Hail Damage Severe After Sunday Storm

A severe hail storm late Sunday afternoon inflicted damage conservatively estimated at \$30,000 to property in the Hico area. The final damage report could run as high as \$50,000, according to insurance company adjusters.

Hail stones as large as hen eggs pelted the area for about 15 minutes, inflicting damage to roofs, sheet iron buildings, and masonry.

Heaviest hit was the local school, where damage is estimated to be in the neighborhood of \$2,000. Several claims have been filed for more than \$1,000, but the majority of the adjustments will be less than \$200 each.

Claims adjusters have been busy in Hico since Monday of this week, and expect to remain here the rest of the week.

Interest Displayed in School, City and Senate Elections

Hico voters will exercise their privilege of naming candidates of their choice for the first time this year when they go to the polls Saturday in the annual school trustee election.

Four candidates are vying for the two places to be filled on the local board.

Incumbent Ray Cheek heads up the list of candidates, with Charles Golightly, Coolidge Wade and E. A. Black the other candidates. Dr. W. F. Hefer, other board member whose term expires, declined to seek re-election to the position he has held the past three years.

A. A. Brown will serve as election judge in the school balloting, with the polls opening at 8 a.m.

Election interest was generated at Fairy and Carlton, with a host

of candidates filing for three places to be filled on each of those school boards. Seven candidates are running at Fairy, while the Carlton ticket will have eight names.

Incumbents at Fairy are Garland Streater, Raymond Jones, and J. J. Jones Jr., all who are seeking re-election. Others on the ballot are Joe Harris, Justin Bullard, J. T. Leonard, and Wesley Jones.

None of the present board members at Carlton whose terms expire are seeking re-election, but eight other aspirants are seeking the three posts to be filled. Retiring board members are Otho Stuckey, Condred Roberson and Henry Spurger.

Seeking the three positions are Mark Munselle, Avel Reich, Doyle Palmer, Lewis Cox, J. T. Butler, S. C. Thetford, Sam Sharp, and Melvin Kerley.

City Election.

In the Tuesday, April 4th city election, Wayne Rutledge and Alvin Casey, incumbents, are unopposed. Rutledge is seeking his third term of office, while Casey is running for his second term. Little interest has been displayed in the election.

Senate Election.

Also Tuesday, voters will name a United States Senator to succeed Lyndon B. Johnson. Seventy-one names will appear on the over-loaded ballot, and the biggest problem facing voters is finding the name of the candidate of their choice. The ballot looks like a who's who in Texas, with just about every conceivable profession represented. However, most observers feel that the race has narrowed down to possibly six candidates, but the major problem is locating their preference on the ballot.

Each and every qualified voter should exercise their privilege in the elections, and vote for the candidates of their choice.

April 3rd Is Change Date For Routes

14th Annual Stock Show Declared Great Success

Entries totaling 272 head were recorded in the 14th Annual Hico Livestock Show staged last Friday at City Park. While the entry list was below last year, quality of livestock shown was far above previous years, with the cattle show declared the best ever held here.

In the Beef Cattle Division 57 entries were recorded for a near-record number. Dairy cattle en-

tries were also on the upswing, with sheep and goats a little below previous years in number.

In the auction sale which followed the show, Odie Petsick paid the top price for a local project, bidding 31c per pound for a fat steer offered for sale by Bill Rutledge, James Weathers and J. B. Woodard also purchased calves. Several hogs were also sold at the auction.

IT HAPPENED . . .

HERE OR NEAR

Storms! He who lives on earth will experience storms, in whatever zone he may live, be it torrid, temperate or arctic. Some areas are more subject to them than others, but none escapes entirely.

Last Sunday afternoon wife and I got in the car for our daily ride and headed out toward Olin on 281. A cloud was approaching from the direction of Purvis when we left our home that did not look very ominous. When we turned back for the return to town we were much surprised at the stormy appearance of the cloud which at that time was headed toward Glen Rose. We remarked to each other that we would hear from the cloud later. It was the blackest that we had seen in many a day. And Monday morning as we tuned in on the news we did hear.

The black cloud moved eastward and left a trail of damage through Johnson County and on into Ellis County. It struck Italy, the town where I grew to manhood. In that village of something over a thousand souls it moved right down main street and almost demolished the business section, a strip of nine hundred feet wide through the very heart of the prosperous town. Some seventeen persons are reported injured in the path of the tornado as it swept past Hico and on to the east, to say nothing of property and crop damage.

It was the severest storm to hit Italy since the mid-nineties. That one occurred on April 30. I had hoed corn that day, corn that was knee high and looked quite hopeful of making a good crop. But about four in the afternoon a cloud appeared in the west and rapidly assumed threatening proportions. Hurriedly leaving the corn field, we rushed home, arriving just before the storm hit, a hail storm of unprecedented proportions. First, we heard something strike a house several hundred yards away, as if it were a cannonball, or some heavy missile. Then a hailstone fell in our front yard that was as big as a baseball. Then stones of all sizes up to three inches in diameter began to pound the housetop and great leaks appeared inside the house as the roof was totally

destroyed. That hail continued to pound for thirty minutes and the stones piled up on the side of the house from which the storm came in a great mass of ice two feet high. Heavy rain took over as the hail ceased and in minutes the creek down in front of the house rose to flood stage. We all were so awed we just stood agape and wondered what the ultimate result would be. Mother had a small baby in her arms. She sat in a rocker with her head down and a hand on her brow and we all knew she was praying.

Not a window in the house was whole. Most of them were a total wreck. When the rain ceased we walked out in the yard to see the extent of damage. It seemed complete. The roof was gone. The trees about the house were stripped of every leaf. The corn was whittled down to mere stubs, looking much like cane stripped for the mill in syrup-making time.

The next morning the citizens rushed to Italy to get shingles and windows to make their homes habitable. There were two lumber yards in the town: R. C. Mitchell and C. E. Woods yards. By nine o'clock not a shingle was left and no windows were to be had. It took a week for the yards to get supplies from wholesalers to meet the demand. It took weeks to recover all the houses and put in the new windows in the affected area.

Some years later, Frost, a town of similar size, was almost totally destroyed by a tornado. Then just a few years ago that community near Hillsboro was destroyed by a tornado, Vaughn. Storms do come and the often wreck many a man's prospects and leave him in the lowlands of hardship.

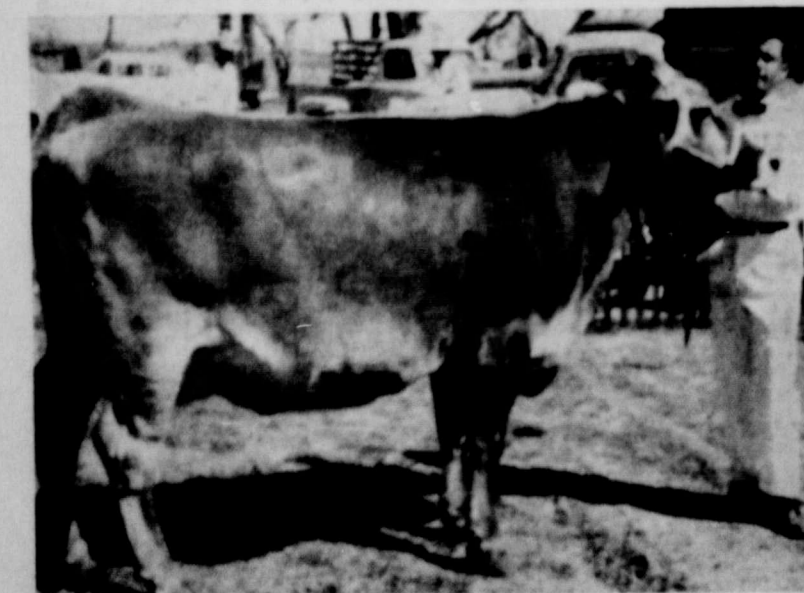

Don't forget the Red Cross drive tonight.

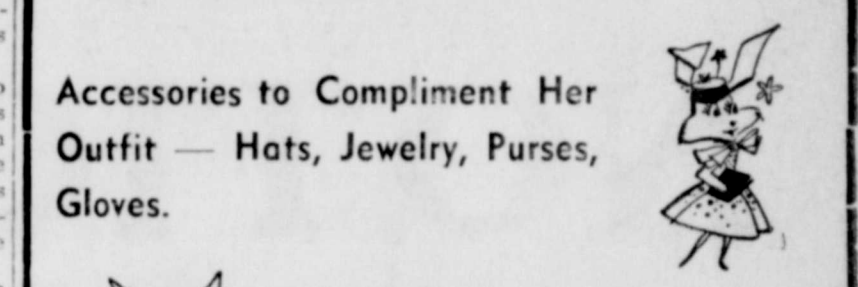

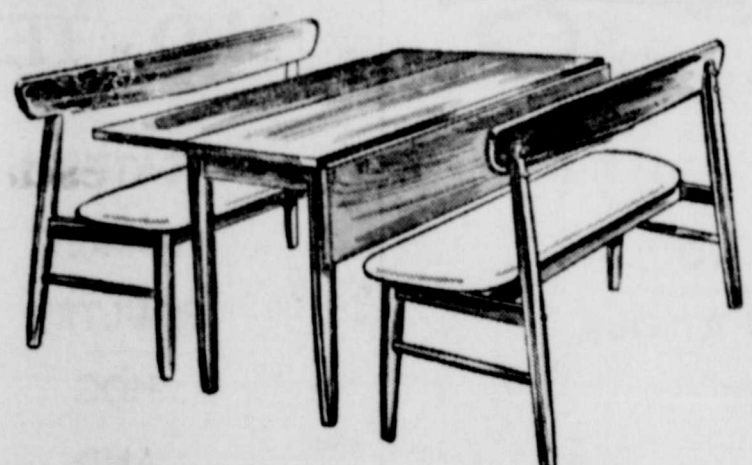

A good "rule of thumb" for proper range use and management is to graze only half of the annual growth of grass.

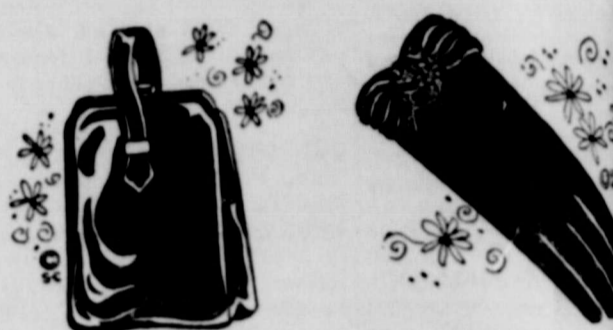

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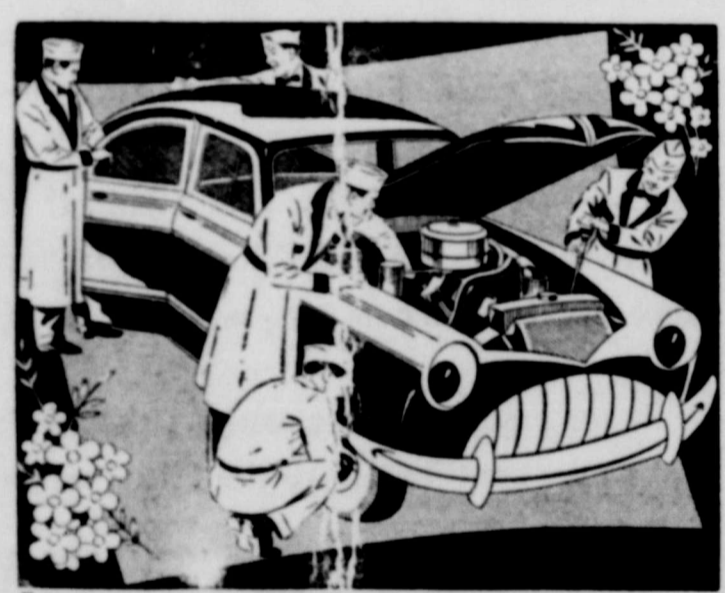
