Wheat producers who have planted more than 13.5 acres of wheat in at least one of the yea's 1959, 1960 or 1961 are eligible 'o vote in the August 24 referendum, except those who have a feed wheat exemption for the 1961 crop. Secretary of Agriculture Orvilio L. Freeman has called for the widest possible participation in the referendum and has emphasized the importance of the detarmination that growers will make -whether or not marketing quotas will be effective on the 1962 wheat rop. A two-thirds majority of growers must approve before quotas ge into effect. Approval of quotas will also make the new wheat stabilization program available to wheat producers.
