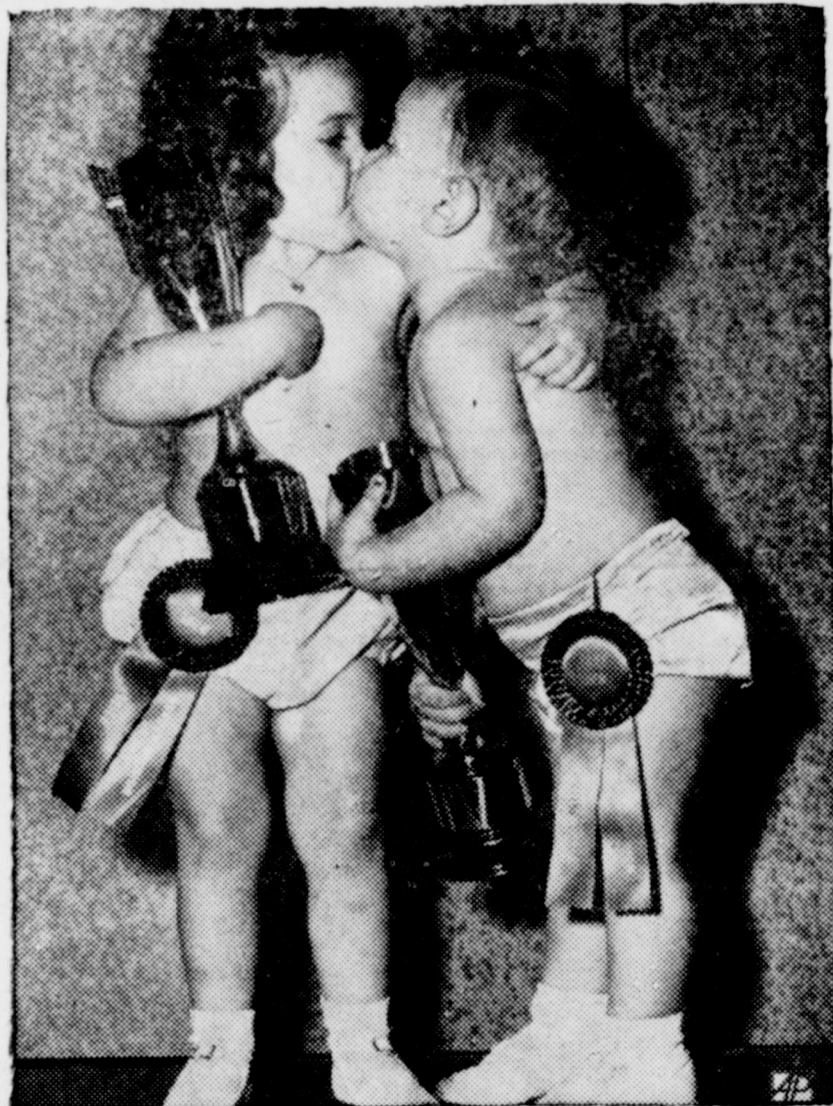

36th Division To Encamp At North Camp Hood In June

June 5 thru 19, the 36th Division of the Texas National Guard will encamp at North Camp Hood, according to Major General H. Miller Ainsworth, Commanding General of the division. He was accompanied by Brigadier General Carl Phinney, assistant division commander, when they visited South Camp Hood, and conferred with Lieutenant Colonel Benjamin E. Meadows, Camp Hood Post Engineer. The 49th Armored Division also comes June 19 and remains until July 3.

Major A. W. Holt, Public Information Officer, Camp Hood, was in the News office Wednesday and released this information.

Work of various kinds is now in full swing at North Camp to prepare it for the use of the guard, and the project will be completed by the time the 36th arrives, according to Col. Meadows.

The electrical distribution system is being extended to include command posts, mess halls, latrines and shower houses.

The site is being cleared of old foundation posts and rubbish. Serviceable concrete slabs are being left in place.

The sewage plant and all plumbing in shower houses and latrines is being rehabilitated.

Water service for thirty-two mess halls is being completed and 34 shower rooms and latrines are being re-roofed.

The railroad facilities in the North Camp are being renovated, including the Leon River bridge.

Necessary structural repairs are being made to mobilization type buildings in the area.

Two 40-point rifle ranges are being repaired and minor repairs made on the pistol and machine gun ranges.

The swimming pool is also to be put in good shape, and the Army Motion Picture Service will make arrangements for showing pictures to the guardsmen during their encampment.

These men will be among the estimated 325,000 officers and men in some 5,000 federally recognized Army and Air units from all the States, District of Columbia, Hawaii and Puerto Rico who will take part in the largest field training program in history.

Construction of permanent regimental and battalion headquarters buildings, mess halls and bath houses at North Camp Hood for the use of the guard is contemplated, but so far this project has not received approval. Cement floors will be poured for tents to house officers and enlisted men.

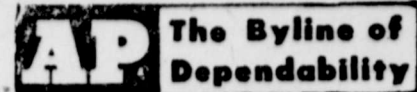
In addition to using the ranges, training aids and maneuver areas, the National Guard will make maximum use of service facilities of South Camp Hood, including the laundry, hospital, bakery, cold storage plant and various repair installations.

School Bills Pass In All-Nite Session

AUSTIN, March 17. (AP)—The House Education Committee after an allnight session recommended passage of three public school reorganization bills. The meeting started at 7:30 p. m. yesterday and ended at 5:40 a. m. today.

The Committee voted 16-5 for the amended version of a bill to drastically reorganize State direction of schools. 17-2 for a bill providing for a minimum foundation program of education and 17-2 for a bill to finance the program.

Uranium Theft From USA Being Investigated

MEXICO CITY, D. F. Mexico, March 17. (AP)—A supposed theft of refined uranium from the U. S. atomic laboratory is being investigated by the Mexican Secret Police. A month ago a Mexican was arrested with a small cylinder of uranium, police said, but newspapers asked them not to publish.

Communists Delay Italians On Pact

ROME, Italy, March 17. (AP)—Communists delayed the Italian adherence to the Atlantic Alliance today by a filibuster in parliament. They also hushed up protest strikes in Milan and Genoa.

Communists and Fellow Travelers kept up a word battle in the Chamber of Deputies all night and into the day. This was the longest filibuster on record in Italy, but Premier Alcide De Gasperi commands enough votes to assure Italy joining the pact once the filibuster ends.

Lights Ordered For Field For Night Base Ball Here

New, In City Government! City Superintendent At Hamilton!

New, at least to us, is the office of City Superintendent, which has been created in Hamilton.

The new official will be named by the council and will be directly responsible to that body, which gives the city something like the city manager type of government.

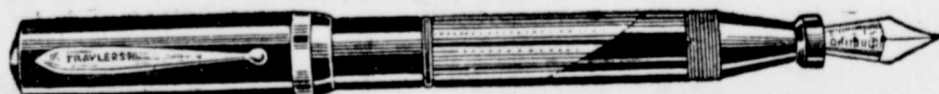

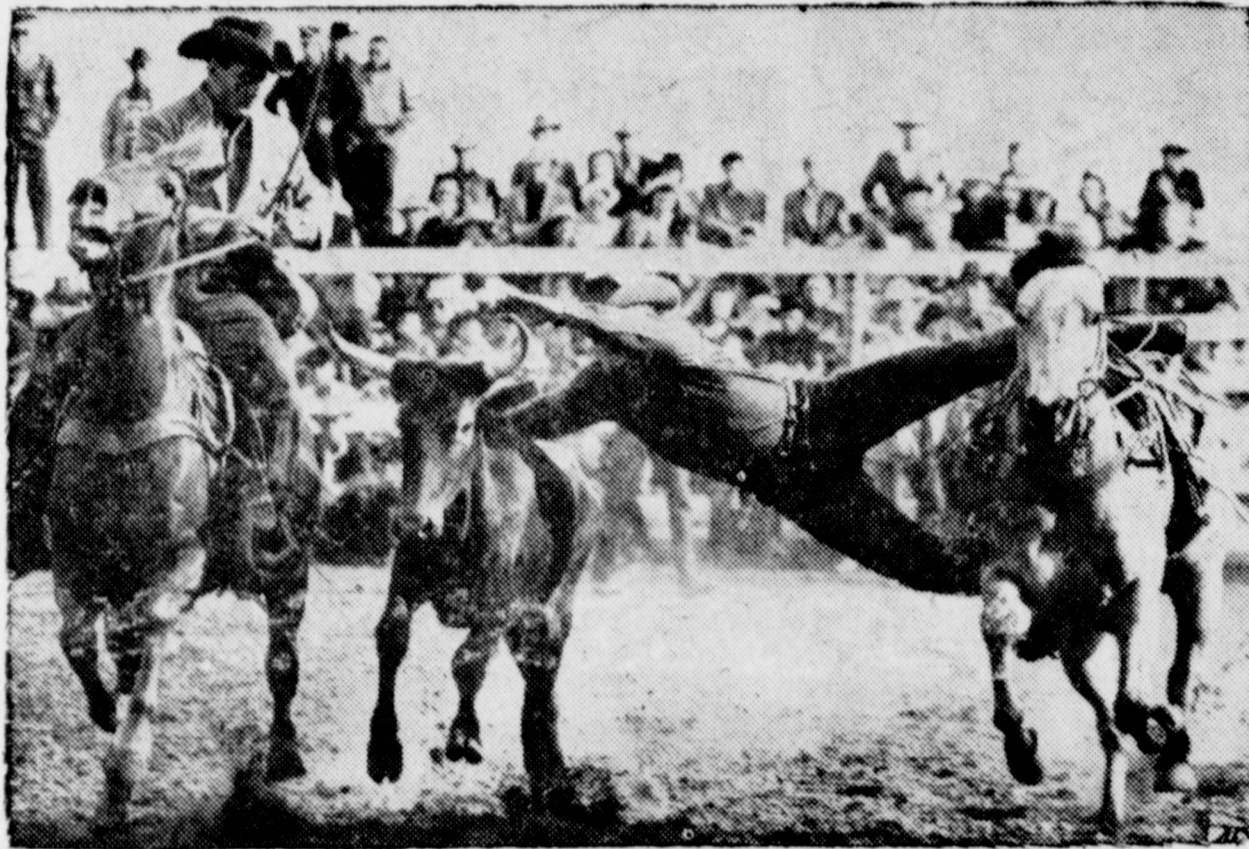
Hornets To Participate In Track Meet At Clifton Saturday

Does Government Management Work?

For a decade before World War II, France was moving toward control and management of her major industries. Private employers were unduly criticised. The profit system was represented as being abused. There were those who apparently found it easy to foment confusion and strife. Employees were set against employers. Production went down, standards of living went lower and lower. The security of France became doubtful, as dangers arose.

Then came the attack from Hitler. France fell quickly. Her divided condition, her hatreds and factionalism, made defense feeble and weak. Then five years later, liberation came. France again established her own government. But industrial confusion was still everywhere. Employers were so discredited by the propagandists that production couldn't get going.

From Chaos to Worse
The trouble was that the French people in general, fretted by the propagandists, couldn't get down to straight thinking. The public wanted more and more for doing less and less. The call for government to take over major industries became louder and louder.

Certain industries were therefore taken over in 1945 and 1946. One of these was the coal industry, in which the government took over ownership of the mines. It employed the management, and hired all the workers. The government was placed in full and complete control. Three years passed.

No Happy Family
You have perhaps read the news in recent weeks. Government employed miners went out on strike against their government employer. These government employees so seriously damaged government owned mines that government soldiers had to be sent out to protect the property and the mines. You might think that under Socialism, everybody would be just one happy family.

Not at all. Fighting has been going on between the government miners and the government soldiers. Property has been so damaged that some mines cannot be reopened for many months at best. Lives have been lost in the fighting, and many persons wounded. All this at a time when France is in a critical hour, when her people need coal and fuel. This is all wrong, and it certainly proves that government management cannot insure industrial peace.

Keep Industry Safe
There are other important observations. Very important is the fact that government ownership and management of mines did not increase production per man day. On the other hand, 4 million tons of coal have been lost, and the price has risen about 50 per cent. This has led to the diversion of 19 million Marshall Plan dollars from other purposes, to buy fuel for the French people.

Many who wanted government management are still not satisfied. Many of them are promoting a Communistic state, now. That would happen in America. There is no indication that government management would work any better here. It is only a step toward Communism, which we do not want. Let us work in every way to preserve private management, a system which has helped America to achieve the highest wages and best living conditions ever known.
