## Army Specialist Completes Training At Fort Benning

Army Specialist Four Jimmy C. Linch, son of Maron Linch of Hico recently completed the helicopter mobile maintenance course at Fort Benning, Ga.

During the four-week course, which is conducted by the Sikorsky Division of United Aircraft Corporation, Specialist Linch was trained to perform repairs on the airframe, engines and rotor system of the H-37 helicopter. The H-37 is the Army's largest operational helicopter. The 15-ton aircraft is capable of carrying 44 fully equipped soldiers or 10,000 pounds of cargo.

The 20-year-old soldier is a helicopter mechanic in the 593rd Transportation Detachment, Lawson Army Aviation, Command, Fort Benning.

He entered the Army in September, 1957 and was last stationed in Germany. Linch was graduated from Iredell High School in 1956 and was employed by the Triple A Exterminating Company in Haskell before entering the Army.

### YOUTH CENTER TO BE OPEN FRIDAY

The Youth Center will be open this Friday night, June 17 at 7:30.

All junior high and high school students are urged to attend activities.

A schedule will be worked out shortly of nights in each month when the Center will be open.

Final approval was received last week from the State Attorney General's office of the \$98,000 in bonds voted April 30 for the purpose of remodeling the present Hico high school building, and the construction of a new 400-seat auditorium. The approval was received after the customary 30-day waiting period.

Contract for the work was awarded to B.W. Construction of Bryan at a special meeting of the Hico Board of Trustees recently. The contract was awarded on a contingent basis, and final approval was given this week.

The contracting firm had workmen busy Monday of this week on preliminary work prior to removal of the top floor of the building. Approximately 70 work days will be required for completion of the remodeling, with 150 calendar days allowed for completion of the entire program.

The contracting firm received the job on the basis of low bid. Two Hamilton contractors also submitted bids on the job.

Base bid for the project was \$73,738.00, with alternates and minor changes expected to run the total cost to approximately \$90,000.00. Remainder of the bond money will be spent to completely re-furnish the building and auditorium.

Plans call for remodeling of the old building, removal of the third floor, new roof, heating system, plumbing, electrical work, and new steel windows throughout. All masonry will also be refinished. Furnishings, including desks, steel lockers, blackboards, etc. will all be new in the building when completed.

Windows and staging was removed from the auditorium this week prior to removal of the third floor. Work is expected to start in earnest by next week.

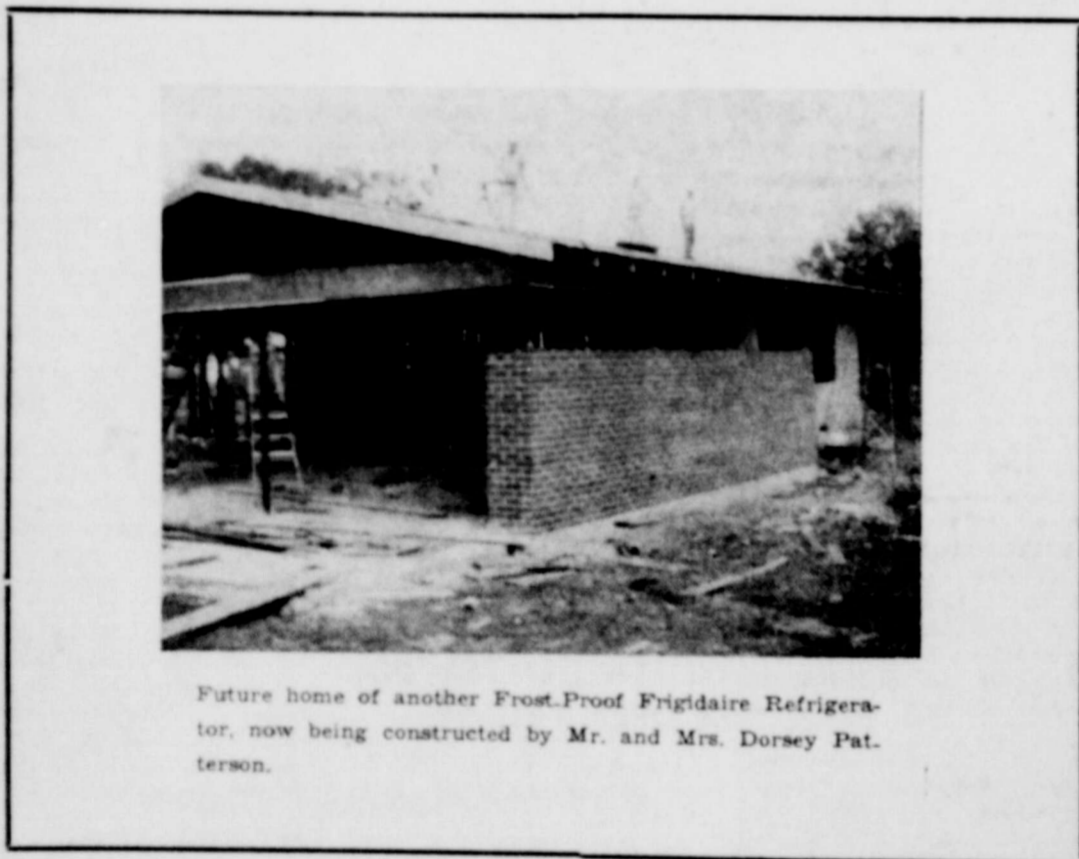

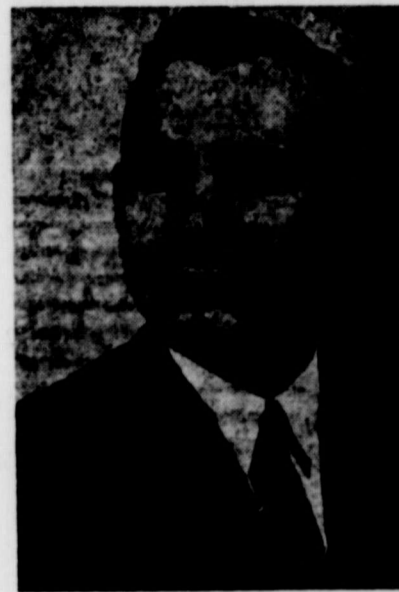

# IT HAPPENED . . .

HERE OR NEAR

After a month and a half of silence here we are again! And there has been a real very real reason—not merely an excuse. It happened thus:

Late in April one morning wife became violently ill at breakfast time. Though she has not walked without crutches for two and a half years, she jumped up and went scooting across the house without her crutches, while I sat dumbfounded at the sight. I took her crutches to her, and assisted her to the davenport where she lay down. Then another great surprise came. She was seized with convulsions, and finally seemed to succumb to death. I thought she was dead. I tried to get somebody over telephone, but was unable. It is possible that in my disturbed state of mind I was not doing the telephoning right.

Finally we managed to get in touch with the ambulance and hur-

ried wife to the hospital where she was given oxygen and after several hours came back to consciousness. Due to the doctor's skill and the nurses vigilance she got better and after some days we brought her home. Looking after her was a problem for a bungling husband. Happily our daughter came from Corpus Christi and we managed to care for the sick wife-mother.

But the daughter had to return home and so I had to do all the essentials here at home. If I had had time those days to write, I was too disturbed to concentrate on anything other than the daily round of nursing and housekeeping. That's why I have been silent until now. Now we have the Corpus Christi daughter back, and also the New Mexico daughter, and things have eased a full hundred per cent for me.

The coming of the Corpus Christi daughter, Ruth Williams, has

brought some rather remarkable things to mind. The Corpus daughter's husband has been electrician on a government job in the Marshall Islands, the Island of Kwajalein, for a year and he came home in early May for his annual vacation. At the same time the only son, Edward, came home from Biloxi, Miss. Air Base, for a month's leave, before going to his next assignment. The father and son's vacation ended at the same time.

On Sunday, June 5, the husband-father left Amon Carter Field by plane for another year on the job in the Marshall Islands, a four-thousand-mile trip. ### DAIRY FOODS PLENTIFUL FOR JUNE DAIRY MONTH

There is an abundance of milk and dairy products this month, The Dairy Month. In fact dairy food supplies are so large they are featured on the USDA's June list of plentiful foods.

The good-supply story covers the dairy food field—whole milk, buttermilk, skim milk, flavored milks, yogurt, cheese of all kinds, dry milk, evaporated milk, cottage cheese, cream, half-and-half, and ever popular ice cream.

Fresh spring vegetables also will be plentiful in Texas this month. Watch local markets and advertisements for specials. Look for especially good buys on celery, asparagus, onions, radishes, salad greens, cucumbers, sweet corn, snap beans, and potatoes. USDA's list emphasizes the abundance of Texas onions.

The supply of broilers and fryers continues large and current prices encourage frequent use of chicken for picnics and patio cooking.

Peanut butter is also on the list. This protein-rich food is ideal for sandwiches, with milk, and a host of cooking and baking recipes.

These food specials should help the careful homemaker plan her meals for more economy, by using what is plentiful and is in season.

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Approximately forty people attended the brush control demonstration Monday afternoon at the Circle S Polled Hereford Ranch of Dr. C. B. Cathey.

A new chemical was used on some prickly pears, and we should know in a few weeks as to whether it will kill pear. The chemical is mixed with water rather than diesel oil. If this works then pear control will be made a little cheaper than what it is now.

Some pear was also treated with 2,4,5-T and diesel oil which is the standard recommendation at this time.

Mesquite trees, liveoak and hackberry were also treated with 2,4,5-T and diesel oil. Some were treated with fenuron pellets. Pellets in the past have not given too good control on the soils of the county, but have where there is more sand.

The areas treated with the different materials have been marked and can be observed from time to time.

After application of the chemicals in the pasture, the group gathered at the cattle barn where Mrs. Redding served cold drinks and ice water. Cliff Bates, extension economist gave a short discussion of the value of controlling trees, brush and pear. Following this Hubert Redding, manager of the ranch, carried the group through the pens where some of the show cattle are on feed, and also some of the sale bulls.

Several of those attending the meeting were doing some mesquite control work on their places this summer and each stated they were having good results with 2,4,5-T and diesel.

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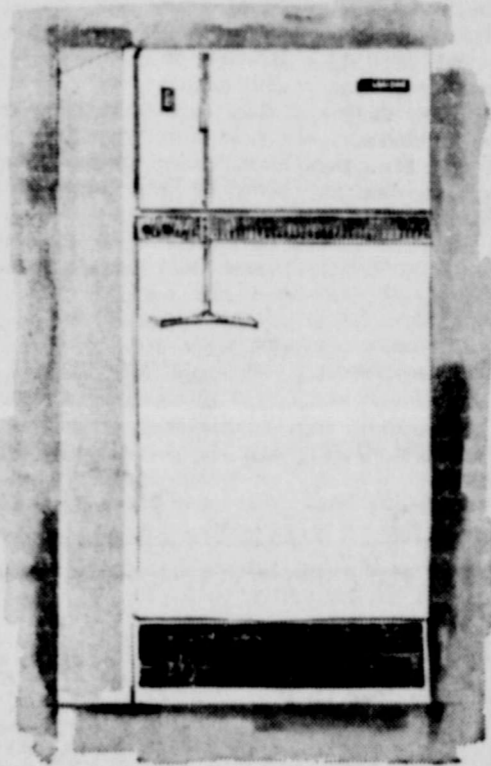

## Beware of the Terrible Two-Traffic and Drownings

Beware of the Terrible Two—traffic and drownings!

That's the caution extended this week by the National Safety Council as a forewarning of the top hazards to be encountered over the forthcoming Fourth of July holiday.

Traffic took 276 lives over the Fourth in 1953, and drownings claimed 178 victims, according to the Council. In addition, 65 persons died from miscellaneous causes during the mid-summer holiday.

The holiday period will begin this year at 6 p.m. Friday, July 1, and will continue through midnight Monday, July 4.

To reduce the number of accidental deaths from all sources, the Council—a non-governmental agency founded in 1913 to prevent all kinds of accidents—is conducting an annual campaign aimed at educating the nation about the dangers that can befall unsuspecting Americans—whether they're behind the wheel of a car, having fun swimming, or busy in the home.

### IT'S THE LAW—

## Follow Simple Rules When Involved in Auto Accident

Vacation time is here. Millions of people are driving about the country, and automobile accidents will occur with increasing frequency. What should a person do when involved in an accident?

At such times it is hard to keep your wits about you and know just what to do. It is therefore a good idea to plan in advance just what you would do in event of a smash-up. Here are a few simple rules that every driver should commit to memory:

- 1. Stop! Failure to stop can result in serious criminal consequences.
- 2. Render Aid. If anyone is injured: (a) Render first aid; (b) Stop bleeding; (c) Call a doctor or an ambulance or both; (d) Do not move an injured person in any way that could possibly add to his injury.
- 3. Protect the scene from further damage. You may be liable for damages to approaching drivers, unless they are properly warned. If the highway is obstructed at night, have someone turn his headlights beams on the wrecked vehicles.
- 4. Call an officer. Policemen, Highway Patrol, Sheriffs and their deputies are trained accident investigators whose testimony may be invaluable in establishing your civil claim for damages.
- 5. Gather information—write it down. Don't trust your memory. Don't guess—be specific. Measure skid marks. Step off distances. Be sure to obtain names and addresses of witnesses. You are required by law to exhibit your driver's license to the other driver—and he must do the same.

6. Be careful what you say. If you feel you are being blamed, it is best to make no statement. You may learn later that the other driver was at fault, or more so. Statements can be misinterpreted, or may be used against you. Whatever you say, make it true.

7. See your doctor if the slightest chance you are injured. Serious injuries always result in immediate or bloodshed.

8. Consult your lawyer immediately. The sooner your lawyer is brought into the picture, the better he can advise you and protect your rights. He can make statements from the scene and do many other things that the true facts are your lawyer's advice giving any interviews or statements to investigators or adjusters the other side.

9. Inform your insurance company promptly. Failure to do so may void your policy.

10. Report the Accident to the Department of Public Safety. It is required by law if there is injury, death, or total damage exceeding \$25.00.

An official accident report may be procured from the Sheriff's Dept., Highway Dept. or State Dept. of Public Safety.
