## Hamilton County Ranchers Eligible for Drouth Relief

Hamilton County last week was placed in the drought emergency relief area by the department of agriculture, according to Douglas White, County Supervisor, Farmers Home Administration.

Farmers and ranchers in the

county will be able to purchase feed for basic livestock herds at the rate of \$1.00 per hundred savings.

Applications for emergency feed for livestock may be filed with the Farmers Home Administration through August 31, to provide feed for the basic herds through September 30, 1956.

The amount of feed that can be bought under the program is: 4 pounds per cow, 3 pounds per heifer, and 1 pound for calves; 5 lbs. per bull, 1 pound for ewes and nannies, one-half pound for ewe lambs and nannie kids, and 2 lbs. for billies and rams.

The News Review received a telegram last week from Congressman Omar Burleson announcing the drought designation, and stated further that farmers will be permitted to graze their livestock on lands that have been put into the soil bank program.

## Truman E. Roberts Will Head Local Scout Fund Campaign

The following men were announced as Community Chairmen by Dr. J. T. Archer of Meridian, Hamboco District Campaign Chairmen for the Independent Finance Campaign to support the Heart O'Texas Council, Boy Scouts of America.

Truman E. Roberts was named as Hico fund chairman. Other area chairmen are Garland Davis, Meridian; Leon Andress, Walnut Springs; S. E. Ragsdale, Clifton; St. Johnson, Cranfills Gap; George Mingus, Valley Mills; and Eloe Stringer, Hamilton.

These men met last Friday to make plans for the campaign which kicks off October 9.

Dr. Archer announced that at the Council Budget Planning Conference which he attended, the budget for the coming year had been increased 12 per cent. This was due to the constantly increasing number of institutions, leaders, and boys being served.

Keeney, teacher at Aleman during 1956, is a candidate for a bachelor of science degree in physical education.

Final rites were conducted Friday afternoon, August 4, for Eugene Wesley Mackey, 74, at the Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Chapel, with Bro. Stanley Giesecke officiating. Interment was in the Duffau Cemetery.

Mr. Mackey, who passed away August 2 in the Hico Hospital after a lengthy illness, was born June 11, 1882, in Bosque County, Texas and had been a resident of this community for several years. He had retired from his occupation of farming.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Earl Bates of Fort Worth; two sons, Grady and Clifford, both of Hico; four brothers, John of San Angelo, Henry of Hico, Toy of Mineral Wells, and Pete of Fort Worth.

## State Water Engineers Set Bosque Watershed Hearing

Fred McCleskey, president of the Upper Bosque Watershed Association, was informed by Weldon Hart, first assistant to Gov. Allan Shivers, that the State Board of Water Engineers has set a hearing for September 10 on the application of the Bosque Watershed Association for the creation of a special water control district on the river.

The association sponsored the circulation of petitions to the state board on the creation of the district and over 500 names were obtained for the plea.

Should the state board approve the creation of the district, backers of the plan will then submit the proposition to a vote of taxpayers in the watershed.

These steps are the first in a series designed to meet the financial qualifications for the institution of a watershed flood control and soil conservation program on the river similar to that now being constructed on Greens Creek.

McCleskey stated that he had not received official confirmation from the board that hearing had been set but that he is confident notification will soon be received.

He stated that the board of directors of the association would be governed by the consulting engineers from Dallas on making appearances before the board and that the group planned to follow the recommendation of those experts in the matter.

## Sen. Price Daniel Thanks Texans For Support In Primary

Senator Price Daniel this week thanked the 622,000 Texans who gave him an overwhelming lead in the first primary race for Governor, putting him more than 162,000 votes ahead of his run-off opponent.

"This is the widest lead a candidate for Governor ever has had in a run-off," Daniel said. "I am confident that, with hard work, we can win a landslide victory on August 25."

Daniel, a native of Liberty County, maintains his family home on a small ranch near his birthplace and is a member of the REA.

As a U. S. Senator, he supported 90 per cent parity on basic crops, authored an amendment to the farm bill which placed grain sorghum supports at a comparable level as corn, and helped obtain more realistic farm credit provisions.

Daniel is advocating a statewide water and soil conservation program, and a state drought relief program that would include loans to farmers and ranchers facing mortgage foreclosure.

His program also includes step-up research into proposals to create additional water supplies, such as conversion of salt water and artificial "rainmaking."

Daniel said that as Governor he would "put the full power of the State Government behind our farmers and ranchers, to help them regain their fair share of the national income and to help them fight the worst drought disaster in our history."

## Democratic Convention Held Saturday in County Seat

The Hamilton County Democratic Party met in Convention, as prescribed by law, at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon at the County Court House with Bradford D. Corrigan acting as chairman, and Mrs. Harold Jones as temporary secretary.

Local delegates who attended were Odie Patsick, D. E. Bulloch, A. A. Brown and E. V. Meador.

After a peaceful start, the convention developed into a more "stormy" session when an attempt was made to declare the Hico delegation illegal. The charge was made by a delegate from the lower end of the county, who claimed that under the Federal Hatch Act, one of the Hico delegates could not participate in such conventions, and asked that none of Hico's six votes be recognized. The request was overruled.

Two reports from the Committee on Delegates to State Convention were read. A. T. Jones read the majority report asking for the following delegates and alternates: Bradford Corrigan, Mrs. Maye Brann and A. T. Jones, with alternates Rev. William Tieman, Mrs. T. D. Craddock and Clyde Weatherly.

D. E. Bulloch read the minority report with the following delegates named: Odie Patsick, Rev. C. N. Gilbert, and P. M. Gerald. Alternates named were D. E. Bulloch, Harold Stroud and Jack Stribling.

Voting showed the minority delegates being named to the State Convention by a 12-10 margin. Rev. C. N. Gilbert read 5 resolutions, and the vote was unanimous in favor of accepting all resolutions.

D. E. Bulloch made motion that delegates to the State Convention go as a Unit Group, but go un-instructed. Motion was seconded and carried.

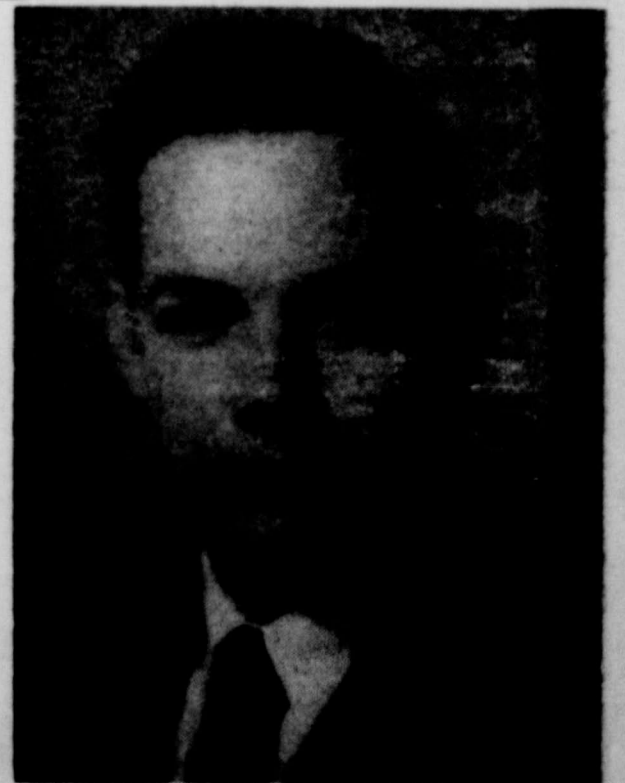
## Clairette Baptist Church Revival Will Commence Tonight, August 10

## It Happened Here or Near

The country church once upon a time was to be seen on almost every hill, and often in the dale. Now it is not seen so often. In the last quarter of the former century one did not go far in any area of this part of Texas but there was a church, perhaps a considerable distance from a residence or any other structure. Pioneers had some ideas all their own as to where the church should be located, and you can see some reasons in their choices. They wanted shade and centrality and accessibility. Yet in some cases they wanted the building to be seen at long range, so perched it on a hill.

Some of those pioneer names persist, like Pleasant Hill or Pleasant Valley, or Oakdale, or Oakhill, or Oakgrove, or Lona Cedar, or Falls Creek. Often, perhaps most often, some local characteristic or terrain—a hill, or creek, or spot of timber—suggested the church's name. The term "Mount" was often attached to the name of the church, as Mt. Lebanon, Mt. Sinai, or some other Mountain mentioned in the Bible, and no doubt used back in the state east of the Mississippi River from whence some of the members hailed.

Early in this century the country church began to disappear. First the Presbyterian churches were abandoned, or gravitated to the town. Next the Methodist churches began to disappear or consolidate with the nearest town church. And finally some of the Baptist churches ceased to exist, or moved toward, though Baptists persists in the rural areas more than any other. In the last quarter of a century a new development in the country has been witnessed in the growth of the Churches of Christ. A few Lutheran churches are to be found in the country also, mostly in communities largely German.

Several forces have operated to reduce the number of country churches. The consolidation of schools, the decline of the village, and perhaps most of all the conservatism of the membership in being content to continue to use the old building, wholly inadequate for any real church activities, and in many cases the utter lack of any sort of attractiveness in the place where the worship was held. I have seen rickety slat benches with nails sticking up with such regularity that one could not sit on a seat with any peace of mind lest he snag a hole in trousers or skirt on those ubiquitous nails. Often in the rear of the building might be seen stacks of wood to maintain the fires in the box heater near the middle of the room; that is, if the antiquated pipe could be induced to hold together. The piano stool was a hazard for the pianist, and the piano gave

forth all the tones but the ones desired. The hymn books would be of similar sort, minus backs, and the first available number some where around 12, with the index and back pages missing. The front end of the heater in many a case seemed intended mostly as a screen to which tobacco juice could be propelled by the brethren who could not refrain from their "baccy" even during a worship period. And then a pious brother would bewail the lack of interest among the younger generation in the church.

In these days, things are better in the country churches that remain. One can see some beautiful buildings with adequate room and facilities for worship and all church activities. There is still a lack in most cases of gracious about the church.

Carlton Baptist Church is a fine example of a comely and adequate building. It is able to carry on a full scale of activities in its roomy quarters. Pleasant Hill Methodist Church, between Lico and Stephenville is one of the most beautiful houses of worship one can find in the country, and it is picturesque that its interior is just as attractive as its outside. There are some wonderful Lutheran churches to be seen, notably at Friday and Pottsville, and Cranfills Gap. At Olfen, in Concho County, is what is said to be the most beautiful church in America and it has been pictured and described in magazines quite a bit. It is St. Boniface Catholic Church about a mile west of Federal Highway 83, between Ballinger and Paint Rock. Its pictures and stately and interior decorations are said to be surpassingly beautiful. The Churches of Christ to be seen in the rural areas are all alike in outward appearances, neat and kept freshly painted and inviting. A Methodist church at Bethel in Ellis County, at an old camp-meeting site that dates back almost a century, has the most ornate church and the best kept cemetery I have ever seen in the country.

This writer has a very strong conviction that the church ought to be the most beautiful spot in the community, and always takes note of attractive church buildings and grounds.

## The End of Your Rope . . .

A favorite expression of one of my school friends was, "When you get to the end of your rope, tie a knot and hang on." And that's not a bad idea if you will do some other things while you're hanging on. When you get in a tough spot, tie a knot in the end of your rope and hang on. Then while you are hanging on, do something else.

First, examine your heart. Maybe you are in a jam because of some attitude or action of your own which is contrary to the purposes of God. You may have been trying to make a go in life on your own without seeking God's help. Or, as so often happens, you may have been obstinately violating God's purposes. Anyway, a person hanging by a knot from the end of his rope is in pretty good shape to be honest with himself. Forget the other fellow for a little bit. Forget the adverse conditions for a moment. Just examine your own heart in the presence of God, and see if there is anything there that God wants changed. If there is, you cannot really get out of your jam until you do something about it.

Second, repent and change the direction of your life where necessary. Repentance may be old fashioned, but you can't live a good life or a full life without it. When

your heart examination has disclosed things that are contrary to God's will you can expect to make progress out of your difficulty only along the road of repentance. Just being remorseful isn't quite enough either. You must change the direction of life so that you will not become involved in some violation of God's purposes again. You will not get completely out of difficulty by just changing direction, but you can't get out without changing direction. And remember the old Chinese proverb which declares, "A journey of a thousand miles is begun with a single step."

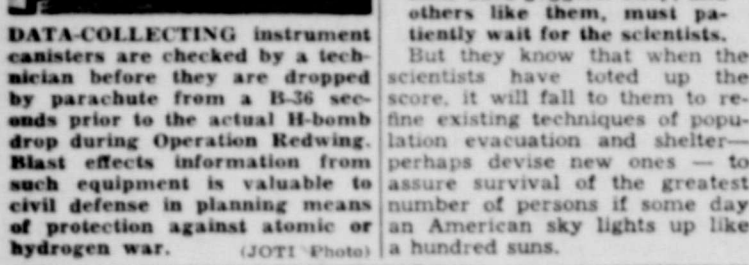
If you take steps one and two, God will take step three. He will deliver you from your difficulty. He will forgive your sin. In I John 1:9 we read, "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just, and will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness." He will give you strength. In Isaiah 40:29 we read, "He gives power to the faint, and to him who has no might he increases strength." Through His forgiveness and through His power God will deliver you from your difficulty. Are you at the end of your rope? Tie a knot and hang on. Examine your heart. Repent if your life calls for it, and turn to God. God will surely deliver you from your trouble.

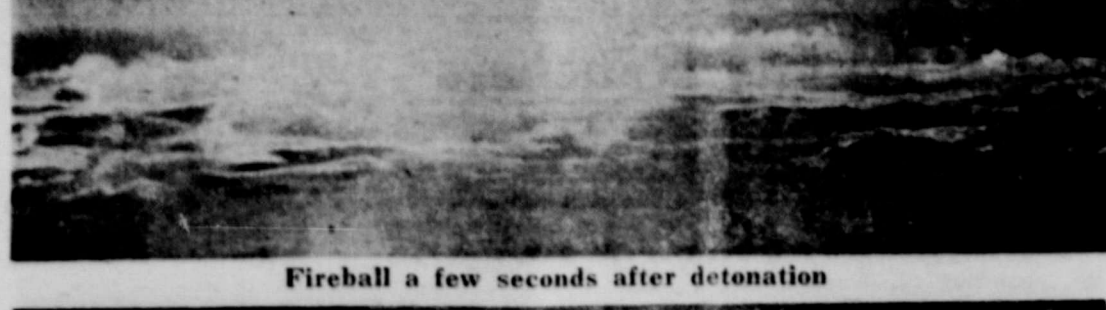

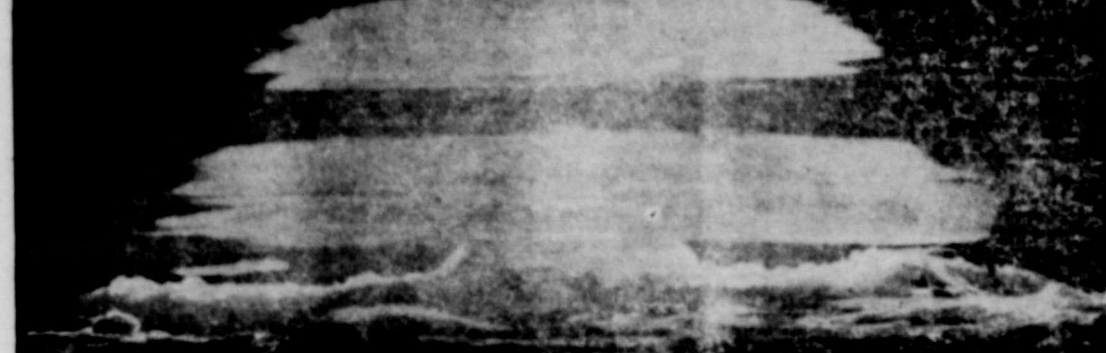

## "Proposed Constitutional Amendments to be Voted On at an Election to be Held on November 6, 1956"

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 23 proposing an amendment to Section 9 of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to provide that the Commissioners Court in each county may levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund purposes, permanent improvement fund purposes, road and bridge fund purposes, and for the purchase of land for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year, and providing further that the Commissioners Court shall not assume any outstanding bonds or other obligations, providing for the necessary election and form of ballot, and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize needed changes in and revision of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas, providing that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as adopted November 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

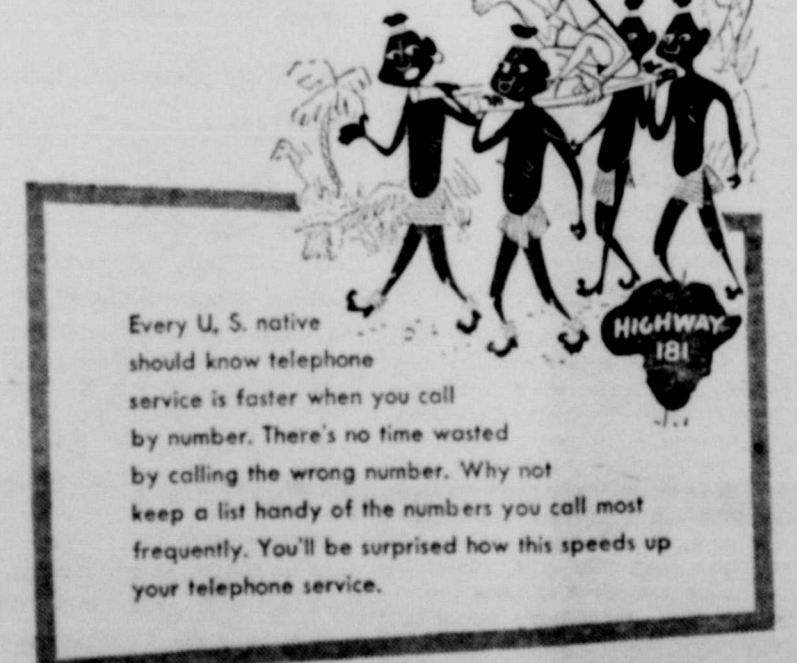

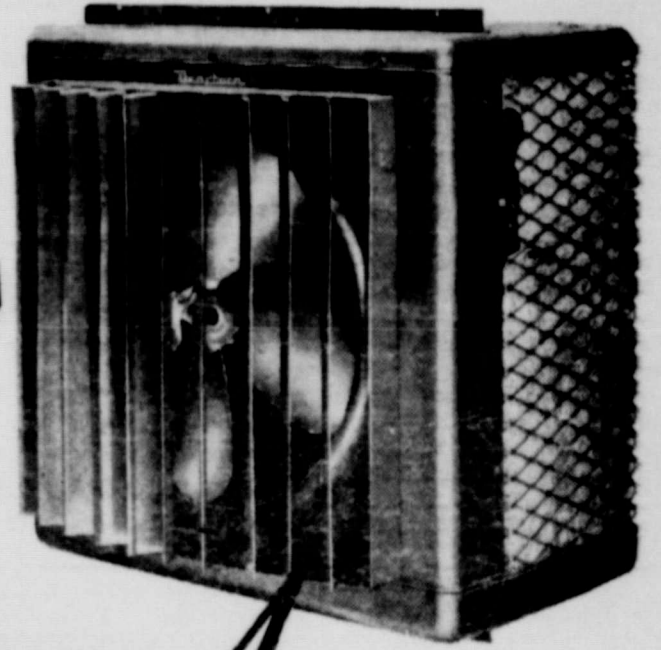

#### WRITE A LETTER TO YOUR HEIRS

Every person should, of course, make a will, so that his wishes for those he cares for may be carried out after his death. Our courts will then see to it that his wishes are put into effect.

But as a rule your will is too important to clutter with detailed facts and advice to your survivors. It is not the place to tell where you keep your important papers, although your survivors should know. They might need these papers in probate proceedings or to carry on your business. Some of these papers may bear on your survivors' actions.

So put these vital facts in a letter to your survivors:

Where is your will? In a safety deposit box? At your office? Or tucked away some place for safe keeping? You might have hidden it so nobody can find it. It might have been destroyed by accident.

Your will is no good unless it can be found.

Who is your executor—the person or institution you want to carry out your will? To whom do you look for sound business advice?

Where do you bank? With whom do you deal at the bank? Some persons have a savings account in one bank and checking accounts in others. Where are your safety deposit boxes? Do you keep important papers in other places? List these places.

Where do you keep all your insurance policies—life, health, car, accident, others? They may cover your family as well as yourself. Your family may wish to continue them.

Where are your personal account books? Letters about your business affairs? Your cancelled checks and receipts? These facts will protect your estate from false claims.

Do you own real estate? Where are the deeds and abstracts or title insurance policies? Do your records show a capital gains basis for your real estate and what you invested in any piece of real property? Tell your heirs what you think they should do about your real estate and other property.

Do your records show which property is separate and which is joint? The division of your property may rest on these records. Besides, good records may save tax dollars.

Besides current bills, do you have any debts? If so, list them and your creditors. Where are the copies of your income tax returns? Your car title?

Note these subjects: Old age and survivors' insurance, pensions, profit-sharing plans, group insurance, club memberships, royalties, estates and trusts, and joint ventures. Put down your social security number. These are just a few things to cover in the letter you leave. You will think of others. Give your heirs every bit of pertinent information about your properties and business activities.

The "Leap-Year" Proposal

### Highlights and Sidelights . . .

Today's favorite riddle among Capitol seers is: "How will the new legislature go—Conservative or Liberal?"

First primary voting results assured substantial turnovers in both houses. Fifty-four newcomers are certain in the 150-member House. At least seven "freemen" are assured in the 31-member Senate.

Second primary returns could boost the turnover to 65 in the House, 11 in the Senate.

One astute, non-partisan observer hazarded a guess that the 55th Legislature will be "slightly more liberal." But he emphasized this was only a guess, necessarily based on campaign statements. Many things can happen to change these positions.

Only way to be sure, he commented, is to "watch 'em vote a few times." This is especially true, he pointed out, for the newcomers.

Senate newcomers include three men who defeated incumbents outright. They are Charles F. Herring of Austin, who won over Sen. Johnnie B. Rogers; Henry B. Gonzales of San Antonio, who defeated Sen. O. E. Lattimer, and Hubert R. Hudson of Brownsville, victor over Sen. Rogers Kelley.

In the Lubbock area, Ex-Rep. Preston Smith and Rep. Carroll Cobb are in a runoff after both edged out Sen. Kilmer Corbin.

Two other senators are in runoffs. They are Sen. Doyle Willis of Fort Worth, contested by Rep. Joe Pyle; and Sen. William Shireman of Corpus Christi, opposed by Bruce Reagan.

Rep. Floyd Bradshaw of Weatherford won the post of the late Sen. Wayne Wagoner. Two other senators did not run again. Sen. Gus Strauss of Hallettsville will be succeeded by Culp Krueger of El Campo. Sen. Warren McDonald will be replaced by Rep. Bill Wood of Tyler.

Long-range guesses are that the conservative-liberal balance in the Senate will be "about the same as before." But the House is termed "still a jig-saw puzzle." Both conservative and liberal forces in the House will be without some of their staunchest advocates in past sessions.

Forty-three representatives retired. Among them were such liberal leaders as Reps. Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde, Maury Maverick Jr. of San Antonio, and D. B. Hardeman of Denison. Twenty-eight men have been elected to fill vacancies; 15 are yet to be decided in the second primary.

Eleven incumbent representatives were voted out in July. Casualties included such known conservatives as Reps. J. O. Gillham of Brownfield, W. G. Kirklind of Odessa and Stanton Stone of Freeport. Other conservatives were

among the 11 incumbents involved in runoffs.

This year's House turnover is only slightly larger than the average of one-third. Largest in recent history was in 1939, the year W. Lee O'Daniel first became Governor and the House got 91 new members.

#### POLIO VACCINE FOR ALL

State Health Commissioner Henry Holle reports that federal allocation of Salk vaccine had ended. Shots are now available commercially for any person of any age. More-than-adequate supplies make the change-over possible.

For Dr. Holle it was the end of a several months' fight to get shots for persons 20 years of age and more.

Health Department statistics show that 16 per cent of all Texas' paralytic polio cases this year and 29 per cent of polio deaths hit persons over 19.

So far this year Texas has had 668 polio cases, 15 of them fatal. During the same period last year 701 cases were reported. Health officials credit vaccinations for the drop.

#### STATEWIDE RAIN MAKING BACKED

A statewide rain making effort may be launched to combat Texas' prolonged drought.

Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas has called a September meeting of the Texas Water Resources Committee to study this possibility.

First to advance the idea publicly was O. G. McClain, Corpus Christi member of the committee. A petroleum geologist, McClain contended that rain making is the "most economical, permanent and equitable way to get more water."

Even "with complete conservation and development," he said, "the water supply still would be terribly inadequate. What we need are some good rains. We cannot legislate them. They are not coming naturally. The only alternative is to work for them."

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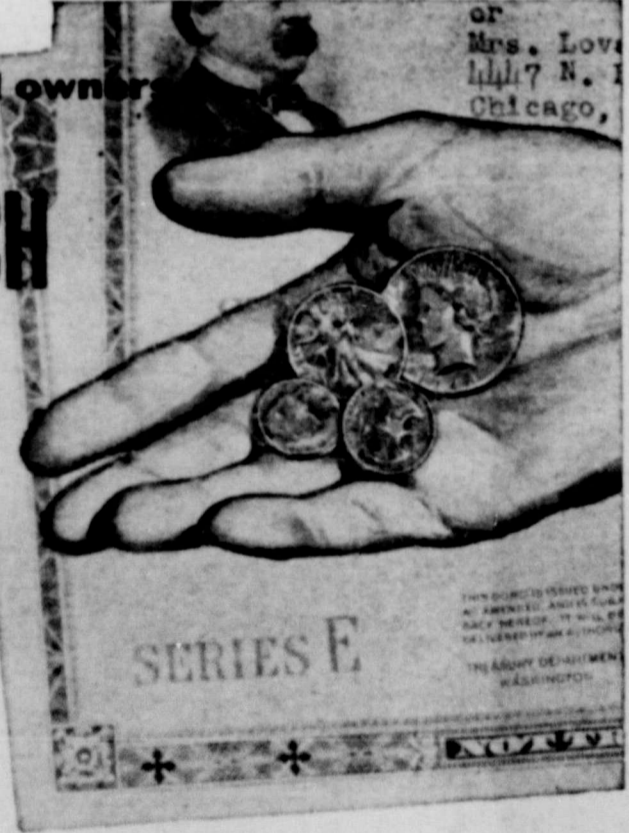

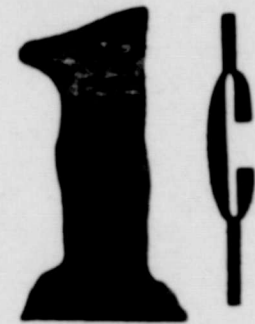

**TEXANS ASK EGG GRADING LAW**

Egg production is big business in Texas—187 million dozen worth each year, to be exact.

Yet Texas stands alone among the 48 states with no legal means of protecting its egg industry. As a result, the housewife suffers through unrestricted shipment of inferior egg products from other states, as well as frequent misgrading and labeling which sells her poor-quality eggs branded as "top-quality."

Farmers and egg industry men, alike, are now asking that the State Legislature pass a uniform grading and labeling law. Such a law would have a double-purpose:

1. It would protect the consumer. The industry wants to guarantee the housewife that she will get 12 good eggs in every dozen she buys—and that the eggs actually are of the size and grade which the label claims.
2. It would assure the producer a fair price for the grade of egg he sells, by encouraging and promoting payment according to quality.

Such a law is a strong possibility in the next session of the Legislature. In the meantime—and especially during the hot summer months—industry men are recommending to producers to keep eggs fresh until they are sold and consumed.

Egg producers are urged to gather their eggs at least three times a day in wire baskets and leave them in the baskets overnight in a cool, damp, ventilated place.

A good on-the-farm storage temperature is around 50 to 65 degrees if eggs are marketed often. The humidity should be 65 to 80 per cent.

These steps are also suggested:

1. Clean dirty eggs with steel wool, sandpaper or emery cloth brush. Be careful about actually washing unless you know the procedures recommended, or the quality can deteriorate rapidly after eggs are wet.
2. Pre-cool egg cases or cartons before packing eggs.
3. Pack eggs with the large end up.
4. Market at least twice a week, more often if possible.

**COUNTY AGENT REPORTS**

By E. R. LAWRENCE

Thursday night, August 23, in the court room at 8-15, there will be a meeting of all those who are interested in an Upper Watershed Project in the county. Roland Madeley, Area Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service will discuss the setting up of such a project. His talk will cover costs, making application, requirements of the land owners etc. He will be in a position to answer most any question that can be brought up.

Hamilton County again is in the drought area and this makes farmers and ranchers eligible for help on the purchase of feed for their foundation herds. The program is the same as it was the last time the county was in it. A dollar on each 100 pounds of feed is paid by the government. There is no hay buying program as of yet. The dollar is paid on corn, grain sorghums, barley oats and range cubes. Applications are being taken at the FHA office in the court house.

The amount of feed that can be gotten is 4 pounds per cow, 3 pounds per heifer, and 1 pound for calves; 5 pounds per bull, 1 pound for ewes and nannies, one-half pound for ewe lambs and nannie kids, and 2 pounds for lambs and rams.

Rudolph made the silo by placing some poles in the ground, about ten feet apart and then nailing rough cut lumber along to make the sides. The silo is about eight feet long and thirty feet wide. 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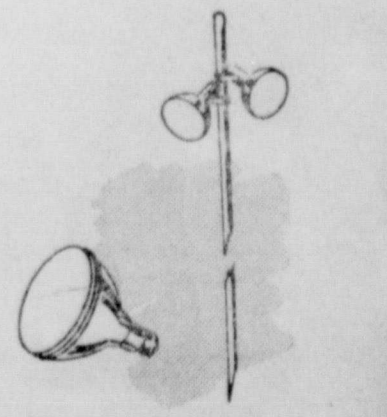

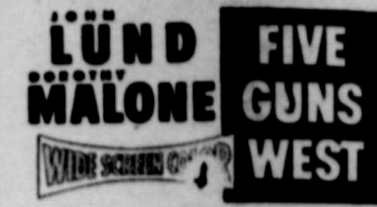

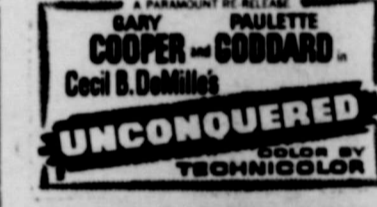
