried foods.

Anger Destroys Fat Reserves

Experiments have demonstrated why nervous, irritable individuals are usually thin, while those with a serene temperament often accumulate weight. It has been proven that anger and fright increase the amount of fat in the blood and remove a corresponding amount of fat from its usual storage place beneath the skin. A fit of anger may take off more fat than an hour's exercise, or two or three days of enforced diet. Thus the person who allows himself to become upset continually withdraws the fat reserve from his body. Such persons could profit, perhaps, by taking more of the fat-forming foods.

But whether the members of your family are good natured, or irritable, young or old, they need a constant supply of fuel foods—at every meal, every day. Fuel foods produce energy—and energy is the motive power of life and work and thought.

WHO'S NEWS THIS WEEK

Martin Had Get-Up of Mortician

NEW YORK.—Among his companions in barnstorming, Glenn L. Martin was known as "The Dude," although his carefully tailored flying suits were always black, including their elaborate braid trimmings.

His somewhat mortuary get-up and behavior gave an impression of great conservatism, and it is not surprising that he got backing from the bankers when other aviators failed.

A few months ago, he said his Glenn L. Martin company, of Baltimore, making planes, had a backlog of \$15,500,000.

He told the house naval affairs committee there should be a 100 per cent increase in air armaments, that foreign nations are spending ten times as much as the United States. He would build a 250,000-pound bomber, carrying 30 men and a 4,000-pound bomb load 11,000 miles.

In 1912, this writer saw him put an inflated inner tube around his neck, strap a compass on his leg and take off to sea, at Avalon bay, Los Angeles, in a flying laundry wagon on which he had rigged a single wooden pontoon. He was bound for Catalina island, 20 miles away. It looked like suicide.

He not only made it, but picked up again at Catalina and finished the round trip, blanking Bleriot, whose flight over the British channel was a one-way excursion. He had made the plane in an abandoned church.

The flight got him world attention. Then he staged a plane coyote hunt, dropped a ball into a catcher's mitt and a bouquet into the arms of a beauty contest queen.

This air extravaganza did not last long. In 1913, he built and sold two model TT war planes to the army, and has been building fighting craft ever since, with the exception of trans-Pacific Clippers.

He grew up in Mackburg, Iowa, built a pusher plane in his backyard and flew it in 1908. He is fifty-two.

WILLIAM JENNINGS BRYAN, in his seersucker suit and his rumpled hat, frequently looked as if he had been sleeping under a bridge, especially in the midst of a hard campaign.

Bryan, Jr., Fastidious About Dress

His son, William Jennings Bryan, Jr., is fussy about his dress, severely and fastidiously groomed, with a jaunty little moustache and a nice collection of malacca sticks, sports clothes, and varied haberdashery.

He is in the news now as he becomes collector of customs at the port of Los Angeles, his first recognition by the California Democracy, in whose vineyard he has labored for years.

When his father laid down his staff and scrip at Dayton, Tenn., he picked up the legacy only two things—free silver and anti-evolution. He is quite unmoved by oratory, speaking with calm, legalistic precision, with no gift for the resounding or oracular.

He has made spirited forays against this or that, notably Upton Sinclair's "Epic" of 1934, but with no such impassioned fervor as that which inspired his father. But, when occasion offers, he puts in a word for silver, or against evolution.

After the Dayton trial and his father's death, he made a knightly vow that his lance always should be leveled against this ignoble theory of man's origin. But nobody seems to be bringing that up now. The argument is shifting to where man is going.

He attended the University of Nebraska three years, studied law at Georgetown university, went to Arizona on account of his wife's health, and practiced law first in Arizona and then in Los Angeles. He is fifty years old.

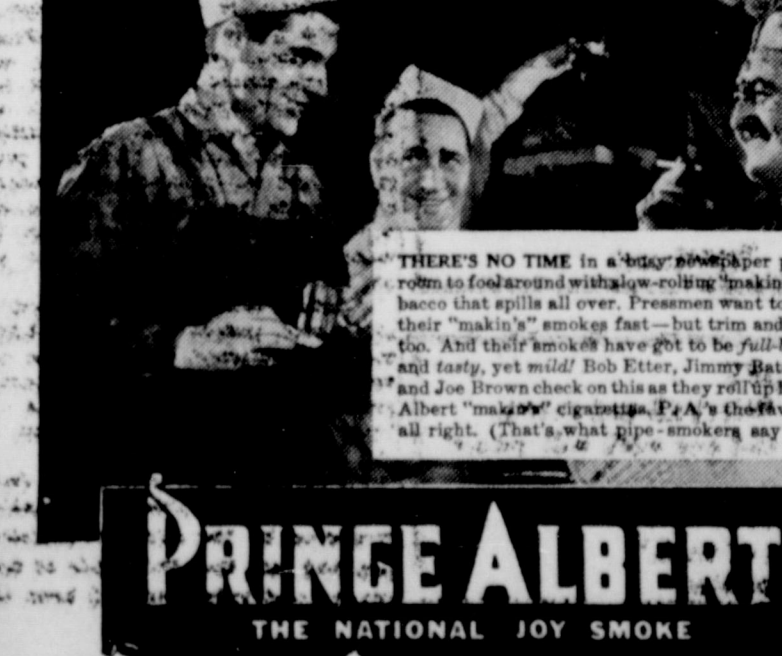

TIPS to Gardeners

Plant With Care

EXERCISE care in planting and also in preparing to plant. Though soil may be rich, it will not produce as it should unless it is prepared thoroughly.

A primary consideration in planting is to have the soil favorably moist; damp, but not wet. If circumstances demand that you plant when the ground is dry, moisten trenches or drills before dropping the seed.

To retain moisture after planting, cover seeds immediately with fine earth and press down firmly. Harold Coulter, vegetable expert of the Ferry Seed Institute, advises that temperature be considered at the time of planting. Too high a temperature is often as detrimental to seed germination as one too low. A temperature between 65 and 75 degrees is most favorable.

Soil must be loose so seedling sprouts can push through, and roots develop. Where the soil forms a heavy crust, it may sometimes be broken sufficiently to let seedlings through by gently pricking the soil with a rake.

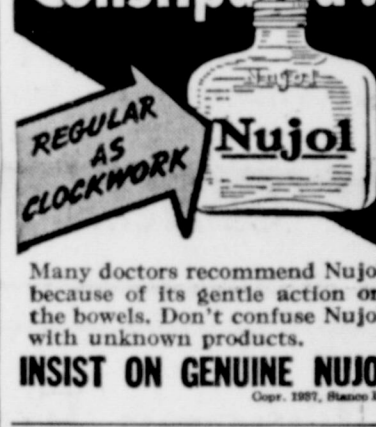

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THE REST OF THE RECORD
 By Gov. James V. Allred

GOVERNOR ALLRED NOT TO RUN AGAIN
 AUSTIN, March 24 (Special)—I have fought a good fight; I have kept the faith!
 Thus did Governor Allred summarize his stewardship of the high office to which the people of Texas have elected him twice while announcing that he would not be a candidate for a third term. The announcement was made by Governor Allred, Saturday night, over a state-wide radio hookup from the Mansion at Austin.
 "My record is written," Governor Allred said in reviewing the accomplishments of his administrations. "It can be changed neither by comments edged with bias nor statements poisoned with prejudice. I only trust that having given the best in me, I have in some measure justified your faith and confidence."
 "Naturally, I should like to see the remainder of the people's program carried out. For this reason and at the earnest insistence of many fine friends throughout the State, I have considered the problem of asking the people for another term."
 "But necessarily, there are other considerations. Not alone the so-called third term tradition, but my family's welfare, and most important, the welfare of the State!"
 "Financially, I am in worse condition than when I became either Attorney General or Governor because I am deeply in debt. I owe it to my family to consider their future welfare."
 "Outweighing all these things, is the question of the public interest. Necessarily in a career or service where no one has ever doubted my stand on public questions, I have made bitter enemies. An unprecedented third term announcement on my part would plunge Texas into the bitterest campaign it has ever known, a campaign of false interests and personalities."
 "For these reasons, I have concluded that I should not be a candidate. Therefore I plan to enter private law practice in Austin at the conclusion of my term."
 "In the future, should the occasion arise, I shall stand ready to serve the State I love. Meantime from the bottom of my heart, I thank the thousands of friends whose support elected me Attorney General and Governor and without whose help none of my accomplishments as Governor to which I have pridefully pointed could have been realized."
 Governor Allred said he had no desire to dictate his successor out felt that the people of Texas were entitled to know how avowed candidates for governor stood on old age assistance, the child labor amendment, sales of liquor by the drink, legalization of race track gambling, the continued outlawry of racketeering, on the sales and other taxes.
 "Even those who do not like me," the governor declared, "know where I stand upon these questions. It is asking too much of others to make themselves equally clear? Surely a man big enough to be governor should certainly have some convictions on these subjects and possess the courage of his convictions."
 Reviewing briefly his record during the past three years, Governor Allred said Texas had had a state administration of which she need not be ashamed for it had commanded the respect of other states and the confidence of the National administration.
 rural resources tax; defeat of sales tax; planned conservation program for oil and gas industry; as well as various flood control districts; aid for insane and eleemosynary institutions; establishment of negro tubercular hospital, crippled children aid, and broadened public health program; establishment of Public Safety Department with attendant strict law enforcement; repeal of race track gambling.
 The Governor pridefully pointed out that under his administration, rural schools received greatest aid and every school the biggest per capita apportionment in history. In addition, colleges and universities had received aid for building programs and fairer salaries for teachers. Despite needed help, the governor's administration showed an ad valorem school tax reduction of 26c on the hundred dollars.
 Pointing with pride to abolition of old pardon system and the establishment of clemency on merit, the governor said the volunteer parole system inaugurated by him was the "most widely respected" system in the nation.
 He reviewed the Centennial Celebration made possible by legislation sponsored by the Allred administration and said that thousands of new citizens and industries had been at-

HEALTH NOTES

Austin, Texas—One of the traditional American economic virtues has long been that of self-sufficiency. But one situation in which the trait of self-sufficiency can be overcome is during illness, states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.
 "The man who treats himself as a fool for a doctor" is a phrase which should surge home at a good many Texans. Too many of our citizens, when indisposed, jump at conclusions as to what is wrong with them, and go to the corner drug store for a bottle of advertised medicine.
 This ignoring of the existence of physicians and relying upon self-diagnosis is a bad gamble with ill health. For these persons, for all practical purposes, have isolated themselves as far as medical service is concerned.
 In fact, they persist in this ignorant of careless complacency until they become acutely ill, when at last they call for professional medical service—which is frequently too late.
 "It is indeed too bad that so many persons deliberately raise a barrier between themselves and the family physician. Considering him only as supplementary aid when the situation gets personally out of hand, they are literally thousands who through delay have made it impossible for medical science to render its best service and thus were penalized by a protracted illness, a chronic disease, or the premature termination of life."
 "It follows that many people, with great profit, could surrender this 'isolationist' idea and appreciate the physician for what he really is. When his abilities are more generally given an opportunity to be applied early, when his advice on living habits is sought, and when he is considered as the only person to be relied upon to conserve health and treat illness, then, and then only, will the present remarkable service that medical science stands ready to give be afforded its maximum opportunity for good."
 Among the many achievements pointed out were old age assistance to over one hundred thousand needy aged; the establishment of a re-employment service and an unemployment insurance department; liquor traffic regulation; passage of the securities act, the chain store tax yielding millions in revenue and producing fairer competition for independent industries; increased attracted to Texas as a result.

The Governor said he was proud that the state administration had enjoyed the personal friendship and had secured the hearty cooperation of President Roosevelt in carrying out a real recovery program.
