Some of the reasons for the proposed hospital plan as pointed out by the proponents, and published in the Hamilton Herald-News last week are:

"1. It is known that a large amount of money leaves Hamilton County going to the hospitals in the surrounding counties. Not only does the money to pay the hospital bills go elsewhere, but it costs the

to go and come or to pay motel or hotel bills to be near those who are ill.

"2. Loss of time may be the cause of serious consequence in case of serious accidents or in maternity cases.

"3. There would be much satisfaction in knowing, that county hospital facilities would be available if needed.

"4. Our neighboring counties have been remarkably successful in paying off indebtedness and have made money the same time furnish facilities at minimum charges."

The citizens of Hico and surrounding communities seem to have their doubts about the above, especially in paragraph 4. It is commonly known that county institutions throughout the state are forever in need of funds for operation and expansion costs.

The cost of such a bond issue as the one now being proposed would be something like \$300,000, \$100,000 of which would tax raise to each property owner of approximately 20% on top of their present taxes, and would require 30 to 40 years to retire the bonds.

Sentiment in most quarters seem to be that Hamilton definitely needs a hospital . But, feelings are that they should build their own and not ask the help of people who more than likely will never benefit from such a project as a county hospital.






If You Can't Lick 'em-Join 'em

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




