Spanish is being offered to students at the rural campus for the first time in five years. S. M. Mayhew will instruct the foreign language class.

"We hit. That is all I can say," was Head Coach Jack Moss' first comment about the Hornet scrimmage with La Vega last Friday night. The Hornets out-scored La Vega two scores to one during the scrimmage but Moss, after reviewing films of the contest, seemed dissatisfied with the team's execution of fundamentals.

Coach Moss noted some confusion developed in the Hornet ranks as the Pirates did some things that had not been expected. Normally teams volunteer scouting information at these interschool scrimmages.

At times the Hornets were unable to pick up assignments against the odd man line causing mistakes.

During the Pirate scrimmage Chris Bone and Jim Saunders both were held out due to injuries. In talking with Moss late Tuesday, he indicated that both boys would be held out of the Cameron scrimmage also.

In the absence of Saunders, senior starting quarterback, Moss worked out Ricky Thompson at quarterback, along with Steve Braziel. Thompson engineered a touchdown drive for the Hornets using almost all of his runningbacks to pick up valuable yards. Thompson scored on a quarterback keeper play to cap the Hornet drive.

Thompson also scored the other touchdown on a 30 yard pass from Steve Braziel while operating at his flanker post.

Thompson's versatility is a pleasant surprise for the Hornets and adds depth to the signal calling spot. Moss says "He can do just about anything you ask him to do." Saunders is suffering from a shoulder pull and doctors said Tuesday that he can be

back in action for the McGregor opener.

In relief at quarterback, Steve Braziel did an outstanding job of passing, noted Moss, despite some unsatisfactory pass blocking at times. The bright spot for the Hornets this week was top

notch pass defense. Moss said the only mistake was the first La Vega offensive play when the Pirates broke a pass for their only score.

The anti-air defense included Mike Williams, Steve Braziel, Larry Moore, Billy Hord, James McCarley, Wil-

liam Ayres and Jim Smith. Returning to his original comment, Moss noted "We hit so I am still pleased with these kids." Trey Tatum was a standout blocker in the line.

Pass blocking standout for the evening was Ronald Brown who was playing on a slight ankle injury and not at full speed.

The defense held together, noted Moss, but it was individual effort and not good execution that made the defense effective. He explained that on many plays the defense held up but the player with primary responsibility would not be in on the play. "Gang tackling" was a big part of our defense, noted Moss. Several times the black jerseys blotted out the Pirate offense.

Playing against the combined La Vega-Carver schools the Hornets were outsize in many respects, but the scoreboard still gave the Hornets the nod.

The Hornets will scrimmage Cameron Friday night at 7:30 in Cameron. It will be another good test for the Hornets as Cameron allowed the Belton Tigers only one score in a scrimmage last week.

Cameron is picked as a contender in their district. The Yoeman offense is in good shape and moved the ball well against the always tough Belton defense.

Friday night will give the

Hornet coaches a comparative look at their district chances since Cameron will have been a common foe for the top district contender.

Cameron will also be a mirror to the tough McGregor defense since both schools use similar defense. The season opener is just over one week away, September 11, and the Hornets will have to be in top shape to handle the Bulldogs.

for the year. Medart is expected to have \$11,000 in 1971 for purchase of new equipment.

Precinct #2 with Cloyce Duncan as Commissioner will have a cash balance of \$16,531 making \$84,731 in total revenue. Duncan will have \$10,307 in time warrants and interest to pay during 1971 and Precinct #2 is expected to have \$14,000 available for equipment purchases.

Precinct #3 with Roland Wright as Commissioner will have a cash balance of \$6,873 as of January 1, 1971 making \$75,073 in total revenue. Wright will have \$8,088 in time warrants and interest to pay during 1971 and Precinct #3 will have approximately \$14,000 available for capital expenditures.

Precinct #4 with George Jageler as Commissioner will have a cash balance of \$23,324 to add to the new funds totaling \$91,724 in revenue. Jageler will have \$7,721 in time warrants and interest due and it is expected that Precinct #4 will have \$24,500 for possible capital expenditures.

The all important General Fund is expected to have expenditures of \$268,646 in 1971. The General Fund is the source of funds for most county offices and operations other than the road and bridge fund.

Reports Of Chinch Bugs Infesting Grass

Several reports of Chinch Bugs infesting St. Augustine grass have been received in Coryell County said Don Calahan, County Agriculture Agent.

The adult is 1/6 to 1/5 inches long, has a black body, reddish yellow legs and fully developed wings. Each front wing is mostly white, but is marked with an irregular black patch at the middle of the outer margin.

Chinch bugs such the plant juices which results in yellowish or brown patches occurring in the lawn. Injured areas frequently are first noted along edges of the lawn. As the insects continue to infest the brown patches enlarge as the bugs begin to work outward.

In most cases, when Chinch bugs are present in sufficient numbers to cause yellow or brown patches to appear in the lawn, they may be found by parting the grass in the damaged areas and making close observation.

If Chinch bugs cannot be found by this method, their presence may be detected by using a metal can such as a three pound shortening can, a large coffee can with both ends cut out. Force one end of the metal can about 3 inches into the ground in the yellow portion of the grass or at the margin of the damaged area. Insert the can in the grass, fill with water and if chinch bugs are present, they will float to the surface within about five minutes waiting period.

Control of the Chinch bug

can be handled in a number of ways, said Calahan. If it has become dry, irrigate the lawn by running the sprinklers about an hour. This aids in the spread and penetration of the spray into thick turf mats. It is not necessary to have the turf moist before granular insecticides are applied.

Granulate that can be applied are Trithion, Diazinon and Ethion. These also can be applied as a spray.

Granular materials are preferred for homeowners use. Cydone-type lawn fertilizer applicators work well in applying granular insecticides. Water lawn thoroughly following granular applications. Sprays are effective but require more time and effort. Use 15-25 gallons of spray mixture per 1,000 sq. feet of yard.
