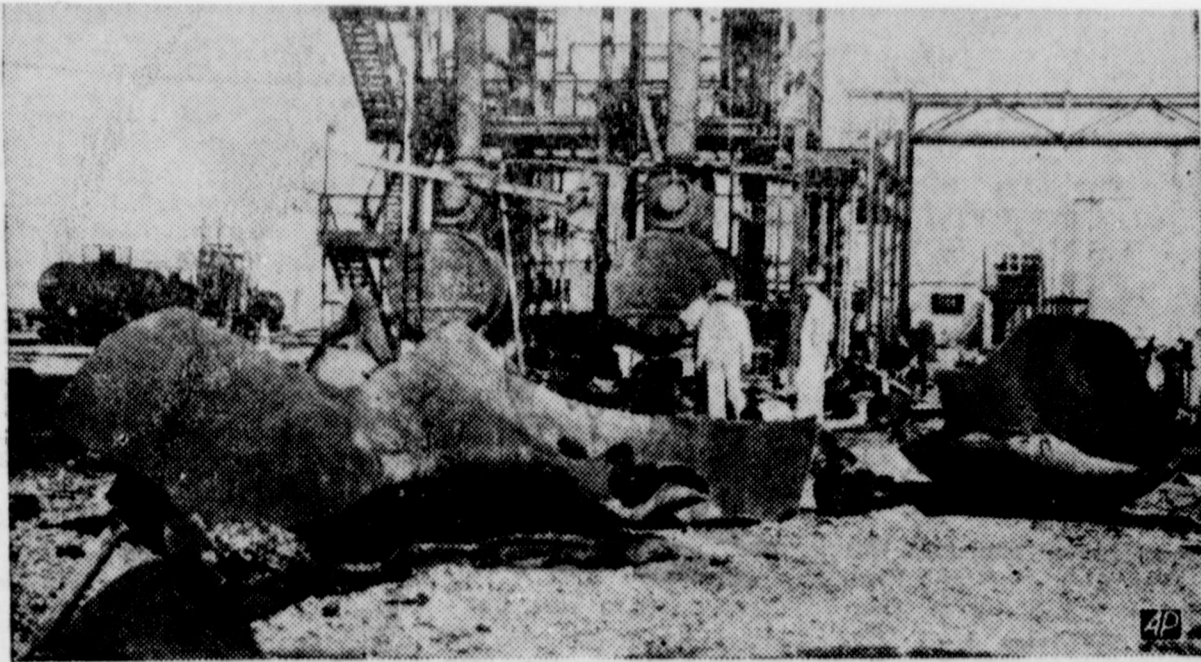

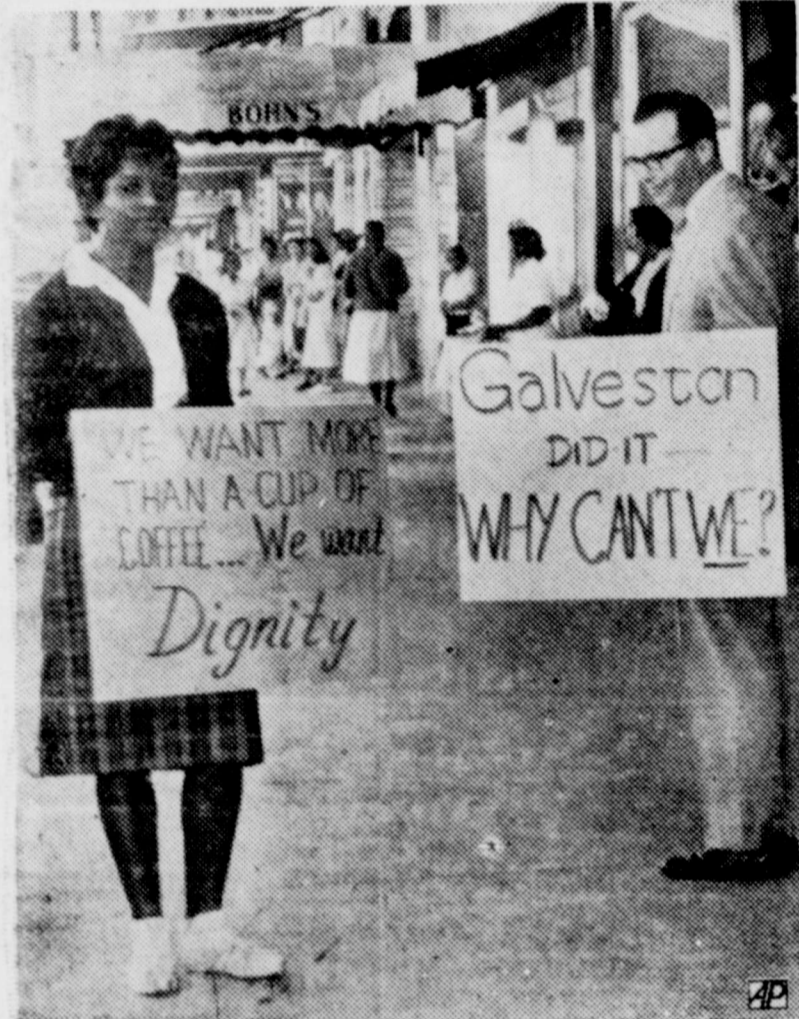

Coryell County farmers and ranchers have May in which to apply for cost-sharing under the 1960 Agricultural Conservation Program on deferred grazing, 6-1 to 10-31. Payment this practice is 58c per acre for the period. No payment for shorter time.

Dear Friends:
This has been a week of distinguished visitors. On Monday President Charles De Gaulle of the French Republic spoke to a joint session of Congress. He received one of the most enthusiastic-foreign visitor. I feel that this is a reception ever accorded a of great significance because General De Gaulle has become a kind of symbol of stability and determination in our negotiations with the U. S. S. R. I fear that the enthusiastic support of the French President indicates a considerable degree of doubt about firmness on the part of our own officials. I hope that this doubt is unfounded, but we simply can't overlook the fact that President Eisenhower is inherently reluctant to take direct issue with Mr. Krushchev.

I hope that the determination of De Gaulle, not the appeasement of Prime Minister McMillan, may prevail at the Summit Meeting.

On Thursday the King of Nepal was our guest. While he does not enjoy the great reputation of General De Gaulle, and while he does not present the same commanding figure, he too (strange as it may seem for a King) is a symbol of Democracy.

For probably 200 years Nepal was actually ruled by the Rana family. The first Rana was Prime Minister. He exercised such power that he was able to pass the office on to his family. Throughout the years the Ranas held the actual power of government. Each built a palace larger than his predecessor. Finally the King overthrew the Prime Minister and in effect returned the government to the people.

Today Nepal has a democratically elected Parliament (the first in its thousand years of history). It has a "responsible" government of the British type. It is making great progress. It is a next door neighbor to Red China, but the very fact that the King was independent enough to visit the United States at exactly the time the Red Chinese ruler was visiting his country is bound to tell people all over Asia that the King of Nepal prefers Western friends. When the head of a small country snubs the Chinese, its significance is not lost on other

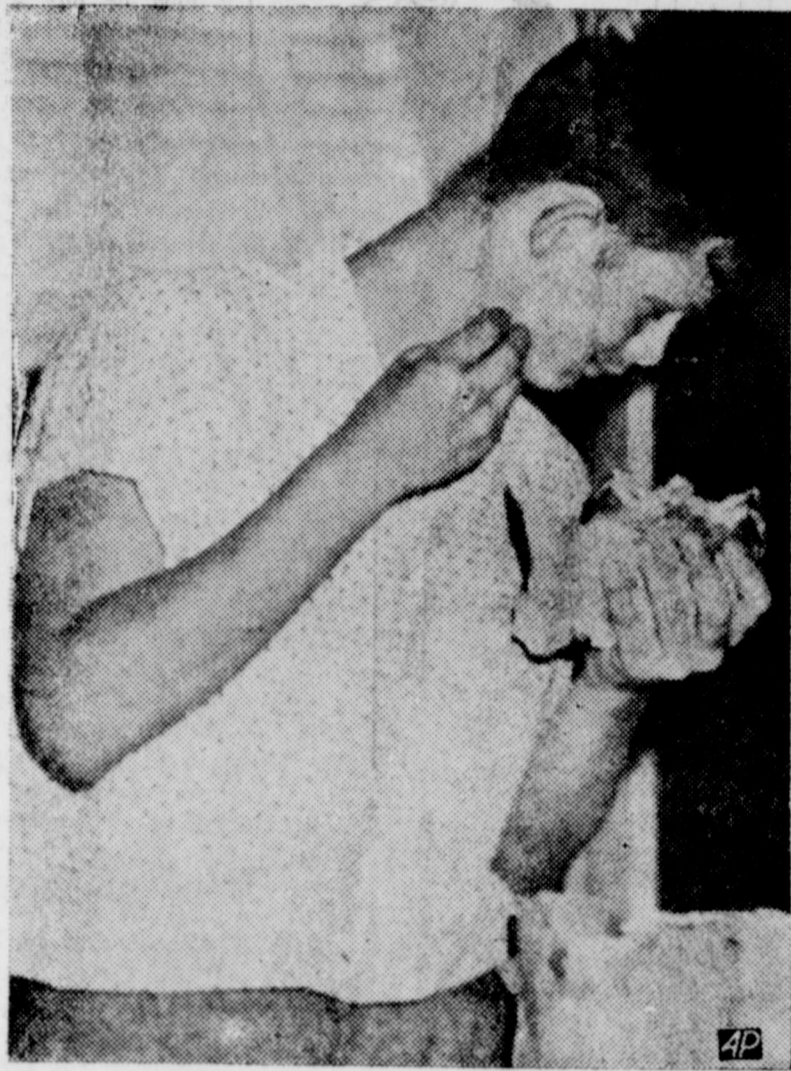

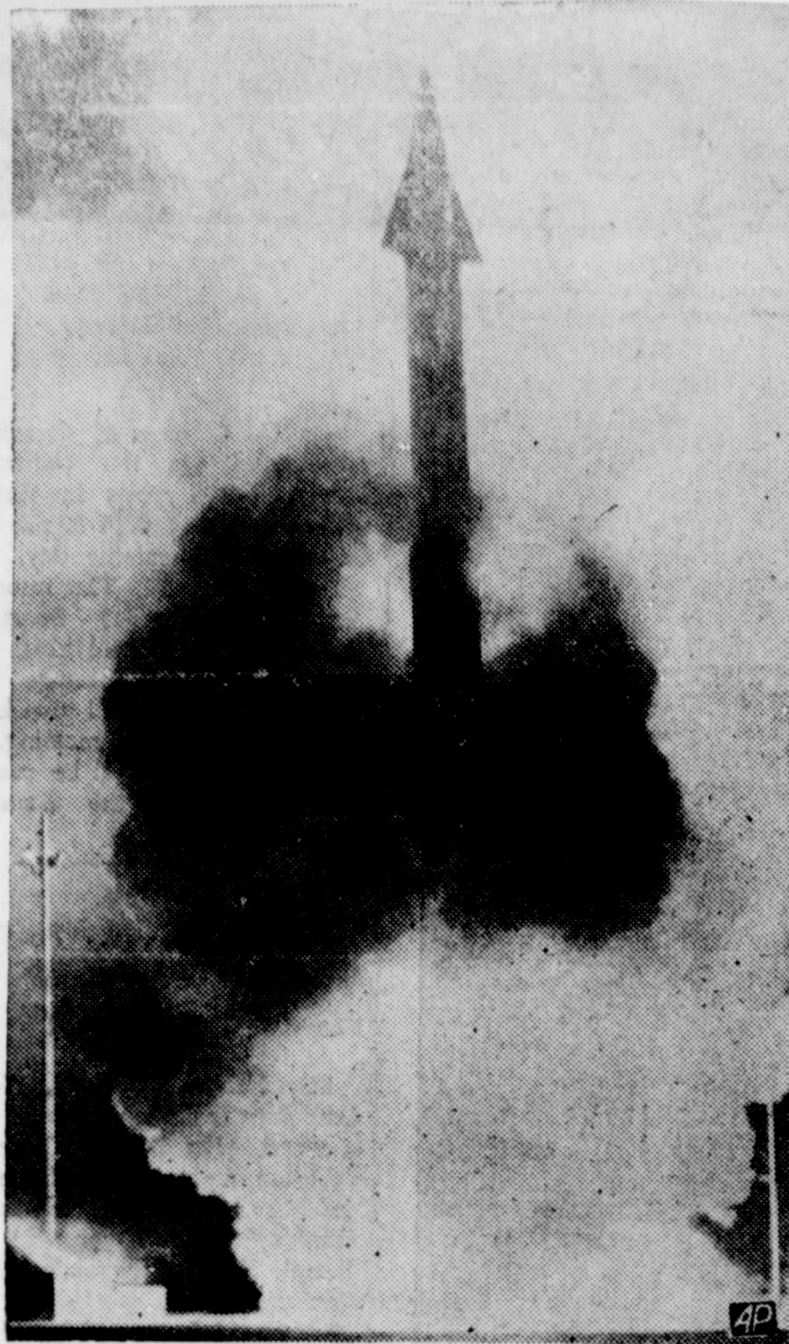

**WASHINGTON AND
 "SMALL BUSINESS"**

By C. WILSON HARDER

Recently Rep. H. R. Gross expressed wonderment that the government, despite all that has been said about minimizing the Russian effort to wage war, was permitting American "know-how" to be used in building a tire making plant in Russia, with several more projected.

A Mr. Henry Kearns, assistant Commerce secretary for international affairs, was quick to point out that there existed a substantial error in what the public had been told about this deal.

Back in about 1957, the Commerce Dept. denied permission for American firms to bid on the basis processes incorporated some techniques peculiarly American in development, and thus Russia should not have them from any American.

And so the U. S. Dept. of Commerce, with righteousness and presumably high moral principle, took this stand, to betterment of American defense.

However, subsequent developments have tended to inject rather brutal inquiry of "just who thinks they're kidding who?"

The Russians are getting their plant built, and plan on building several more. Mr. Kearns takes position British hold the construction contracts.

But in the next breath he lets it be known these British firms are affiliates of U. S. firms.

This then, develops into a cozy little situation. American firms are told at one time they cannot bid on these contracts on the basis that this would aid the Russian potential to wage war. At the same time, this edict quite efficiently rules out possibility of any independent U. S. enterprise from having a go at this job.

Now leaving aside the question of whether it is quite proper for the British, recipients of so much of U. S. foreign give away billions, to profit by this opportunity that also helps the Russian military strength, there does seem to be a major question here between Tweedledee and Tweedledum.

If an independent American firm is not big enough to have foreign connections, then it should stay out of Russia as that would surely help the Russian arms program.

But on the other hand, if the American firm is a big enough monopoly in its field, and has foreign connections, then it is quite proper to proceed with its British affiliates. And as long as the American corporation has this foreign line-up, presumably anything so done to build plants in Russia will be of no use whatsoever in building Russian fighting strength.

It is wondered if Rep. Gross will be able to understand this fine point of distinction.

This seems hardly likely.

In fact, there is often wonderment along Potomac as just who many bureaucrats consider greatest enemy of the U. S. . . . communism, or the American free enterprise system.
