



Highway 60 Phase **Progress Discussed**

Progress on the construction of two additional lanes on U.S. Highway 60 from Friona to the Deaf Smith County line is about on schedule, according to Rhea Bradley, district Highway Engineer.

Bradley said it is hoped to have traffic on the new lanes the latter part of this summer. Then, the crews will move to the old lanes, tear it up, and begin reconstructing that portion of the highway.

The storm sewers and culvert work have been completed on the Friday, May 3, at 7 p.m. in the highway, and work on the actual roadway will now proceed.

Bradley said that plans for the second stage of the project, from Friona to Bovina, have been completed, and submitted to the state office for approval. The highway officials plan to award bids on this portion of the highway in December of this year. "There are several utility adjustments still lacking on the Friona-Bovina segment, but all right of way is purchased, and the utility problems are being worked out," Bradley said.

District engineer Mel Pope of Lubbock said the funds were secure for the second stage of the project, but a date has not been set for awarding the third stage, Bovina to the state line, pending a new state budget and availability of funds.


"We are hopeful of completing the entire project as quickly as possible, because we realize how badly the improvements are needed in Parmer County," Pope said this week.

The goal of "Smoke-Free 2000," to prepare young people to make the correct decision regarding smoking, will require much hard work by educators and volunteers. The American Heart Association believes this goal can be achieved.


Burial was in the Hart Cemetery by Wood-Dunning Funeral Home.





two months of the 72nd session, the debate over education has focused primarily on how we pay for it. Senate Bill 1 which passed in the sixth special session contained significant education reforms that were not struck down by the Supreme Court in the second Edgewood case. Though these reforms received little press, I feel strongly that they will go a long way toward returning control of our schools to parents, principals and teachers.

With the exception of Carter High School in Dallas, high school athletics have received little attention in the education debates during the last three years. I think this is due in large part to the fact that the system is working. Interscholastic athletics play a very valuable role in the education of those

gation. They will serve these girls well for the rest of their lives.

I introduced and passed in the Senate a resolution commemorating the accomplishment of each of these teams. Such a resolution is a way for the Texas Senate to give a pat on the back to the girls, the coaches and the schools that made these state championships happen. Education means many things to many people. The meaning and content of public education has been debated endlessly in the Texas Legislature. In my book, the vitally important lessons of team work, training, discipline and goal setting are an integral part of a quality education.




