With dues-paying time here again for Hico Civic Club members, we think it appropriate to publish the financial statement of the only local service organization.

In case you have ever wondered where the money comes from, and what it is spent for, then read the report given elsewhere on this page.

The club—and we think most of you will agree—is a healthy organization and it deserves more support than it has been getting in the past. Last year the organization had less than 60 members, which number is far from being what it should be in a town this size.

The club is a deserving organization, and people here should show their appreciation for its efforts by joining and attending the weekly meetings and lending their support to its many projects. If you haven't already done, so why not see secretary P. W. Hamilton today and pay the \$10 yearly dues. The cost is too small not to be a member.

January 31 is an important date for nearly everyone in the business world, to taxpayers in general, and more especially to residents of voting age who like to express themselves by casting a ballot for the candidates of their choice.

January 31 is the deadline for paying poll tax receipts, that very important little piece of paper which entitles you to the right to participate in naming officials to serve you in many capacities. And from all indications 1961 will be an important election year for the people of Hico, as well as the County, State and District.

Majority of the state officials must be elected this year, and in our own county, voters will name a Judge, County Clerk, District Clerk, and County Treasurer, plus P's, Constables, Commissioners in some precincts (not Precinct 3).

Also in 1961 local residents must name a mayor and two aldermen, and patrons of the local school district will also vote on three trustees.

And don't forget the District Judge and District Attorney races, plus selecting a State Representative from this district.

So you can see, with the above mentioned elections alone, the price of a poll receipt is minor. Mrs. Pearl Williams, county tax officer, will perhaps make one more official visit to Hico for tax collection purposes between now and the 31st, and more than likely will name a deputy or two to take the poll receipts locally.

We'll try not to let you forget to pay them, but don't, whatever you do, let January 31 pass without buying your voting privilege.

Construction Started On New Bank Building

Work was started last Thursday morning on what is to be Hico's most modern business structure when completed.

Contractors began clearing away debris and excavating the site for the new First National Bank building on the lots where Petsick Insurance Agency and the old Wiseman Studio building were formerly located, facing main street and Highway 6.

General contractor for the building is W. H. Barsh of Waco. Architects are Bilheimer and Calmeit also of Waco.

The building will have 3,450 square feet of floor space. Features of construction will be an exterior of hollow brick and decorative materials, concrete roof, a terrazo-floored lobby, a suspended acoustic tile ceiling, and a window wall on the north side. A directors room also will be used as a community room.

Tentative construction contract calls for 130 working days.

The local bank was established in 1890, and has assets of \$2,000,000.

Odus Petsick is president, and Ellis Randals is cashier.

Retired Hico Banker, Herbert F. Sellers, Buried Wednesday

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Wednesday, January 3, in the First Methodist Church for Herbert Franklin Sellers, prominent Hico citizen.

Mr. Sellers passed away Monday night in Hico Hospital following a lengthy illness. He was 78.

Born in Iredell, Mr. Sellers had lived in Hico for 73 years. He was a former mayor and city councilman and a retired banker. He was a Mason and Presbyterian. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Sellers, pioneer settlers of this area.

Mr. Sellers retired from his profession in 1933 following consolidation of the old Hico National Bank with the present First National. He served as president of the Hico National.

Rev. Norman Purvis and Dr. Nat Tracy of Brownwood officiated at the final rites, with burial made in Hico Cemetery under the direction of Barrow-Rutledge Funeral Home.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. H. H. Tracy Jr. of Fort Stockton, and two grandchildren. Pallbearers were Roy French, Goodwin Phillips, J. B. Ogle, Murph Tidwell, C. L. Woodward and W. J. Wisdom.

Disappearance of Man 76 Years Ago Still Much Talked-About Mystery

Would a man, who was described by his wife as being a wonderful father and a good provider, mysteriously leave his family, never to return?

That is the question that old timers living around Alexander, Texas, have been asking themselves for the past 76 years. The question concerns Neb Thornton, a farmer who lived near that community in the latter part of the last century.

The story goes back to 185 when four men robbed a Texas & Pacific train near Gordon, Texas. A hat found at the scene of the robbery was identified later as belonging to a man named Brock, who lived near Alexander.

When questioned about the robbery, Brock implicated three other men. Neb Thornton was one of those men. The

other two men were brothers, Calvin and Henderson Brumley. Incidentally, after the robbery, none of these men ever showed signs of having any extra money.

As best as old timers can recall, none of these men were ever indicted for the crime. However, they were forced to flee their homes at night and hide from the Vigilantes, night riders who did their own indicting. A Vigilante indictment could only end one way, a hangman's noose around an outlaw's neck.

Neb's wife, Nan, told a niece, Mrs. C. L. Mitchell, an Alexander resident, that she would lie awake at night listening to the Vigilante's horses paw the ground outside the house as they waited for her husband to come home. She said that she would pray that he would not come home for fear of his life.

IT COSTS TO HEAT CARLTON'S SCHOOL

For the last three years, according to figures released by Supt. A. J. Barron, the cost of heating the schools at Carlton has ranged from a low of \$479 in 1960-61 to a high of \$708.70 in 1959-60. In 1958-59 the cost was \$578.90, which makes an average cost for the three years of \$588.86.

The peculiar thing is the variance in the different years. For instance during 1960-1 butane was purchased during only five months, but in the previous year butane was purchased during only two school months. The greatest single month's bill was December of 1958 when \$198.90 was spent.

The 1961-62 school year has started out on a record for the first three months, when \$21200 was spent. At the end of the first three months of 1958-59 only \$87.40 had been spent, 1959-60 was the largest (210.00) until this year, and 1960-61 was the least with \$82. A bad, cold winter can make the difference of several hundred dollars in the cost of butane alone.

Purpose of Guidance Program at Carlton Explained by Supt.

The guidance program of the Carlton Schools is set up to:

1. Help the individual pupil evaluate his abilities, aptitudes, interests, and achievements.
2. Assist the pupil in orienting and adjusting himself to the school environment.
3. Provide information and service which will aid the pupil in making educational and vocational choices.
4. Help teachers and other personnel to understand the needs of individual students.
5. Provide the administration with information which may be used in curriculum planning and in improvement of the total educational program.

The fall testing program has been completed. It has consisted of seventh grade mental maturity tests, tenth grade aptitude tests, and seventh and twelfth grade achievement tests. Further testing will be done in the Spring.

At this time all students in grades eight, nine, ten and eleven are being interviewed for course selections so that the best possible curriculum can be provided to meet the needs of the children next year.

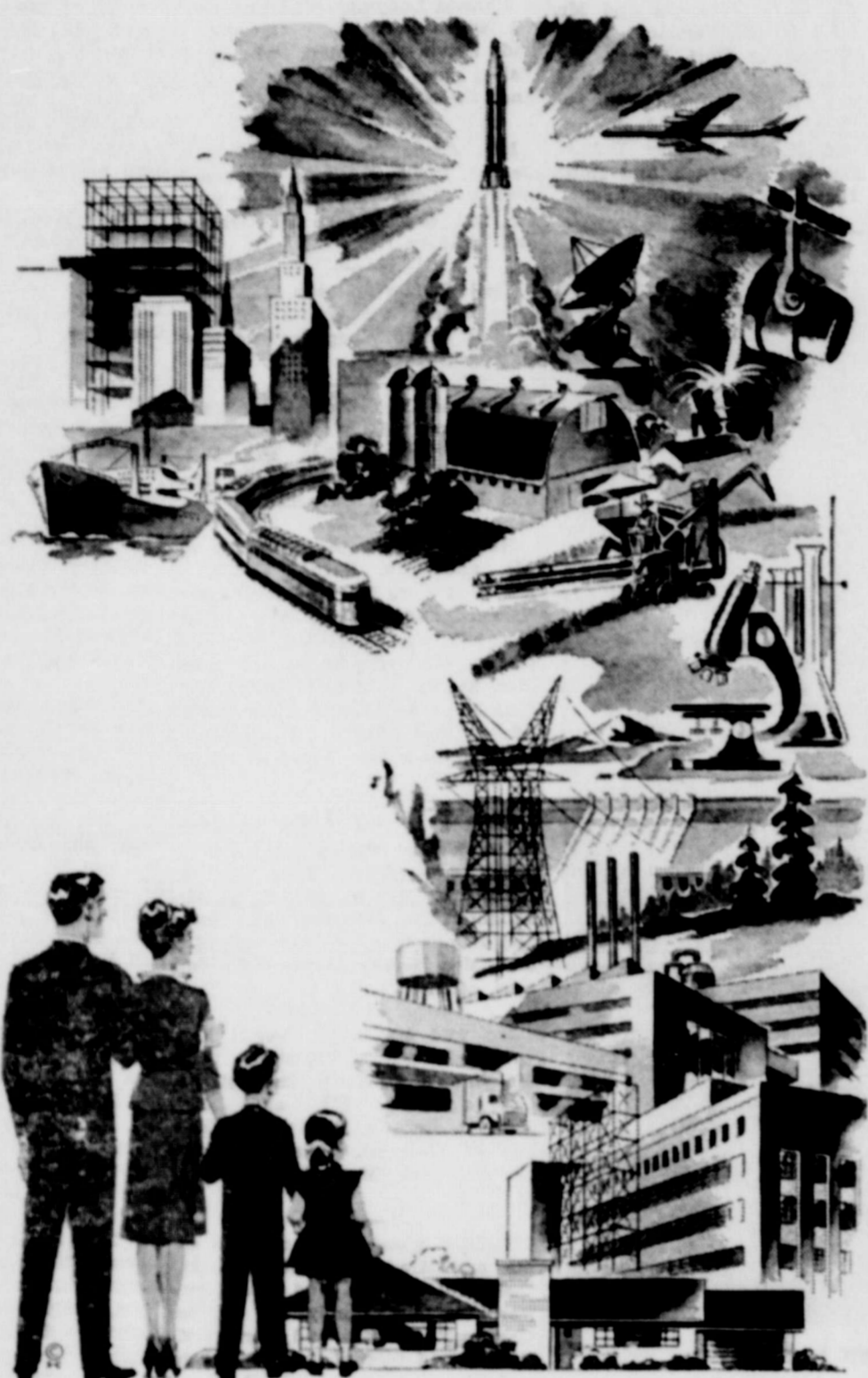

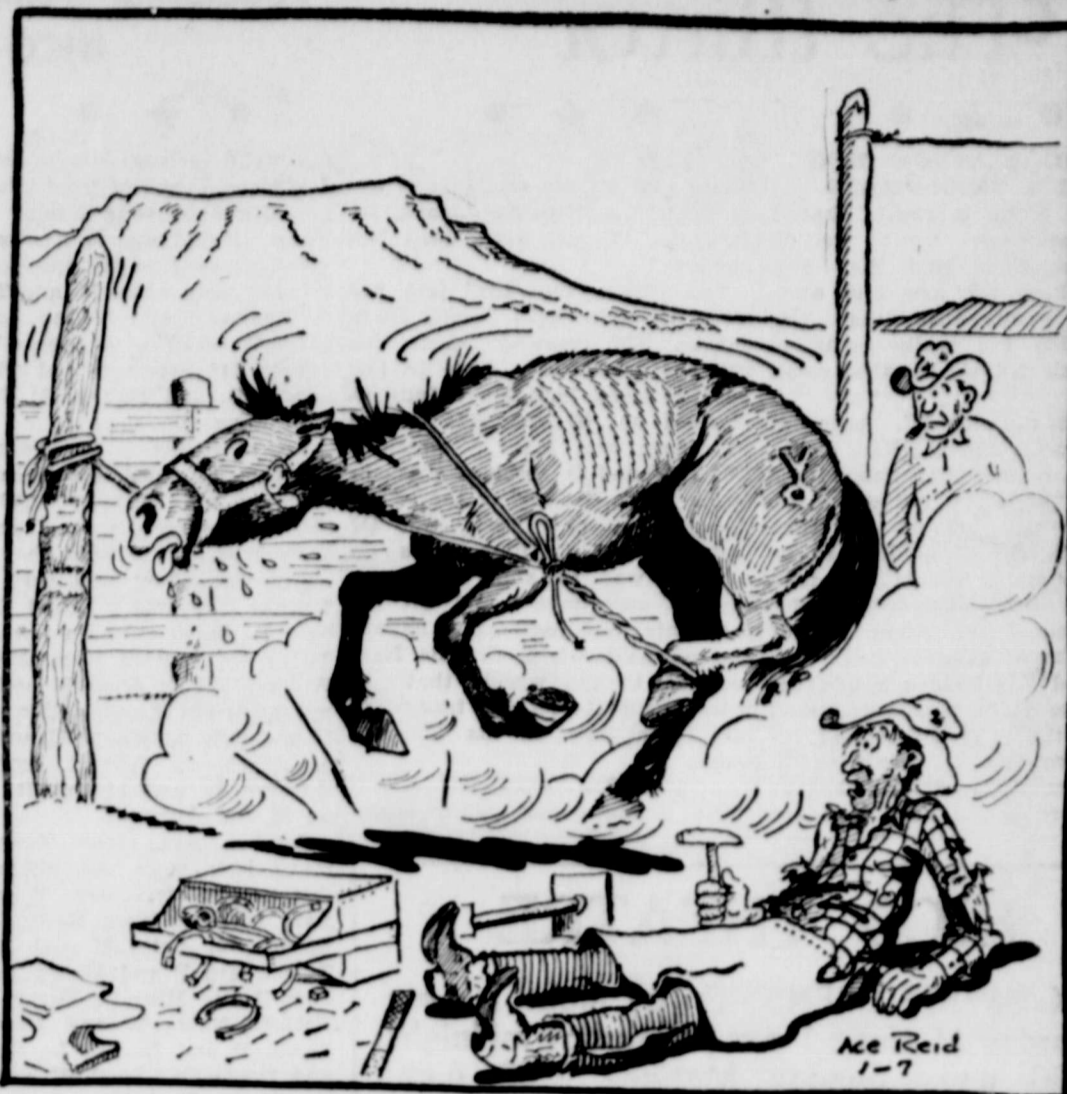

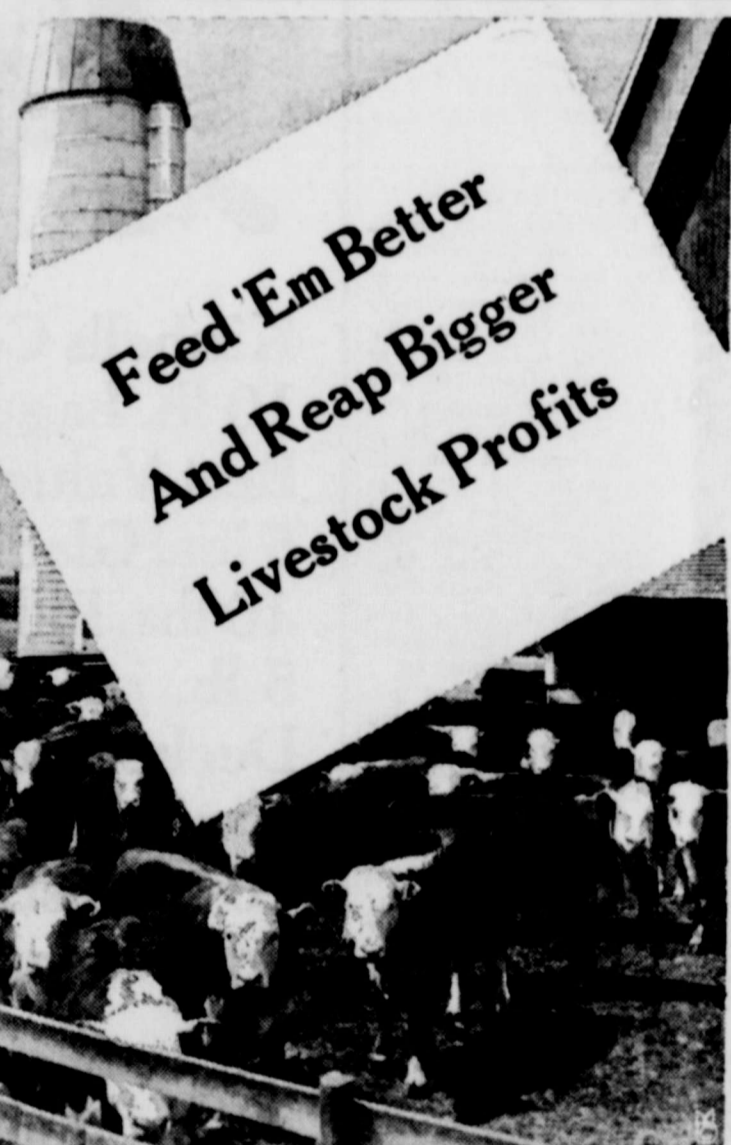
