Members of the color guard from the Webelos, Panther and Eagle patrol, led by Tammy Richards and Lupe Paiz, presented the colors and led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Fleming, the board president, welcomed the members to the meeting.

Door prizes were awarded at the conclusion of the meeting.

"REPORTS OF MY DEMISE have been greatly exaggerated," said Mark Twain in a cablegram to a New York newspaper in 1897, thirteen years before his death.

Three weeks ago, the New York Times News Service reported that declining profits from the catalog division of Sears, could result in the closing of the catalog operation if negotiations with a Japanese buyer failed to go through.

The Amarillo News-Globe did some investigation in response to worried catalog store owners in this area, and on February 10 noted that there was no truth to the alleged closing of Sears Catalog Division. Ed Brennan, CEO of Sears, indicated that a press release was being issued which stated the rumor was "totally false."

The Bible and the Sears Catalog were the two most prominent books in every rural home in this country from 1887 until the present time. A glance back at 104 years of these annual tomes presents a portrait of American enterprise throughout the most variable and progressive century known to mankind. I am glad to know that we will not be saying "goodbye" to this piece of Americana for some time.

While thumbing through my reproduction copy of the 1908 Sears Catalog, I noticed that many of the items pictured then, now sell for extremely high prices in antique stores, such as the wicker baby carriage which went for \$4.25, the massive round oak dining table with claw-foot pedestal for \$12.75, and one of those beautiful old roll-top desks for \$15.65.

The wind-up Columbia Graphophone (record player) was billed as the "talking machine" and went for \$14.95 with records priced at \$2.50 per dozen. Nothing is new! I thought the platform recliner chair was a fairly recent invention, but there was one in the 1908 catalog listed as the "Automatic Morris Chair" for \$6.25.

When the new catalogs came out each year, many varied uses were found for the old ones. Tiny toddlers sat on them to give needed height for eating at the "big table" instead of in the high chair. Little girls couldn't wait to cut out paper dolls from the fashion section, and little boys loved to snicker at the ladies' undergarments. Before the advent of the "slick" colored pages, an old catalog could be found hanging in the corner of the outhouse.

Some of the 1908 items not found in the 1991 version of the catalog are: leather saddles from \$7.00 to \$30.00; patent medicines such as wart removers, cathartic pills, cod liver oil, boil remedies, carbolic salves; farm wagons \$46.95; buggies and surreys from \$25.00 to \$104.95.

Perhaps "The Catalog" by Edgar A. Guest, describes it better than I could:

*I know the markets of the earth and wondrous tales I tell, of all the new and pretty things the whole world has to sell.*

*And those who sit with me awhile and roam my pages through, may see the pageants of mankind set out in open view.*

*I know the realms of happiness for little girls and boys; I swing the gates which lead into the magic land of toys.*

*I am the window of the world at which is kept displayed, the best of everything men do; the best of all they've made.*

*They know me as a catalog and yet on lonely nights, I bring them dreams and fancies and a wealth of real delights.*

*For often when the day is done and duty's flags are furled, I take the family shopping round the markets of the world.*

## TEAMS Exit Tests Are Scheduled

Individuals who have met all requirements for high school graduation but have not passed one or both sections of the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) may take the test in April.

During the April administration, the English language arts test will be administered on Wednesday, April 3, 1991 and the mathematics test will be administered on Thursday, April 4, 1991.

Individuals who are no longer enrolled in a Texas public school and wish to register to re-take the exit level mathematics and/or English language arts test(s) may pick up a registration packet at any high school campus, district central office, or education service center. Registration forms must be completed and returned in the pre-addressed envelope and are to be received in Iowa City, Iowa, no later than 5:00 p.m. March 13, 1991.

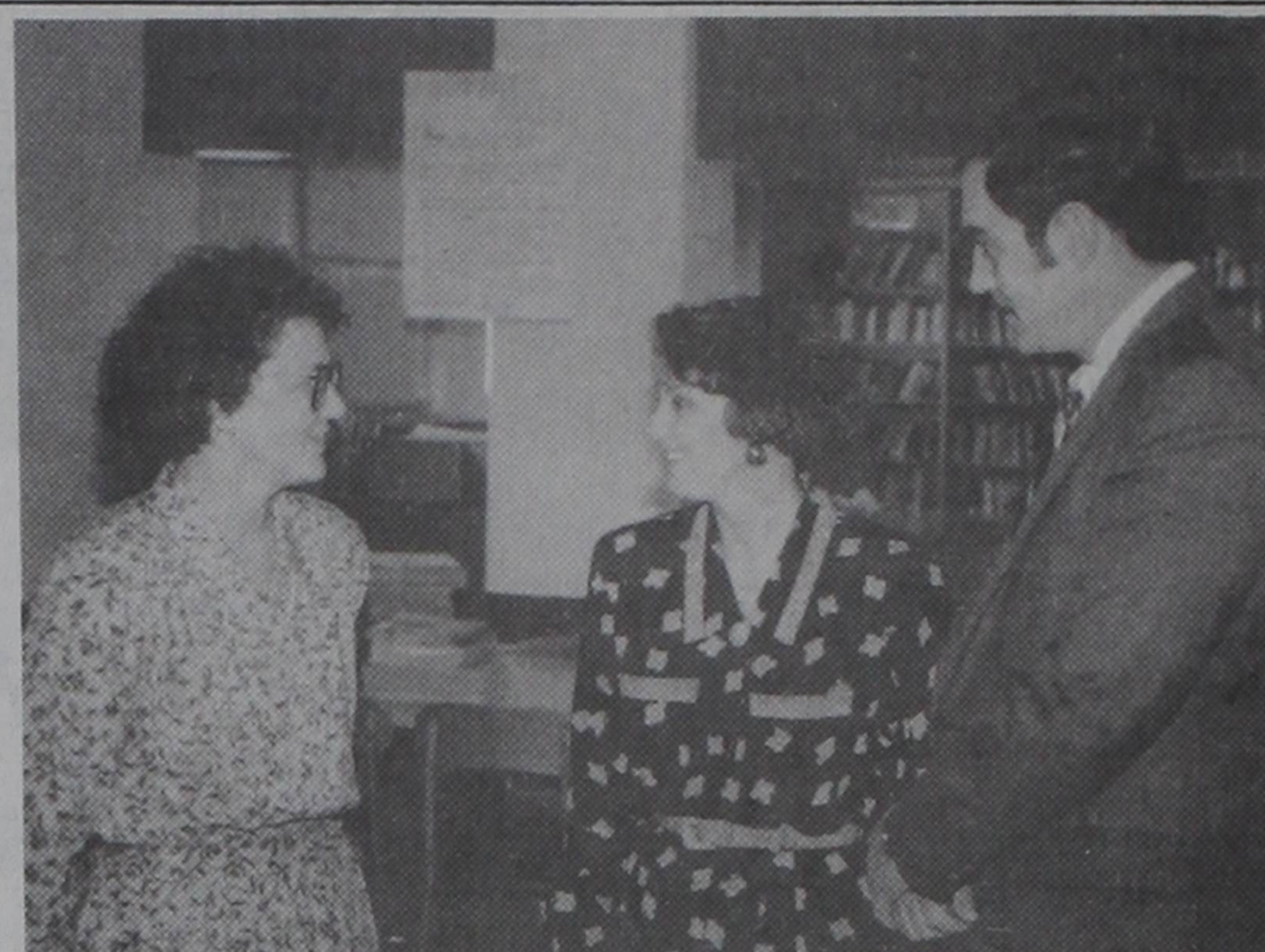

### Be Alert To International Investment Fraud

There's little doubt that international investing will play a major role in the 1990s. The international marketplace is already becoming increasingly integrated. In just 10 years (1977-1986), the volume of foreign stocks in the United States grew from \$414 million to \$1.63 billion. Likewise, foreign interest in U.S. stocks grew from \$80 billion to \$277 billion.

Whenever investor interest is concentrated in any one sector, fraud and financial abuse are sure to follow. The area of international investing could be a prime target for scams for a number of reasons.

For starters, few foreign markets are subject to the rigid trading regulations and safeguards typical of the U.S. stock exchanges or the watchful eye of the Securities and Exchange Commission. For example, the Bogota, Colombia, Exchange has been identified by some law enforcement officials as a "major front for many illegal operations...."

Likewise, the Hong Kong Exchange was rocked by a scandal that forced it to close for four days during the October 1987 crash.

Saving the institution took \$258 million in public funds and the suspension of a dozen futures brokers and the exchange's former chairman. The chairman and seven other officials were later arrested for taking bribes from companies trying to float new issues.

In addition, Italy, Sweden, Belgium and Taiwan have no prohibitions against insider trading. More alarming, Malaysia, Greece and Kenya have no government agency to safeguard the interest of investors or to police market misconduct.

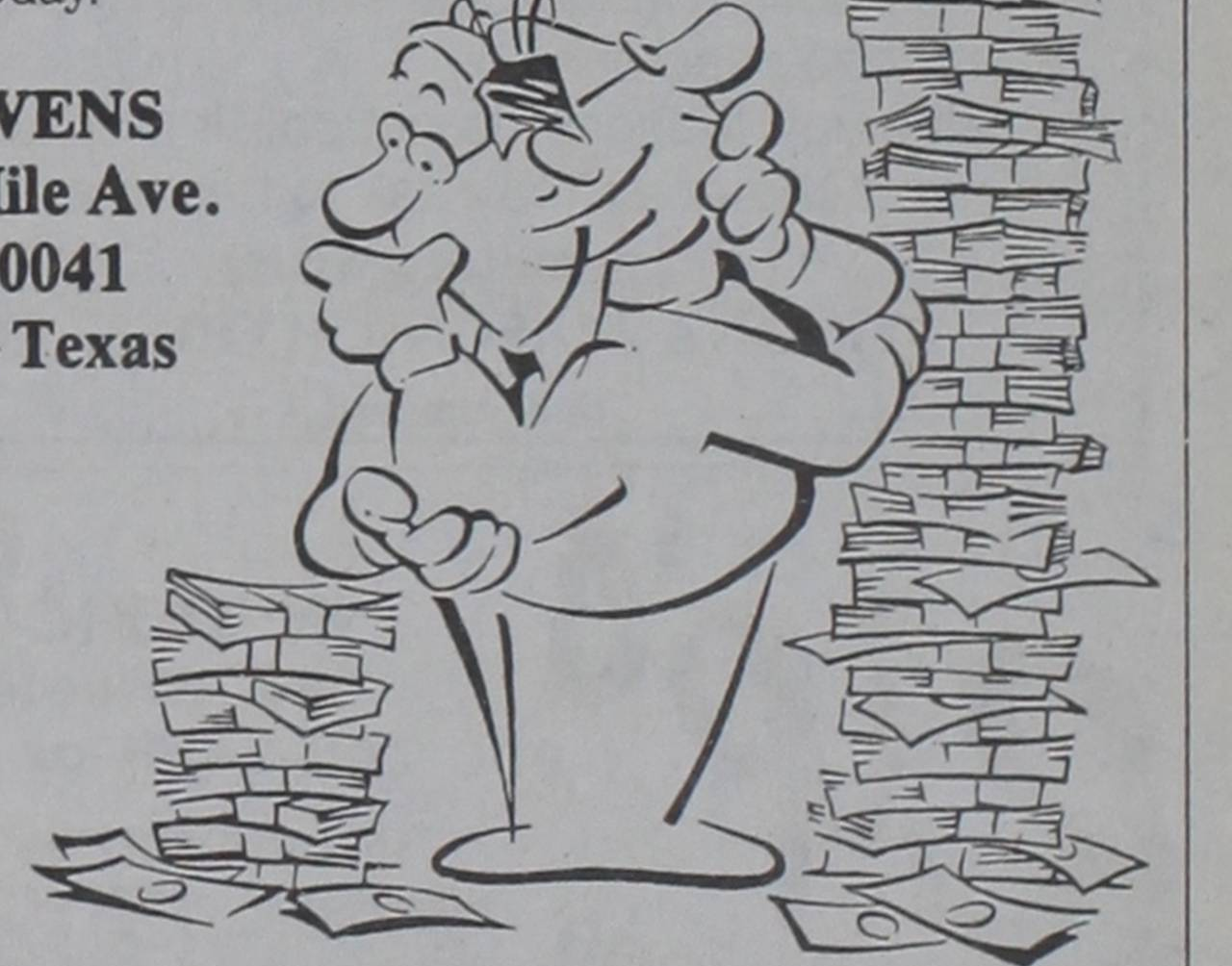
As these facts illustrate, investors should be wary of jumping into any market they don't understand. Fortunately, there are some steps you can take to protect your investment:

1. Don't get stampeded in the rush to invest internationally.
2. Understand the risk of what you buy.
3. Remember that international doesn't necessarily mean better.
4. Check with your state securities agency and Better Business Bureau for information on investments offered to you and on the salesperson offering them.
5. Keep in mind that if you are dealing with a stranger about something you can't personally investigate, trouble may follow.

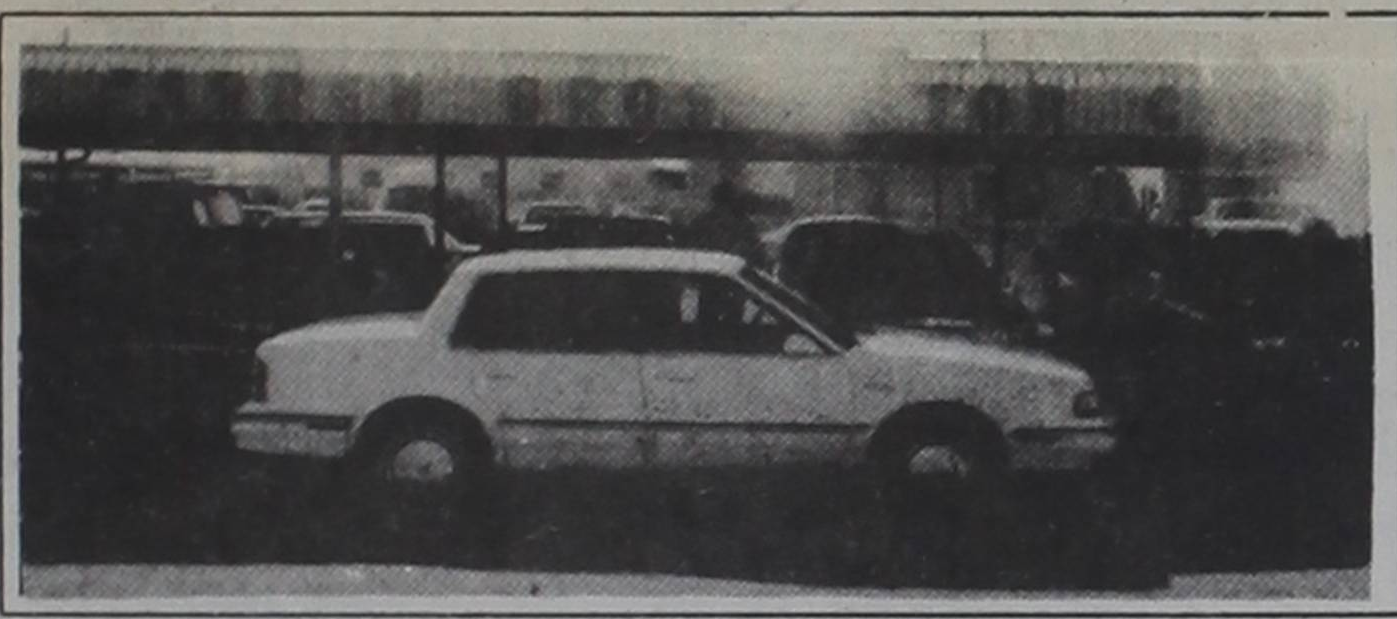
