HAVING SUPPORTED and urged editorially for the widening of U.S. Highway 60 through Parmer County for almost 30 years, it has been highly gratifying to this writer to see the actual work on this project underway.

A number of times ye editor has told our friend Rhea Bradley, resident engineer for the Texas Department of Highways and Transportation that "I hope to live long enough to see this project completed," since it is one we have pushed for so long a time.

Whether or not we live to see it completed, Praise the Lord: we have at least seen it begun, and the work is well underway.

The first stage of the project is widening the highway from two lanes to four lanes from the Deaf Smith County line into Friona, and the work is currently underway to construct the two new lanes on this portion of the road.

After these two new lanes are completed, the old existing highway will be torn up, and a new roadway will be built in its place.

Highway officials say they expect to be able to open up the two new lanes to traffic by the late summer. After that, the work on reconstructing the old two lanes from Friona to Summerfield will begin.

Meanwhile, Bradley tells us that plans for the second stage of the road improvement, from Friona to Bovina, have been completed and have been submitted to the TDHT state office in Austin for approval.

District Engineer Mel Pope of Lubbock says that funds are in place for this second stage of the project, and the TDHT hopes to award the contract for this "middle section" of the road in December of this year.

All of the right of way needed for the project between Friona and Bovina has been secured, with some utility adjustments yet to be made.

Hopefully, construction on this second stage of the roadway can get underway early in 1992. The highway department anticipates about a year to build each new segment of roadway (a year to build the new lanes, Friona to Bovina, then another year to reconstruct the old roadway).

The only question mark, in terms of dates, concerning the project, is the third stage, which is the Bovina to Farwell segment of the road.

Funds for this stage of the project are not in place, since it could be 1993-94, at the earliest, before it will come up. Funding may depend in part on how the budget-writing, currently underway in the state legislature, comes out.

We would take this opportunity to encourage the TDHT to actively seek funding for the third stage of this project.

According to our unofficial count, there have been three fatalities from wrecks on Highway 60 between Friona and Summerfield in the past six months. The Amarillo DPS office reports five fatalities in Parmer County for the calendar year 1990. These fatalities most probably could have been avoided if the highway had been a four-lane facility.

As the local residents realize, this highway undoubtedly has the highest percentage of truck traffic, per capita, for any road in the country, and its completion will be just cause for celebration.

Hospital Becomes "Smoke-Free"

Effective April 15, 1991, the Parmer County Community Hospital has become a smoke-free hospital. This policy, approved by the Parmer County Community Hospital board of directors, prohibits smoking in all areas of the hospital and applies to employees as well as visitors and patients.

In an attempt to inform the public of the new policy, "No Smoking" signs will be prominently displayed throughout the facility and all ashtrays will be removed from the hospital.

Healthcare institutions should lead the way in the implementation of policies that create safer and healthier work environments.

Protecting employees, patients and the visiting public from involuntary exposure to secondhand tobacco smoke was the impetus for the new policy.

While the health effects associated with mainstream smoking have long been recognized as the leading cause of preventable death and disability in the world, the deleterious effects of environmental exposure to tobacco smoke to non-smokers has only recently been documented in medical literature.

Parmer County Community Hospital now joins the ranks of a growing number of hospitals now proclaiming a smoke free environment.

Breast Screening Clinic Is Slated

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Cancer Council for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self-examination every month.
2. Have a physical examination every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age.

Age: 35-40--one baseline mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; over 50, yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Friona on Wednesday, May 29, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at Parmer County Community Hospital. Exams are done by appointment only. For information about the clinic or to

ON HOSPITAL DISTRICT

Public Meeting Is Well Attended Here

The first of two informational meetings pertaining to the election in which voters will be asked to vote for or against a Parmer County Hospital District was well-attended Tuesday night in Friona, when about 300 people turned out.

Members of the board of directors of Parmer County Community Hospital made statements and answered questions, along with hospital manager Phil Langston, pertaining to how the proposed hospital district would work.

Following are some of the questions asked, and how they were answered:

Q--You're not at the present time doing operations or delivering babies. Do you plan to re-instate these if the hospital district is approved?

A--No, this is not in the present plans. We would have to have a surgeon, plus invest in extra equipment and costs.

Q--Why hire an outside administrator, from Oklahoma, at a cost of \$8,000 per month?

A--We consulted for some time with High Plains Baptist Hospital, and they showed us where we could get some help. Preferred Management Corp. pays fringe benefits, and provides much expertise. We feel we're getting our money's worth. We're getting a lot of side benefits. It would cost us

\$75,000 to \$90,000 a year for strictly an administrator.

Q--What problems will we be facing if we approve a hospital district?

A--A hospital district does not necessarily guarantee the survival of PCCH, but it will give it a CHANCE. It's up to the local people, if they are concerned enough to want to keep their hospital. We hope to be able to expand, and to continue to offer quality health-care service.

Q--How much would a 25¢ per \$100 valuation raise?

A--The maximum would be \$511,000 per year.

Q--What is the situation with the pharmacy?

A--We hire a proprietary firm to run the pharmacy. They provide the pharmacist. We still own the pharmacy and the inventory. The firm gives us the qualified help. Our revenue from the pharmacy might be down \$60,000 this year, but our net profit could be up \$12,000, and this is important.

Q--Do you think it will be right for a tax-supported hospital pharmacy to compete with a privately owned pharmacy downtown?

A--no response.

Q--Isn't \$500,000 a year a lot of money to spend to keep the hospital open?

A--Our annual budget is around \$1.3 million. We have a list of equipment and improvements we need to make, at an estimated cost of \$763,000, and after this is done, the amount we need from taxes should not be as much.

Q--Isn't there any alternative to the hospital district and the extra taxes?

A--We thought long and hard about this. It wasn't an overnight decision. We did the survey about six months ago, which led us in this direction. We didn't feel we could ask for donations, because donations tend to be a one-time deal, and we need on-going financial assistance.

Q--Are we trying to compete with Amarillo hospitals?

A--No, but we need to be able to pay our employees adequate salaries, and upgrade our facility. We have a group of dedicated Auxiliary members, but we can't expect them to do it all. We're talking about basic support to bring our facility from the 1960s to the 1990s.

Q--What would happen to the taxes if we passed the hospital district and the hospital still didn't make it?

A--If there were no hospital, there'd be no board and no taxes.

Q--Is indigent care an unlimited liability?

A--Legally, the sky's the limit, but in practicality, what we end up with isn't that bad. In 1990 we marked off about \$28,000 to indigent care, and about \$19,400 the year before.

Q--Rather than just have a few people in the hospital, wouldn't you be better off with several indigents?

A--No, we'd be better off with the few paying patients. Most of our revenue comes from outpatients rather than inpatients. Inpatient stays tend to be shorter than previously. We need to generate more outpatient services.

We opened a physical therapy department with the help of Excel last year, and this has been a big benefit to the hospital.

Q--Why can't we use the sales tax rather than the hospital district?

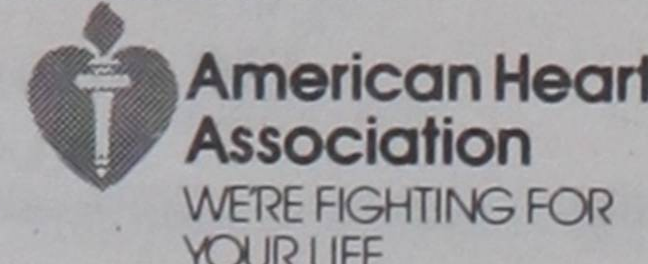
A--That was the thoughts of most of the people completing the survey, but we discovered that in light of the fact that our hospital district would not follow the county boundaries, we could not collect such a tax until at least 1993. Also, the sales tax would not produce nearly as much as the hospital district taxes.

Q--Why not just charge the patients who use the facility more money for the services rather than taxing everyone through the hospital district?

A--You can't gouge the people who use the facility. There is still some "shopping around" as to which hospital people will use. It just doesn't work to raise what you need through increased prices.

Longtime civic leader A.L. Black made some comments toward the end of the meeting. He said in part: "When we recruited M.B.P. (now Excel) to come to Friona, one of the things they asked us was 'Will we have hospital facilities?' We promised them that they would. I don't want more taxes. No one does. But if we let the hospital fail, we're overlooking a very valuable jewel, since the hospital is a valuable small industry in itself. No board should operate a business without hiring capable management. I've found that management is always worth what you pay for it."

Karim Moshrefi, lab technician at the hospital, said in part: "You've come a long way, and have worked so hard to have the hospital. We have some dedicated people at the hospital. The doctors are very honest. We need to have some better equipment, which would bring more patients and more benefits."

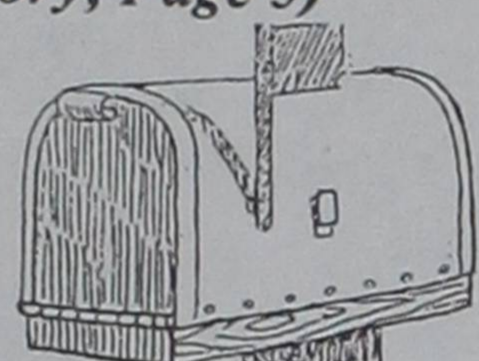

Letter To The Editor



Dear Bill,

The town meeting Tuesday night was a good exercise in freedom. We are really fortunate to be allowed to speak our minds on issues as important as a hospital district. In many parts of the world, such a meeting would be unthinkable.

I missed the opportunity to present a doctor's view point, so I would like to express a few thoughts of my own. I think that my two young colleagues generally feel the same way as I do, but I speak for myself.

Dr. Toten, Dr. Shah and I are family physicians. We do primary care. We came here to practice medicine in the context of general practice. We provide care to this area consistent with our level of training, and appropriate to a rural setting. That level of care could not be provided without the support of a hospital.

Skating Recital Scheduled

A roller skating recital is scheduled to be held at the Friona Community Center this Sunday, April 21 at 2 p.m.

Participating in the recital will be youths who attend lessons instructed by Ronna Dicus in Friona, as well as skaters from Roller World in Clovis.

The recital will include freestyle performances, group routines and demonstrations in dance, figures and speed skating. Following the recital will be refreshments and a free fun skate for all who wish to bring their own skates.

Admission to the recital is \$1.50. Children under five will be admitted free. Tickets will be sold at the door. Proceeds will go to support the skating club.

If I wanted to own or operate a hospital, I'd buy one, but then I'd not have any time left to practice medicine. The regulations governing operation of a hospital are so many and so complex that an administrator must be a manager, an accountant, a lawyer and a scientist!

The hospital can be closed down by the Health Department, the attorney general, the labor department, the OSHA agencies, the Pharmacy Board, and any number of nameless agencies. Nothing will shut the doors any faster than apathy. The Parmer County Community Hospital Board of Directors did the right thing in hiring experts in the operation of rural hospitals when they contracted with Preferred Management, which now provides contract management. You can already see a lot of improvement up here.

If we are going to continue to attract and retain good medical professionals, we simply have to provide a working environment that meets certain standards. Those standards include modern equipment in good repair, and competent trained people to operate it. The environment must also be stable, well-funded, and not operated on an annual crisis basis. The current hospital board recognizes this and has put their neck on the line by asking for a new tax.

We doctors are for the proposed district! We like our patients. We like Friona. We'll stay as long as conditions permit. Vote YES to the district.

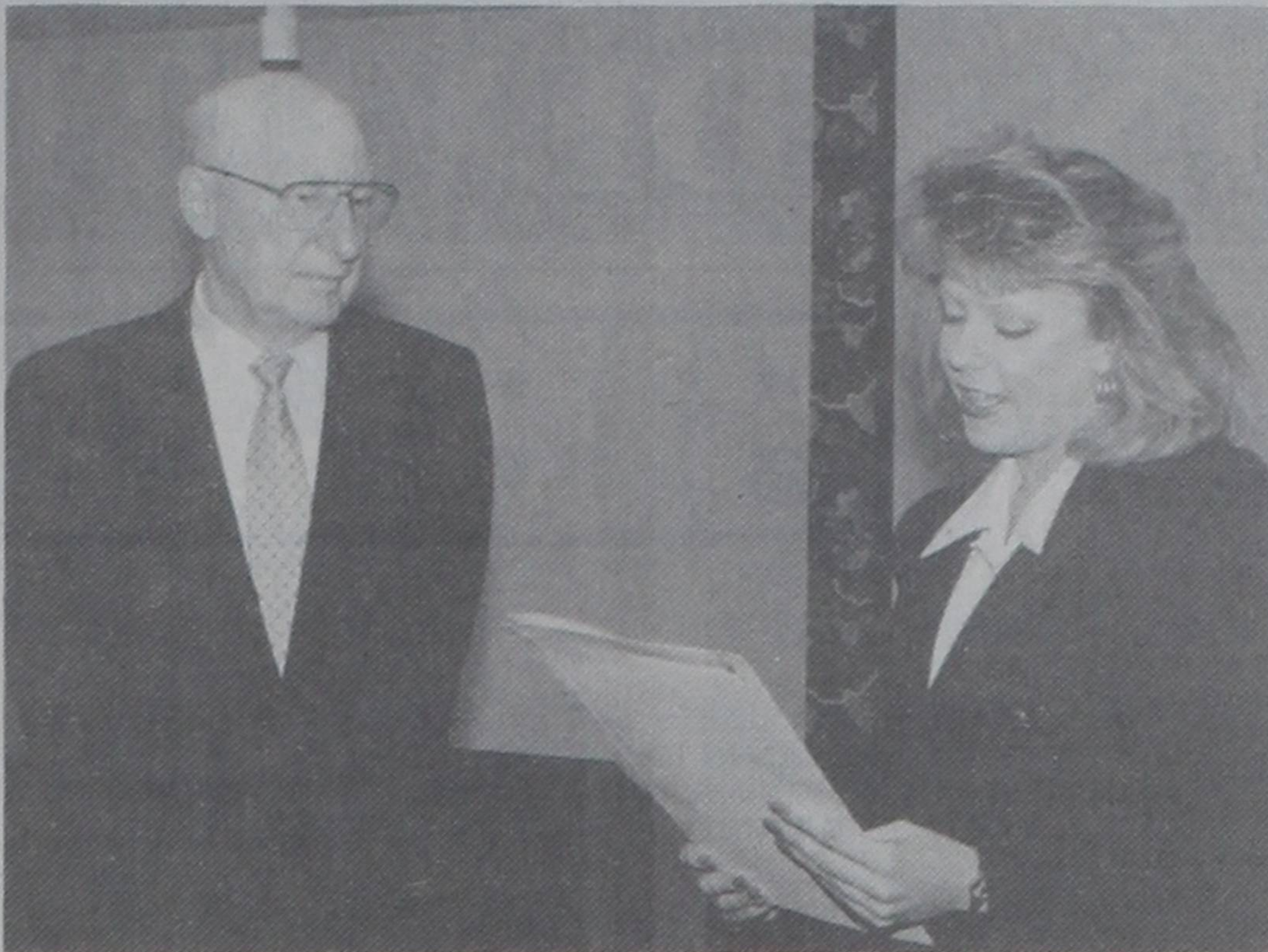
The award was presented at the annual meeting of Golden Spread Electric Cooperative, Inc. at Amarillo National Bank's Plaza/Two on April 1.

ACS Gives Tips For Food Preparation

In the battle against cancer, are your rations strong enough? The foods you eat could help lower risks for certain cancers. The American Cancer Society's Great American Food Fight Against Cancer will help you learn which foods to enlist. Contact your local American Cancer Society or call 1-800-ACS-2345.

Why is eating smart important? Recent evidence from cancer research studies suggests a relationship between what we eat and the risk of developing various types of cancer.

The ACS gives the following tips for preparing foods:

*Bake, poach, steam, oven-broil, stir-fry or roast meats, poultry and fish without using extra fat. Avoid frying, which adds extra fat and calories.

*Ask your butcher to help you select low-fat cuts of meat. Trim away all visible fat, and use 2-3 ounce portions. Cut meat into thin slices to look like more. Remove the skin from poultry.

*Use vegetable cooking sprays instead of frying in fat.

*Cook vegetables as quickly as possible and use as little liquid as you can.

*Use herbs and spices, such as onion or garlic, ginger, lemon and lime juice, and mustard, instead of fats and oil to flavor meats, fish and

poultry.

*Use the paste method for gravy and sauces. Add flour or cornstarch to cold liquid slowly and blend well. This eliminates the need for fat.

*After making a soup or stew containing meat or poultry, refrigerate until the fat congeals on the surface. Remove it before heating and serving.

*Substitute skim or non-fat milk for whole and yogurt for sour cream whenever possible. Choose desserts made with milk or yogurt instead of those made with cheese. You might find that you prefer dishes and desserts that aren't too rich.

*Use "comparison shopping" to select recipes. Pick the recipe that contains the least amount of fat. Even then, most fat in recipes can be reduced by one-third to one-half. This works well for casseroles and main dishes, as well as for muffins, quick breads and cakes.

*Try adding a little bran or wheat germ to recipes, even casseroles and main dishes.

*Experiment and have fun. Use the Great American Food Fight Against Cancer as an opportunity to liven up your meals. Add additional fruits and vegetables to recipes for extra fiber and vitamins. Try new--and healthier--combinations of foods.

Elaine will graduate this year from Friona High School. She is the daughter of Teddy and Sharon White of Friona.

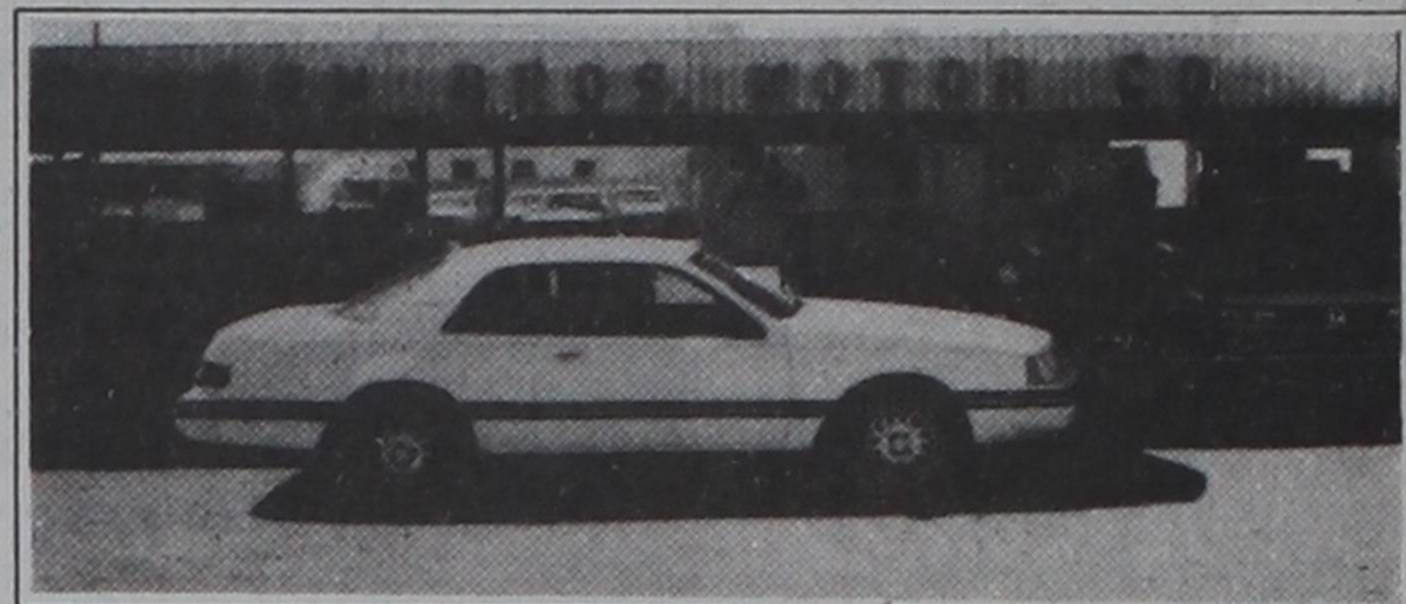

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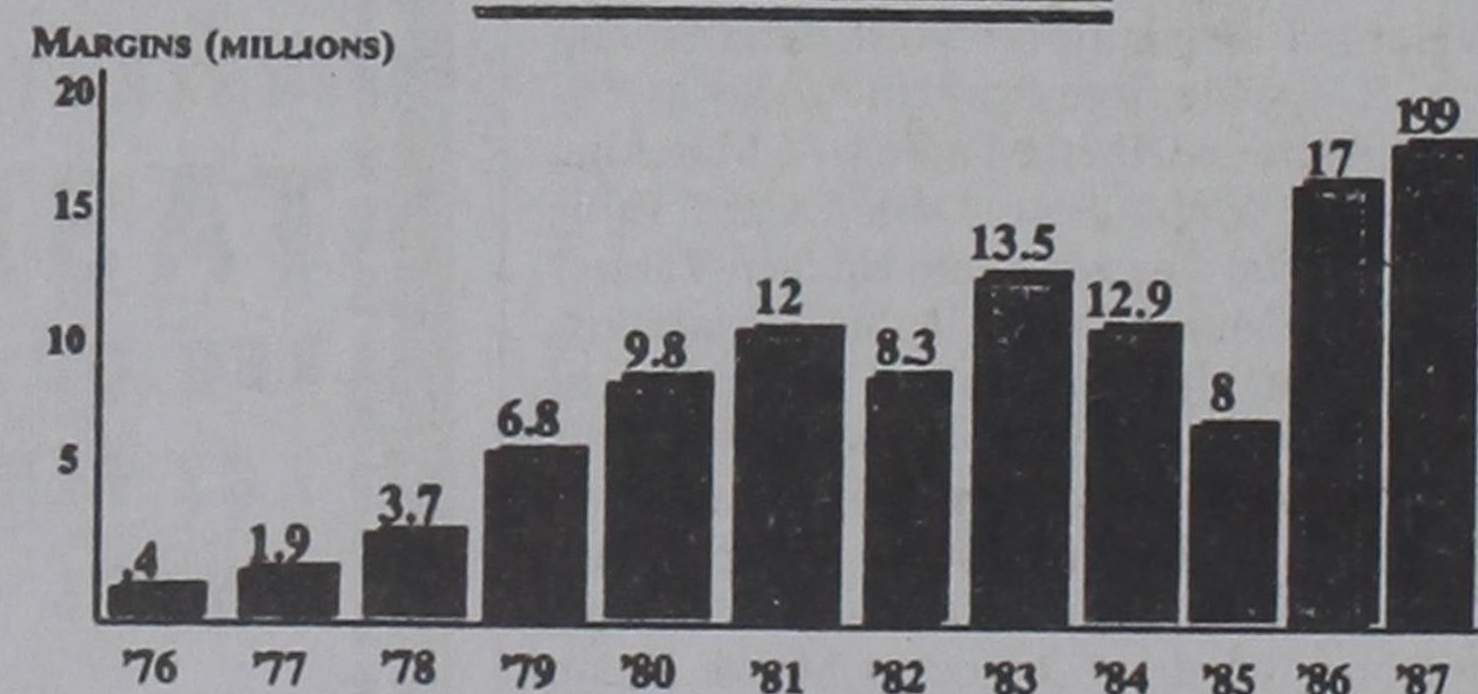

Watch For Reverse Splits

If you're a shareholder, here's something you could probably do without—a reverse split. In most cases you have been handed some bad news.

Before you panic and sell your blue-chip stocks, hear this: "There has never been a reverse split in a stock of the Dow Jones Industrial Average since the index was created in 1928."

How does a reverse split work? Suppose you own 1,000 shares of \$1 stock, the market value is \$1,000, and you have a 1 for 10 reverse split. You now own 100 shares of a \$10 stock with the same \$1,000 market value. The reverse split has (1) reduced the number of company shares outstanding and (2) raised the value of those shares to attract more investors.

Most reverse splits happen among low-priced "penny" stocks. These smaller companies often enter the corporate world with more shares outstanding than major NYSE companies. In order to achieve additional financing, they must first consolidate their swollen capitalizations by reducing the number of outstanding shares. Investors are reluctant to invest more capital in a "penny stock" with 30 million shares or more already outstanding. Management can remedy the situation with a reverse split.

For example, in June 1987 a stock that was \$1.06 a share had a 1-for-8 reverse. One thousand shares were worth \$1,060. Today you would own 100 of these \$4 shares, and the market value of

your holdings would be \$400. The shares would have to increase to \$10 a share, a whopping 250 percent, before you would break even. All this, even with the company reporting increased revenues, earnings and an improved outlook.

Some reverse splits can work to your favor, at least temporarily. Another example shows how a stock with a 1-for-2 reverse split in 1983, at \$4.13 a share, traded as high as \$12.63 in 1989. That's good. What's bad is that at this writing, it's back to \$4 a share.

Many investors sell immediately when a company announces a reverse split. That does not, of course, eliminate the possibility of future reinvestment. Once the dust settles and the price of the stock stabilizes, buy back in—if the fundamentals look good and you think the stock has a reasonable future. With the money you received from selling the shares before the reverse split, you can almost always buy more shares at the lower post-split price.

Generally, any stock split must be approved by the shareholders. With reverse splits, however, the legal structure of the corporation could authorize the board of directors to authorize the split without stockholder approval. This makes it doubly important to carefully monitor your investments if you own low-priced stocks.

Although this won't make you an expert on the subject, you should now be aware of the consequences if one of your holdings ever suffers a reverse split.

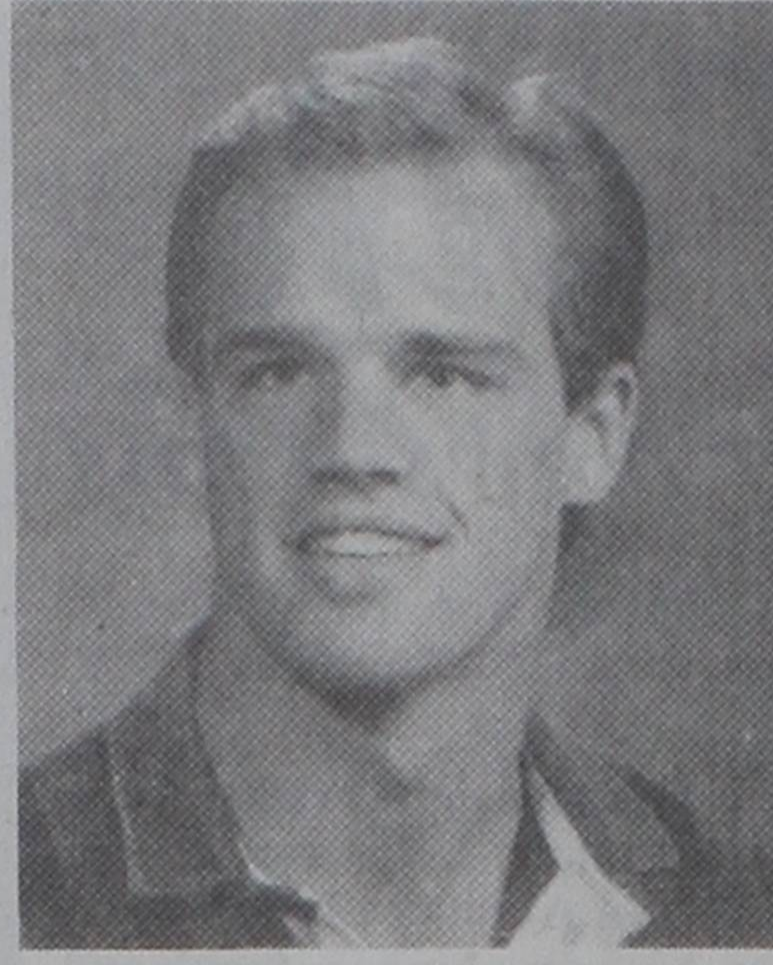
Echols Is Chosen As Counselor

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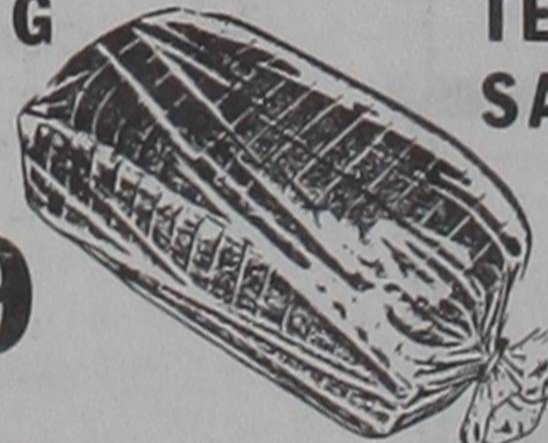
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
