"Actually there is a shortage of nurses, so we're keeping our fingers crossed. After all, the opportunity to travel was a deciding factor for enlistment," said Karolyn.

With reserve commissions, the girls will be in the service for two years and may apply to stay longer. They have no ties to Corpus Christi and so are enthusiastic about joining.

"Not even boyfriends could make us pass up an opportunity like this," said 2nd Lt. Karolyn Head, U.S. Air Force Nurse Corps.

## W. E. (Gene) Tate Is Candidate for County Judge

To All the People of Hamilton County:

This is to let you know that I would like to serve another term as your County Judge if you will let me.

For the past several years, the Commissioners' Court and I have tried to handle your financial affairs as conservatively as possible. The results of these efforts are plainly reflected, we think, in the tax setup of the county. At present, our county is being operated on a tax rate which we believe is lower than that levied by any other county in Texas, and our assessed valuations are lower than those of most counties. How long these desirable conditions can endure is a matter of speculation because in the operation of any kind of enterprise, financial difficulties generally develop unexpectedly. Of course, if and when such difficulties present themselves, I shall be in favor of increasing the revenues of the county by any means available to the Commissioners Court. If, however, such a contingency does not come about, I am in favor of keeping the tax rate and the assessed valuations at their present low level so long as the solvency of your county is not threatened thereby.

Due to the cooperation of the law enforcement officers of the county and the efficiency of your County Attorney, handling the affairs of your County Court at Law has presented no serious problems. The dockets of your various courts are at this time relatively current and it is our intention to keep them that way.

It has been a distinct privilege and a genuine pleasure to have served you in the past, and I humbly solicit your support and influence in the coming election.

Action on the 1962 political front was evident this week when five candidates authorized their names placed on the ballot for the May 1962 Democratic Primary.

Of the five candidates, three are seeking re-election, one is announcing for her first term of office, and the other is seeking election to fill the unexpired term of the office he now holds by virtue of having been appointed two months ago by Governor Price Daniel.

The three office holders seeking re-election are Hamilton County Judge W. E. (Gene) Tate, County Treasurer Pat Secrest, and County Clerk Vada Williams. Miss Secrest and Judge Tate are veterans of the Court House, while Mrs. Williams will be running for her third term of office.

The newcomer to the local political scene is Erma Maddox of Hamilton, who is seeking the post of District Clerk. Incumbent C. E. Edmiston is retiring, according to reports, and will not seek re-election to the post he has held for many years.

The other candidate, present District Judge Truman E. Roberts, will vie for the two years which will remain on the unexpired term of the late H. W. Allen.

Roberts, District Attorney until his appointment to the judge post two months ago, must run for the office to fill the remainder of the time of the present four-year term. The present District Attorney, Byron McClellan of Gatesville, must likewise seek election to the post vacated by Roberts.

1962 promises to be one of the most important political years in recent history, and local residents may have a part in naming candidates only by paying their poll tax.

First in a series of five drawings during Hico's Trades Day will be held Saturday afternoon at 4 p.m. when \$105.00 will be given away.

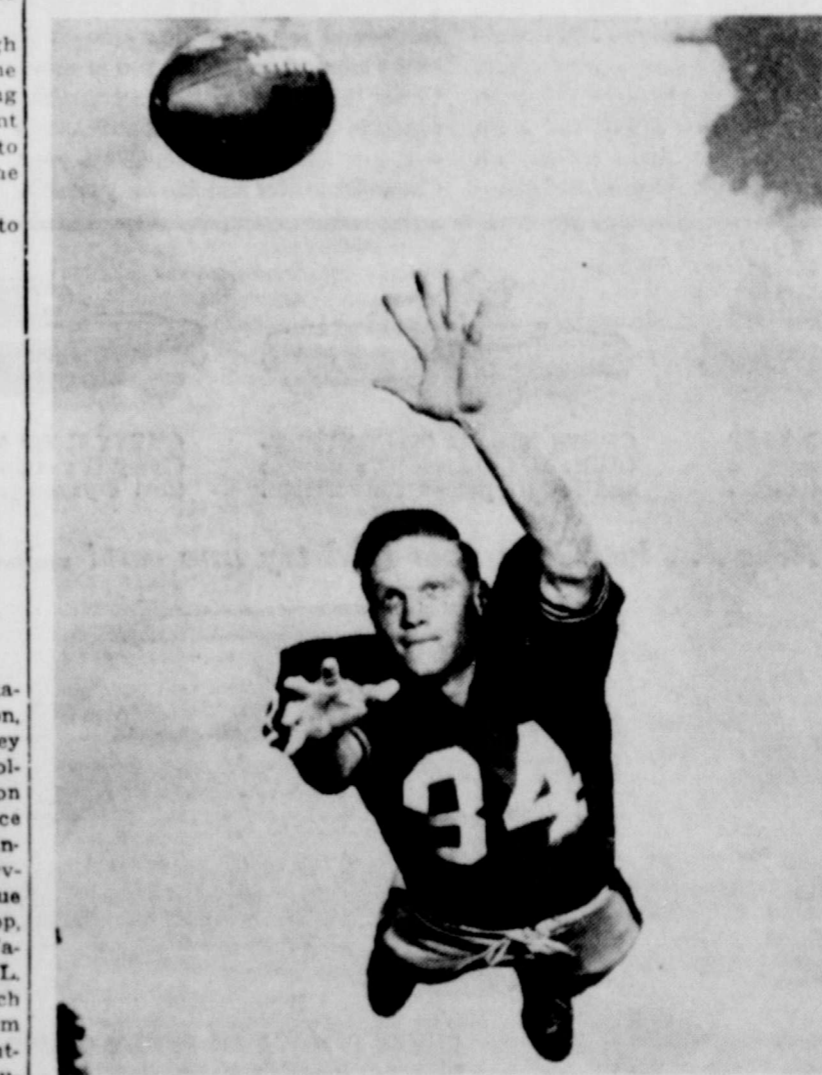

**Juvenile Parole Program**

### More Mileage From Tourists

Gov. Price Daniel's "Texans for Tourists" group will get together to discuss passage of a legislative appropriation for advertising the State's numerous attractions. Although the Legislature passed a voter-approved Constitutional amendment to allow for tourist promotion in 1935, no funds were allotted for this purpose.

While the Texas Highway Department distributes attractive brochures through its eight state border stations, nothing has been accomplished on a national basis.

Meanwhile the state is losing money on tourism. The 8,600,000 out of states who came here last year contributed \$23,000,000 to the state's tax till. They spent \$427,600,000 while here. This was a drop of one million visitors from 1930 and a drop of almost two million from 1929.

Other states consider tourist advertising a sound investment—figuring they get hundreds of dollars in return for each dollar spent on advertising.

### Building On The Rise.

Residential permits issued in October ran 42 per cent above the 1930 figure for the same month. Apartment construction is largely responsible for this rise.

A total of 101,079 construction permits was issued last month: 60,658 for residential; 40,421 for non-residential, and 10,496 for alterations and repairs.

Alterations and repairs on residences were up 19 per cent.

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Don't forget the Income Tax School Monday, December 11. It will start at 9 a.m. in the district court room. Sid Jenkins area farm Management Specialist of A & M College Extension Service will discuss farm and ranch income problems and Henry Madeley, Assistant Manager of the Social Security Administration, Temple, will discuss Social Security as it applies to farmers and ranchers.

This past January we had a similar school here and many who attended told me afterwards that they made money on tax savings by having attended the meeting. The meeting or school, is for the purpose of giving help to you in your tax and Social Security matters.

On Tuesday, December 12, cotton marketing quotas will be voted on in the county. Every grower of cotton should take advantage of this and cast a vote.

If marketing quotas are approved in the referendum, price support will be available to growers who comply with their farm allotments at such levels as it determined appropriate by the Secretary. If marketing quotas are not in effect for the 1962 upland cotton crop, the allotment program will remain in effect and price support will be available to co-operators at 50 percent of parity.

Under the 1962 quota program, growers who exceed their farm allotments will be subject to penalties of 50 percent of the cotton parity price as of June 15, 1962 on the excess production. Also, none of the upland cotton produced on the farm will be eligible for price support.

Each year the county loses a few hundred acres of its allotment. When this happens it means that the county is cut this many acres. Over the county there are some who still like to grow cotton and who would like to have a larger allotment. Generally, allotments are lost due to the acreage not being planted.

If you do not want to plant your allotted acres, why not check with the local ASC office and see if it can be turned in and given to some grower or growers who would like to have it.

One of the most beautiful seasons of the year is at hand. Round about the county Spanish oak, elms and other trees are in full autumn color and the country side is beautiful. This seems more so than in the past year or two. Why not take a ride over the county Sunday afternoon and enjoy the beautiful colors to be seen.
