Electronics In Arithmetic! It Was Ban Enough Before! What Could Be Next?

TYLER, Tex., April 29 (AP)—Electronic arithmetic is fun—even if it sometimes shocks you, of Mrs. Mabel Thomson (cq) at Gary School here.

And despite these harmless shocks (she prefers to call them "stings"), Mrs. Thomson says an electric teaching aid she uses is a good way to drill fractions. "Gets the facts in their heads and the right answers at their fingertips," says the teacher who formerly taught science.

Measuring 18 by 20 inches, the plywood board aid was made by the father of one of her former students. It has two rows of 13 printed fractional answers down its front. Beside each fraction is a metal screw bolted to the board.

The idea of the game is to select a fraction from the left row that is the reduced equivalent of one of the other row.

Where does "electronic arithmetic" come in?

First of all, a network of copper-covered wiring on the board is connected to two 1.5-volt dry cell batteries. Leading off the top of each battery is a piece of the wire with an exposed tip.

A student playing electronic arithmetic "selects" his answers, one from each row, by touching the tops of the exposed wire to the screws of his choices.

If a small flashlight bulb mounted on the right side of the board lights up, the student knows he has added a few points of his grade.

No right answers—no lighted bulb.

Glenn Hicks, principal at Gary, rigged the network of wiring on the board for Mrs. Thomson.

Currently the board is being used to prove that "Fractions are fun." But the teacher who got the idea from a children's game quickly explains it is a versatile teaching aid.

By changing the fractions to notes on the musical scale, Mrs. Thomson can use it in music drills. Or those notes changed to words and their definitions are good vocabulary builders.
