## RECALLED GRAND JURY RETURNS 32 INDICTMENTS

### NINE CASES FILED SINCE MARCH

The recalled Grand Jury handed down thirty-two indictments, Tuesday, April 14 at 1:00 p.m. Nine of the cases involved offenses allegedly committed in the past two

weeks. Heading the list of indictments are one murder, two assaults to murder, one robbery by assault and a robbery by firearm.

The January Grand Jury has returned 76 indictments, in what is thought to be the record number of cases. Over half of the indictments released involve Texas Youth Council inmates.

Baltazar Guevar was indicted for assault with intent to murder in connection with the stabbing of Juan Perez.

John Charles Anderson, a

Robbert A. Fought and Andrew Jackson Grumbles were indicted on charges of burglary in connection with a case at Mittell's Department store in Evans.

Teddy Poindexter was indicted on theft charges. Granville Stewart was indicted on charges with wrongful removal of mortgaged property. Fritz L. Heller was indicted on theft charges. Earl F. Ercanbrach was indicted by the grand jury for driving while intoxicated.

## Plentl To Be Arraigned Saturday

Wallace Plentl, former Gatesville DPS patrolman, was indicted by the Coryell County Grand Jury for murder with malice aforethought in connection with the March 13 death of his wife, Janice.

The indictment charges Plentl with "willfully, with malice aforethought kill Janice Plentl by choking and strangling her with his hands."

And the Grand Jurors afore-said do further present in and to said Court, at said term, that Wallace Plentl on or about the 13th day of March, 1969, and before the presentment of this indictment, in said County and state, did with malice aforethought kill Janice Plentl by choking and strangling her, in the manner and means of effecting said choking and strangling being to the Grand Jury unknown.

Plentl will be arraigned on the murder charge, Saturday, April 19 at 9:00 a.m. in the 52nd District Court, before Judge Truman Roberts.

Plentl was arrested and charged with his wife's death, March 15, following the funeral. He is presently in Coryell County jail held without bond.

Mrs. Plentl's body was found in the bathroom by one of the Plentl's three sons and reported the incident to officers.

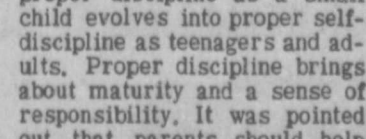
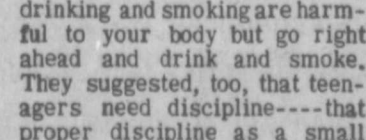
## Hog Creek Water Project Approved

County Judge Norman Storm fined Gerald Pickering \$450 plus \$35 in court costs on charges of receiving stolen property.

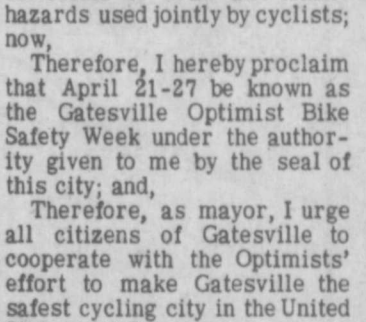
## Gatesville PTA Hears Student Count Program

The Gatesville PTA met Monday night, April 14th, in the Junior High School auditorium. The program for the evening was a discussion by members of the Student Council on "Living with Discipline" (Tensions in Families). These young people stressed the importance of youngsters' being loved by their parents, that it was not always important to have "lots of things, such as fine cars, houses and etc." They pointed out that they needed to be loved for themselves and accepted on their own merits and not compared to brothers and sisters. It was brought out that there is a definite need for family rules and that when these rules are not followed that discipline should be meted out fairly, justly, and immediately. These students also felt that parents should not be buddies to their children-----friends, yes; but buddies, no! They should "Be a parent!" They also called for parents to do as they teach their youngsters to do and not be hypocritical. The example they used was parents who say drinking and smoking are harmful to your body but go right ahead and drink and smoke. They suggested, too, that teenagers need discipline----that proper discipline as a small child evolves into proper self-discipline as teenagers and adults. Proper discipline brings about maturity and a sense of responsibility. It was pointed out that parents should help their children become self-reliant, from teaching them how to tie their shoes as small children to making important decisions as older ones. Once they

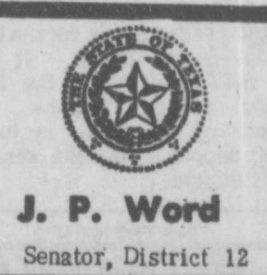

## A Word from Austin

REDISTRICTING - The U. S. Supreme Court created additional problems for the Texas Legislature last week when it handed down an opinion involving Missouri and New York Congressional districts. The high court's decision said state legislatures must make legislative districts as near mathematically perfect as possible and be able to explain any tolerances from the one-man, one-vote theory. This edict is HOPELESSLY IMPOSSIBLE and nobody, not even the Supreme Court Judges, could redistrict along such lines. This is another example of the Supreme Court's unwillingness to look at anything in a practical way with respect to legislative and congressional redistricting.

THEREFORE, THE LEGISLATURE MAY BE FORCED to redistrict the State this session and this tedious task make a special session this summer inevitable. To help alleviate this problem, Sen. Hall of Rockwall and I introduced a bill in the Senate authorizing the reapportionment of the State in both legislative and congressional districts. Our legislation also provides for the election of members of Congress from each district.

ECONOMY IN STATE --The Senate passed my bill relating to the establishment of an administrative services division within the state auditor's office. Having been a member of the interim study committee on Economy in State Government, I feel that this addition to the auditor's office would increase its overall efficiency.

TEXAS CLEAN AIR ACT--Last week the Senate passed a much needed safeguard of the clean air of this state. The measure improves the structure of the Clean Air Act of Texas to provide for more Texas to provide for more effective control of the quality of our air resources.

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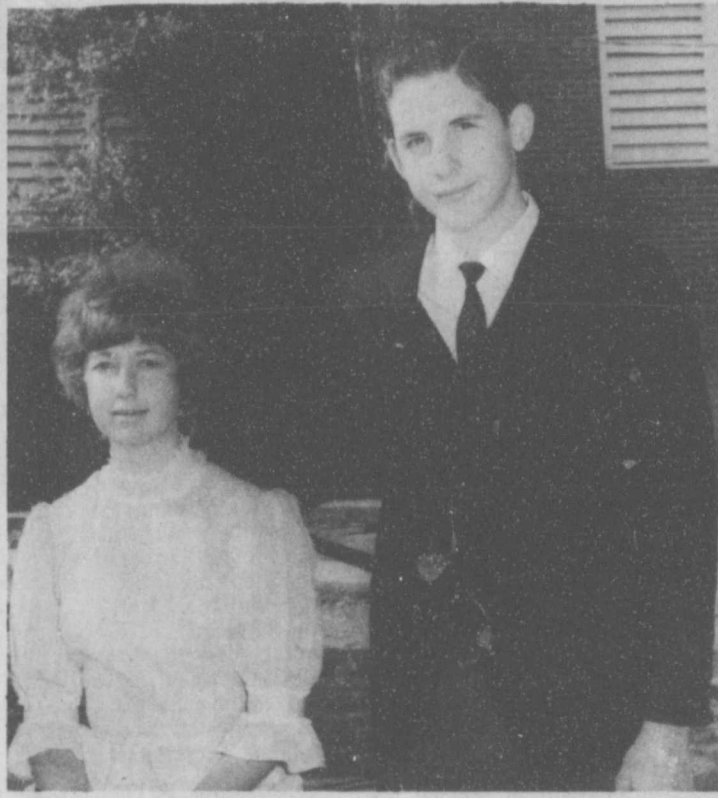

## Food For Thought

Now the Lord had said unto Abram, "Get thee out of thy country, and from thy kindred, and from thy father's house, unto a land that I will shew thee: And I will make of thee a great nation, and I will bless thee, and thou shalt be a blessing; And I will bless them that bless thee, and curse him, that curseth thee; And in thee, shall all the families of the earth be blessed." Gen. 12:1-3.

We would like to bring a few more thoughts this week, concerning the Israeli people, for they definitely are a part of the fulfillment of the end time prophecies; if you read my earlier writing of the "Jews in Prophecy" -- you noted, they are not altogether history of the past, but are also part of the message of the hour.

As we listen to the daily news, so much is being said about the Arabs and Israelis differences.

And now the "Big four" (of which we are one), are stepping in, and are planning to try to make a settlement for them; and one of the big issues, is, for Israel to restore to the Arabs the land taken in the war of June, 1967.

We fear, lest our nation should take a stand against Israel. If we will remember how the tide turned in favor of Great Britain in World War I, when Lord Balfour issued his famous declaration, promising Palestine to the Jews for their homeland; in contrast, when she failed to keep her promise in 1939, and afterward World War II came upon her, and almost the liquidation of her vast empire.

Should America fail in her obligation, as a christian nation, to stand with Israel, help will come from other sources and we could expect a national disaster, similar to what has happened to Britain.

If you will re-read the scripture heading of this writing, you will note God promised to curse those who curse Israel. It is the duty of all christians to pray for Israel. The Psalmist David wrote in Psalm 122:6: "Pray for the peace of Jerusalem; they shall prosper that love thee."

The Jews were expecting a Messiah that would set up an earthly kingdom and deliver them from the Roman bondage they were in at that time, is why they rejected the Lord Jesus, and cried out "crucify him: let his blood be on us, and our children." Matt. 27:25.

God has a time for all things. It is now God's time for Israel to be in Palestine.

"Jerusalem shall be trodden down of the Gentiles, until the times of the Gentiles be fulfilled," Luke 21:24.

So we know the time of the Gentiles is drawing to a close, for the Jews are back in Jerusalem.

We, the Gentiles, were grafted in, to the true vine, but the natural branch, which is Israel, was cut off because of the blind-

Remember the Arabs are half brothers to the Israelis, being descendants of Ismael, the son of Hagar, the bondwoman, and the Israelis are descendants of Isaac, the son of Sarah, the freewoman, but each, were sons of Abraham, but God's covenant with Abraham, that he would bless all nations, was to be established thru Isaac, the son of Sarah, from whose lineage our Saviour was born; but Abraham loved Ismael, and was concerned about him too, and inquired of the Lord about him. God told Abraham, Ismael was to be blessed, too, and that he was to beget twelve princes, and become a great nation, and he has truly fulfilled his promise to Ismael and the Arab people; today we have 12 great Arab nations: Lebanon, Syria, Yemen, Jordan, Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Sudan, Libya, Algeria, Tunisia, Morocco, and Iraq. In all, 100,000,000 people, that occupy a territory that compares, in size, to that of the U. S. A.

These, backed with the forces of Russia, will again, come against Israel, as I have tried to bring out, in full, in my earlier writings of the "Jews in Prophecy", called the Northern Army, Ezekiel 38.

These come against the little nation of Israel of about 3,000,000 people, and will overrun them for a little while, then will God's fury rise up in his face, and in his jealousy for his people, he will rise up to stand for them.

This is to magnify, and sanctify himself, to make himself known, in the eyes of many nations, that He is the Lord.

But these two nations must be joined together in one, as we read in Eze. 37: 15-22.

The prophecies concerning the reign of Christ on earth, show us that his throne will be in Old Jerusalem, and therefore, the city must be reunited, and made one city, and if this is the time--and we believe it is--the Jews will never give back the territory they took over in June 1967.

When God told Abram to leave his family and his country, and go out into a land which he would show him, he told him to lift up his eyes in all directions, and he would give it to him, and to his seed forever. Gen. 13: 14 & 15.

We, as a nation, and as Christians, should not be against God's ancient people; when we try to take from the things God has given his people forever, then, we fight against God, and his plan, and we will be cursed for it.

We, as Christians, should write our Representatives, and ask them to stand for Israel, and voice a helping hand to them.

Israel, in the news today, is not merely another news item, but is a fulfillment of God's prophetic word.

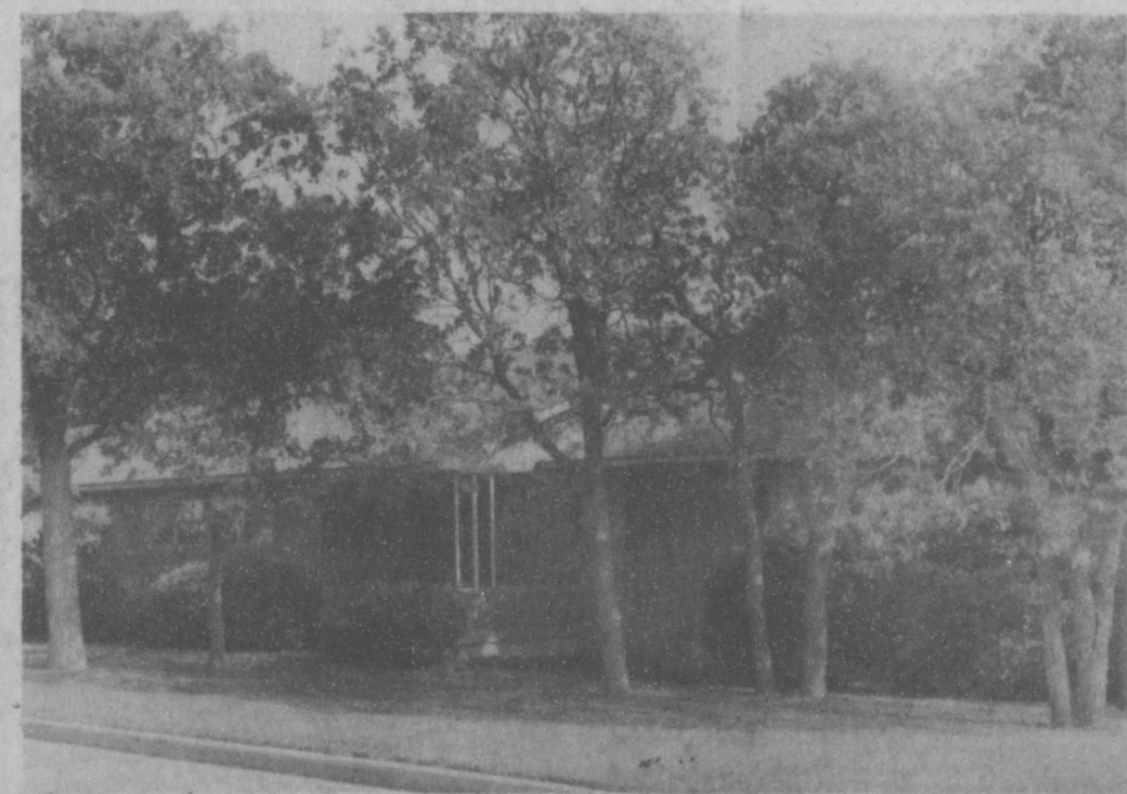

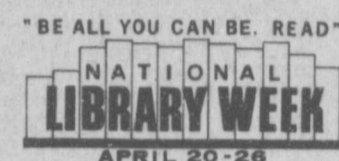

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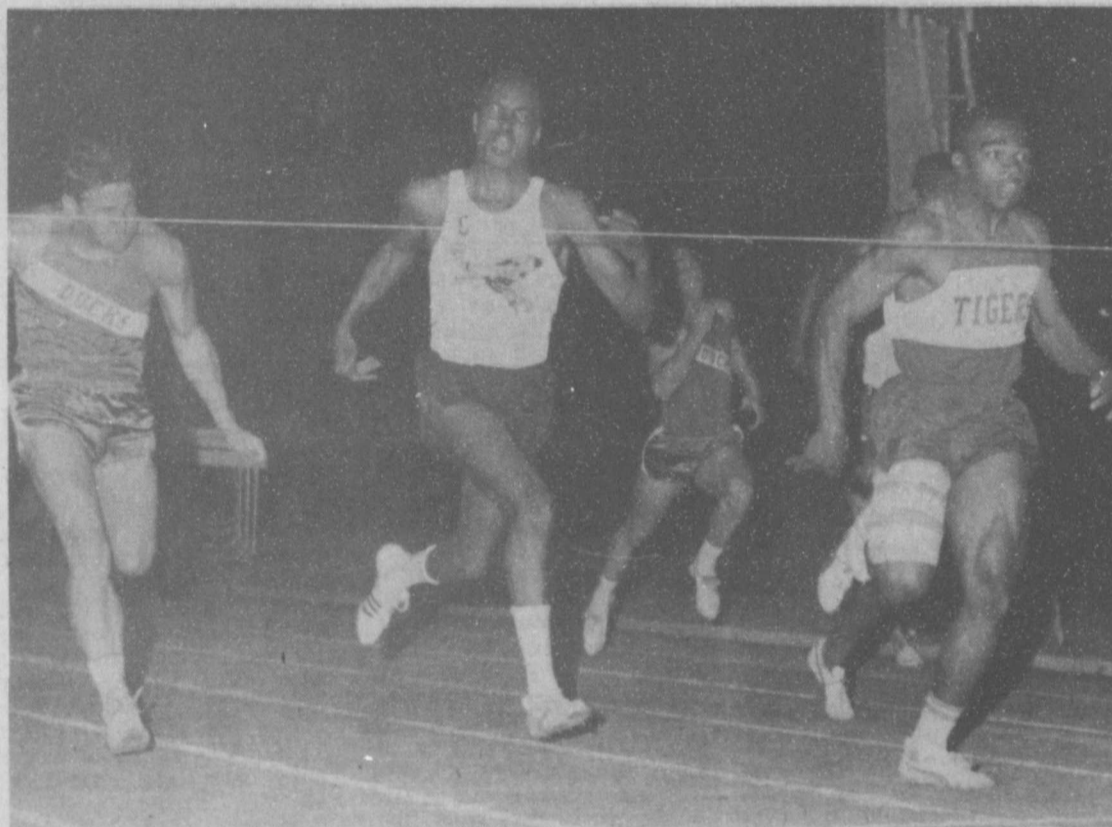

versed or prevented. Only through painstaking and exhaustive research into all aspects of cancer will the answers to the questions be discovered.

During its history the Cancer Society helped develop procedures which have saved or prolonged thousands of lives. Among these were the Pap test which has slashed the death rate from uterine cancer in half in the past 15 years, and the use of drugs in prolonging the lives of those stricken with cancer.

Public education receives about 20 cents of the ACS dollar. Here the emphasis is on spreading the message of the value of annual checkups to discover the presence of cancer at the earliest opportunity. By combining a knowledge of the seven warning signals of cancer with regular yearly check-ups, thousands of lives can be saved. For, cancer can often be beaten if treatment is undergone at the earliest possible indication of its presence. Professional education and instruction in the latest methods of detection and treatment of cancer for physicians, dentists, and nurses takes another 16 cents of each dollar raised.

Other allocations of each dollar raised by the Crusade, were 22 cents for service to cancer patients and community services. This involved easing and lightening the many burdens which cancer places on its victims and members of the immediate family.

Administrative costs and management of the organization took five cents. The budget for fund raising amounted to nine cents.

These figures, show how the Cancer Society dollar is allocated in Texas. The Cancer Societies are to save lives and to assist in helping in the conquest of the disease. This combination of science, medicine and education is succeeding in saving more lives each year from cancer. "There is solid evidence that the money you give to the Cancer Crusade goes to the firing line in the war against cancer."

riding, tennis courts, fishing and others.

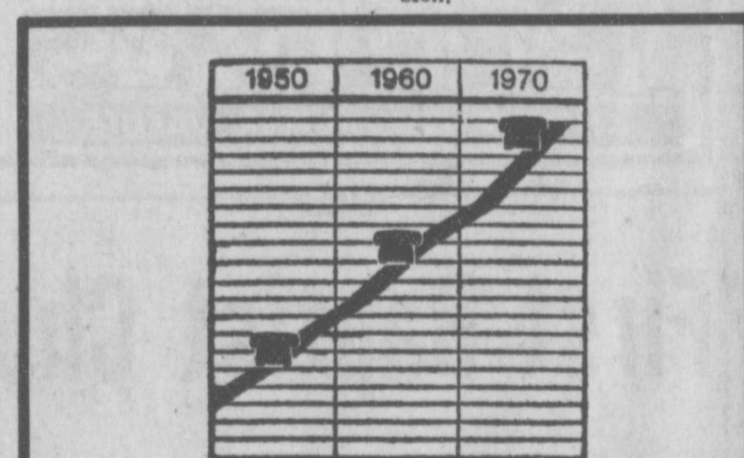
