The Fifteenth Annual Horse Show and Play Day will be the top attraction in Gatesville this week end.

The combined show includes a Registered Quarter Horse Show on Friday, a Registered Appaloosa Horse Show on Saturday, and a Central Texas Horse Show Assn. (CTHSA) Play Day Saturday at 5 p.m.

Gatesville Riding Club President, Ollie Bynum, indicated that about 180 entries are expected in each of the two Registered Shows and the 29 riding clubs of the CTHSA will be competing for points in an "association wide" point contest.

Bynum noted "there is no admission fee for spectators for any of the two day events and the public is cordially invited."

The Registered Quarter Horse Show is a top attraction for Texas top breeders. The American Quarter Horse Association approved show will be judged by H.S. Miller, Bobby Curry, chairman and Fay Oglesby is secretary. Horses can be entered in 29 different classes. Trophies and ribbons plus cash money will be awarded to winners.

The Appaloosa Horse Show parallels the schedule of the Quarter Horse Show with 29 classes to be judged. The show is approved by both the Central Texas Appaloosa Horse Club and the Texas Appaloosa Club. Gene Chitwood will chair the show with Fay Oglesby as secretary and H.S. Miller as judge.

Trophies and ribbons will be awarded to winners along with cash prizes.

## Census Takers Now Making Door To Door Canvass

The Decade Census for 1970 began Wednesday morning in Coryell County and all over the nation. In Coryell, 18 enumerators began a canvass and collection of census questionnaires after a two day training session in the National Bank Civic Room.

Robert Ford, manager of the temporary census bureau in Waco, says it will probably take from three to five weeks for the census takers to get around to all households in the area, and urges residents to keep the form in a safe place until the enumerator calls.

The district manager also asks that the forms be completed before the census takers visit.

At the majority of residences the census worker will simply ask for the questionnaire, check it for completeness, and be on his or her way.

At every fifth household, however, the enumerator will seek answer to additional questions. Enumerators will be wearing a red, white, and blue identification card which bears the seal of the U.S. Department

of Commerce and the words, "census Enumerator, Official Credential."

Ford said it is possible some households did not receive a questionnaire but they need not fear they will be missed because a census taker will find them and furnish a form.

The enumerators have no set hours to work. So to collect a form from a residence where no one is at home during the day, the enumerator at that house before or after regular working hours.

Once the census takers have picked up all the questionnaires they will again be checked for completeness. If incomplete, the enumerator will go back into the field to obtain the missing information.

When all forms are complete and correct, they will be sent to Jeffersonville, Ind., where their information will be transferred to computer tape.

The individual identity of the forms vanish at Jeffersonville. The computers read only the black dots and convert that information into statistical tables.

Preliminary results of the census will be announced sometime in May.

Sheriff Cummings reports that investigation is still underway. He indicates "We have had complaints from several areas of town about disturbance calls." The best procedure to follow if such a disturbance occurs at a persons home is call the sheriff's office noted Cummings.

Cummings explained that normally these disturbances are pranks by young kids. Asked if he thought this case involved kids Cummings said, "I have my doubts."

City Police Chief, Gene Goins had no information to report on the incident other than investigation was continuing.

### Mosheim People To Decide School

The Bosque County School Board voted to recede their action to Annex the Mosheim School District to the Valley Mills School District in a meeting in Mosheim Tuesday night. The Board's action satisfies a suit which is still pending in 52nd District Court concerning a closed meeting of the Bosque County Board held earlier this year.

The Board indicated that it would probably leave the matter up to the Mosheim area people. Indications are that a petition for an election to decide the annexation questions will be circulated.

At the meeting other alternatives were discussed including division of the Mosheim district between the surrounding districts. This suggestion is not presently given any support by the Bosque County School Board.

Mrs. Joe Lyn Jackson will manage the Gatesville Municipal pool this year in the new \$65,000 facility at the corner of 8th and Bridge Street in the north corner of Raby Park. Mrs. Jackson has been in

Swimming Programs as a student and an instructor for several years. Action was taken by the City Council to hire Mrs. Jackson at the Tuesday March 31 meeting.

The Council also set new admission rates at the pool for the coming year. City Manager, Skipper Wallace indicated that no season tickets will be issued this year. Admission for children 12 years and under is 25¢ with ages 13 through 18 charge d 50¢ and 19 years and older paying \$1.00.

Bathhouse contracts were let recently but work has been delayed due to wet weather.

Tuesday the Council let a contract for paving the parking area and a part of 8th street in Raby Park in front of the pool to Cleo Woodard Construction for \$5,049.

The Council also approved the extension of the sewer lines construction 2565 feet along Hwy. 84 and tunnel under the four lane highway to the construction site of the new National Guard Armory.

Wallace estimated the cost of the sewer extension at between \$7,000 and \$8,000. A 750 foot extension of the line already completed to service the new site of the First United Methodist Church. Wallace expects work could be completed on the National Guard line within two weeks.

The Council bought a floor polisher for city hall at a

\$374.69 and a vacuum cleaner costing \$232.65 for the new library from Williams Chemical Co. and Janitorial Supplies.

The new library building is complete according to Wallace and awaiting furnishings before the library is opened in May.

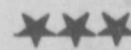

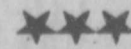
Joe is currently serving in the armed forces at Chu Lai, Vietnam. Mrs. Burt is the former Miss Connie Crouch and is a native Okie.

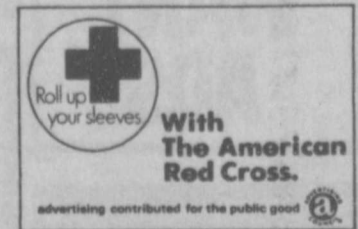

Avoidance of cigarettes and the wearing of light, protective clothing when exposed to the sun for long periods can actually prevent cancer, of the lung and skin respectively.

What is at the heart of the matter is obviously not so much a "communication gap" as an "action gap". The Society's messages of sense and safety are reaching millions...but all too many of us aren't really listening.

The American Cancer Society needs your support to do its job: a job it is doing magnificently well--on its part.

But the other half of the job is ours: to act on the knowledge given us. No one else can force us to. Saving our lives begins with us.

TB TEST REINSTATED—Tuberculosis tests have been reinstated at all border ports of entry for cattle imported from Mexico, reports the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Action was taken under terms of a Travis County district court order enjoining the commission from permitting entry into Texas of cattle from Mexico in violation of health regulations, Associated Milk Producers of Texas filed suit.

Early this year the Health Commission put TB testing requirements into effect on the border but suspended them two weeks later at the request of Governor Smith pending a hearing in El Paso on objections to the order. Commission decided to exempt steers and sprayed heifers after the hearing. Issue will be aired at an April 6 agency meeting here.

REGISTRATION LEADERS NAMED—Loving and Roberts counties registered the highest percentages of voters in the small-county category. Loving county scored 258.3 percent and Roberts county 232.4 percent. Quotas were fixed by the State Democratic Executive Committee. Throckmorton County came in third in the same class.

Next group, population wise, was led by Rains County, followed closely by Stonewall, Shackelford, Bandera, Zapata, Menard, Dickens, Mills, Coke, and Jim Hogg.

**COURTS SPEAK**—Supreme Court held that witnesses cannot be forced to present certain types of records when they are sought only to challenge their own testimony.

High Court overruled the effort of the City of Orange to direct the Beaumont Court of Civil Appeals to make specific findings in an annexation dispute between Orange and Port Neches.

After appeal to the State Supreme Court a Houston shipyard welder won his case for workmen's compensation disability insurance on the basis of his claim that he was poisoned by fumes in a job accident.

Fred Williams of Houston, candidate for land commissioner, has asked the Supreme Court to force land commissioner Jerry Sadler to make public a list of 43,000 voters who have state veteran land loans.

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin, through the AG's anti-trust and consumer division, got a district court injunction against Empire Sewing Machine Distributors of Ft. Worth ordering it to stop deceptive trade practices.

### Hornets Second At Jacket Relays

A second place tie at the Jacket Relays in Stephenville Saturday March 28 is proof of an improved Hornet Relay team. The team has undergone some adjustments since the beginning of the season.

The big changes came last week when Hornet coaches changed their dash men to gain points in events considered weak in earlier relays.

At Stephenville the change of Larry Moore from the 100 yard dash to the 440 yard dash was a complete success as Moore won the "open 440 with a 53.2 second time in a 30 mile per hour north wind."

Moore played an important role in the mile and 440 yard relay events which finished in fourth and third respectively. With a fifth place finish in the Broad Jump, Moore tied for Hornet individual high point with Gary Kafer at 17 points.

Kafer set a new meet and GHS record as he continues to improve his already superlative high jump form. Under less than ideal conditions he cleared 6' 7 1/4" Kafer ran a 15.5 second 120 yard High Hurdle event to take third place.

He collected one point for a sixth place finish in the 330 yard intermediate hurdles.

Taylor took off the Championship at the Jacket Relays with 84 points while Gatesville and Azle shared second place with 69 points each. Other teams in the Hornet division were Lampasas, Granbury, Stephenville, Weatherford, Breckenridge, Eastland, Cisco, and Hamilton.

Coach Christopher noted that Azle offset much of the Hornet strength.

The Hornets were also minus speedy Ray Ortega at Stephenville. Ortega is a key factor in the 100 yard dash and the sprint relay.

In the 220 yard dash Coach Christopher ran Don Rogers as part of the shuffle for points. Rogers collected six points for his third place finish in a time of 23.9 seconds.

William Ayers has been consistent for the Hornets in the one mile run. At the Jacket Relays he took second place with a 5:01.5 time which Coach Christopher considers good under the wind conditions.

Hornet pole vaulters are still looking good with both Steve Palmer and Steve Braziel placing with jumps of 11 feet. Palmer was third and Braziel fourth on fewer misses.

The Hornet Relay teams are improving as the season progresses. At Stephenville Don Rogers, Larry Moore, Billy Hord, and James McCarley picked up a third place. The mile relay of Don Rogers, Billy Hord, Ricky Thompson and Larry Moore picked up a fourth place.

The Hornets move into their final pre-district test in Marlin Saturday with most of the 13AAA District hopefuls on the same proving grounds.

The teams to bet at Marlin seem to be the host team, Taylor, Belton, Gatesville and Lockhart.

O. Back to track Coach Christopher said this week "I think we have the right Sprint Relay combination now in Don Rogers, Larry Moore, Billy Hord, and Ray Ortega." Rogers will come out of the blocks good then hand the baton to Moore and about 9.5 seconds later Hord will have the baton. Not much over 10 seconds later Ortega will be blazing down to the white string and a total time hopefully around 42.5.
