### SPECTACULAR ACCIDENT INJURES NO ONE: DAMAGE TOTALS \$6,123 PLUS

Walter Lee Bell, driving a '59 Ford Station Wagon, was carried to the hospital and released, but his vehicle sustained \$2,800 damage. A '56 Chevy sedan, driven by Cecil Coin Coon of Gatesville, was damaged \$800, and a '55 Diamond T Truck, belonging to Hunsaker Trucking Company, and driven by Thurman Walter Wilhelm was damaged \$100.

A '54 Chevrolet driven by Arthur Painter, Gatesville, was damaged \$20, and a '57 Cadillac funeral car owned by Cannally Funeral Home, Waco, and driven by David Paul Lake, of Waco was damaged \$1200, and a '556 Diamond T truck driven by Louie Ennis Dickerson of Crosbyton, was damaged \$1200.

Damage to Dickerson's was not given, but must have been substantial. Dickerson was cited for DWI, pleaded guilty, and paid off to the tune of \$71.45, had a three day jail sentence, completed, and had his driver's license suspended for 6 months.

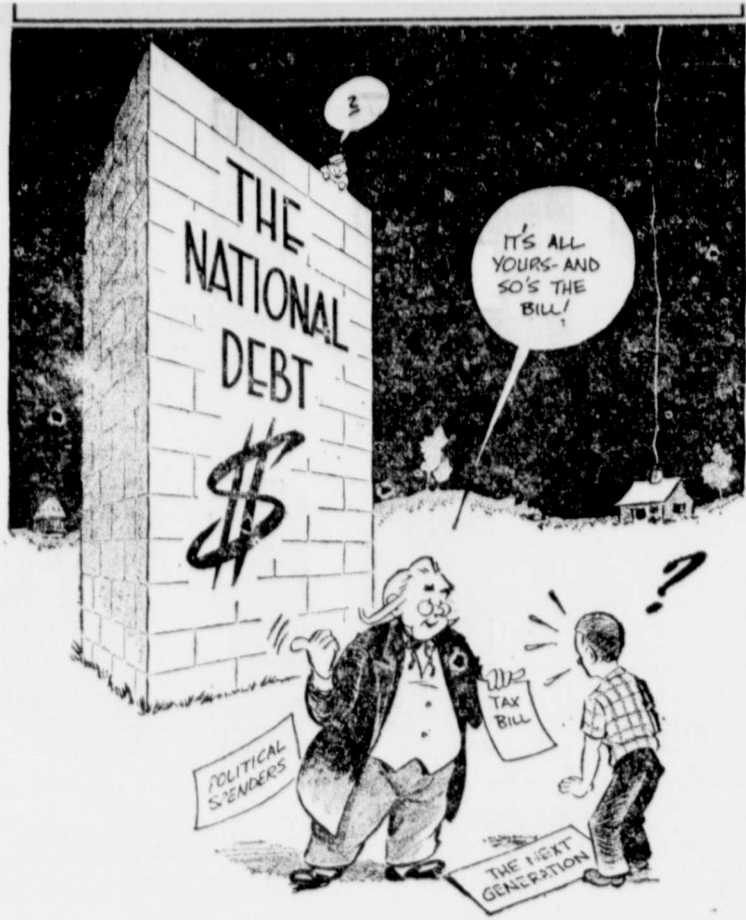

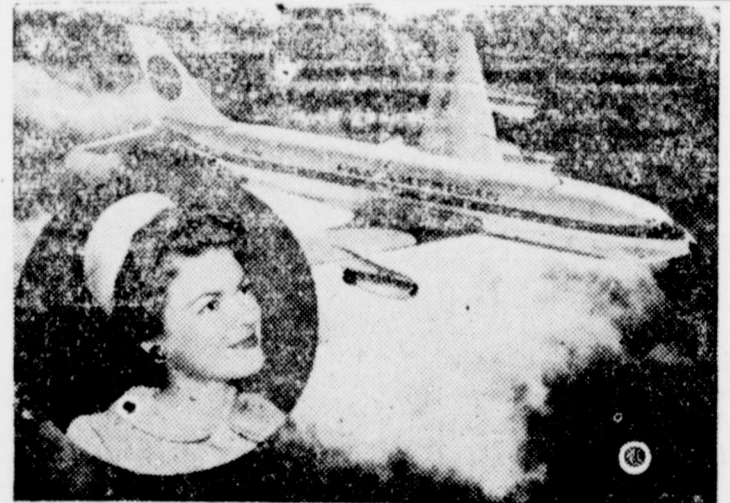

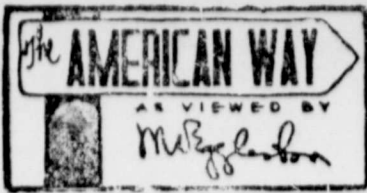

**GLORIES IN HIS SHAME**

U. S. Senator Estes Kefauver (Dem., Tennessee) has proudly boasted to his constituents that 8 Federal aid programs have re-

turned Tennessee more than twice what Tennesseans paid in taxes to support those 8 Federal aid programs.

Getting down to cases, Estes cited that since 1936 the programs have poured \$700 million into Tennessee, compared to Tennessee tax contributions toward these programs of \$312.5 million.

Said Mr. Kefauver: "I for one see nothing immoral about it. The centers of capital in our big states draw wealth from our state -

wealth which brings no corresponding low of taxes to Tennessee or her municipalities."

He went on to say that Tennessee counties and cities needed federal aid to assist in their many problems. "Without federal aid these problems will simply fester and increase and ruin the life of our communities. And the nation is only as strong as its many parts.

PROFITS NOT CAUSE OF

## INFLATION

"No wonder we are 'p'ving inflation and our dollar keeps getting worth less and less. Look at those fat profits companies are making

This comment was made in a letter received recently from a newspaper reader. As undoubtedly many readers may hold the same erroneous opinion, let us quote a part of our reply:

"Profits made by our American corporations definitely have not contributed to the upward spiral of prices, at least during the past decade, as a look at the facts clearly reveals.

From 1950 to 1959, aggregate corporate profits were \$207 billion, ranging from a low of \$16.8 billion in 1954 to a high of \$24.5 billion in 1959.

Admittedly in dollar terms this is a high profit—but not fat as you have called them. The facts are that while in 1954 profits were 9.4 per cent of national income, in 1959 they had shrunk to 6.1 per cent.

If you wish to unearth the number one contributor to inflation, you'll find wage increases to be the culprit. The compensation of employees rose from 63.7 per cent of national income in 1950 to 70 per cent in 1959.

Thus corporate profits have really had a deflatory effect while wages have been inflationary."

Dear Friends:

On several occasions I have pointed out that our present flexible farm price support program was giving precious little assistance to farmers and at the same time was burdening our taxpayers with an

almost impossible load. Within the last seven years we have increased our surplus stocks from \$2,452,000,000 to nearly \$10 billion. In connection with its price support program the CCC now shows losses of about \$7 billion more of it on basic commodities. Seven years ago these commodities showed a net profit of \$13 million. Within those 7 years the Dept. of Ag. has spent more money (\$37 billion) than that dept. had spent (\$35 billion) in its previous 91 years of existence. All of this happened while farm prices were going down and the cost of food to the consumer was going up.

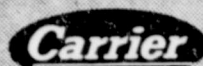

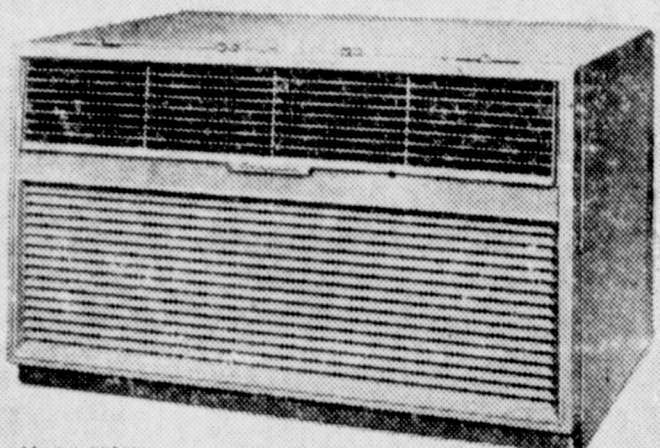

make sense. I think that we should give farmers the same kind of governmental assistance to control unheeded production which we give oil producers under our proration laws. Others think that we should allow unlimited production with a low government loan program.

Our committee offered the House a bill which would have allowed wheat farmers to choose in a special referendum which method they preferred. The bill presented the Committee proposal of a cut in acreage, an increase in supports and a payment in kind for removing land from production as one choice, and the Farm Bureau proposal of unlimited production and a very low price support as the other choice. I simply cannot understand how those who say they want farmers to decide

for themselves could oppose this choice, but they did.

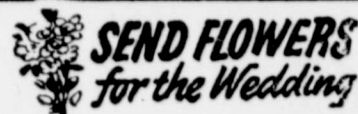
So far as I could see, no one gained by this action except the grain storage people. I have some very fine friends in that business but I don't believe that even they would want us to continue to raise sheep grain simply to provide them with more business. As it is I hope that those who voted against any action this session will stand ready to vote for the taxes which will be necessary in order to pay for a continued increase in unneeded storage.

Yesterday the House voted for a program of aid to the States for assistance to needy old people who are faced with medical and hospital bills they can't pay. The bill definitely does not involve any socialized medicine. On the contrary, it will help doctors collect their

bills, just as it will help old people pay them. I voted for the bill.

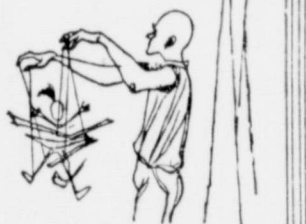

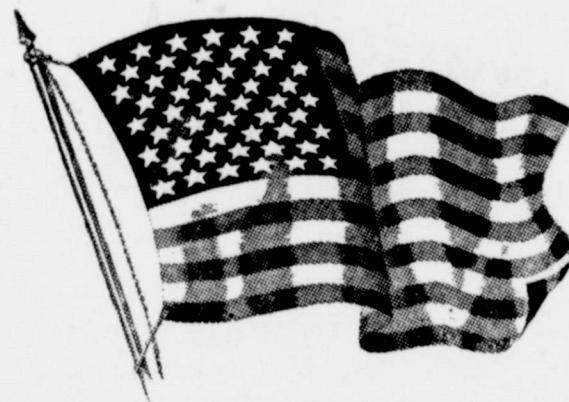

the opportunity to build her body for this grueling feat.

Studies by a leading university have shown that each two weeks of rest returned an additional 10 pounds of butter fat in the next lactation. This is an average for a six to eight week dry period since the cow actually responds more from the first few weeks of rest than the last. To feed beyond eight weeks will seldom return sufficient additional milk to offset the feed cost, unless the cow is in a very poor condition.

Mature animal weight records have shown that slightly over two pounds per day gain during the dry period will give total increase of about 125 pounds body weight. Depending on the breed, this conditioning will return 1000 to 2000 pounds or more of extra milk in the succeeding lactation.

This additional milk will bring more than twice the cost of the ration for the dry cow. A 1200 pound cow will consume about 700 pounds of concentrates during 60 days. This grain ration should be of an oats or barley base and depending upon whether home-grown grains are utilized, the cost will run three cents to four cents per pound. A 1500-pound milk increase at \$4.00 per hundred weight would give a return of about \$60. This return, on investment would be difficult to equal in any other phase of animal agriculture.

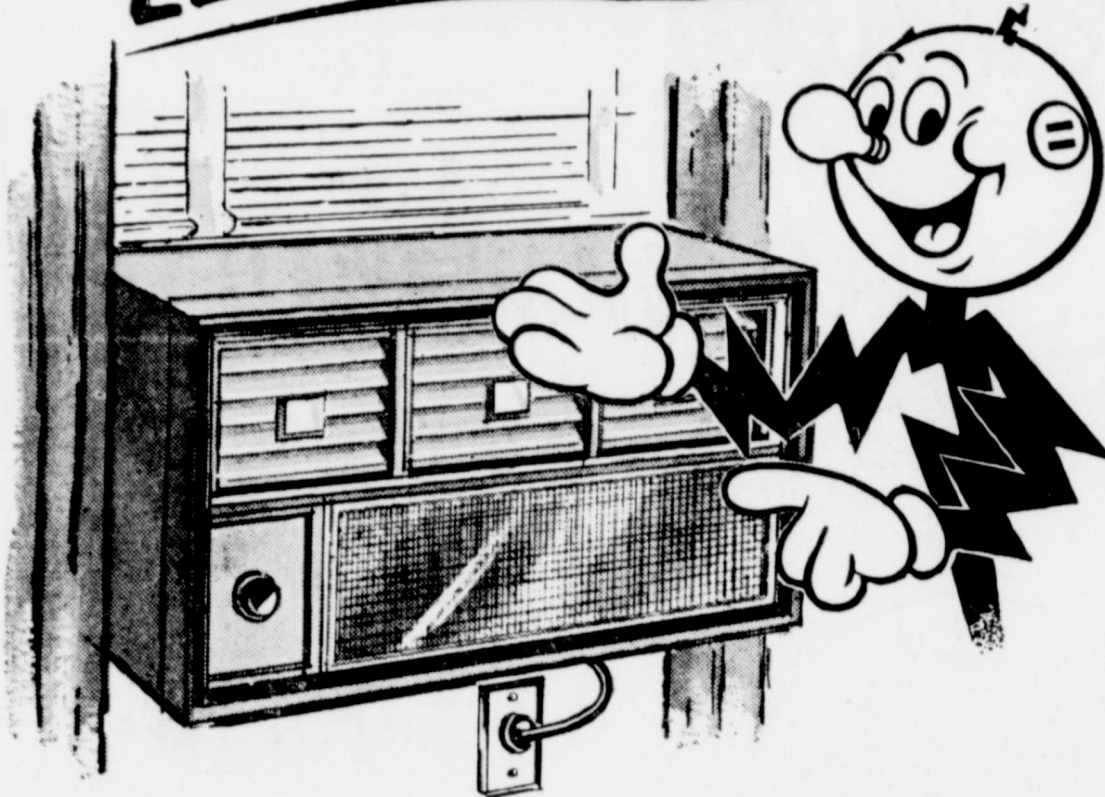
