## Hornets-Brahmas Meet At Austin In Quarter Final Game

### HORNETS ONE OF 32 IN STATE PLAYOFFS: BOTH HAVE PERFECT RECORDS

Somebody's season record is going to be shattered tonight! Both Bellville Brahmas and Gatesville Hornets have perfect records, 12 wins, no losses, and no ties. Something's bound to give by 10:30 p. m. tonight when GHS Hornets meet Bellville's Ernie Koy Jr., led Brahmas in a battle of battles tonight. Some

sportswriters have the Hornets favored, but some sportswriters don't. It depends on what part of the country they're from, and their 'coverage.' Anyway, it's bound to be a battle, and the Hornets are in to shape - especially for this late in the season - and, we understand, so are the Brahmas. Winner in this classic is expected to furnish competition for Olney in the AA Finals - at least, some observers think so.

This game pits the only two teams in the entire playoff with unmarred records in the 16-playoff games of the four-division prep lineup, according to The Houston Chronicle. Gobs and gobs have been written about the games of these two teams, but all the writing and pictures are history, and more thrilling history is to be written Friday evening in House Park Stadium in Austin. The Hornets have gathered ex-

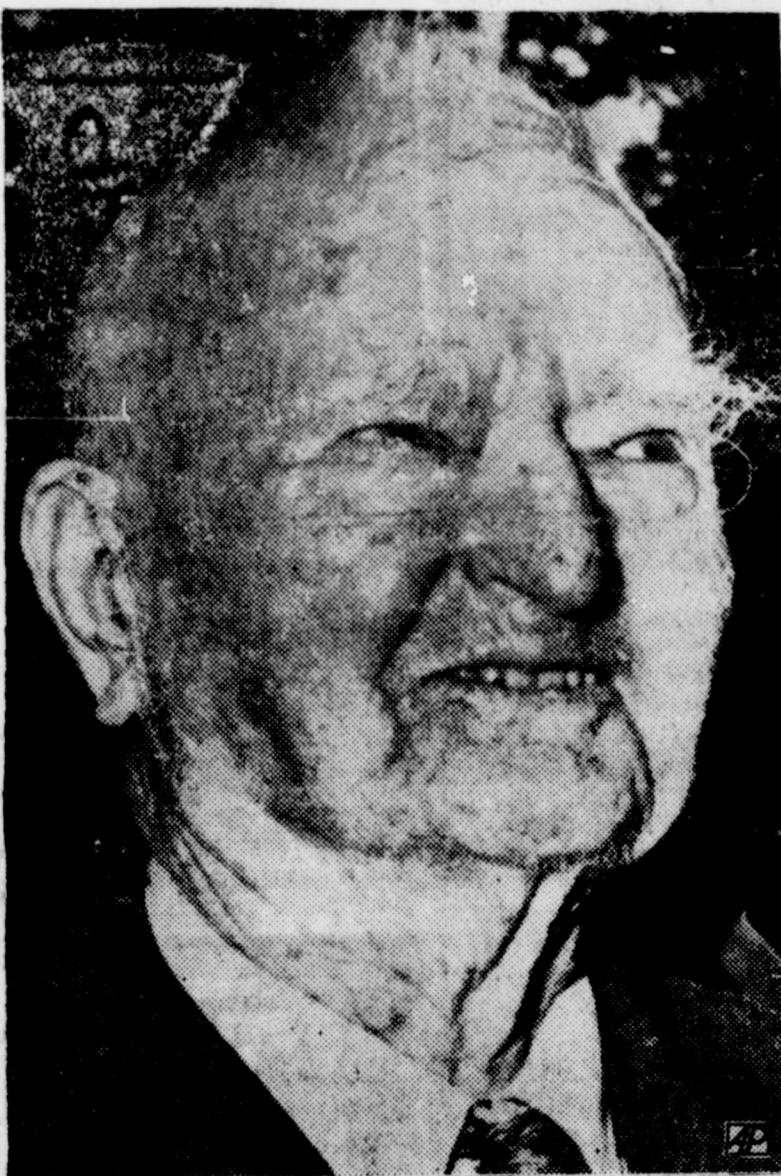

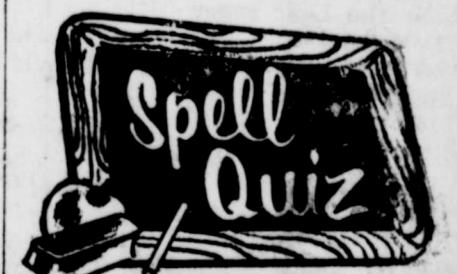
### Weldon Jones To Undergo Throat Operation In Providence Hospital

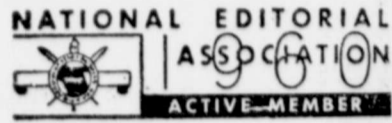

## FABULOUS BOVINE

### Old Nit, 22, Dies; 'Milkingest' Cow

The Holstein-Friesian Association of America has stamped 'Complete' on the career record of the 'milkingest' cow that ever lived.

Korndyke Beets Jannek Segis 2085418 (VG)— owned by Clark

died only 541 lbs. short of be-  
Bowen and Son, Wellsboro, Pa.—  
coming the first 300,000 pound  
life-time producer in all dairy  
cattle history.

During her Methuselah-like  
span of nearly 22 years, 'Old Nit',  
as she was known throughout the  
registered Holstein industry, pro-  
duced 299,459 lbs. of milk.

This total, compiled on twice-

daily milking, ranks as the all-  
time national record— regardless  
of breed or milking frequency. It  
compares to a lifetime output of  
approximately 25,000 lbs. by the  
average cow.

As an added claim to fame, Old  
Nit posted a lifetime butterfat re-  
cord of 10,748 lbs. This ranks as  
he second highest ever in the 75  
year history of the national Hol-  
stein organization's official pro-  
duction testing programs.

Under the 'milk per day of  
life' program recently adopted by  
the Holstein Association, she  
averaged nearly 42 lbs. of milk  
for every day between her second  
birthday— in 1941 — and the date  
of her death. No allowance is  
made for dry periods in the calcu-  
lation.

En route to national longevity  
honors, the Bowen Holstein shat-  
tered two all-time 365 day re-  
cords on Herd Improvement Reg-  
istry test.

Her 20,414 lbs. of milk and  
761 lbs. of butterfat, completed in  
1956, still stands as the national  
record for 16 year olds milked  
twice daily in the program.

She also holds the paralleling  
record for 18 year old cows with  
a 365 day production of 20,838  
lbs. of milk and 752 lbs. of  
butterfat.

In between "Old Nit"— never  
one of the rest on laurels— narrow-  
ly missed breaking the all-time  
record for 17 year olds.

Korndyke Beets Jannek Segis  
was born in January, 1939 on  
the farm of Emmon Pepper,  
Granville Summit, Pa. She as sold  
to the Bownens in 1946 — to the  
consternation of neighbors who  
wondered why anyone would in-  
vest in such an 'old' cow.

The answer soon became ap-  
parent as 'Old Nit'— gray with  
age but in the profit column  
every squirt of the way — went  
on to out-live three full genera-  
tions of average cows.
