B. 334 was a broad captioned bill that would take almost any amendment; it was hoped that the Senate would build it up while the House worked on the main tax bill.

On April 21, the House passed H. B. 727 by a vote of 72 to 71. It was a limited 2 per cent sale tax with revenue of about \$264.5 million.

Rep. Leaverton Will Report to People In Series of Articles

(Ed Note: Following is the first of a series of four articles prepared by Rep. H. A. Leaverton of Evant giving his opinion on the situation at Austin.)

Perhaps it is appropriate that I make a report on the Legislative situation at Austin. For brevity, I will write four letters on different phases of that situation as follows:

1. What actually happened.
2. Some pertinent facts.
3. The difficulty.
4. The present thinking of your representative.

What Actually Happened.
It is conceded, I think, that the 57th Legislature worked hard. Resolutions and Bills introduced: SJR 25; HJR 83; SB 480; HB 1136. Resolutions and Bills passed: SJR 8; HJR 6; SB 235; and HB 314.

Committee hearings, generally, were long and painstaking. Many bad bills were weeded out but some of the more important were passed to the floor for further consideration though opposed by the committee. Only a few bills can be named; we mention:

Most of the paving was in the immediate area the downtown section, with some seal-coating extending to the north portion of town.

Streets in the lower section of town were badly damaged last winter by the severe cold and snow, which caused buckles in many places. Some streets receiving the seal-coat had not been re-topped in several years.

WASHINGTON—

As It Looks From Here

Washington, D. C., June 21.—In 1956 the United States Supreme Court held that the State Department was unauthorized to deny a passport to a person because of his belief. In other words, the Court said that a person with a Communist record could not be refused a passport.

Several efforts have been made by the Congress to overcome this decision. The House of Representatives has twice passed a measure, but it has never gotten by the Senate.

The following is a text of a bill I introduced on June 7, which it is hoped will have early consideration and pass before this Session of the Congress is ended. Title: "To provide for the de-

nial of passports to persons knowingly engaged in activities intended to further the international Communist movement."

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled.

"The Congress finds that the international Communist movement of which the Communist apparatus in the United States of America is an integral part, seeks everywhere to thwart United States policy, to influence foreign governments and people against the United States, and by every means, including force and violence, to weaken the United States and ultimately to bring it under Communist domination; that the activities of the international Communist movement constitutes a clear, present, and continuing danger to the security of the United States; that travel by couriers and agents is a major and essential means by which the international Communist movement is

promoted and directed; that a United States passport requests other countries not only to permit the holder to pass freely and safely but also to give all lawful aid and protection to the holder, and thereby facilitates the travel of such holder to and in foreign countries; and that in view of the history of the use of United States passports by supporters of the international Communist movement to further the purposes of that movement the issuance of passports should be denied to such persons.

"The Secretary of State is authorized to deny a passport to any person who is a member or former member of, or affiliated with, the so-called Communist Party, or any organization determined by the Subversive Activities Control Board to be subversive, or who knowingly engages or has engaged in activities intended to further the international Communist movement.

"The Secretary of State may require as a prerequisite to the issuance of a passport, that the applicant subscribe to and submit a written statement duly verified by his oath or affirmation whether he is presently, or has been a member of a Communist organization—or a supporter of the international Communist movement, and to state the circumstances of any such membership."

This measure provides that the applicant for a passport, when denied the issuance of such for any reason, be afforded the opportunity of a hearing. This last section of the bill meets previous objections where it was contended that every man should have his "day in court." This section entitles any person to submit proof to refute evidence against him which has been the basis for denying him the privilege of traveling in foreign countries under the approval of the United States government.

Tax Debate Continues With Many Voices Being Heard

Austin, June 21.—Texas' tax debate continues! Not as lively now as during the legislative session—but many voices are being heard.

It's sort of a "speak now or forever hold your peace" period. Some type of tax bill, undoubtedly the biggest in Texas history, will have to be passed in July or August, and those with something

to say are rushing to get in their licks.

Legislators report that the small-scale "great debate" is proving very helpful in stirring up opinions from previously silent constituents. They're hoping to disconcert enough home district representatives to guide them to a swift, sure solution when they return for the special session July 10.

Eight Central Texas lawmakers, in a reply to Gov. Price Daniel's

report to the people, say that raising \$341,000,000 in new revenue will require a "broad coverage tax".

Although five of the eight voted with the governor during the session, several objected to a "hit and miss" tax approach.

Some say that people in their districts object to selective taxes on grounds that "it's not fair to tax my product and not my neighbor's."

In The Wind.

A number of new approaches to tax plans already battered around during the regular session are being worked on by lawmakers during this interim. Among plans being considered are these:

1. By Rep. Charles N. Wilson of Trinity (sponsor of the 2 per cent sales tax passed by the House last session)—a new sales tax that would be linked, siamese-twin fashion, with a corporation income tax.

2. By Rep. George T. Hinson of Mineola (a frequent sponsor of legislation favored by the governor)—a 2 per cent tax on everything selling for \$5.00 or more, with the usual food and drug exemptions.

3. By Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas—selective excise taxes of 2 per cent on a long list of items, but generally exempting the bed rock necessities of life.

New Committee at Work.
Governor Daniel's new tax study committee, made up mostly of the board chairmen for various state agencies, got off to a diplomatic, soft-voiced start.

Several lawmakers took a dim view of having "another study group," recalling that the last one had come up with a payroll tax plan that never caught fire. Texas voters, they pointed out, selected their legislators to write tax laws and will hold the legislators responsible for the outcome.

Members of the committee made it clear that they don't intend to dictate to the Legislature. But they do hope to be able to indicate some possible paths of compromise among the various plans for which the legislators have shown favor.

Committee is to meet July 6 to write its report for the special session.

Down the Drain?
Some legislators are fretting over the loss in state revenue resulting from the Legislature's failure to pass a tax plan during the regular session.

Here is the way they see it:
1. Bills passed by a simple majority vote take effect 90 days after the close of the session. If a tax bill had been passed in the regular session, it would have taken effect the last of August and money from it would be accruing September 1 when the new fiscal year begins.

2. If a bill is passed by a simple majority in the special session—say about August 10—it will not take effect until November 10.

3. A \$340,000,000 tax bill covering the 24-month period would raise money at the rate of about \$14,000,000 a month. But between Sep-

September 1 and November 10, nothing would come in from the new bill. This waiting period of two months would mean the loss of some \$35,000,000 in state revenue which would have been raised if the same bill had been passed earlier.

Question that immediately arises is: Can the Legislature pass a tax bill by a two-thirds vote of both houses so that it will go into effect immediately? (As done in 1950).

Today legislators are dubious. As the new tax bill is expected to affect more items, many legislators feel that it would be unfair to expect businessmen and storekeepers to get ready overnight to charge all sorts of new taxes.

New Worlds to Conquer.
With the election of John Tower as U.S. Senator, exultant leaders of the Texas Republican Party feel they have a foot solidly in the door.

Beyond the door, that they hope to swing wide, is a two-party Texas with the GOP sharing political power in Texas on a roughly equal basis.

New goals are being carefully considered. All but one (Travis) of Texas' big metropolitan counties went for Tower, as well as large sections of West Texas. In these areas, except where a very popular Democrat is entrenched, the Republicans can be expected to bid for places in Congress, the Legislature and even county jobs.

First test is due in Bexar County where Congressman Paul Kilday is due to resign to become judge of the Court of Military Appeals. Bexar County went for Tower last month.

Under the present law, Kilday's successor will be determined in a one-shot, high-man-wins special election, probably next fall. There is some talk of trying to get the Legislature, during its special session, to pass a law which would require a run-off in special congressional elections. This would reduce Republican chances.

Contempt of Court.

Court of Criminal Appeals ruled that a person cannot be held in contempt of court for an act committed outside the court room.

In the case in point, a district judge had held a man in contempt of court for assaulting him (the judge) at a filling station. Judge sentenced his assailant to 72 hours imprisonment and a \$100 fine.

Nope, said the appeals court. Contempt of court has to take place in the court room.
