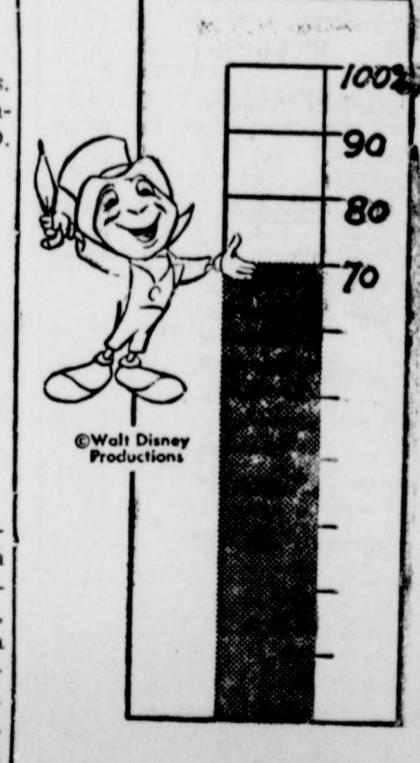

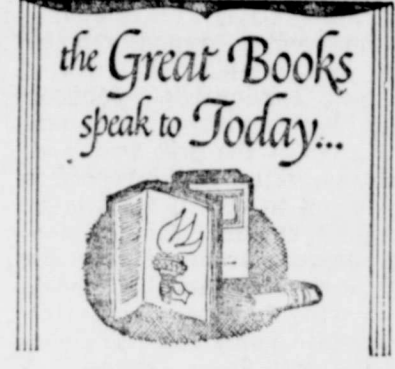

AS THESE noble Houyhnhnms (a fictional race of horses) are endowed by nature with a general disposition to all virtues and have no conceptions or ideas of what is evil in a rational creature, so their grand maxim is, to cultivate reason, and to be wholly governed by it. Neither is reason among them a point problematical as with us, where men can argue with plausibility on both sides of the question; but strikes you with immediate conviction; as it must needs do where it is not mingled, of aured, or discolored by passion and interest.

I remember it was with extreme difficulty that I could bring my master to understand the word, opinion, or how a point could be disputable; because reason taught us to affirm or deny, only where we are certain; and beyond our knowledge we cannot do either. Remember to retire into this little territory of thy own, and above all do not distract or strain thyself, but be free, and look at things as a man, as a human being, as a citizen, as a mortal. Put among the things readiest to thy hand to which thou shalt turn, let there be these, which are two. One is that things do not touch the soul, for they are external and remain unimportant; but our attention must come only from the inner world, which is within. The other is that all these things which change, change, change, and will no longer be and constantly bear in mind how many of these changes thou hast

Put a photo of your favorite football player or sweetheart in a star-shaped picture frame this fall, using colorful miniature college pennants to form the star. The picture frame is easy to make, costs very little, and is a bright addition to any dormitory, bedroom or recreation room.

Five small felt pennants, a large sheet of plain white cardboard, plus a little glue and a pair of scissors are all the materials you need for the job.

First, arrange the pennants on the cardboard with the narrow ends pointed outward from the center to form a perfect star. Next, glue pennants into position on the cardboard, applying a few drops of glue on the back of each

and taking care not to allow glue to go beyond the broad stripe at the base of each pennant. An excellent all-purpose fast-sticking adhesive for this purpose is Elmer's Glue-All.

After pennants are permanently in position, cut star out leaving a quarter of an inch of cardboard showing at the edges to give the picture frame a "mat" finish. Finally, cut your photograph of a football star or sweetheart in pentagonal shape and mount it by slipping under the edges of the felt pennants for the completed project.

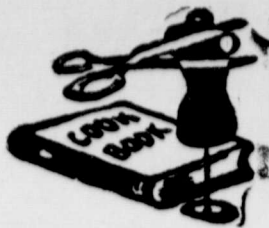

U. S. - MEXICO AGRICULTURAL CONFERENCE

October is always a good month to start planning for the next agricultural year, and the Texas Department of Agriculture sponsored a two-day conference of U. S. and Mexican agricultural officials this month in San Antonio.

The conference was mainly about bringing about closer cooperation between U. S. border states and north Mexican states through discussion of mutual problems by agricultural authorities and associations of the two countries, chiefly in the field of insect pest control.

There was a sizeable delegation from both Mexico City and the north Mexican states, headed by Ing. Jesus Patino Navarette, the Mexican sub-secretary of agriculture, and Ing. Esteban Uranga, the official mayor of the department. Besides our own officials from the Texas Department of Agriculture, there was a strong representation from the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Among items on the agenda for discussion from both sides of the border were further and more effective control measures for the pink bollworm, screw-worm infestation, the citrus blackfly, the Meican fruit fly, and the hapra beetle, a grain pest which recently promoted

BELL COUNTY FARMERS VIOLATE WAGE-HOUR LAW

A Bell County, Texas, farm operator and his cotton harvesting contractor have been charged with violating the Federal Wage-Hour Law, especially with regard to the law's child-labor provisions.

U. S. Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell brought the suit in the U. S. District Court at Waco. He charged R. C. Hawkins and Manuel Gaona with hiring minors under 16 years of age for harvesting and handling cotton which goes into interstate commerce.

R. C. Hawkins, according to the suit, lives on a leased farm near Temple, 35 miles southwest of Waco; defendant Manuel Gaona is listed as residing at Robstown Nueces County, Texas.

immediate and effective eradication measures by the Teas Department of Agriculture in the El Paso area.

Our inspectors from the Texas department were able to report that for the fourth successive season they have found the State entirely free of citrus blackfly, and credit for this record was given in large part to cooperative efforts of the U. S. and Meico. Two blackfly-free zones are being maintained in Meico in the area nearest the Rio Grande Valley. This is being accomplished through the use of parasitic wasps to keep blackfly infestation at a low level south of established buffer zones, and by prompt insecticidal treatment of new, small infestations within the buffer zones.

As a result of this cooperation, combined with constant inspection by the Teas department, the only blackfly infestations found on this side of the Meican border were in 1955-56 when they were discovered in seven localities in the Valley. Prompt application of insecticidal sprays by the Teas Department of Agriculture and the Teas citrus industry eradicated the infestation without further spread.

1. Cut out four panels from the sides of two of the containers saving scraps.
 2. Cut the circumference and width of the side of the container from crepe paper and cellophane, then tape inside the container.
 3. With the scraps, staple together in circle, top smaller than the bottom with cardboard. Cut circle to fit and another with center cut out to fit in slit as handle.
 4. Color handle and top brown, then set in lid, and turn container upside down and fit the top just made, on top of the bottom of container, which gives the effect of top of lantern.

AUSTIN—It is more than a year until the day when the next President of the United States will be elected, but in Texas, the race is on.

From now until Nov. 8, 1960, may well be a year of the most feverish political activity the state ever has known.

House Speaker Sam Rayburn fired the starting gun by calling for an all-out campaign to win the Democratic presidential nomination for U.S. Sen. Lyndon Johnson. Rayburn called for Johnson-for-President organizations in every county in Texas.

Speaker Rayburn's sponsorship also makes exceeding difficult the position of Texas' liberal wing Democrats who have been cool toward the senator since the convention hassles of 1956.

Committees Forming

In a surge of appointive activity, Speaker Waggoner Carr named House members to serve on three of the study groups authorized for between-sessions activity.

Named to the Legislative Council, a permanent organization usually assigned a lengthy list of studies, are Reps. W. T. Oliver of Port Neches, Eligio de la Garza of Mission, H. L. Strickland of San Antonio, R. H. Cory of Victoria, R. A. Bartam of New Braunfels, Tony Koriath of Sherman, Tommy Shannon of Fort Worth, Will Ehrle of Childress, W. W. Glass of Jacksonville and Richard C. Slack of Pecos.

House members on the Texas Commission on State and Local

Tax Policy will be Reps. Frates Seeligson of San Antonio, V. L. Ramsey of Beckville and J. Gordon Bristow of Big Spring.

This group will further the study of the state's fiscal structure begun in 1957-58 by the State Tax Study Commission. Specifically, the new group will consider such problems as whether the property tax should be abandoned or overhauled.

To the Texas Coordinated Commission for State Health and Welfare Services, Carr named Reps. W. N. Woolsey of Corpus Christi, W. E. Shaw of Forney and Max C. Smith of San Marcos.

Three senators, three private citizens and seven agency heads also are to serve on this panel to study and recommend improvements in health and welfare programs.

Gas Tax Challenged

First of what will probably be many suits attacking the constitutionality of the new severance beneficiary tax on natural gas has been filed in an Austin district court.

Pipeline companies promised to fight the tax in court when it was passed by the Legislature this year.

A tax of 1.5 per cent of the gas is levied on the purchaser, such as a pipeline that contracts to buy it from the producer.

Governor Daniel worked persistently for the new gas tax, an issue that helped keep lawmakers at loggerheads for months. He promised to help fight the suits. "Long line gas companies fought hard against accepting any of the tax load," said the governor. Now, he

Outlook Good For Lamb Producers, Says Magazine

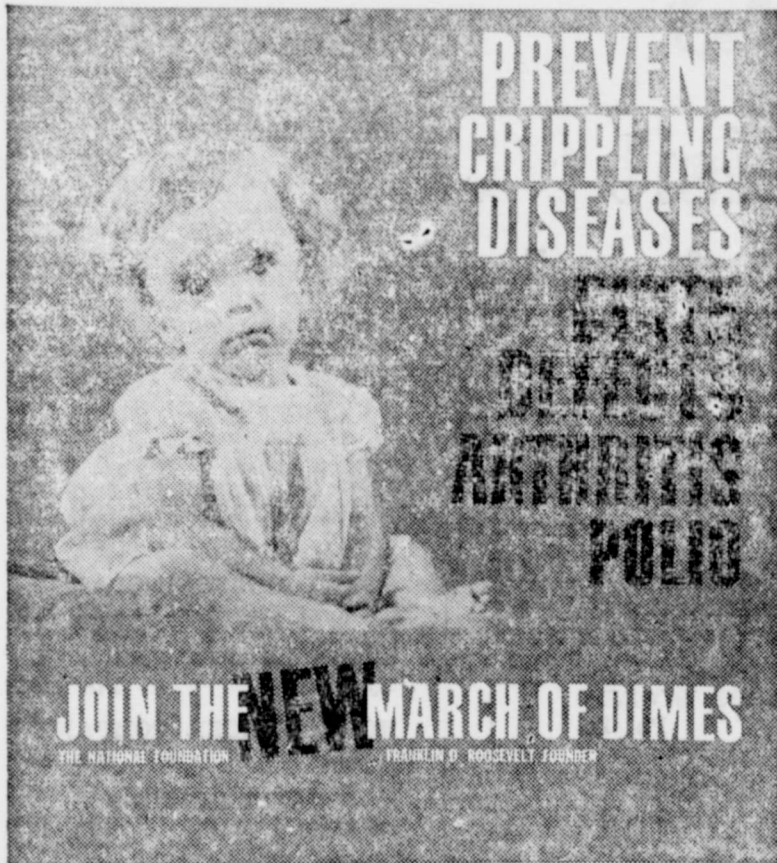
Lamb producers should be able to make some money this fall and winter as contrasted to the bleak winter of 1958, according to National Live Stock Producer. Lamb prices normally decline late in the year, then increase gradually to a peak in May.

"Good and Choice feeder lambs are about \$4 lower than last fall. This should put black ink back into lamb feeding operations this fall and winter," the magazine said. It pointed out that corn prices will be about the same as last year, ranging from 90c to \$1 late this fall and winter. Hay prices will be about the same as last year in the Eastern Corn Belt but \$3 or \$4 per ton higher in the Western Corn Belt than a year ago.
