Beauchamp being contested by Walter H. Brumley Jr

- if at all - until the run toward November as neither ncumbent Republican Randy Neugebauer nor Democra challenger Robert Ricketts have opponents in the primary.

For many kids, volunteering is an ideal way to celebrate the season

She wiarted a weekly cooking program called Kids Are Cookin', and even wrote a recipe book so other kids could start similar programs. "I could n't live in the midst of so much homelessness n 't live in the midst of so mas.
and not volunteer," she says.
It isn't just the holiday season that is inspiring tris generosity of spinit. From cooking to collecting donations, kids are giving their time and energy more than ever. High school volunteering is at its highest point in 50 years.

And there's evidence volunteering has a longterm impact on society: Kids who volunteer when they are young grow up to be the most a group that represents numerous charities.

WAYS TO HELP
But it is the season for giving, and Jena Sims is grateful for holiday shoppers - they help her fundraising efforts for the American Cancer Society. She sells personalized Christmas omaments for $\$ 10$ each, and last-minute shoppers help her sales. "People run out of gift ideas and [the omaments] ate something original," says Jena, 16, of Winder, Ga.
In the last five years, Jena has raised $\$ 75,000$ for cancer research through omament sales, fundraising events and a team of energized helpers. Every cent is donated to cancer researct

Jena says she won't stop until there is a cure. "I lost both my grandfathers to cancer," she says. Jena also says she visits cancer patients in the hospitals to show support. "A lot are going through treatment ... they are glad someone is coming to visit them," she says.
Getting into the hospital is a challenge since many don't allow kids or teenagers. "A lot of times you get rejected," she says. "You have to be ready to get rejected, keep going and not stop." Fear of rejection may be one reason some kids don't sign up for service. "There can be some very bad experiences," says Arthur Blaustein, a professor at the University of Califormia at Berkeley and author of "Making a Difference: America's Guide to Volunteering and Community Service" (Jossey-Bass, \$12.95).

## DO YOUR HOMEWORK

 Researching an organization can help a kid decide whether a group has the right opportunities. "It's very important to have the right match. People are disappointed if they just shuffle paper," Blaustein says.For some kids, behind-the-scenes work can be just as exciting. Cameron K. helps prepare and pack shoeboxes filled with toys, toiletries and candy for Operation Christmas Child. The group is hoping to send seven million shoeboxes to children in 95 war torn or impoverished countries.
"I think it's good for children to have these things and know somebody cares about their needs," Cameron says. "I think it shows kids can help."
Kids can help others, and Blaustein says volunteering sven helps the volunteers. "It makes you feel really good about yourself," he says. "It's a very positive experience. It's good for the kid, it's good for the people who they are serving."

 The new Georgia Aquarium's cruise ship-shaped tanks hold 8 million gallons of water.
New aquarium is home to more than 100,000 fish

Ralph and Norton can grow to be 40 feet long and live in a tank as large as a football field. What are they? They're the only two whale sharks display at a North American aquarium. , mamemime TdNE aquarium, the new Georgia
Aquarium in Atlanta. The aquarium's cruise shipshaped tanks hold 8 million gallons of water and will be home to about 100,000 fish! The aquarium opened to the public in November.


AN AWESOME AQUATIC ABODE The aquarium was designed to look like a giant ship breaking through the waves. It has 60 different aquatic habitats and five galleries, each with a unique theme. About 2.4 million visitors are expected each year. They can gaze through the aquarium's curved acrylic windows or touch a rough starfish or slippery stingray at interactive stations and touch tanks.
"We want to be the world's most engaging aquarium," said Jeff Swanagan, the aquarium's executive director

WORLD'S LARGEST FISH Ralph and Norton arrived in June from Taiwan. At that time, they were 15 feet long and 13 feet long, but they could grow to more than 40 feet! Whale sharks are the world's largest fish. Three full-time veterinarians will be on hand to make sure Ralph, Norton and all the aquarium's sea life is healthy. Students from the University of Georgia will help run the aquarium and conduct research at the onsite animal hospital.

A GENEROUS GIFT
The aquarium was paid for almost completely by a $\$ 200$ million gift from Bernie Marcus, cofounder of The Home Depot Inc., and his wife, Billi. "It's going to be the most unique aquarium in the world," said Marcus, 76. Marcus said the aquarium is a "thank you" note to the city of Atlanta and state of Georgia, where the Home Depot first opened for business.
