Gatesville C-C Industrial Committee, actively promoting Gatesville for any possible industrial prospect, is conducting a survey of potential labor in this area, as there have been several inquiries received the past few months as to possible locations here.

In this addition of THE NEWS is a coupon for all persons over 17 who would like to work in some type industrial or manufacturing plant to fill out and return it to the C-C office. Women are especially asked to complete the form, as female employees seem to be more in demand than male employees.

The C-C is trying for any type of business but it is thought that such plants as clothing, electronic and electrical parts assembly and metal fabricating plants may be most suitable.

Buildings to house such plants are available and the Committee is completing their list of all vacant or available space. Gatesville Industrial Corporation, which owns land for industry location, is working with the C-C.

The new City-County airport is seen as a major factor in the current interest of industrial prospects, W. D. Cooper, President of Gatesville C-C says and the first question asked by the last 3 prospects was "Do you have an airport or landing strip? If not, they are not interested."

TEXAS LEADSEM A-1 IN 4TH OF JULY TRAFFIC: BLOODIEST 4TH IN HISTORY

Texas toll of violent death for the Independence Day week end soared above 100 Tuesday night for the bloodiest carnage for July 4th holiday in state history, averaging more than one an hour. Traffic took the highest.

Broken down there were 67 traffic, 13 drowning, four in boating and 17 in miscellaneous accidents. Predictions were 55, but we beat that during the 4-day holiday.

In the nation the total was 949, another winning figure, traffic 640, drowning 169, planes 48, miscellaneous 92. California had 55, New York 34, Illinois and Ohio 30, Pennsylvania and Michigan 26, Indiana and Virginia 24 and Oregon 21. Alaska, Wyoming and the District of Columbia had none.

Here locally, altho we went no farther than the south side of North Fort Hood, we lost 2 Mustangs, a '66 and a '65, both parked at the curb in front of the house on Main Street when a pickup barged into the back end of one and knocked it into the other. The '66 was totaled, and damage to the '65 was \$600 or more, and they had not rolled an inch. Luckily no one was in them. The pickup was damaged about \$600 and had slightly over 1,000 miles on it. Driver of the pickup was taken to Coryell Memorial Hospital with a gash on his head, treated and released.

Deavers Injured In 'Chute Jump From Jet Plane

Air Force Major Glenn Deavers, 36, son of Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Deavers of Gatesville, sustained a broken vertebrae in his back Monday morning when he parachuted from a stricken jet fighter plane while on a training mission near Tampa, Fla.

Deavers is stationed at MacDill AFB Fla., and had just taken off on a flight when the plane developed trouble. He and his co-pilot jumped from a height of 600 feet, and the plane exploded and disintegrated after they leaped out.

The co-pilot was uninjured in the parachute jump.

Major Deavers is being treated at MacDill base hospital, where his condition is reported as good.

Presenting the medal to the sergeant, son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Orton, Route 1, Bellvue, is Major General George J. Eckhardt, commanding general of the division.

Sgt. Orton earned the medal last Jan. 25 while commanding a tank that was leading the squadron commander's armored personnel carriers through dense jungle during a search and destroy mission.

As the column proceeded along the trail, the tank behind Sgt. Orton's was ambushed by Viet Cong

anti-tank crew, killing the vehicle's commander and wounding the rest of the crew.

Sgt. Orton quickly maneuvered his tank between the enemy position and the command vehicles, and fire all of his weapons simultaneously, bringing effective firepower on the enemy. This allowed the other vehicles to move out of the killing zone.

Sgt. Orton, a tank commander with Troop A, 3rd Squadron of the division's 5th Cavalry, entered the Army in 1953 and was last assigned in Germany.

He completed his high school education through a General Educational Development test.

His wife, Elizabeth, lives at 507 Meggs, Copperas Cove.

"My Garden Japan" is not a travelogue, but a subtle and sensitive evocation of Japanese philosophy, art and culture.

"After seeing the film, the viewer will relate himself to the universality of nature," writes previewer George S. Avery, director of the Brooklyn Botanic Garden. "This is the deeper meaning of the film and makes it a moving human experience in itself."

The goal of the film is to show the essential unity in the aspirations of all people, says International Minerals & Chemical Corporation, which commissioned the movie. As a major supplier of agricultural chemicals, including Saskatchewan potash, to Japan, the company has developed an understanding and deep appreciation of Japanese culture.

"My Garden Japan" tells its story in the words of a Japa-

An original musical score, recorded by the Imperial Court Musicians, is pleasing to Western ears, yet basically Japanese.

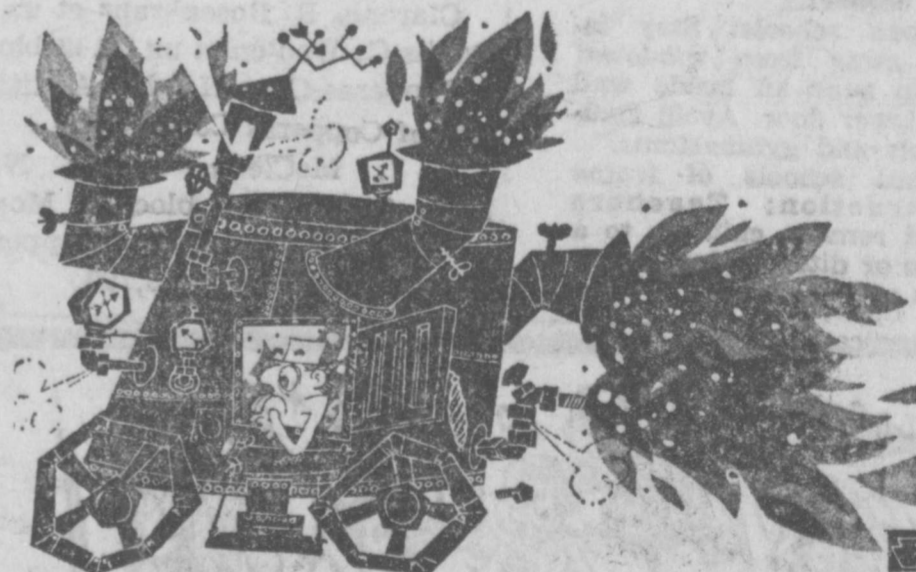

What To Do In a Tornado

- People in open country can view the approach of a tornado and move at right angles to its path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.
- In towns or cities, seek shelter inside, preferably in a substantial building. Stay away from windows.
- The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).
- Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums.
- Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.
