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## COUNTY MUNICIPAL AND SCHOOL BOARD ELECTIONS DECIDED

Coryell County municipal and school board elections followed a set pattern of large turnouts for contested and small turnouts for uncontested races although some excitement occurred as write-ins were recorded.

The largest voter turnout was in Copperas Cove where 742 cast votes in city council elections and 639 cast votes in school board races.

In Cove voters elected two incumbents and one new alderman to the city council. Ed Schorn led the balloting with 473 votes followed by Joe Kunkel Jr. with 398 votes and Louis Dewald with 390 votes.

Dewald is the newcomer to the council.

Cove School Board selections were long time board member, Lovett Ledger with over 400 votes, and Mrs. Sandra Lambert with 400 votes.

In Gatesville the City election drew a very light turnout as only 68 votes were cast during the Tuesday election. Voters excepted the unopposed councilmen with Mayor Bob Miller winning reelection with 64 votes. There were two write in votes for A.L. Miles for Mayor.

The council seats went to announced candidates with Hazen Ament receiving 66 votes, Dave McCallister 66 votes, and Francis Ward 66. Don Powers received one write in vote for a council seat.

Gatesville School Trustee voting held Saturday was also light with less than 100 votes cast. Ray Byrom lead the balloting with 70 votes followed by James R. Powell with 54 votes. Both men were seeking re-election. An unorganized write-in vote for Bobby L. Cummings totaled 30 votes. Only two board positions were up for election this year.

Evant School Board election held Saturday attracted 137 voters to the polls and elected two newcomers to the board. Charles Faubion lead in the balloting with 76 votes followed closely by Mrs. Billy Cates with 74 votes. Failing in their bid for re-election were Alfred Brazier with 52 votes and Owen Lee with 44 votes.

Write-ins were active in Evant with Joe Kreid receiving 18 votes, Wayne Parrish 3 votes and Carl Grubb, 2 votes. Two ballots were mutilated and three voters cast votes for only one person at Evant.

School Superintendent, L.L. Pruden, noted that the election was the largest on record in

recent years and possibly the largest ever for the school district.

The Evant School Board reorganized Monday night with Ralph Perryman, president, Bertis Ballard, vice president, Mrs. Billy Cates, secretary, and Bill Smith, Charles Faubion, Lee Carroll and J.C. Lingie Jr. as board members.

At Oglesby voters excepted the city council candidates, Walter Witte, Edward Ray and Kenneth Goodwin for two year terms.

The Oglesby School Board candidates were unopposed and all three were re-elected. Savoy Lawrence, Irwin Jackson, and Alton Dalton all received 26 votes.

At Jonesboro voters re-elected Taylor Young and Hershel Wilhelm to the school board. Mound voters re-elected Sterlin Bernard by write in votes to the Mound School Board.

H.R. Hesse, at large candidate; Fred Homan of Oglesby (Precinct 3) and A.A. Watson of Jonesboro (Precinct 4) were all re-elected to the Coryell County School Board for two year terms.

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## Fire Destroys Workshop

Fire completely destroyed a work shop behind the Jack Baker home just south of Gatesville on Straws Mill Road Tuesday afternoon.

The blaze was reported at 6:30 p.m. while the Gatesville Volunteer Fire Department was holding their regular weekly meeting. Fire Chief Pat Peterson noted that one unit was near the rodeo arena in the southern part of town when the alarm was sounded.

A strong south wind whipped flames toward the Baker home before firemen arrived and several minor explosions were touched off by the flames.

Firemen with the first unit on the scene poured water on the roof of the Baker home as shingles on the roof had already begun to curl up from the heat. The second unit arrived and began cooling the flames from the workshop which at times had leaped toward the

## MOSHEIM TO HOLD ELECTION DECIDE SCHOOL DISTRICT FATE

A petition calling for an election signed by 48 residents of the Mosheim County line School District has been turned over to the County Judges of Bosque, Coryell and McLennan Counties this week.

The petition calls for an election to decide on the question of where or not to consolidate the Mosheim District with the Valley Mills School District.

Judge Norman Storm indicated Wednesday that the three county judges had already held preliminary discussion to set an election date. Storm said, "No date has been set as yet but we have tentatively set May

9 for the election."

The election was called following the Bosque County School Boards retraction of its decision to place the Mosheim District in the Valley Mills School District.

Opposition from landowners in Coryell County and Clifton School Board representatives was noted in recent weeks as the landowners filed a law suit asking the Bosque Board's decision to be set aside.

The election will allow Mosheim School District voters to decide the fate of the district with regard to the Valley Mills School District.

A weekend youth led revival will open April 17, at the King Baptist Church and continue through April 19.

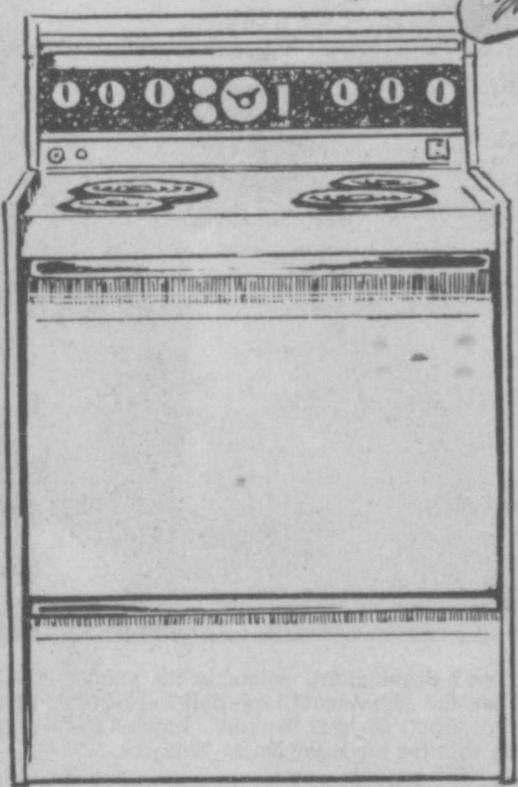
Evangelist Jim Selman, a religious education major at Baylor University in Waco, will speak at each service.

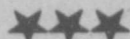

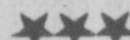

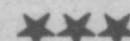

Coryell County Census Chairman Mrs. Homer L. Davis urges each resident to keep their census forms in a safe place until the enumerator picks up the blanks.

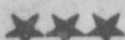

## Art Is Life Of Local Art Class Teacher

"Art-dis is my life." Yes, art is the life of Mrs. Marie Brock-Jones of Killeen, as she stated (with a definite Austrian accent) in an interview Tuesday.

Mrs. Brock-Jones, an artist who's speciality is mural painting, is currently teaching a class of 12 local artists each Tuesday afternoon in Gatesville. Art is indeed a great part of the life of the native Austrian, born in Steyr, Austria, Mrs. Brock-Jones studied art for six years in high school. Painting continued to dominate her life after she completed her high school studies. The promising young artist enrolled in private lessons with artists in Vienna, Austria and later under Robert Bloom in Germany.

Art is and will always be very dear to Mrs. Brock-Jones. Art opens your eyes. You see things you never saw before. You can learn the history, clothes, and habits of a people through their art, she said.

Mrs. Brock-Jones came with her family to the United States in 1947 to Fort Bragg, North Carolina. She continued her study of the art media by working with two Minnesota artist McCraig and Taube.

The family moved to Germany in 1955 and returned to America in 1957, settling down in Killeen. An accomplished artist, the Killeenite paints portraits, still lifes, landscapes and comic scenes in addition to her speciality-murals. "A mural" she said, "is a thrilling medium to paint in because it will remain where you paint it as long as the wall stands. A mural portrays a building and its history. It tells the observer something closely connected with the architecture and use of the building.

"A mural brings people closer together. You don't have to be able to read, write, or speak the language to know what the artist is trying to say. Time disappears, but the feeling of that time and its people remain—in the mural." Her murals can be found in Germany, Austria, Killeen and Copperas Cove.

She has received awards for many of her works in Temple, Austin, Killeen and one award in Washington. After being a student under artists from Vienna to the U.S. for most of her life, Mrs. Brock-Jones began as an instructor of art five years ago in Killeen.

The artist's students in Gatesville and in Killeen range from beginning to advanced artists. Her local class began in early November and will proceed indefinitely as the students advance. Her most advanced artists receive private lessons.

The painter uses only the three primary colors blue, yellow, and red, with black and white in her work. Any color can be made from those colors she said.

Chris Bone picked up a sixth place in the discus and is a top contender for the second spot in the district meet behind David Barteck of Belton.

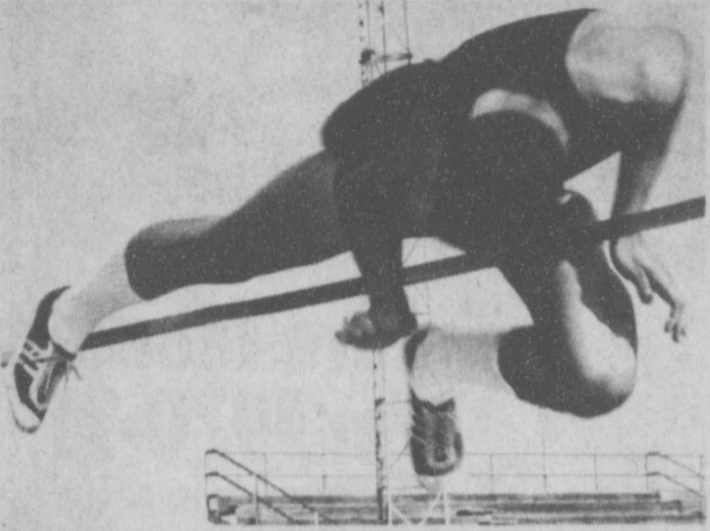
Steve Palmer matched his all time best in the Pole Vault with

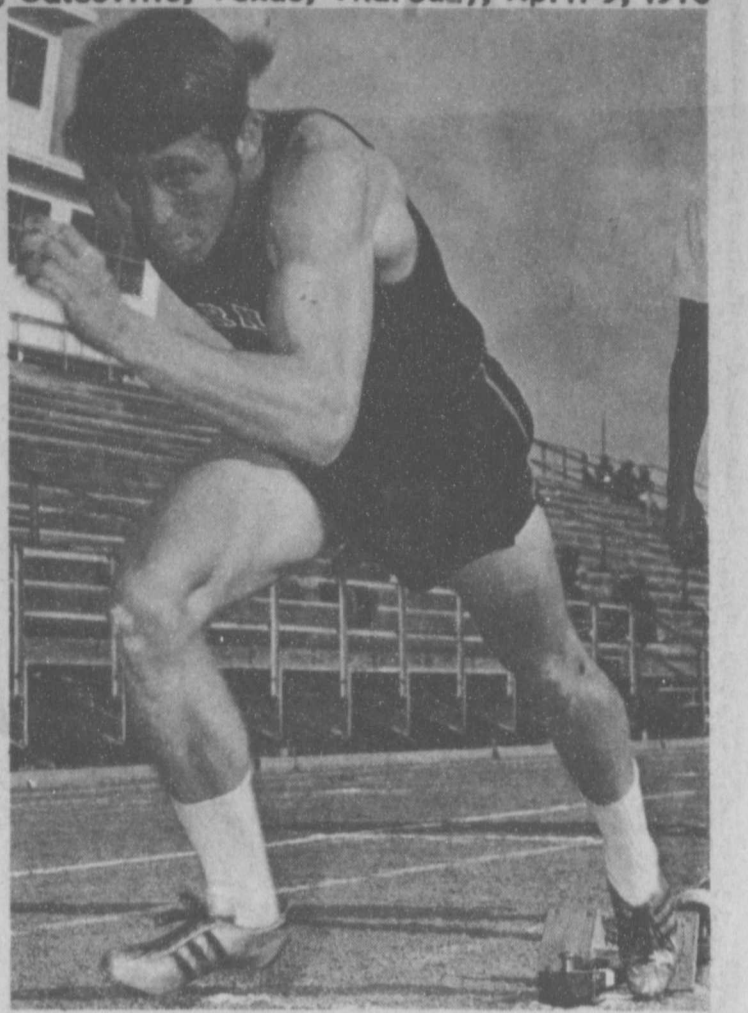
The Hornets were close to scoring points in several events including a seventh place for the sprint relay team, Larry Moore in the 440 yard dash, Don Rogers in the 220 yard
