The first school was opened in Hico in 1882. It was in a small frame building that stood on the lot where J. W. Richbourg's home now stands. Only elementary grades were taught, as there were no high school teachers nor rooms for high school classes. S. M. N. Marrs was the first teacher of the

In 1893-1894 the frame building was replaced by an eight-room brick building. The land for the building was donated by W. M. Grubbs. The bricks were made locally by Mr. Jack Woods. One building was used for the ten grades from that year until 1921. Mr. Core and Mr. Adair were elected by the board as joint superintendents. Succeeding them was J. until 1907.
