

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



He has made arrangements with one of the large poultry operators near Hamilton to secure the manure from his laving houses. As this scatters it over his fields. At the present he has not had time to cover all his fields but those where manure has been spread should show up after the next crop is planted and has made some



—An unprotected walk on a highway bridge, a twice-daily hazard in Boise, Idaho, for some 75 Whittier School pupils, got the P.T.A.'s attention. Now a protective railing, erected by the state highway department, makes the well-traveled route a safe one.


