## Hico-Early Clash Here In Weekly Grid Feature

Hico, with the schedule working in their favor, will play their fourth consecutive home game tonight, Friday at the local stadium when they encounter the Early High Longhorns of Brownwood. Game time is 8 o'clock.

Early, who has won all previous encounters with the locals will be slight favorites to win their fourth game of the series with the Tigers. They are 1-2 for the season this year, having lost to Dublin 22-0, Jim Ned 14-12, and won over Bangs last week 40-24 in a high scoring duel.

The 22-0 loss to Dublin compares with the local's 20-0 loss to the same team, but comparative scores mean little, and the Longhorns must be given the nod over Hico in the tilt tonight.

However, Hico has always played the Longhorns a good game, losing last year at Early 16-8, and fans can expect to see a close game.

Local people will also have a chance to see one of the largest high school players in the state, Clayton Cunningham, who stands 6 feet 7 inches and weighs 263 pounds.

Injury-wise the Tigers will be in fair shape, with only Larry Brown definitely out of the game. He will probably miss a couple more weeks of action due to a broken finger. Mark McElroy has missed two days of school this week with the flu, but is expected to be ready for the game with Early.

Coaches Jack Barnett and David Anderson have indicated that they would start the following against Early:

## Last-Second TD Covers Blanket 14-8 Last Week

They came to play, these Hico Tigers!

Spotting Blanket an eight point lead through 3 quarters last Friday night, the locals suddenly found themselves, and rolled for the tying touchdown with about five minutes left in the game.

And not to be outdone, or satisfied with a tie, the locals came back with some fine defensive play, and scored the winning touchdown on the game's last play.

Blanket had gone ahead in the game early in the second quarter and had thwarted all efforts of the locals to get into the end zone and Hico had moved the ball well, but always saw a fumble or pass interception spoil scoring chances.

Just when it looked as if the Tigers might never catch up lightning struck, and the locals had bounced back into the game with a TD and conversion of their own.

Mark McElroy scored the first mark of the night for the Tigers when he blasted nine yards off right tackle for the counter. Little Alan Solsbery, who became of age in the game, made a fine run around the left flank for the tying two point conversion. The drive for the marker went 94 yards with the big gainer in the series a 44-yard pass and run from Don Jernigan to Larry Erick.

The locals had gained possession at their own six after holding off

a Blanket thrust at that point. It took 11 plays to cover the distance.

Following the tying touchdown, Larry Erick intercepted a Blanket pass to set the stage for a drive which finally fizzled at the 18. Blanket held at that point taking over on downs.

It was a short-lived series for the visitors, however, with Erick again intercepting a stray pass at the 40 and running to the 29.

On the first play from the 29 with time running out, Jernigan dropped back for the home run strike. Erick was at about the seven when Jernigan let loose, but he had complications. Two Blanket defenders cut inside of Erick, and tipped the ball back perfectly to the standout end, who gathered it in and merely walked across the goal for the winning points.

Thus what had appeared to be sure defeat was turned into victory within a span of only a few minutes.

There were several bright spots in the game. Jernigan completed 10 of 16 passes and had one intercepted, for 169 net yards. Erick gathered in six of the tosses good for 119 yards. McElroy caught three, two on screen plays, which netted 38 yards, and Alan Solsbery latched onto one for 12 yards.

Solsbery, the freshman speedster, gave fans a hint of things

to come in future years with his running. The little man is quick as a cat, and with some needed blocking on the sweeps is a threat at any time to go all the way.

Mike Lowe, who has been a defensive standout in past games, played his usual consistent game, but a strange position handicapped him to some extent. He was playing middle guard, and had less chance at making the "show-up" plays as he has had in past games as a linebacker. Robert Reed also turned in a fine game from his linebacker post. Butch Knudson had his best night of the year, as did several of the other Tigers.

Most fans seemed to be in agreement, taking everything into consideration, that the locals had the best team on the field last week, and even though they had what some might call "luck" on the last play, deserved to win the game. A couple of breaks early in the game prevented them from scoring and winning handsly. Blanket had a small and scrapping team, and it looked for a while as if the old jinx would stand pat and the locals were going down for the seventh time in 8 years.

However, credit must be given to the locals for staying in the contest as long as they did and not giving up. They were determined to the end, as the final score indicates.

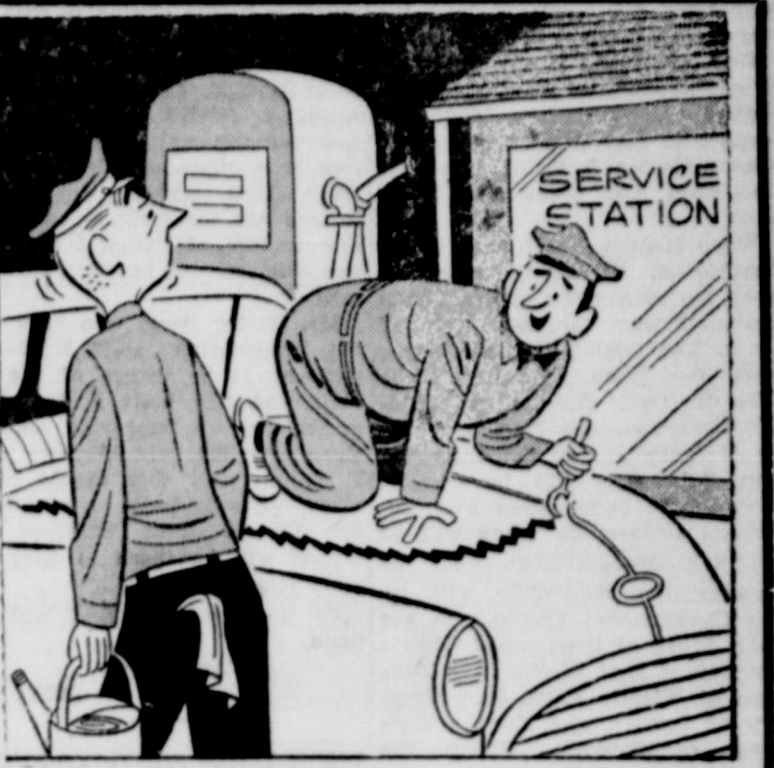

### Game Warden Reports on Changes In Commission

By C. H. "Swede" Johnson  
 Now that there is a touch of fall in the air and the opening of dove season has come and gone, I think it is about time for me to uncover the old typewriter and start my column again.

There have been lots of changes that have taken place since the last time I have talked to you. One of them is the changing of our department by dividing the State into five regions. They are: Region 1, San Angelo; Region 2, Waco; Region 3, Tyler; Region 4, Seabrook; and Region 5, Rockport.

Waco Region 2 will have as its director A. W. Lewis, who has been the supervisor of the North Texas District for the last 17 years. The Inland Fisheries Supervisor for Waco Region will be Wm. H. (Bill) Brown; the Wildlife Supervisor for Region 2 will be Al Jackson; and the Conservation Supervisor will be Charles Edmondson. Information and Education Officer for Waco will be Frank Etheredge. Then under the conservation supervisor will be the Conservation Chiefs who are John Wood of Brownwood, Morris Stallcup of Fort Worth, C. T. Pittman of Wichita Falls, Jack Gregory of Temple, and Eugene Willmann of Kerrville. Under the chiefs will be two to three Conservation Officers for each district which have not been named at the time of this writing, and then following your conservation officer will be the wardens.

The papers recently stated that all wardens in the future were to be called conservation officers but I have already explained that the conservation officers will be a pay grade position and not a title

for all officers. I believe that this new set up will benefit most of the sportsmen in Central Texas and will put you in closer contact with the personnel of the Game and Fish Commission.

Another thing I would like to mention before closing is that the Game and Fish Commission Wildlife Exhibit will be at the Clifton Fair Sept. 21, 22 and 23, which is about a \$60,000 exhibit showing live all the native animals and fish that represent Texas, and I don't think anybody should miss it who are the least interested in our wildlife of Texas. I think all the children will benefit from this exhibit.

Mr. Harley Berg, who is one of the Information and Education Officers, is in charge of the exhibit and has built it from the ground up by improving on this show over the past 15 years. And I really think this should be a must for everybody to see. Warden Clymer from Whitney and myself will be there to help answer your questions.

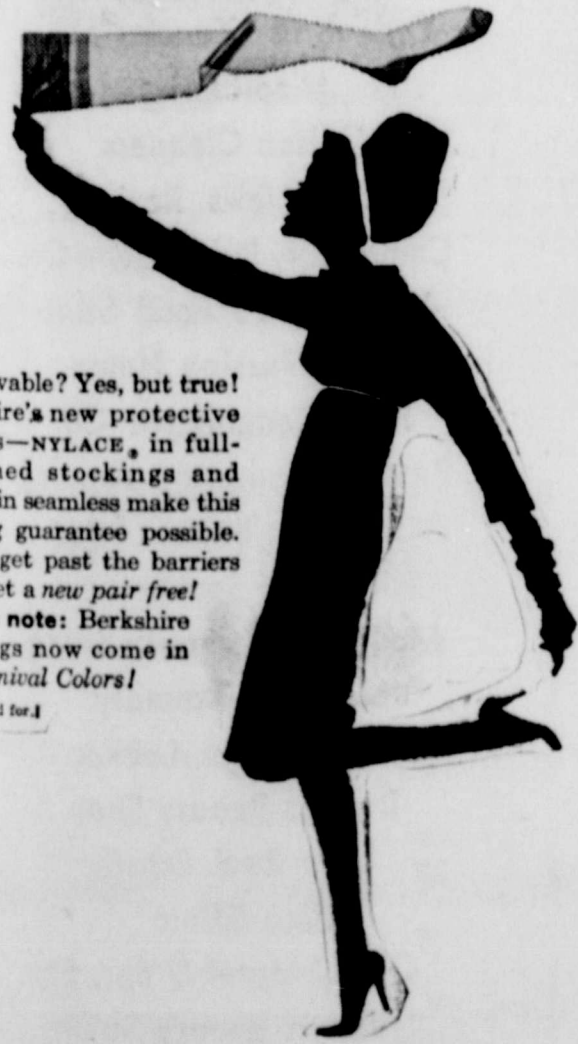

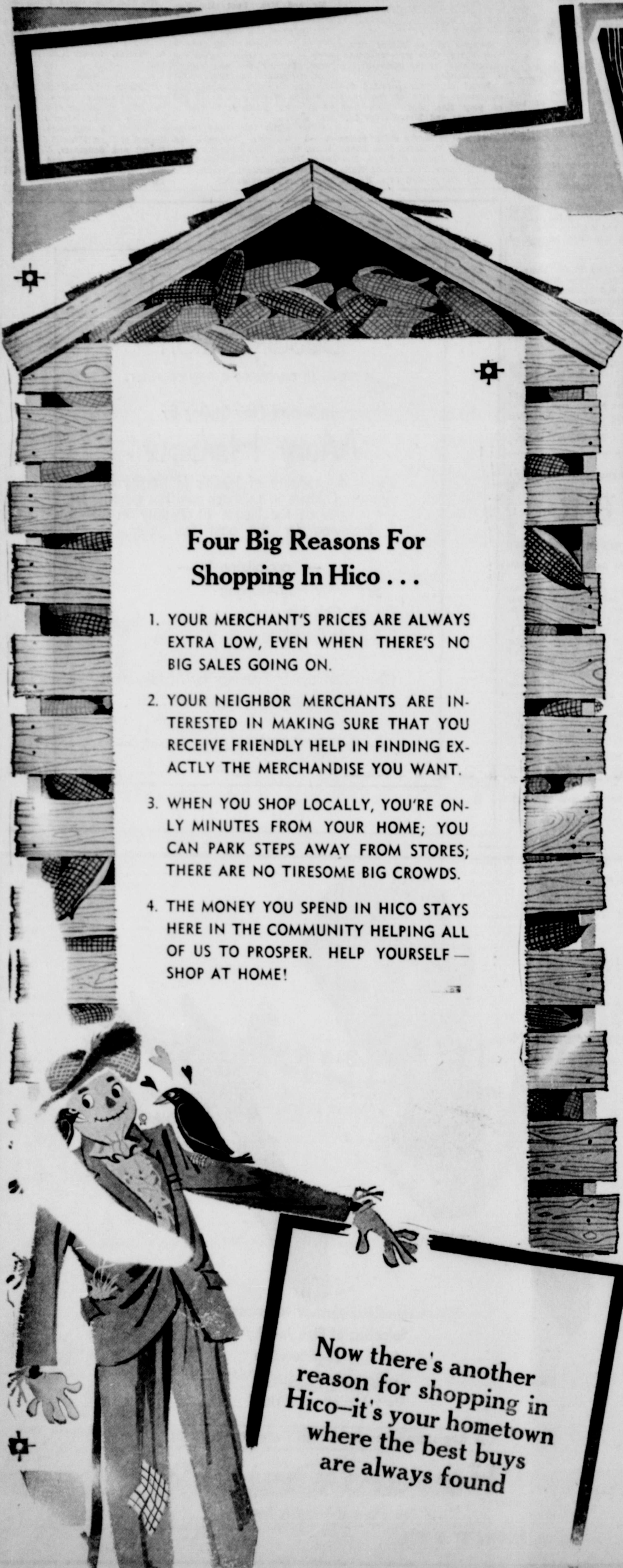

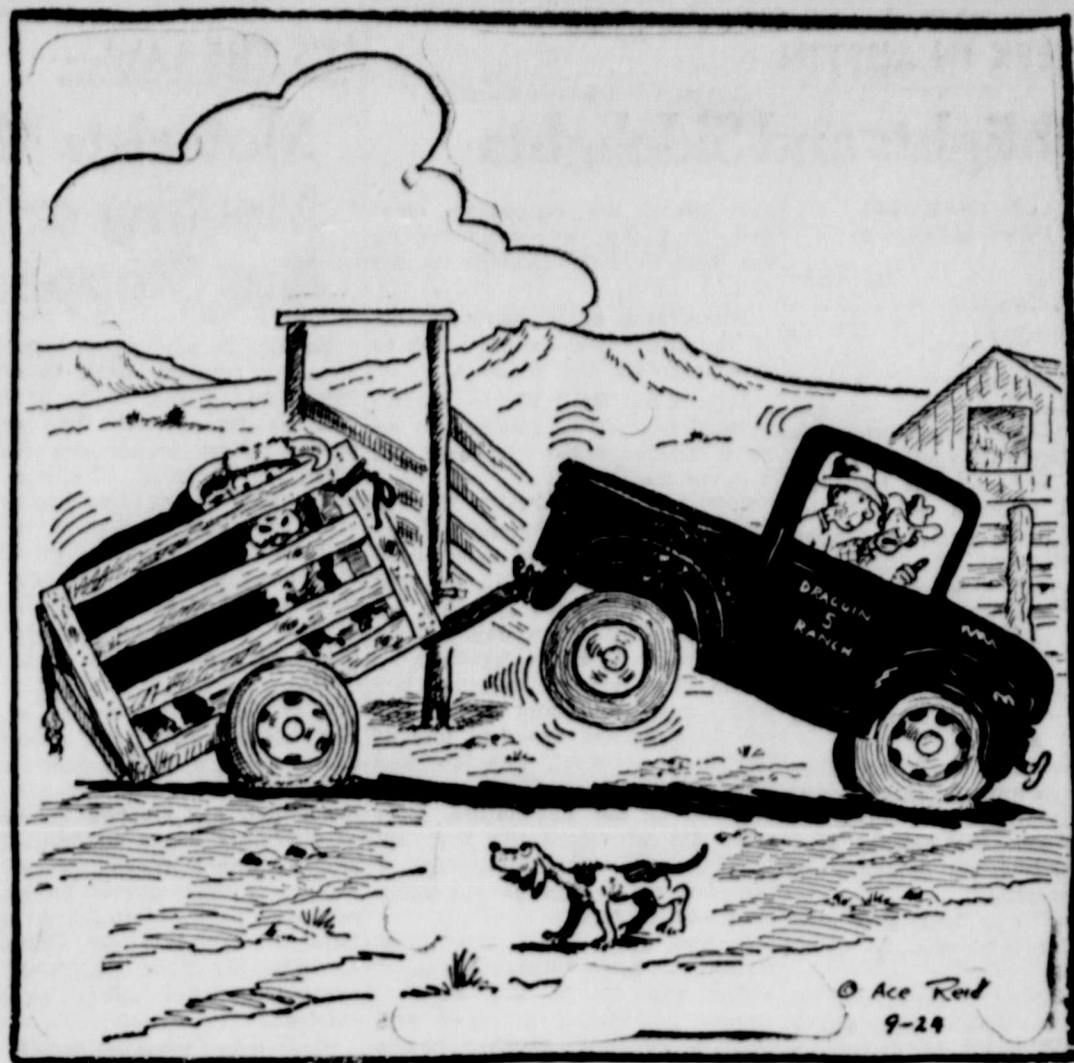

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

Austin, Sept. 20. — Hurricane Carla had its impact on the State Capitol. But not like it did on the Coast.

Refugees camped on the Capitol grounds the first night of the storm. They were moved into public buildings as the rains reached Austin. Several giant trees on the Capitol grounds were blown down, and the Board of Control estimated damage of \$5,000 to Capitol grounds and buildings.

State officials were busy, too. Gov. Price Daniel's on-the-scene inspections led to several coastal counties being declared disaster areas. Thus they became eligible for Federal aid.

State Insurance Chairman Thomas Ferguson announced that several hundred insurance adjusters had moved into the coastal area to begin estimating damages to insured properties.

So far no one had any estimates of the total damage Carla did to Texas.

One sure thing is that insurance companies, which have taken in about \$15,000,000 in premiums this year for windstorm and rain damage in the seacoast area will have substantial losses to pay above their income from this source.

**More Sales Tax Rulings**  
Comptroller Robert S. Calvert is still issuing rulings on how the new state sales tax applies to specific sales situations.

He has changed his mind for the first time. It's on the subject of repairmen.

Now ruling declares that the repairman is the consumer of the tangible personal property which goes into a repair job, unless he has a contract under which he is to bill the customer separately for labor and parts or materials. In that case, he can collect the sales tax from the customer on the materials only. But if the repair contract is for a lump

sum price, the repairman must pay the 2 per cent sales tax on the supplies and materials at his cost.

These and other complications of the huge new tax law led to two proposals for changes.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson recommended that it be changed to an across-the-board two per cent tax with no exemptions.

State AFL-CIO Pres. H. S. Brown called for complete repeal of the sales tax, and substitution of an income tax which he said "you pay just once a year, instead of 15 times a day."

**What's A Farm Trailer.**  
The new revision of the law which used to exempt farm trailers from license fees has lots of people in a swivet. The law was revised twice during the spring sessions of the Legislature.

Oilfield servicing companies brought suit to set aside this interpretation of the law. License plates, based on weight, would be staggering, they claim as they maintain that the legislature did not mean to tax them when it wrote in an exemption for the water well drillers.

Rural legislators report some farmers aren't happy about having to pay \$5 to be exempt.

**New Oil Policy-Maker**  
Lieut. Gov. Ben Ramsey became Railroad Commission Ben Ramsey in ceremonies Monday, and went right to work at the statewide oil proration hearing held Tuesday.

Ramsey leaves behind a record that probably will never be broken—election to six terms as lieutenant governor. Some earlier holders of that office had won as many as three times, but there had been few of them.

Ramsey's salary goes up from \$4,800 a year and an apartment in the Capitol to \$17,500 a year, but he will have to pay his own rent. Senator Bruce Reagan of Corpus Christi assumes the duties of Lieutenant Governor until the special session opens. Then the Senate will choose another senator to preside over its meetings.

IT'S THE LAW—

Motorists Must Stop When Meeting or Passing School Bus Stopped For Passengers

Thousands of school children are now trooping back to school throughout Texas. Many of them will be transported by school buses. Most people are careful when approaching a school bus which may be standing beside the road or school to pick up school children or allow them to alight. However, we have already had some very bad accidents this year because a child or motorist, or both, were careless at that very time.

Most Texans are aware of the law which requires a driver to come to a complete stop when overtaking from the rear a school bus which has stopped to receive or discharge school children. After stopping immediately behind the bus, he is then allowed by law to proceed past same at a speed "which is prudent, not exceeding 10 miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."

What many persons do not realize is that the very same rule applies when meeting a stopped school bus. While everyone is interested in protecting our children, unthinking violators of this simple safety rule greatly outnumber those who comply. Failure to follow the law in this case can

lead to fines up to \$200 even when no accident occurs. Following an accident in which some child is injured or killed, the penalties are naturally much more serious. Although the above rule does not always apply when passing a stopped school bus in a business or residential district of a town, the necessity for extreme caution even in those locations is obvious.

When it comes to overtaking and passing moving vehicles, exercise of ordinary common sense will generally keep a driver within the law. For instance, when passing a car it is only common sense to proceed on past it a safe distance before cutting back to the right side of the highway. Also, any driver would realize the danger of increasing his speed while another is attempting to pass him.

In the same category is the prohibition against passing on the right under most ordinary conditions. Of course, you may legally pass on the right in a few specific instances, such as when the vehicle overtaken is making or about to make a left turn, or upon a one-way street with two or more lanes, or upon a four-lane highway.

However, our traffic laws state that even when passing on the right is allowed, it shall be done only under conditions permitting such movement in safety. And, in no event should passing be accomplished by driving off the pavement or main-traveled portion of the roadway.

Familiar to all are the no passing zones designated by yellow lines placed to one side of the center line on our highways. Not so well known are the restrictions against crossing the center line when approaching within 100 feet or when traversing any intersection or railroad grade crossing.

A driver should never cross the center line of a highway when the left side of the road is not clearly visible and free of oncoming traffic. Generally speaking, when not engaged in passing another vehicle, one should not drive to the left of the roadway.
