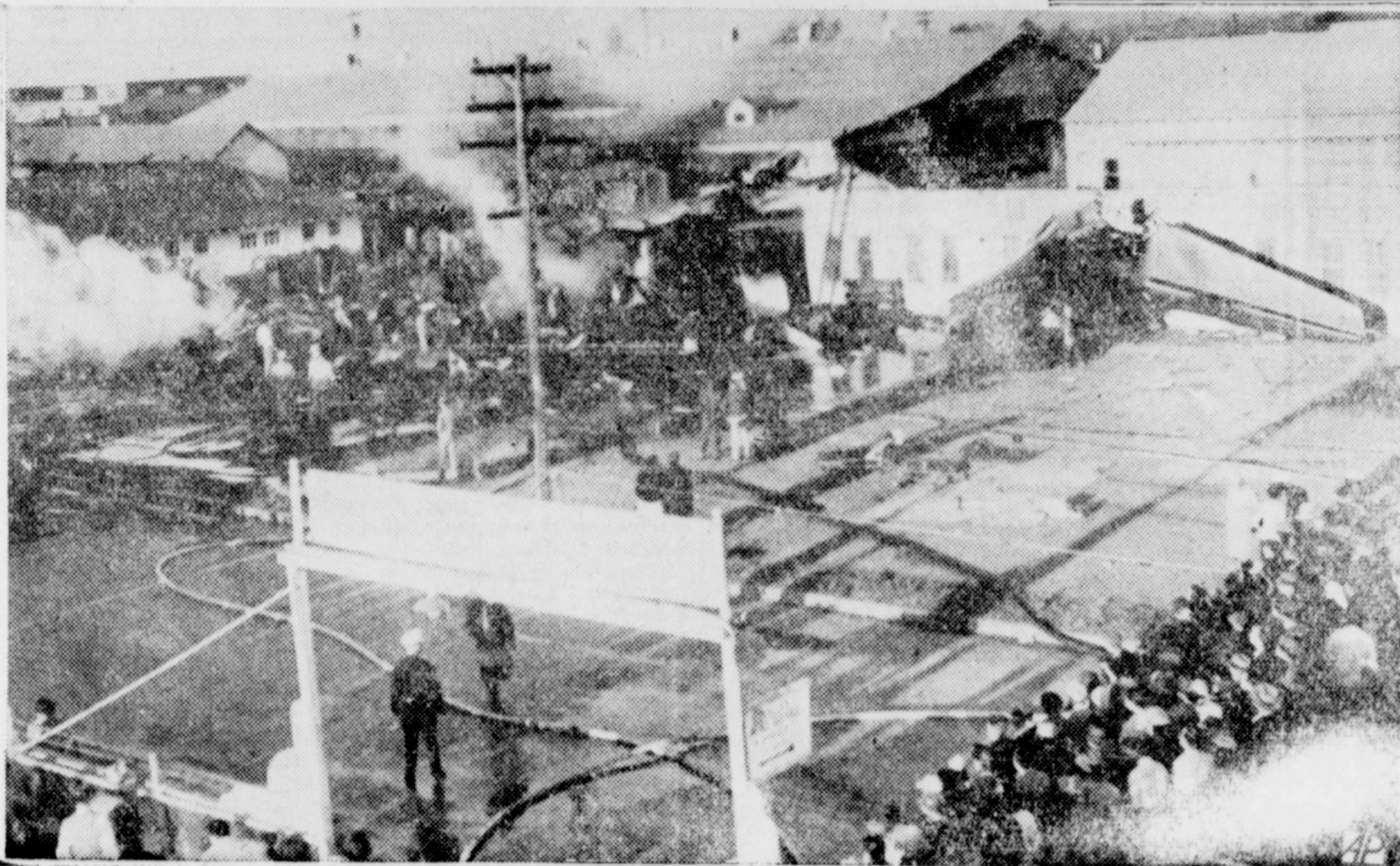

**HAMILTON-CORYELL SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NOTES**

W. J. Dube, a cooperater of the Levita Group, has been busy planting vetch and rye. Mr. Dube produced a very good crop this spring and will have approximately 80 acres of vetch, clover and alfalfa by next spring.

Mr. Dube also has been making repairs on his old terraces in order to bring them up to district specifications. He will also construct some new terraces and diversions during the winter and spring months.

In range development, he has been selling some livestock as he realizes he has had too much stock. He will plant 25 acres of native bluestem during February and 1 acre of KR bluestem in March for seed plots.

J. B. Kemp and Emmett Dickie whose farms are southwest of Gatesville had the Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service run two miles of terrace lines on their farms during the past week. These terraces will be constructed between now and cropping season next spring.

Berry Buckelew, a cooperater of the Evant Group is not only doing a nice job on his range but is also taking care of his cultivated land which will be used mainly to produce livestock feed.

Mr. Buckelew and his tenant, Mr. Wrigley, have been working on approximately 6 miles of terraces which they have just completed.

C. C. Welch, a cooperater of the Hamilton-Coryell Soil Conservation District, had the Technicians run approximately two miles of terrace lines and 900 feet of diversion terrace last week. These terraces will be constructed by County Commissioner Jake Clearman in the near future and will help control the erosion on his farm.

Marvin Mattlage, a cooperater of the district program had six miles of terrace lines run last week. Mr. Craddock, the operator, is sowing a 36 foot strip to small grain which includes these terrace lines. This is being done so that Mr. Mattlage can terrace this field next summer after the small grain is harvested. More farmers are urged to study their conservatio plans and use this or similar methods. Plan now to get your terrace lines run between now and next July 1. If you wait until July it may be impossible to get your terrace lines

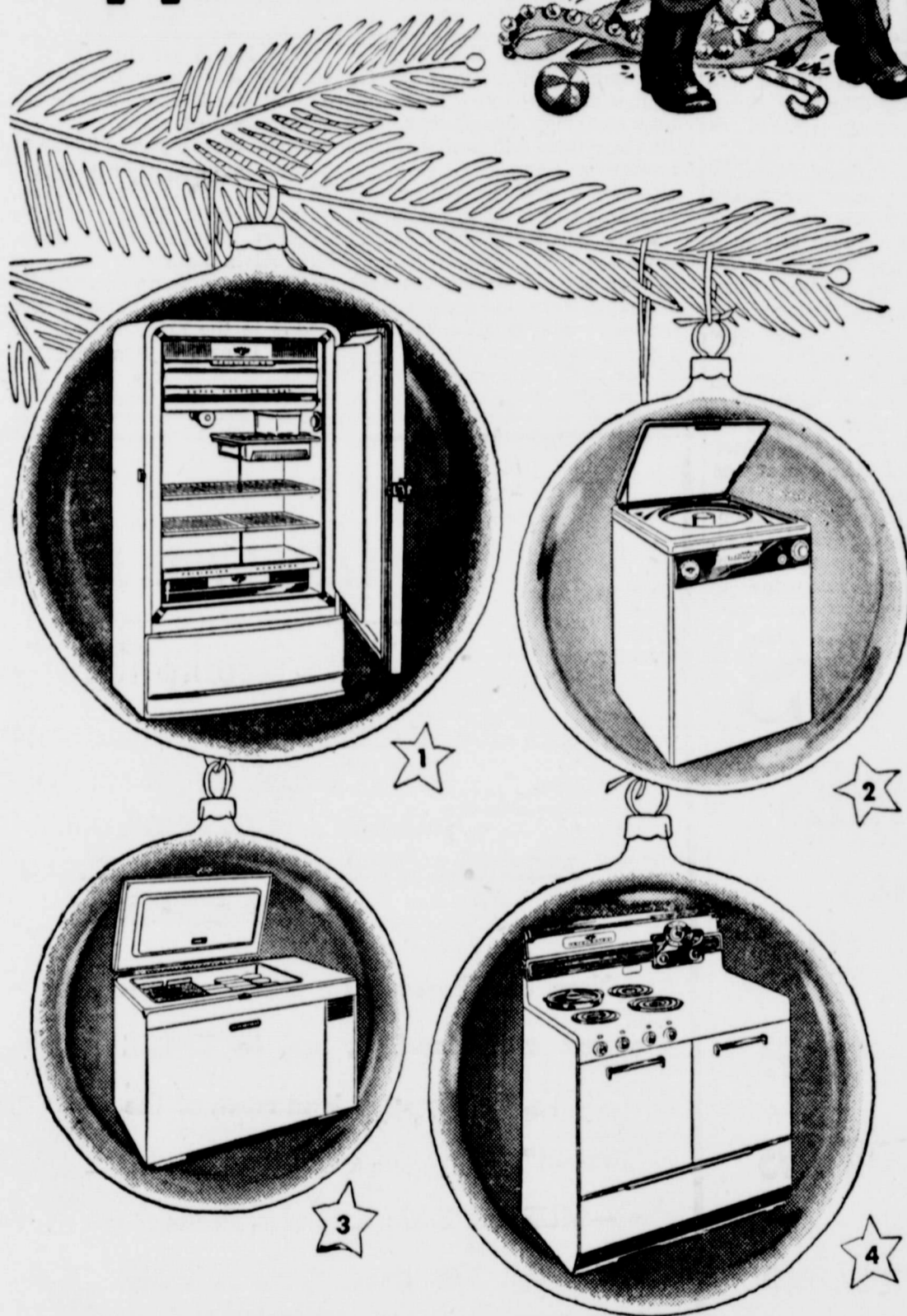

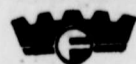

The only charge is for the transportation, and "Uncle Sam" gives us special rates on postage for library loans.

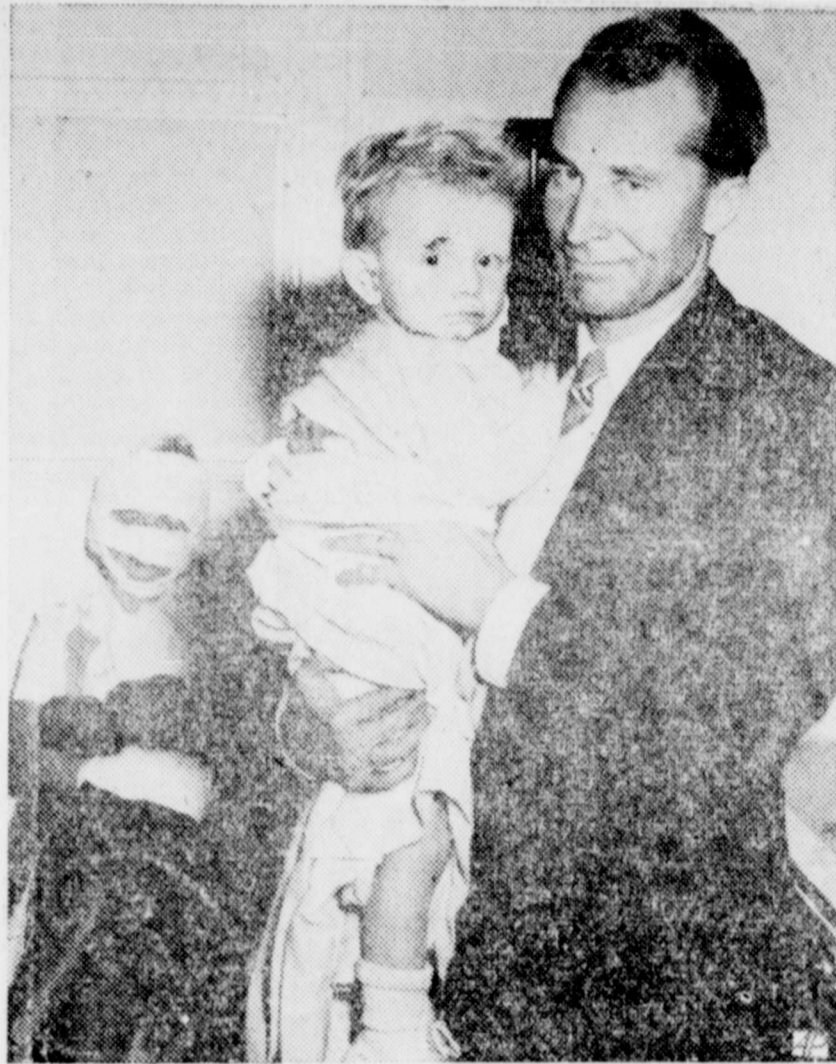
The Club selected as its motto the words of Mrs. Wilson, of the State Library Force, "These are our books, bought by our taxes, we shall use them instead of spending money for other books".
