They did have bandits, Indians, Texas weather, (which one can, and could say is a lot). Sicknes didn't call for a doctor, hospital, nurse, prescriptions or proprietary medicines. The land furnished most of them, in plants, roots, etc.

Why dwell on this! To us, in the newspaper business, this is the FIRST time we've been privileged (?) to write the obituary of anyone 100 years of age, in more than 25 years. It IS an event in our lives. We've written them from 0 to 90, but never a person 10 years of age, and certainly not one who's life went over into two centuries. It's astounding to us.

This lady, practically a native of our county, who's life had touched Ireland, Copperas Cove, Ater and Jonesboro communities more specifically, and undoubtedly, the entire county, prompted us to suggest to some authorities locally that the business houses in Gatesville close for an hour in her honor. It didn't work! We still think it should have.

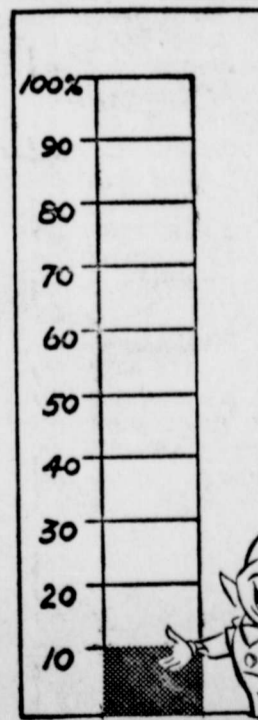

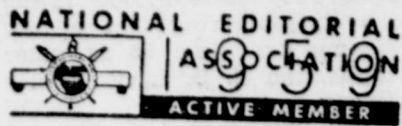

Rev. William Horick performed the double ring candlelight ceremony before a white wrought iron arch covered with gladiola and ivy. Baskets on each side of the arch

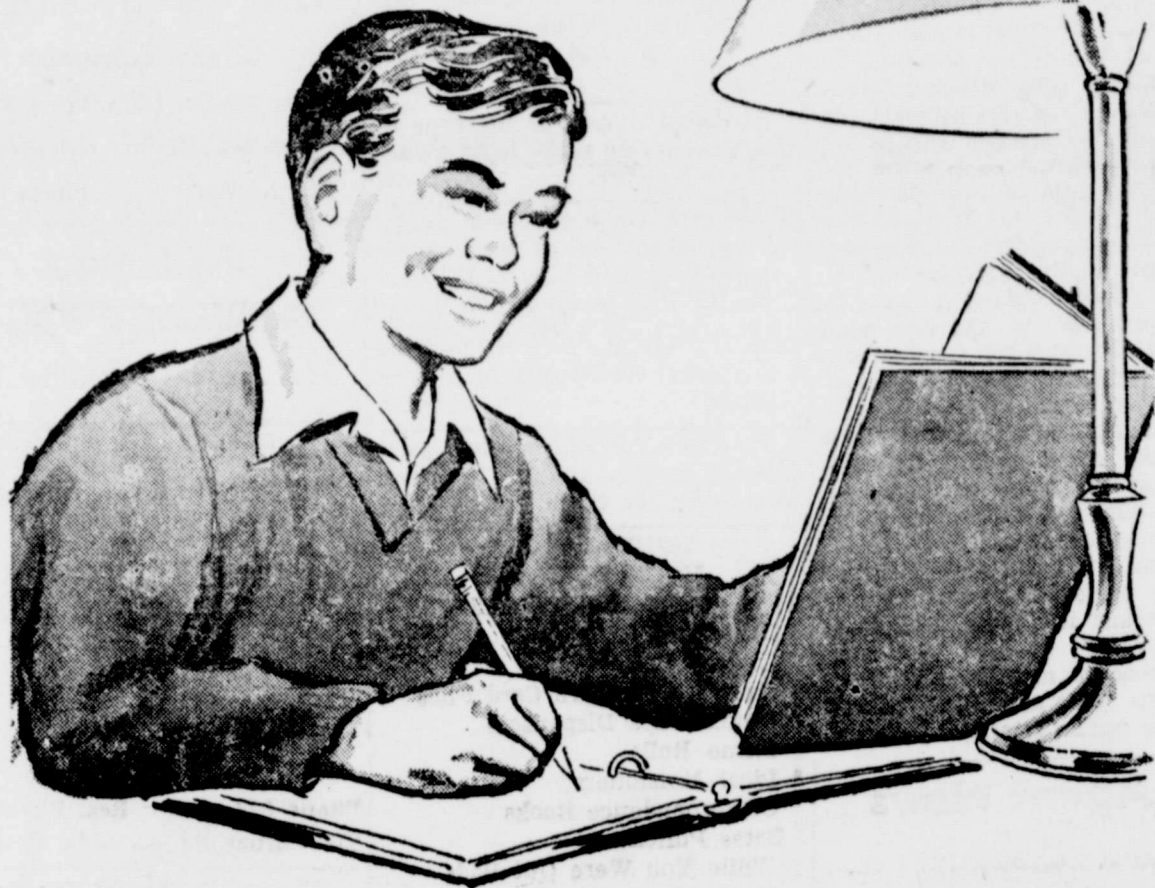
held white gladiola flanked with branched candelabra holding burning white cathedral tapers.

# More light on the subject!



Homework can be completed faster and more accurately when there is plenty of light for easy seeing. For best light from a table study lamp, use a 150-watt bulb. The lamp should be tall enough to spread light evenly over the work area and properly shaded to conceal the light source from the eyes. A diffusing bowl is recommended to soften the light and prevent glare. If the lamp has no diffusing bowl, use a 150-watt white indirect bulb. Better light means better grades.

### NEEDED: PUBLIC RELATIONS IN AGRICULTURE

—69—  
Agriculture's greatest need today is understanding.

This means understanding among those directly engaged in farming and ranching; understanding by those who provide services and materials to the farms and ranches; understanding by those who transport, process and distribute the plant and animal products coming from farms and ranches; and above all, understanding among the great majority of our people who live in towns and cities and who are the principal consumers of the products of our agricultural industries.

Those of us engaged in agricultural endeavors have tended to take for granted that people generally and naturally understand their basic dependence on agriculture for food, feed and fiber. In recent years we have been rudely awakened, in cotton, for instance, by the advent of synthetics.

American agriculture is thus being forced to become public relations conscious. We now must seek consumer acceptance not only of our products, but of our services, of our policies and of our true place in the total economy of the Nation and the world.

Here are several avenues of attack on public relations for agriculture:

1. Correction of the Misconceptions the average urbanite has about us; especially let them understand their foods, feeds and fibers are not expensive, and producers, processors and distributors are not and will not be "rolling in wealth" at the expense of food consumers.

2. Seek to reverse the rising trend of "going to Washington" for funds or legislation on state and local agricultural problems, in the belief that it costs us less. We positively must accept more responsibility at state and local levels.

3. Clearing up the confusion between politically designed and directed policies relating to the "farm problem" on the one hand and the necessity for even stronger programs of research and education in agriculture.

4. Modern and future agriculture may merit a new tag—one that may overcome the popular concept that agriculture and farming are synonymous.

We must tell the great story of modern agriculture again and a dynamic and it's basic. Everybody benefits.

We need to mobilize all of our resources promptly back of an effective public relations program.

nized, the vaccinations must be done in compliance with the Texas Animal Health Commission's regulations. Only vaccinations done by authorized veterinarians and reported an approved forms within 10 days will be considered official.

Type II control area is one that a combination of vaccination of remale calves and blood testing is done. Random sample tests in each herd is done by the Texas Animal Health Commission. This type area has a much more rigid set of rules and enforcement than Type I.

The law provides that for any county to become a control area there must be a petition signed by 75 per cent of the cattle owners, owning at least 51 per cent of cattle as shown by tax roles. 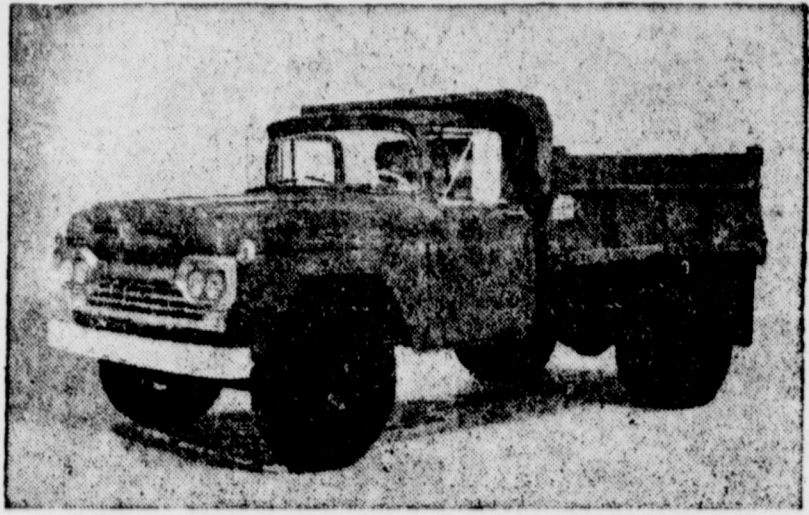


