to "idealism" to "idealism," an "approach which
held that countries held that countries
were united in an were united in an
 of interest - a view shattered by the outbreak of World War II." But there's more: "Rather than study the world a it might be, Realists maintained
that a science of international itics must study the world as it was - an insistence that resulted in the Realists' self-acclaimed appellation."
"realists" might accuse Presiden Bush of idealism for believing in the potential contagiousness of democracy. Indeed, it might be
wishful thinking to believe a wishful thinking to believe a
democratic Iraq would lead to democratic Iraq would lead to
democratization of the Middle East, especially given the theocra ic nature of Islam.
But you don't have to be a KoolAid drinker of this theory to rec-
ognize that the Iragis did in fact ognize that the Iraqis did in fact
flock to the polls at great risk to flock to the polls at great risk to
themselves to participate in their new democratic government. Nor do you have to be a blind fool to recognize that a highly imperfect democratic system in Iraq, especially one at least currently friend ly to the United States, is vastly
superior to what existed before and what might exist if we leave too soon. In other words, you can
support the democratization of

"Rather than study the world as it might be ... you must study the world as it is"? The lynchpin of the ISGR is' its
recommendation for a "New recommendation for a "New
Diplomatic Offensive." That pivDiplomatic Offensive." That piv-
otal recommendation - No. 1 on a otist of 79 - appears to rely on sev list of highly dubious assumptions. One - as many have noted - is that Iran and Syria perceive a sta ble Iraq to be in their respective
national interests. Another is tha resolution of the IsraeliPalestinian issue would disincentivize Islamic terrorists and their sponsoring states from pursuing
global jihad. Another is that all global jihad. Another is that all diplomatically
Could Hitler's or the Soviet's thirsts for world domination hav been resolved diplomatically? Shouldn't we recognize that cer-
tain regimes, ideologies and raditain regimes, ideologies and radi-
cal theologies have no interest in diplomacy other than as a diversion to lull their enemies into co cessions or a false sense of securi
Indeed how realistic is the ISGR when it doesn't even address con-
tingency plans? What if the varitingency plans? What if the various nations don't respond like pawns as the ISGR projects on its global chessboard?
For example, the ISGR recom
mends forming an "Irag
International Support Group among nations that are presumed to have an interest in avoiding chaos in Iraq - sort of a synthesis between Rodney Kingism ("Why can't we all just get along?") and
Alcoholics Anonymous Atcohoncs anonymous. What if Or, if they do, will it then be necessary for the uniformly reviled
state of Israel to form its cent support group would not seek to impose obligations or undertakings on the government of Iraq. So
not only is the omniscient ISGR going to form the group; it is going to speak for it in advance and guarantee that it won't seek to impose its will on Iraq. Oh, really?
What if the new Iraq doesn't behave?
Let' s just test this assurance The ISGR says Iraq's neighbors "favor a unified Iraq that is strong enough to maintain its territorial

Come 2008, Republicans will find a schnauzer museum - or some other strange project - to ridicule and hold up as emblematic of their profligate ways. An earmark is spending that a
politician slips into a larger bill, politician slips into a larger bill,
often anonymously, often at the last minute. A project following the traditional funding path must
first go through an authorization
process, during which its value is process, during which its value is
debated. Earmarks that are awarded without competition or serve only a special interest qualify as "pork," according to Citizens Against Government Waste. That means most of them. Whether Democrats will show more propriety in this area
remains to be seen. The early signs are not encouraging. Consider the incoming leaders of the House and Senate spending subcommittees - the places wher

Inouye also told The Honolulu Advertiser that he spoke with Stevens before the election, and everyone is cool on earmarks. "We pledged to each other that no matter what happens, we will contin tisanship."

There may be even more victims, but
they're reluctant to come forward hey're reluctant to come forward

Investigators believe the same man committed each attack, and that rape
appeared to be the motive even though some victims were robbed. Evidence is being tested against other DNA samples in an effort to identify the man, Whitaker said.
In some cases, the attacker approached his victim outside their
home. Other times, as in the most recent case, he broke into the home to confront his victims.
"I think he just sees one that he prefers, and then he begins to follow out where they live and watching their out where they live and watching their
house," Whitaker said. Whitaker said the victim in the most

ing a struggle with his attacker that led to his escape.

But it's easier than people think to take a stand against sweatshops by buying "fair trade" clothes. All it takes is a little research, maybe a few click of a mouse. Ex-ploita tation: to make a profit from the labor s manout giving a just return. of the world, some manufacturers take advantage of workers' willingness to work for low wages.
