#### Hamilton-Coryell SCS District News

By A. L. MILES

The sprigging season for Coastal Bermuda grass is here. In fact a number of farmers in the district have already planted sprigs. During the past few weeks of unseasonally warm weather recently planted sprigs have responded and new growth is showing up.

Texas Research Foundation Renner, reports highly profitable results in their experiences with Coastal Bermuda when properly fertilized. Based on a value of \$24.75 per ton for hay and total cost of operations including cost of fertilizer plus mowing and rak. ing \$2.50 per acre, \$5.00 per ton for bailing and \$3.30 for hauling, net profits reported ran from \$59.70 per acre to \$103.02 per acre, depending on the amount of fertilizer applied.

Actually we do not have to go to Renner to find outstanding results with Coastal Bermuda. In April last year, Mr. H. A. Mathis sprigged 35 acres of Coastal Ber. muda on the Leon River just below Leon Junction. He applied 200 pounds of 16-20-0 fertilizer. In July he put 78 head of cattle on the 35 acres and when Soil Conservation Service personnel check. ed with Mr. Mathis in January he still had 78 cattle on the 35 acres and the grazing condition was judged as good.

The board of supervisors of the District urge all who are interested in establishing Coastal Bermuda pastures to contact ASC offices for federal cost sharing as. sistance and the Soil Conservation Service offices at Hamilton and Gatesville for technical assistance.
