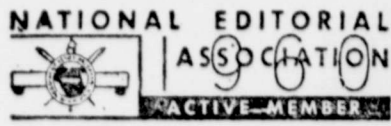

from our Congressman BOB POAGE

June 17, 1960

Dear Friends:  
The House has just approved a substantially increased Foreign Aid Bill. A number of amendments involving hundreds of millions of dollars were adopted. I voted against the amendments and the bill.

As I see it, there is no justification for the wave of hysteria which grips the Congress as a result of the loss of face which we have sustained in Asia. It is perfectly true that when the Japanese Government was forced to say that it could not guarantee the safety of the President, that American prestige in the Far East took another nose dive, but

aid to Japan or to any other country. We have given Japan billions of aid and today Japan certainly needs no aid. We have plenty of military force in Japan to deal with the professional trouble makers and Communist-inspired mobs. We simply are not going to use our troops as Russia used hers in Hungary. Ten times as many troops in Japan would not have changed the present situation. Nor would the giving of a dozen jet planes to every small and defenseless country in Asia, Africa, and South America add to our national defense. Air power is of little value when scattered around in uncertain hands. If we are to enjoy security, we must maintain American strength. I think that we are worse than wasting much of our foreign aid.

Earlier this week the House voted to increase the wages of all government workers by 7.5 per cent. I know that government workers are finding it difficult to make ends meet just as all other workers are. I voted for a motion to fix the increase at 7.5 per cent for postal employees and 5 per cent for all other government workers. This was defeated. I cannot believe that we can exceed this amount, which comes to about three quarters of a billion dollars per year, without the most serious consequences not only in the way of taxes but also in the way of a complete round of wage increases leaving the workers who get the increases in no better shape than they are in now and leaving anyone who does not get a raise in a far worse shape, having to pay more for everything they buy. This is the clear pattern of inflation. I voted against the bill.

As we approach the end of the session our activity picks up on all fronts and so does the mail. If we are slow in acknowledging your communication, please bear with us. We will reply as quickly as we can.

### AUTOMATION IN THE OFFICE

If one were gifted with foresight to see which industries will grow to the greatest degree over the next few years, undoubtedly certain phases of the office equipment field would show up favorably. Today a major problem confronting many firms is the decreasing supply of competent office personnel. The wages of manual laborers have risen to a point where they attract people who might otherwise fill clerical positions. At the same time, an increasing amount of paper work in offices is necessary and consequently the obvious solution is to replace manpower with machines. This is being done to quite an extent in large firms, but as time moves on we can expect to see fewer people even in the average office and an increasing amount of office machinery. Therefore, it seems advisable to examine those companies which will benefit from this growing trend toward automation in the office and such products as will be in demand.

The divergence of performances by different companies in the office equipment industry is particularly intriguing. For example, only one company has had a consistent growth record since 1947 with respect to sales and profits and that company is IBM, which has shown gains in sales and net before taxes every year. Had it not been for the Excess Profits Tax during the Korean War this pattern would have been followed by net after taxes. Truly this is an impressive performance.

Other large American corporations can claim. Following this pattern most closely is Pitney-Bowes, whose sales have increased every year since 1947 while net before taxes has increased in every year except for three—1953, 1957 and 1959. However, in both 1953 and 1957 net after taxes increased. There are several other companies with outstanding growth records and these include: Addressograph-Multigraph, Dictaphone, Friden, National Cash Register and UARCO. Other well known companies, such as Burroughs, Smith-Corona, Marchant and Underwood have had somewhat erratic records.

As far as recommendations are concerned, IBM still continues to be our No. 1 choice in the office equipment field. This stock should qualify for virtually any investment portfolio. Our second choice is National Cash Register, a highly regarded company, whose earnings trend slowed up in the last three or four years, but which, with an improved research program, seems to be moving ahead again.

Addressograph - Multigraph, Pitney-Bowes and UARCO are three other good companies that appear interesting while as a speculation we feel that Electronics Associates has some appeal. FNS

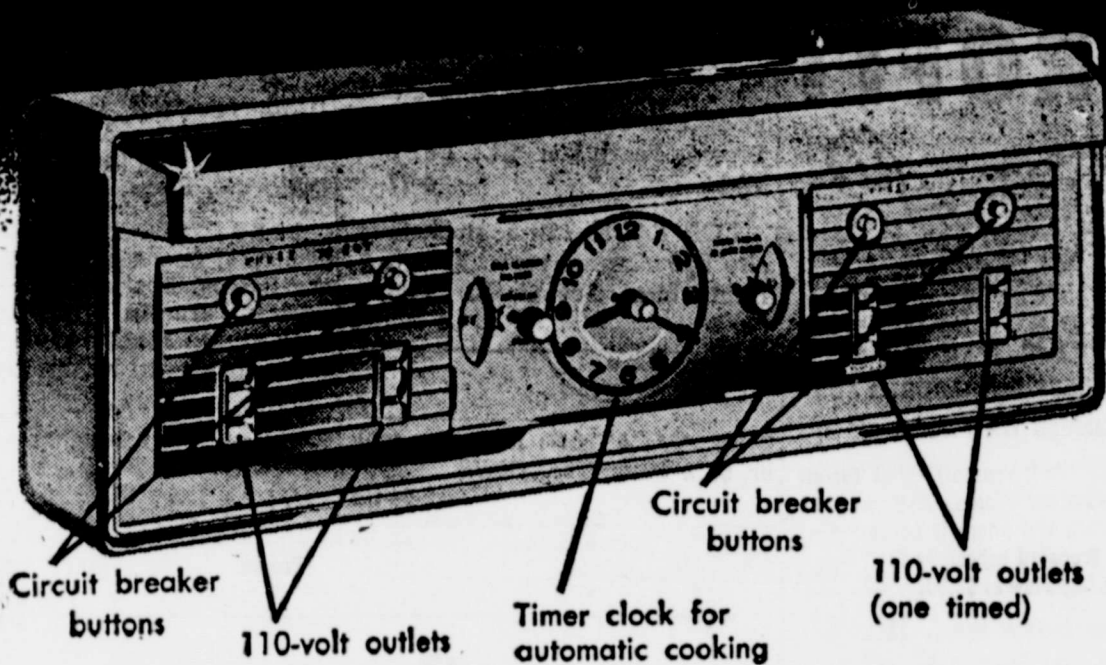

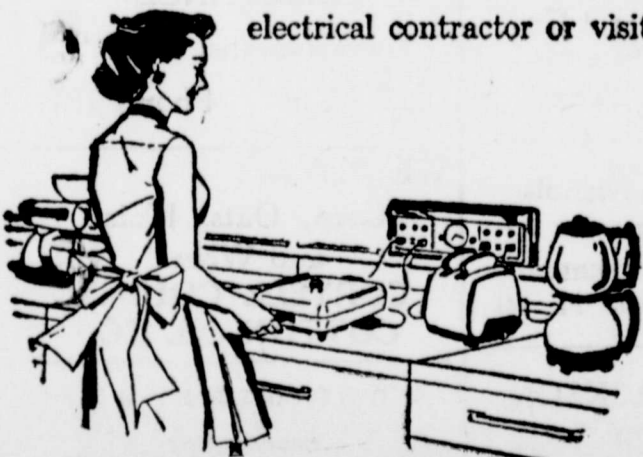

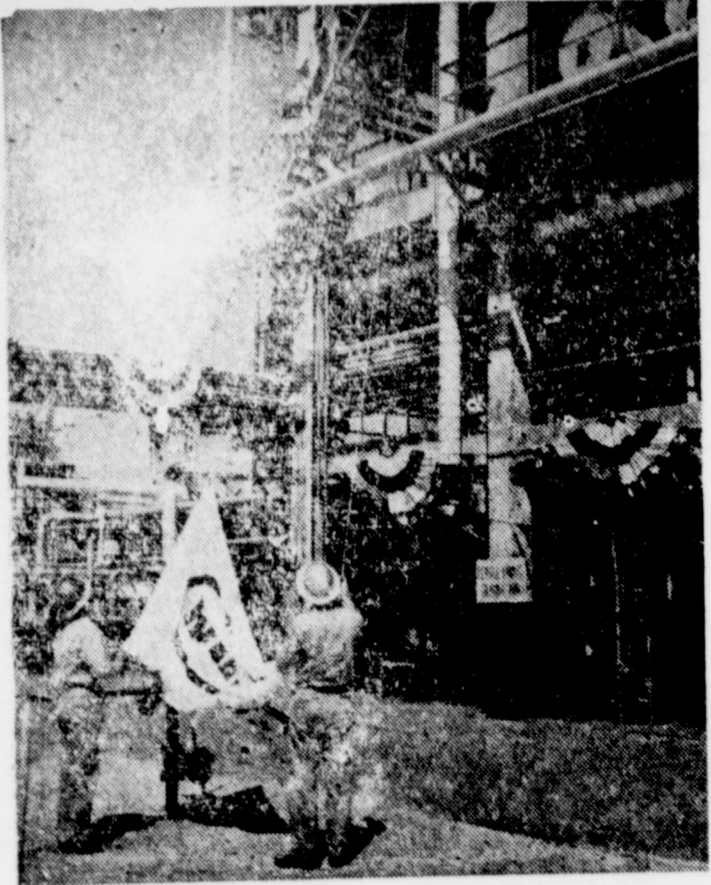

**IF I CAN FIND THE ARMS OF THE CROSS**

A large passenger plane bound for Hawaii took off from the great airport in San Francisco. Sometime later, as the pilot checked his course over the Pacific Ocean, one engine began to sputter, then stopped completely. Immediately, the pilot turned the plane around to return to San Francisco, since it was only 300 miles behind. Hawaii lay nearly 2,000 miles away. In a short while the pilot was approaching San Francisco, but a heavy fog had settled over the bay area. The pilot lost his way in the fog even though he had instruments. He was not sure of the direction in which he was flying. The pilot turned to his copilot and said, "There is a mountain east of the city and its top will be above the fog. There is a cemetery on the top of the mountain; one of the tombs has a tall cross on it. Let's fly toward the mountain and if I can find the arms of that cross, I can bring the ship safely to land." Rising above the heavy bank of fog, the pilot of the plane soon saw the mountain and found the cross standing in the cemetery. Taking his bearings from the arms of the cross, he was soon able to land the plane safely. Do you often feel as if you were lost in the fog of trouble, worry and despair that surrounds you? Do you ever feel that you have lost your bearings—your sense of values and direction? When your way is not clear or your journey is hindered, find the arms of the cross. When you find the cross, you will find a person, Jesus Christ. Christ is a master pilot. He is the Master Navigator. Christ has never been lost. Immediately, the tempest-tossed little boat began to stop its wild pitching and rocking as the wind and sea obeyed the command of the Master. The disciples, cowering in the bottom of the boat, were only too glad that Christ had taken the helm and become their pilot. Today, that same Master Pilot is ready to help you. He is not a dead Christ but a live, vigorous, real person who will guide you back to your course. After you find Him, He will help you arrive at your destination. All you must do is find the cross.
