





This occurred after the government became involved through Medicare and Medicaid. Rural hospitals received about one-half of the pay for services as larger hospitals. The government's idea was that it cost only half as much to operate in a rural area. This proved to be entirely false and small hospitals began to fail. We avoided failure by cutting back on services and making our antiquated equipment last a little longer. The hospital can no longer continue to exist under these circumstances.

The government is changing its mind and over a period of five years will gradually increase pay to smaller hospitals, however, it will be impossible to continue services or expand services without a tax



10. How does the Farwell nursing home operate so successfully without a hospital?



For his Saturday show, paintings will be on exhibit in the garden and galeria areas of the artist's studio. Hours are 12 noon until 6 p.m.



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
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
