Repeat Performance—Almost! Bosque On Rampage Again

In almost a complete repeat performance of the May 23, 1952 flood the Bosque River came down early Thursday morning, fed from heavy rains on the upper watershed.

Most of the water came from Stephenville where a reported 9 inches of rain fell Wednesday night and Thursday morning. Reports of heavy damage in that section were received at mid-morning Thursday. Several houses were reported washed away and high winds blew roof tops off.

Official rainfall in Hico was an inch and a half.

In Hico it looked for a while as if the river would cover all of the lower section of town. No water was reported in any of the houses, but some of the families took precautionary measures and stacked furniture and other household effects. A few of the families went so far as to move out.

Compared to the 1952 flood, markings on the Highway 281 bridge indicated that the water level lacked approximately 4 feet of reaching the high of that year.

Heaviest damage is expected to be along the river bottoms to the crops such as corn. Top soil on the low-land places will probably take the heaviest beating, along with any farm machinery left in the fields.

It Happened Here or Near

MY HOME TOWN—PART III

The first school was opened in Hico in 1882. It was in a small frame building that stood on the lot where J. W. Richbourg's home now stands. Only elementary grades were taught, as there were no high school teachers nor rooms for high school classes. S. M. N. Marrs was the first teacher of the school.

In 1893-1894 the frame building was replaced by an eight-room brick building. The land for the building was donated by W. M. Grubbs. The bricks were made locally by Mr. Jack Woods. One building was used for the ten grades from that year until 1921. Mr. Core and Mr. Adair were elected by the board as joint superintendents. Succeeding them was J. N. Davis, who served from 1896 until 1907.

The first and only graduate of 1897 was Mrs. Fettle Weaver Yager, now living in Abilene. Commencement exercises were not held until the following year.

In 1901 or 1902 the school was enlarged with an addition on the east end of the building, bringing the total number of rooms to eleven. More remodeling followed from time to time, including the covering of the bricks with a yellow stucco.

The present high school building was built in 1921. It has eight rooms, including laboratory, library, and auditorium. In the past few years some remodeling has been done.

With the aid of the W. P. A. a native rock gymnasium and stone home economics cottage were added to the campus in the spring of 1939. The gym was built to house a band room and a vocational agriculture classroom. Included in this project was the extensive terracing of the playgrounds and lighting of the football field.

Again in 1940 the W. P. A. aided in the financing of a native stone stadium and rock fence around

the field. The north fence was never finished, but it is one of the finest stadiums in this section of the country.

Nineteen hundred and fifty-three saw the need of a new elementary building, for the old one had been in use over sixty years and no longer fitted the needs of the students. The old building was razed in the summer of 1953 and most of its bricks found a resting place at their place of origin—near the location of an old brick yard on the banks of the Bosque River.

The modern school was completed in the fall of 1953. It has eight classrooms, music room, and lunch-room, and each has modern equipment. Hico Public Schools have expanded from a small frame building to a total of four modern buildings, which are adequate to serve the students. At present we have about one-hundred and nineteen students in high school and about two-hundred and twenty in grade school. For these three-hundred thirty-nine students sixteen teachers are employed.

Modern Hico's economy is wholly dependent on farming, ranching, and dairying. Its present population is 1212. It is a town of many churches, eight at present, a modern hospital and clinic, modern school facilities, several feed mills, a weekly newspaper and numerous other businesses which make up an up-to-date town. It is incorporated, has a mayor, J. B. Ogle, present incumbent, also a city council consisting of five members. It has a chamber of commerce and several service and secret organizations such as Lions, Masons, and Eastern Star.

Hico annually celebrates with an "Old Settlers Reunion" which has been in existence sixty-two years. People come from afar for this event.

Rains and threats of rains strengthened the hands of cattle producers in the Southwest and prices were strong to 50c higher on most kinds at Fort Worth.

Cows, slaughter calves and stocker and feeder cattle and calves were in the forefront of the advances. Contrary to the usual Monday trade, the movement was fairly active as order buyers, shippers and independent packer buyers showed their strength early in the day and had cattle crossing the scales shortly after the starting siren wailed.

Fed beef cattle were in small supply and cleared at firm prices. Bulls also held well up to last week's strong close. Some fed cattle topped at \$23 and \$23.50, those at the higher price from McClung Land & Cattle Co., Johnson Co., averaged under 1,000 pounds. A load of choice fed steers from Clint, Texas, averaged 1,107 and topped at \$23 and were sent to Fort Worth by Paul C. Davidson. Grassy steers, yearlings and heifers bulked at \$13 to \$18, some ranchers below that range.

Fat cows sold from \$11 to \$13.50, some very fat old registered cows at \$13 to \$13.50, and some of their younger mates in choice butcher flesh at \$14.50. Cannery and cutters bulked at \$6.50 to \$11. Bulls mostly \$10 to \$14, some above or below that.

Good and choice slaughter calves cashed at \$16 to \$21, while plain and medium butcher sorts sold from \$12 to \$16 and culls drew \$9 to \$11.

Good and choice stocker steer calves cashed at \$18 to \$22, the higher figure for load of choice steer calves from J. R. Condon of Clay County. These steer calves at \$22 and their heifer mates cashed at \$19, and a three dollar spread between steers and stocker heifer calves was generally the rule. Stocker yearlings drew \$21 down, and older replacement steers sold from \$20 down. Some stocker cows went back to the country at \$7 to \$12.
