WT Announces New Nursing Scholarships

A \$20,000 appropriation for Nursing Scholarships has been announced by officials at West Texas State University. In October 1969 when the Coordinating Board Texas College and University System approved a Baccalaureate Program at West Texas State University, it was projected that 40-50 students would enroll the first year (August 1971). At the completion of registration on August 28, -100 students had enrolled in the newly established Baccalaureate Degree Program in Nursing. Scholarships have been granted to ten students and others will be awarded as soon as the scholarship applications are processed. Freshmen nursing students at West Texas are from New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Kansas. Twenty-five Texas towns within the west Texas region are represented. There are 25 students from Amarillo and five from Canyon. A number of men are enrolling in the program as Nursing, traditionally a woman's field, is increasingly recognized as a most advantageous profession for men. According to estimates from the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, 1,000,000 Registered Nurses will be needed by 1975. Today there are 700,000 active Registered Nurses in the U.S. Of the 1,000,000 RN's, 40% need to be prepared on the baccalaureate level according to the National League for Nursing. Critical shortages exist in the fields where baccalaureate preparation is required, i.e., nursing education, supervision, administration and clinical specialization. In 1970 there were 1,244 budgeted faculty positions in schools of nursing vacant. The Baccalaureate Degree Nursing Program is a cooperative effort of West Texas State University and the Amarillo Hospital District. 

ID Cards Now Available From TDPS

AUSTIN--Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that effective September 1, Texans will be able to obtain a special personal identification card.

The card, which was authorized by the 62nd Texas Legislature, is laminated and contains a color photograph of the holder. It is the same size as a Texas drivers license.

Information appearing on the card will include the holder's date of birth, height, sex, and eye color. Each card will have a special identification number issued by the DPS.

Speir said the cards should be of value to those persons who do not hold a Texas drivers license, but who need some sort of official card to help establish their identity.

In order to obtain a personal identification card, the applicant must appear at a DPS drivers license field office on or after September 1, execute a special application form, present a birth certificate or other documentary evidence of identity and date of birth, be fingerprinted and pay a statutory fee of \$5.00. The special cards, which will be mailed from DPS Headquarters in Austin, will be dated to expire four years from the applicant's next birth date.

Also effective September 1, certain persons having military service connected disabilities will be exempted from drivers license fees.

Speir said those individuals with a 60% or more service connected disability will be entitled to the free drivers license provided they meet other requirements which apply to all applicants. At the time of application for a new or renewal license, the disabled veteran must present the DPS drivers license office an official communication from the Veterans Administration Regional Office showing that he is currently receiving compensation from the Federal Government in connection with a 60% or more service connected disability.

in prison and a \$25,000 fine can be imposed for taping a record for re-sale or for selling of such a tape without permission of the company that manufactured the disc.

Other major laws passed and now in effect include:

Require employers to rehire National Guardsmen who were called to active duty within the state.

Prohibit employers from firing persons because they filed workmen's compensation claims or were witnesses in cases involving on-the-job injuries.

Increase the fines for littering the highways from \$10-200 to \$50-400.

Enlarge the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission from

three to six members. Establish a seven-member board to license experiments involving marijuana and other drugs. Experimenters will be immune from criminal prosecution if they have such licenses.

Authorize counties to pay financial incentives equal to the cost of foster care to persons who adopt children who are hard to place because of race, age, language or handicaps.

Permit churches, veterans groups, religious societies and other non-profit charitable organizations to conduct lotteries, which are ordinarily forbidden by law.

Require convicted defendants to pay court costs of \$2,50 in city or justice of the peace courts, \$5 in county courts and \$10 in district courts, with the proceeds going to the state's criminal justice planning fund.

in 1965, and since it began, has become a more popular way of compressing hay for feeding, especially in area feedlots. He said several area feedlots purchase most of the cubed hay to use in their feedout operations.

Down the road from the cubing, touring groups visited a broadcast cotton field, produced by W.T. (Bill) Millen. Millen said he planted the cotton on land which produced grain sorghum last year, and explained the process used to raise the crop. Using charts and graphs, Millen showed how he kept up with the water level and rate of use of water by the growing cotton.

He gave the complete process, from deep breaking the land to 30 inches and all preparations for sowing the broadcast cotton.

Millen told the touring group that he watered for a total of six weeks, three weeks to get the cotton up and three

times through the summer. Millen showed a large circular sprinkler system in the field, which he said is the oldest in Bailey County. The farmer said he installed the sprinkler system in the spring of 1957. The system presently waters 200 acres with one setting and he plans to add three additional towers to the present 19 to water 265 acres.

The farmer also said he had not used a sandfighter in the sandy soil except in the wheel tracks and along the south and west edge where sand from the road was blowing into the field. A special new broadcast cotton stripper was displayed.

The J.T. Shofner farm was final touring stop before lunch and he showed the corn he is producing as food corn. Shofner told what process was used to produce the corn and said he was in his third year as a food corn grower. Shofner explained that more money was realized from food corn for frito and corn chip companies than from growing ensilage corn for animal feed. Also on display was a corn harvester.

"I am very pleased with corn as a money crop," said Shofner.

The farmer also showed his one-acre peanut crop which he is growing for the First United Methodist Church and said there are around 23-one acre plots in Bailey County presently being produced for the church.

It was noted that several acres of peanuts are also produced in the county for commercial use and are becoming more popular due to the high yields.

A chicken luncheon was served by Mrs. Vernon Bleeker approximately one mile west of Muleshoe at the Wilson Drilling site. Mrs. Bleeker served fried chicken, potato salad, beans, bread, tea and cobbler to the touring group and several persons who joined the afternoon portion of the farm tour.

After lunch, the touring group inspected a number of tractors and heavy farm equipment which were set up at the luncheon site before resuming the tour in the afternoon.

First stop in the afternoon was at King Feed Lots where nearly 11,000 cattle are being fed out at the present time. Lee Dunbar explained that the lot is slightly below the 18,000 capacity at this time.

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the feedlot before being shipped year.

He said the price of pepper is down at the present time, although he expects the price to rise and realize a good return from his prime bell peppers.

Final stop on the tour was at the construction site of a tomato hothouse at Progress, V.T. Tanner, who is building the 15,000 square foot facility, explained how the operation will work.

He said 3,600 plants will be put in the soil at the hothouse and one crop a year will be produced for local markets. Tanner said the soil will be sterilized one time each year and prepared for replanting.

Tanner had originally planned to be in operation during this month, but has a delay in receiving building supplies for the new facility.

He said the Progress soil is excellent for producing top vegetables and he expects good tomato production once the hothouse is ready for occupancy.

Large blowers and exhaust fans were installed and he is waiting for the fiberglass which will be placed on the roof and sides.

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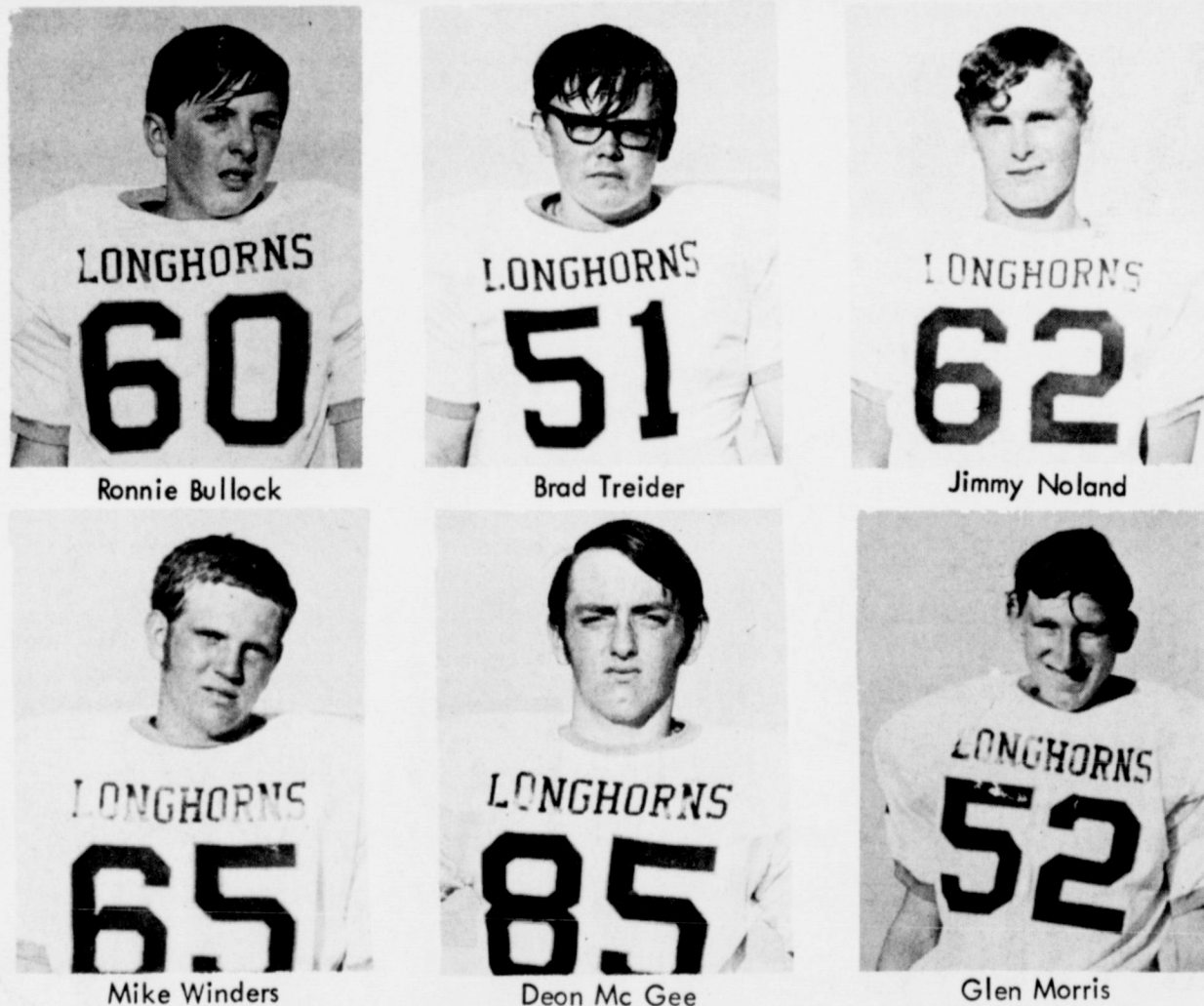

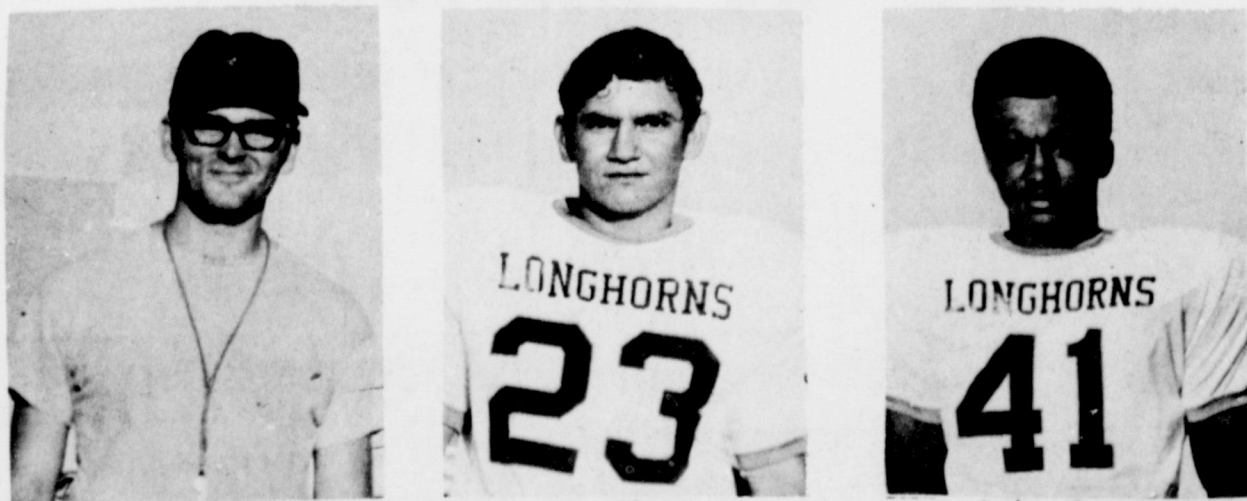

VA To Administer Free License Tags

Certification of Texas veterans disabled 70 percent or more from qualification to receive free license plate for one auto will be done by the Veterans Administration, according to Jack Coker, VA Regional Director at Waco. VA records show 14,150 Texas veterans are 70 percent or more disabled. Eligible veterans should act now to establish their claim for this state benefit approved by the last Texas legislature, Coker emphasized, Texas motor vehicle authorities must have

transmission to and from the VA and records checking by the VA will be necessary, veterans are cautioned not to wait until the last few days in September before acting.

Holiday Road Patrol Slated On Labor Day

Members of the Texas Council of Safety Supervisors will take to the highways this weekend in their second Holiday Road Patrol of the season.

In approximately 60 specially-marked cars, these safety experts will patrol the most heavily traveled highways of the state during the peak traffic hours of the holiday. The cars will be manned by experienced truck and bus industry personnel and will be particularly alert to motorists in trouble.

Initiated as a Council project to assist law enforcement officer in promoting highway safety during particularly busy hours, the patrol has now become a regular statewide occurrence during long holiday weekends. According to reports tabulated by Jack Bryan, director of safety for Texas Motor Transportation Association, the parent organization for the Council, a total of 228 hours were worked during the July four weekend patrol --- 227 contacts were made, and Council members drove 9,510 miles.

These reports were tabulated from four areas --- Dallas-Tyler, Houston, Buffalo and Austin.

Governor Preston Smith commended the Texas truck and bus group, saying, "We welcome the added assistance from the safety men of the truck and bus industry. Their wide experience on the roads and their record of assistance to motorists will aid substantially during this period of high density traffic."

month period (August 30, 1971 through February 29, 1972) in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using, after which time any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "first-come" basis.

The law further states that all such brands and marks must be rerecorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations are extensive.

The owner shall have the right during this six-month period to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one loca-

tion on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the number of brands and/or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and rerecording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian which must be recorded or rerecorded as provided by the new law.

After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act, (February 29, 1972) all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect. And after the expiration of six months, only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

All brands and marks registered under the provisions of this Act shall be registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of the Act. 36s-4stc

EPA Requested Permission To Use Arsenic

WACO --(Sp)-- The Texas Farm Bureau has asked the Environmental Protection Agency to permit cotton farmers to continue using arsenic acid as a desiccant.

"We simply do not have available to us any substitute chemical which will do the job of desiccating cotton leaves prior to harvest as efficiently or as economically as arsenic acid," TFB President J. T. Woodson said in a letter to EPA Administrator William D. Ruckelshaus.

The state's largest farm organization made the comments in response to an EPA announcement in the Federal Register of July 3 pertaining to continued use of arsenic acid as a desiccant.

Woodson, a cotton, grain and cattle farmer himself from Fannin County, said that more than 75 percent of the state's present 4.8 million-acre cotton crop is in stripper-type cottons which are normally desiccated prior to stripper harvest.

"Without arsenic acid to use as a desiccant, cotton producers in the foreseeable future would

be without a reliable desiccant," Woodson said. "Defoliants used on picker-type cottons do not work satisfactorily for stripper harvest because it is almost impossible to kill and drop all of the leaves of cotton plants with defoliants now in use.

"Other materials are either not available, or might possibly be available at an increased cost which would materially add to total production costs," the TFB president said.

Desiccants kill plants and cause them to dry up. Defoliants cause leaves (or most of them) to fall off.
