Sunday at 12:10 p.m., Liquor Control Board agent Bob Tippit and Police Chief Gene Goins apprehended a local man and charged him with making alcohol available to minors.

The county political scene has produced contested races for four offices as the Feb. 2 filing deadline nears.

The race for Commissioner Precinct 2 has developed into a four man race with the announcement last Friday of Earl Bond and the announcement Wednesday of Lonnie Dossey for the office. Already announced are Cloyce Duncan, incumbent, and Luke Austin of Copperas Cove.

Tuesday, Doug Smith of Gatesville filed for the office of

county judge and will face the incumbent Norman Storm in the May 2 Democratic Primary.

Also Tuesday, George Jageler Jr. filed for the Commissioners Precinct 4 office against Cleo Carroll.

Cloyce Duncan is presently Commissioner Precinct 2, being appointed to the position in June 1969 following the death of Commissioner Pat Hollingsworth. Earl Bond, 66, is a farmer and rancher in the Gatesville area. He was in the grocery business for 31 years. Bond began his grocery years in 1938. He spent 16 years working for Carrolton Bro. wholesale grocery and 15 years in business for himself in Gatesville.

Bond lives on College St. in Gatesville with his wife Lillie.

Lonnie Dossey, 40, entered the race for Commissioner Precinct 2, this week to make it a four man race. Dossey is presently employed as a distributor for the Rainbo Bread Company. He has been employed as Deputy Sheriff for one year and was employed at the Gatesville State School for Boys for 10 years.

Dossey, his wife Norma, and their five children live at 1204 College Street in Gatesville.

George Jageler, is a farmer-rancher north of Gatesville. Jageler was a dairy man for over 18 years. He has been the President of

the Coryell County Farm Bureau for the past six years. Jageler has been active as an adult advisor on Future Farmers of America and 4-H youth

He is President of the Church Council at the St. Johns Lutheran Church in Coryell City and a member of the board of directors of the Lutheran Sunset Home in Clifton.

Voter Registration Jumps In Last Week Of Registration

Voter Registration has picked up over the past week with 6,450 person now registered to vote in 1970 elections. The pace of registrations have picked up enough for County Tax-Assessor, Jack Whigham to open Saturday morning from 8:00 a.m. -12:00 noon to handle last minute voter registration and last minute tax payments.

During the afternoon Tuesday and early Wednesday 110 voters registered at the courthouse in Gatesville bringing the total to 4,771 voters. Copperas Cove has registered

1679 through Tuesday.

With politicians filing for office this week the registrations should pick up with only 1/2 days remaining in registration.

February 1 is the last day for payment of county, state, and school taxes with out a late charge.

The Tax-Assessor Collectors office will begin issuing vehicle licenses Feb. 2. Whigham noted that to pick up licenses a person needs the Texas Highway Department Renewal notice or vehicle title and last years receipt.

\$9,306 LIBRARY FURNITURE BID ACCEPTED BY COUNCIL TUESDAY

City Council approved a \$9,306.43 bid by Remington Rand Co. for the library furniture to be installed in the new library.

The new library is scheduled for completion this spring with actual building construction probably completed by March 1. City Manager, Skipper Wallace, noted that the furniture will arrive within 60 to 90 days.

Included in the purchase from Remington Rand are book stacks, reading tables, shelves, periodical shelves, children's low-book shelves, desk, reading chairs, card catalog file and other library equipment.

The 5,000 square foot library will be able to house 30,000 volumes. An auditorium and kitchen complex is located at the north end of the building for meetings and civic activities.

The facilities will be air conditioned with certain areas carpeted. In recent months the old Chamlee Building has under gone an almost unbelievable change with the top story being

removed, the front and rear being completely changed and the roof being rebuilt. The only major original structures left stand at the site are the

east and west rock walls. The library construction cost were set at \$76,843 with the furnishings bringing the total to \$86,149.

Feed Grain, Wheat, Cotton Rates To Be Mailed By ASCS

Coryell County ASCS office will mail Feed Grain, Wheat and Cotton rates to farmers January 30, 1970 in order that they will be able to review the rates before starting to sign up on the program.

Sign up starts February 2 and runs through March 20, reports ASCS Office Manager Clois Stone.

The program on feed grain is about the same as it was in 1969 except there will not be any advance payment for 1970. Neither will there be any advance payment on small cotton

farms as there were in 1969. The office has been advised however, that final payments to farm program participants as soon as possible after July 1st, 1970. This will be earlier than total payments were made in 1969.

There will be a leaflet enclosed with the rate sheets on feed grain, which is well covered.

Stone noted that 1,235 farms will be eligible to sign up under the wheat, corn, barley and feed grain programs. He indicated that there are about 600 cotton producers in Coryell County.

The productive efficiency of our farmers and ranchers has helped stabilize food prices and the cost of living for all our citizens. This record of achievement has resulted from educational and technological advancements in agriculture under the free choice system.

Farmers and ranchers have recognized the value of joining together in an organized effort to promote and protect their interests. Four out of five farm and ranch families in this Nation belonging to a general farm organization are members of Farm Bureau. Farm Bureau is a free, independent, non-partisan, non-governmental, voluntary organization of families united for the purpose of analyzing their problems and formulating action to achieve educational improvement, economic opportunity and social advancement, thereby promoting the national welfare.

Gov. Smith has designated the week of Feb. 2-7 as "Farm Bureau Week" in Texas. The Coryell County Farm Bureau will have a special enrollment drive during this period as part of a statewide effort to push Farm Bureau membership in Texas over the 116,622 figure achieved in 1969.

The Coryell County Farm Bureau ended its 1969 membership year with 852 member families. George Jageler Jr. of Gatesville is President of the Coryell County Farm Bureau and Membership Chairman is G.B. Hardcastle of Rt. 3, Gatesville.

I think the President is exactly right in suggesting that we must cut governmental expenditures but each one of us feels that the cutting should begin somewhere else and it does seem to me that the President has selected a very poor subject for his example, or test case.

Frankly, this Appropriation Bill means much to most of our school systems in Central Texas. I have repeatedly pointed out that I thought it was a mistake to turn our school systems over to the Federal Government, and I voted against so doing, but since the Federal authorities have insisted on taking over the control, I think they owe an obligation to pay the bill. If the Federal Government is going to adopt the child (the school system) it should support it.

Of course, as I see it, there is a great deal of "politics" on both sides of this operation which I think should have been avoided. I know that many members feel that the matter is entirely clear and that they are going to vote one way or the other without regard to any further developments. As I have indicated, I, too, am inclined to feel that the evidence so far is rather clear, but I believe that if we are going to have effective representative government, it is necessary to hear all sides, I am, therefore, going to wait and read the Veto Message and listen to all of the evidence before I try to pass judgment.

On yesterday the President delivered his State of the Union speech. I thought he did an excellent oratorical job but I think that it is fair to observe that he stressed only those points on which there is at least considerable agreement. I was not able to detect very much guidance on those issues where there is decided difference of opinion, such as the rate of withdrawal from Vietnam, the means

to be used to stop inflation, the extent to which local assignment of school children is to be dictated by the Federal Government. I fear that in his very understandable desire to continue the political "honeymoon" the President has ignored many of the most pressing problems crying for solution and that the "honeymoon" may have reached an end.

Waxahachie, Texas, January 23. Increased development of central pressure water systems for rural communities and farms in their areas was urged here tonight by Representative W.R. (Bob) Poage, D-Tex., in a speech before the Texas Association of Rural Water Corporations.

The veteran Central Texas Congressman, co-author with Senator George Aiken, R-Vt., of a 1965 law authorizing Farmers Home Administration loans and grants for such projects, told his audience that support of city legislators is vital for continued expansion of the five-year old program because they control Congress and what it does in the way of appropriating funds.

In order to get the support and cooperation of the urban district legislators, lawmakers interested in rural development must be willing to support measures predominantly of interest to cities, Poage said.

"I think one of the best illustrations of this point lies in the vote to kill rats in the large cities," he continued.

"A couple of years ago an item was included in the Appropriation bill for rat control in the slum areas. Al-

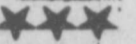

The general subject for the program was Negotiations. Mrs. Byron Leaird spoke on "Women in the Stock Market." Part of her material came from the book "HOW WOMEN CAN MAKE MONEY IN THE STOCK MARKET" by Colleen Moore, one time a movie actress who married a stock broker. This interesting, informative book is written for women to understand with definitions of all financial terms given. Many pieces of advice are given. Investing does not need to be a full-time thing. You should limit yourself to small areas of activity. Do not attempt to make millions in a short time! Use extra money such as that saved from your budget or salary or an inheritance. Do not use money that is needed for your livelihood. It is too risky.

Part of the reason for the rise in living costs is that people are buying more necessities. Air travel has increased. Banks are charging more for their services. There is lots spent on educational research. People are eating out away from home more. Even the buying of music has increased to 7.9 billion dollars annually!

In 1939 the dollar bought 100¢ worth of goods and services. In 1969 the dollar bought only 38¢ worth of the same things. Mrs. Little said that the luxuries of yesterday are now the necessities of today. People also tend to overspend because of wage increases, but they spend more than the raise amounts to.

Mrs. Little gave a humorous account of the rise of the lowly garage from a small shed on the back of a lot to a two or three room appendage to the house to provide for more cars, boats, lawn mowers, and the rest of the items for which there is no room in the house itself. She concluded with predictions of how things will be in 1970.

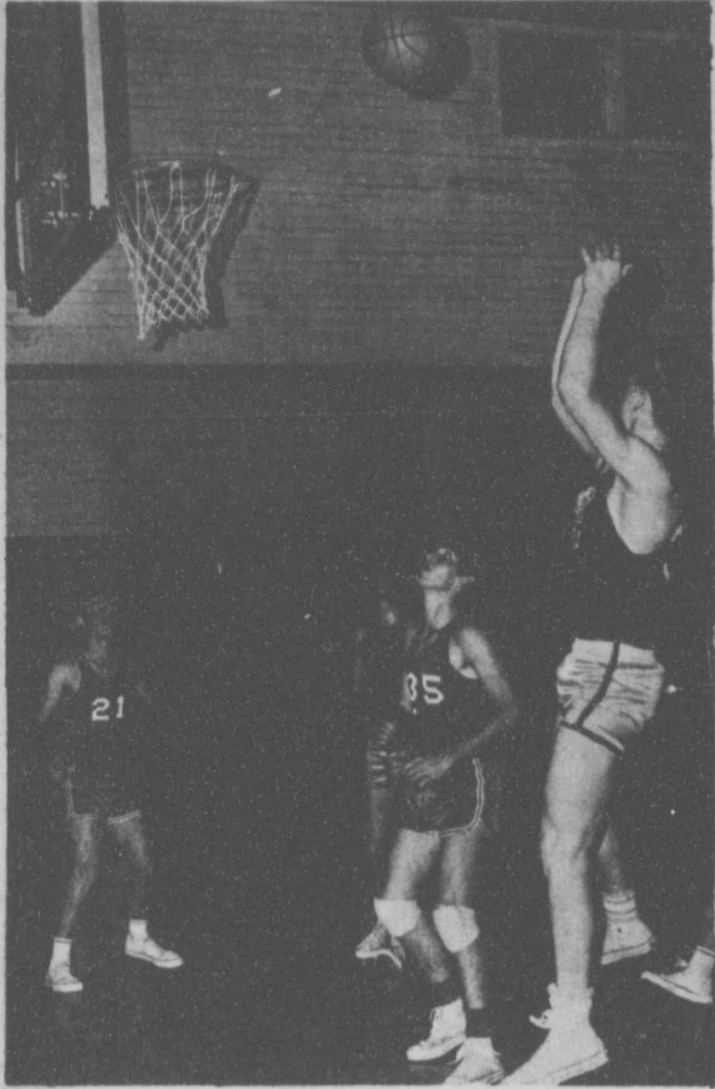

Working Students Get Word On Tax Returns

Working students got word today on how to fulfill their tax obligations to Uncle Sam from Stanley Ferguson, administrative officer, Internal Revenue Service, Waco.

A student earning \$600 or more during 1969 must file an income tax return, even if he is claimed as a dependent by his parents.

Students with incomes of less than \$600 during '69 and who have had income tax withheld, should file a return to get these taxes refunded.

A single student filing a return should claim one exemption for himself, even if he is also claimed as a dependent by his parents.

In a community property state, such as Texas, the total combined income of husband and wife ordinarily is considered one-half attributable to each, and the combined tax is usually the same whether a joint return or separate return is filed. However, in order for parents to claim them as dependents, married students must file separate returns.

Sorensen Researches Sorghums

Dallas, Jan. 22—Self-feeding of a "popped", dry-heated sorghum grain mixture to finishing steers has resulted in a lower feed intake than that of dry, rolled grain in tests by Texas A&M University researchers.

J.W. Sorensen, Jr., A&M professor of agricultural engineering, described this finding here Friday (Jan. 23) as the final speaker at the Seventh Annual Symposium on Thermal Agriculture.

Sorensen's talk on "Dry Heat Processing of Sorghum Grain for Beef Cattle" pointed out that this lower intake was accompanied by increased efficiency of feed utilization, but gave an insignificant decrease in the rate of gain and final weight.

These results were found in research conducted by Sorensen and J.K. Riggs, A&M professor of animal science, to determine the feasibility of dry heat in a "popping" operation for processing sorghum grain for beef cattle. An infrared-heated reciprocating steel table machine and a gas-heated vibrating tray conveyor machine were used in this study.

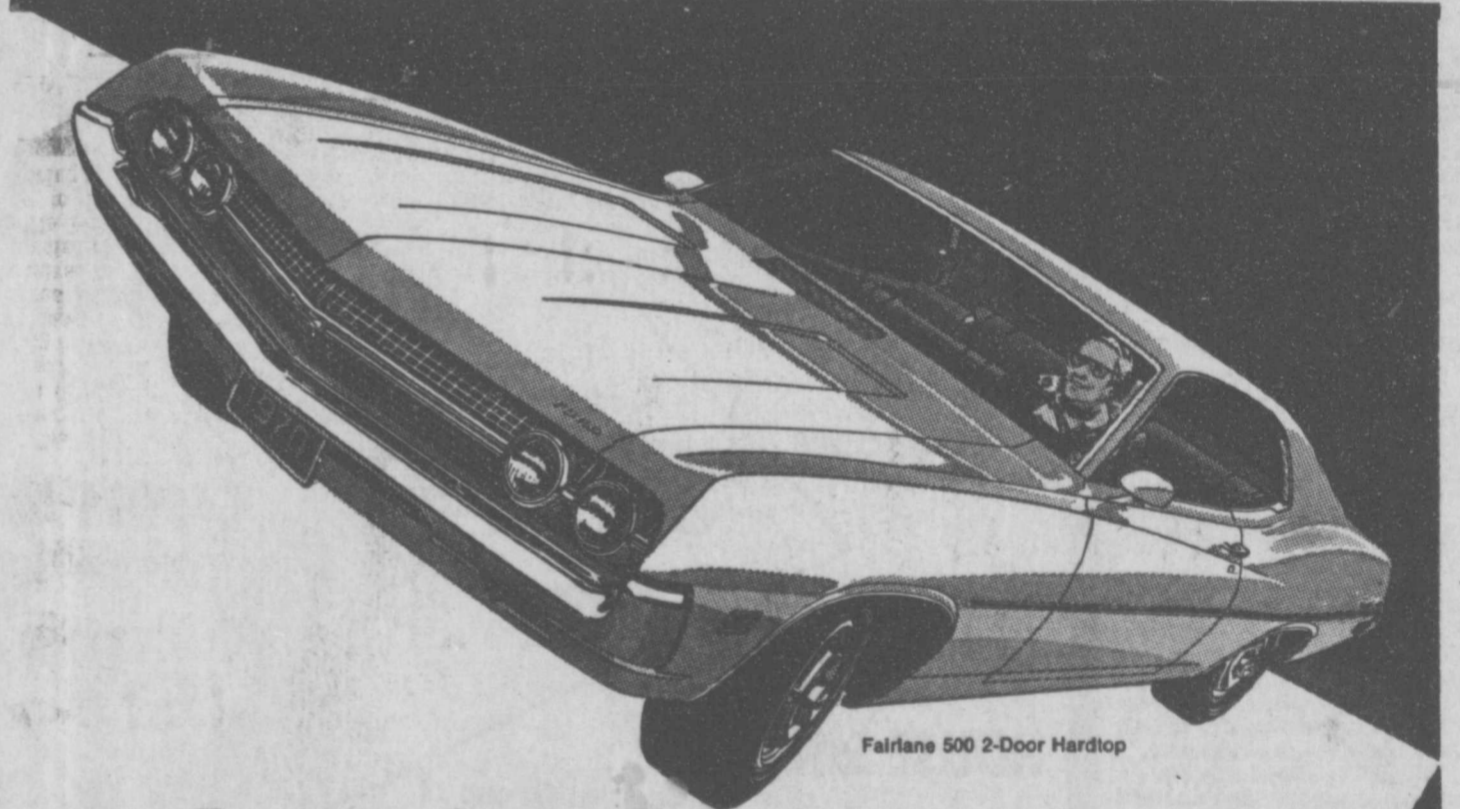

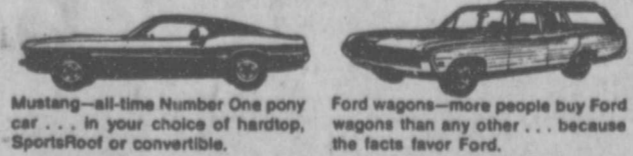
