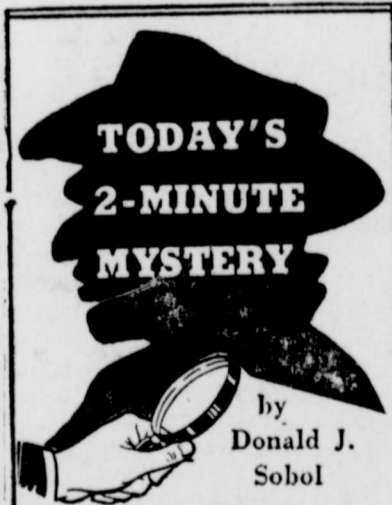

COPPERAS COVE GROUP SEEKING BEER ELECTION

COPPERAS COVE — A petition asking Coryell County commissioners court to call a local option election for legal sale of beer in Copperas Cove is being circulated here. It would be the first such election in Coryell County in 46 years.

The county has been dry for 53 years.

A group of Copperas Cove residents filed application for the petition Tuesday with County Clerk A. W. Ellis in Gatesville.

Don M. Nugent, Copperas Cove lawyer representing the group, seeking the election, said it is estimated they need signatures of 100 qualified resident voters on the petition before the commissioners court can call the election.

He said they plan to present the petition to the commissioners court at the Monday night meeting in Gatesville.

He said the election would be under a recent interpretation of Texas law permitting smaller governing units in dry counties to hold local option elections within those units. In this case, he said, the smaller unit would be the incorporated city of Copperas Cove.

County Attorney Tom Mears, who has lived in Coryell County 66 years, said the county first voted dry in 1904 by a small margin. Later, he said an attempt was made to vote it wet, but failed. Another attempt was made Dec. 13, 1913, and it failed, too.

"Since then nobody has ever had the gall to try another election," Mears said

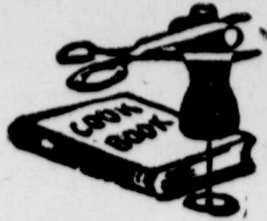

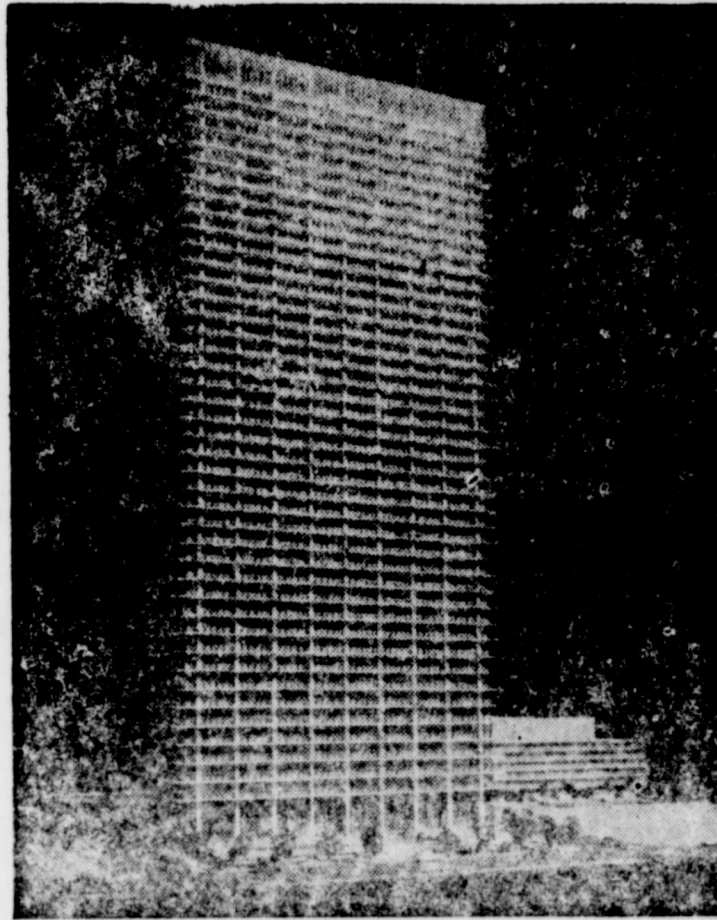
Coryell County Girls Participate In District Dress Revue

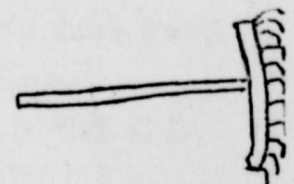

St. Paul, in the words above, is telling the Galatians that they can not be prejudiced against races, stations in life, or anything else. Christianity is supposed to be above prejudice.

In the long history of the world, however, prejudices have never been stronger, or more violent, than in our modern world. We are prejudiced against races and nationalities and new ideas.

Besides being un-Christian, these prejudices are actually ridiculous — as ridiculous as the Englishman who said he despised all Americans, but had never met one he didn't like.

We must reorganize our thinking, or our prejudices will be our doom.
