Purpose of the Hico Nursing Home is to meet ade-

quately the total needs of the aged, ill and physically handlcapped in this and surrounding area. It is located in Hico, Texas, immediately behind Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Home, one-half block from Post Office, and one block from downtown. Patients up and about may go when they choose.

The building meets all State regulations. Warmed in winter by central heat through ducts to each room, and in summer is cooled by evaporative coolers, and room fans where needed.

Each bedroom is an outside room, containing 2 beds, double dresser, easy chairs, and walk-in closet for storing clothing and personal needs. A large family room offers reading, television, and visiting area where patients can meet together, and entertain family and friends. Family visiting is encouraged.

There is a Licensed Vocational Nurse on duty day and night to give medications and supervise, and only medications prescribed by a doctor will be given. The number of nurses on duty depends upon number of patients in the Home, and amount of nursing care required. In case of illness a Hico Doctor will be called of patients' choice, and if unable to contact him, another Hico Doctor will be called. Patients or their families will pay doctor bills, medicine and dry cleaning. All laundry is furnished at the home.



Prices range from \$100.00 per month for those up and about; \$125.00 for those up and down or in wheel chairs, requiring some care; and \$150.00 per month for helpless patients.

Local churches, civic clubs, and interested people are invited to participate in keeping our patients happy and content. Visitors are always welcome, and no visiting restrictions observed.

Nursing Home operator will be alert to patients' needs, and cater to his tastes in food when not contrary to doctors orders. Patients will be encouraged to do all he can for himself, yet have all the assistance he needs beyond his ability.







Waterways should not be used for farm roads. Very much traffic in a waterway either kills the grass or reduces its ability to withstand a heavy flow of water to the extent that erosion can very easily start. Since waterways are so important in a conservation system on a farm, they should be kept in as good condition as possible to insure that they will oo the job for which they were designed.
