eloquent orator. Well intentioned he may have been, but I suspected that Mother Earth, in answer, might say, "I'll be here when you're gone, son. Better take care

are still a few who think it is much ado about nothing. It has been pointed out that not long ago we
were told our cil supplies would were told our oil supplies would be
depleted by the year 2,000 . That depleted by the year 2,000. That
was just before the price of gasoline shot up, and long, long
before the devastating Alaska oil spill. We have problems with oil, all right, but not the problems we
were warned about. There are those who suspect that
environmental concern is tied in with Madison Avenue's desires to constantly rearrange our buying
habits. Or, it's the habits. Or, it's the work of
doomsayers telling us, again, that the world is fast coming to an end, or overzealous scientists who haven't got all their facts straight, or politicians, manipulating us for reasons which may or may not
become clear sometime in the future.
It's hard to sort it all out, this environmental stuff. It will
probably get harder. Some of my friends are being sued because their water wells draw from the aquifer, threatening to destroy the
habitat of the Blind Salamander habitat of the Blind Salamander.
Separating trash, using recycled paper products, making compost heaps, even going back to stick deodorant--these are things most of us can live with. But when our pocketbooks are threatened and
our individual freedoms begin to be restricted for a creature we can't even see, then the questions become a little stickier. We need to get informed, to check our facts, to demand responsible evaluations,
to negotiate, to compromise, to commit....
In 1624, John Donne wrote, "No man is an island entire of itself,
every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main. If a clod be washed away by the sea,
Europe is the less..." Though this

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appears to be an idea ahead of its time, the fact is that people were more sensitive then to the
interrelatedness of things. This was before the scientific age, whe man's ability to control, produce and consume had not begun to dominate our thinking.

independent reasoning are not all bad; neither reasoning are not al infallible. The times are changing, bringing very real danger signs and leading back to the idea that our planet is
like a living organism, like a living organism, each part
related to every other part. Even if a person can't get worked up over Blind Salamanders, it's hard not to be concerned over birth defects
caused by careless toxic caused by careless toxic waste
management, or beer cans found by divers exploring the ocean floor.
One of the principles of mental health is that ultimately people need be able to take responsibility to recognize our parts in a give problem situation and be willing to change. Despite the hype and the extremists and the political and "Save the Earth" movement, it' time for each of us to assume responsibility for environmental problems. The
Thinking about the environmen is a sobering exercise. You can take a cynical approach. You ca wait and see. You can argue that the earth is exceedingly adaptable and regenerative. You can decide that nothing you can do will mak
difference. Or you can mak some small beginning. It is better says the proverb, to take out the trash than to wallow in garbage.

## To Understanding Texas

How a community defines itself
is determined in part by how it unis determined in part by how it un-
derstands its history derstands its history.
Texas A\&M University historians, Walter Buenger and Robert Calvert, tell us that the recording of a history is always a selective process, and the story that is told functons as a mythic text for a com-
munity. Historians are keepers of the culture, they argue, functioning much as the ancients used the spoken word to pass the mythic story of their society from generation to
generation.
of state that for far too long focused on the predominant Anglo myth, devoid of adequate reference
to women, minorities and average citizens of all races.
C. Van Woodward estimates the shelf life of history to be about twenty years. After that time, new scholars have emerged to question the presumptions of previous histo-
rians. Yet here in Texas, the giants of a previous time--George Garrison, Eugene Baker, Walter Prescott

cast long shadows limiting perspecives on Texas history.

Duff and Phelps also analyzes the claims-paying ability of insurance companies. Its highest rating, AAA, means risk factors are negli-
gible. Some of the key factors gible. Some of the key factors
Duff and Phelps considers include (1) the company's capital base, (2) a low operating leverage, (3) highquality investment portfolio, and (4) recovery of statutory profitabil-
ity. Although an insurance company's rating is a reliable way to judge its financial stability, it is subject to change. Ratings are evaluated periodically and are often adjusted. Knowing the current rat-
ing of your insurance company ing of your insurance company
should be part of an annual financial review.

## YOUR EYES



TOGETHERNESS Good vision depends on both eyes working together as a team. Each one must see clearly, of course, but it s equally necessary
that both eyes be able to focus on the sam object at the same time. For most of us, this togetherness is automatic. It happens quickly and easily. But if the eyes are not working vell together, the result may be double vision. Sometimes the individual must overwork muscles trying to get the eyes to aim at the ame object simultaneously, or conscious or unconsciously block ou brain gets confused about what it sees. Corrective lenses and vision training can bring success in correcting this problem. Your optometrist may use either or both. After careful examination, lenses to correct nearsightedness or farsightedness may be prescribed. If
indicated, a prism may be used to alter the image the eye sees. Vision training exercises will be taught in the optometrist's office so you'll be able to do them on your own at home.
