Annual Dog Vaccination Day Set Next Tuesday at Gym

The Annual Dog Vaccination Day, sponsored by Hico FFA Chapter, will be held next Tuesday, March 13. Place of the canine inoculations will be the High School Gym, starting at 9 a.m. and continuing to 12 noon.

Dr. A. T. Landley, formerly of Stephenville, now residing on his ranch near Hico, will vaccinate the dogs. A charge of \$1.50 will be made for the service, which compares with the regular charge of \$2.00.

Harold Walker, Chapter Advisor, said this week that FFA members will pick up and de-

liver dogs to owners who are unable to take them to the gym during the specified time. Persons desiring this service may call the school.

The Chapter uses money derived from the vaccinating program to help in defraying costs of staging their annual livestock show, which will be held Friday, March 23 at Hico City Park.

Persons residing in the area communities are urged to keep the date in mind, and make arrangements to have dogs and other pets vaccinated at this convenient time.

No Opposition Registered In April City, School Elections

Candidates for Hico City Council, Mayor, and School Trustee posts are without opposition in the forthcoming elections. Final filing dates were Saturday, March 3 for city election, and Wednesday, March 7 for school posts.

The city election ballot will contain the names of D. E. Bulloch, candidate for mayor, and W. C. Howard, Jim Jameson, and G. M. Bullard, candidates for aldermen.

The school trustee election has two candidates seeking re-election, and one for nomination to his first

term. M. I. Knudson and C. W. Land are incumbents, and H. R. Baker is seeking the post vacated by Glenn Higginbotham, who declined to enter the race this year. Higginbotham served one three-year term.

County school trustee candidates are also without opposition. J. B. Woodard is seeking re-election to the post from Precinct 3.

Interest at Carlton and Fairy in trustee elections was predominate this week as four candidates filed

at Fairy, and seven placed their names on the ballot at Carlton.

At Fairy, C. A. Bullard, O. H. Brummett, J. R. Latham, and J. A. Edwards are seeking two positions to be filled.

Carlton will also elect two trustees from a list of candidates that includes Thad Tatum, J. T. Longino, Ronald Mercer, Clint Miller, K. C. Griffin, H. C. Thompson and L. H. Lunsford.

City election will be held Tuesday, April 3, and school balloting will take place Saturday, April 7.

Coach With an Enviably Record

Note: The following story reproduced from a paper in the interest of the subject is a school one year, during which time he won the basketball championship for that school.

As A Player.

Coach Ray played basketball in high school at Hamilton and after graduation went to Southwestern University where he played for two years before being called into the service. He went into the Marine Corps where he stayed for four years.

While in the Marine Corp. Coach Ray pulled duty in Hawaii, Okinawa and China. After returning home from service he went back to Southwestern University and received his bachelors degree and then obtained his masters degree at Sam Houston State College.

Madisonville, a Class AA school, was Coach Ray's second stop in his basketball coaching career. He served as head basketball coach at

Madisonville nine years, winning seven district championships.

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Takes Lions Reigns.

Coach Ray came to Greenville in the fall of 1957, taking over the reigns as basketball coach and confronted with the job of pulling the basketball Lions out of a dry spell.

The Lions hadn't won a championship since 1947. That was the year that 6 foot 10 inch Freeburger was playing on the Lions quintet and grabbing state-wide attention.

First Lion Title

During the 1957-58 season the Lions finished with a 12-6 won-lost record. It was an improved record over the previous years, but still not up to the standards of E. J. Ray. He put his outstanding basketball knowledge to work and the next season (1958-59) and along with a good group of boys, won 27 games and lost only five, winning the district 6AAA crown for the first time in 12 years.

The following year, the Lions won 12 games of a 23-game schedule and failed to win the championship.

The Greenville cage coach never gives any of the credit to himself when the Lions win a game. "I'm just the coach—you don't see me out on the court, do you!"

Bi-District Champs.

Things were a little different in the 1960-61 basketball season. The Lions won 20 games of a 27-game schedule and took the district championship for the second time in three years. They went on to beat Fort Worth Castleberry in bi-district and lost to Nacogdoches in the regional playoffs.

Then came the 1961-62 season which has just been completed. For the third time in four years Greenville copped the district cage crown with a 20-6 mark, losing to Richardson in the bi-district encounter.

It was impossible for Coach Ray to remember his won-loss record for his entire 15 years of coaching basketball, but he did recall his record in Greenville. During his five years, his teams have won 91 games and lost only 35.

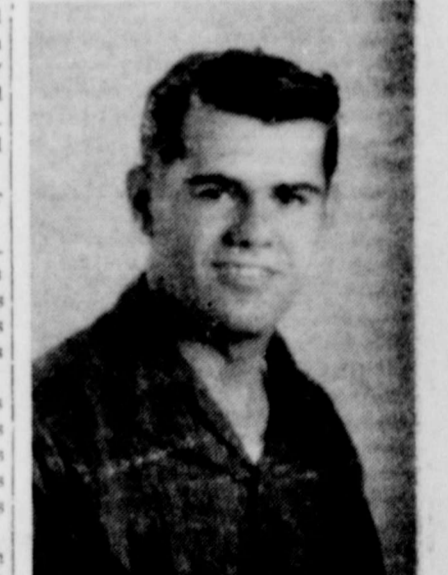

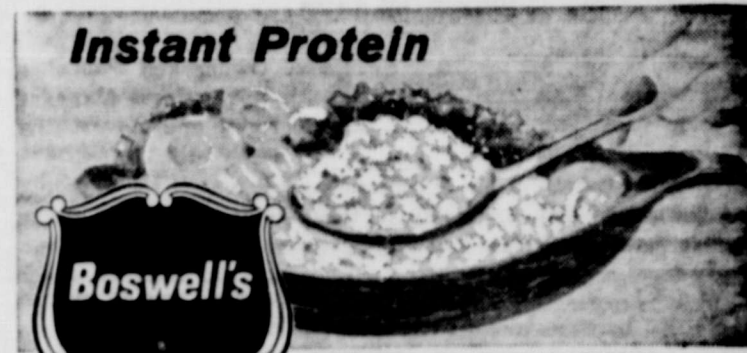

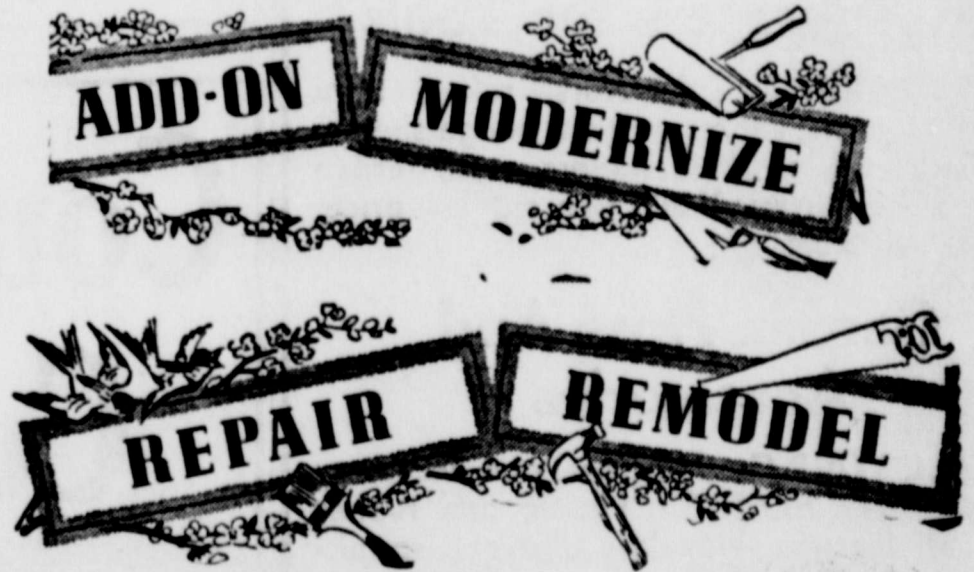

Season Here For Sprigging Coastal Bermuda Grass

Coastal Bermuda is an excellent pasture grass which produces high yields of good quality forage once it becomes established. Many farmers fail to get good stands or quick stands, however. What causes this?

E. M. Trow, extension pasture specialist, says the major reason for not getting a good stand or quick stand is a light or heavier stand of other grass, using dried out sprigs, or grazing before a

stand is obtained. He says these problems can be overcome with proper management.

The first step toward a good stand is preparing a good seedbed. It should be clean, firm and moist, and free of other growing grasses. Trow says farmers are expecting too much of Coastal Bermuda when they expect it to take over from established grasses. Next is planting at the proper time. It is usually best to plant

in the spring, after the soil warms up. South Texans, however, can plant in the fall.

A satisfactory stand cannot be expected unless fresh, viable sprigs are used. The specialist points out. Sprigs should be planted the same day they are dug, and they should contain at least three nodes. It is important to keep sprigs shaded and moist until they are planted. Tests have shown that exposing sprigs to sunlight for four hours reduced viability by as much as 97 per cent.

Recommended planting rate is 9 to 15 bushels of sprigs per acre planted in 30 to 42 inch rows. It is essential that soil be firmed around the sprig after planting, says Trow. This can be done with the tractor wheel or large compression wheels.

Before fertilizing, the farmer should have his soil tested. Where soil is not too weedy or grassy, the fertilizer can be put in a band 3 to 4 inches below the sprigs at or ahead of planting. Otherwise, fertilizer should be applied as a top dressing after Coastal begins to grow. Never broadcast fertilizer until a good stand is obtained, advises the specialist. It is also a good idea to top dress once or twice with nitrogen to stimulate growth.

"Remember," warns Trow, "don't graze the Coastal until a good stand is obtained. Grazing before this may seriously delay getting a stand."

1962 Feed Grain Sign-Up Underway; Final Date March 30

Farmers in Hamilton County are showing increased interest in the 1962 feed grain program. To date 161 farmers have signed intention to divert 3,665.6 acres of grain sorghum and corn.

Advance payments in the amount of \$21,414.91 have been made to these producers. March 30 is the final date to sign applications.

Cotton Information

Cotton producers with allotments, and who do not plan to plant cotton in 1962, are requested to release allotments to the County Committee for re-apportionment to those cotton producers who have requested additional acre.

Allotments Approved

The County Committee has approved new grower allotments to the following producers: Earl D. Kavanaugh 6.1 acres; Joe H. Rowe 15.2 acres; Robert K. Jones 18.4 acres; Aubrey Chilton 9.3 acres; C. C. Thomas 11.1 acres; and Chester Vick 14.9 acres.

2 New Practices Added

The County Committee has approved two new practices under the ACP program for 1962. D-1: Establishing legumes for summer protection from erosion. A good stand and growth must be obtained and left on the land or turned under. No grazing is permitted. The cost-share rate is 50 per cent of cost of legume seed and fertilizer.

This practice is designed for acres taken out of feed grain production and also other cultivated land.

D-2: Improvement of an established vegetative cover for soil or watershed protection. This practice is to be used on range land which needs more than normal maintenance measures in order to provide adequate soil or watershed protection.

The County Committee issued approvals under the ACP program last week in the amount of \$1,822.77. Balance available under this program up to July 15, 1962, \$24,332.17. Approvals are issued on a first come, first served basis as long as funds are available.

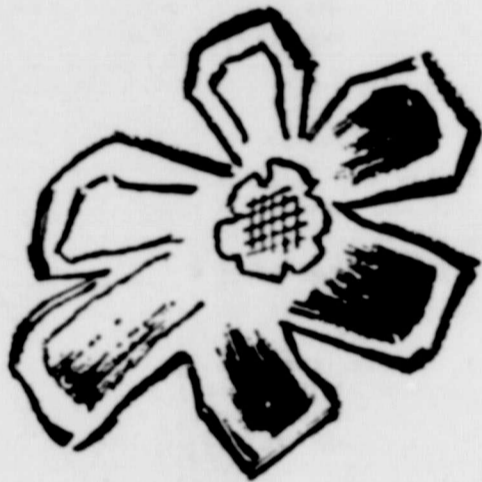

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Tuesday and Wednesday, March 13 and 14, there is to be a Sheep and Goat, Wool and Mohair School in Lampasas. The school will be held in the National Guard Armory and all sheep and goat growers are invited to attend.

There is no cost for the school other than meals and lodging. Should you like you can carry your bedding and sleep in the Armory.

March 13, the school will start at 9 a.m. and Wednesday it starts at 8:30. Last year a number of growers from Hamilton County attended a like school and they were very well pleased with it and the subjects taught or discussed.

Some of the subject listed this year are: Marketing Wool and Mohair; Internal and External Pa-

rasite Control; Factors Affecting Kid Production; Selection of Sheep and Goats; Milk Lamb Production; Grades and Grading Wool and Mohair. —ERL—

Indications from winter surveys on the grasshopper situation for the coming season are that parts of the county might be troubled by this insect.

Surveys show that along the eastern side of the county, from north of Fairy down to Jonesboro trouble could develop from hoppers.

Hoppers can be easier controlled if they are killed out when very small and before they have moved out from the hatching beds. These beds are not too hard to locate in pastures and along roadsides. The survey shows also that along the southwest side of the county trouble could develop. —ERL—

Last winter Donald Jones, Fairy 4-H Club boy caught a heifer calf in the Houston Fat Stock Show. Last week he carried the calf back to Houston for their show. He showed in two classes and placed eleventh in both of them. He had a Hereford and she was purchased from Paul Schrank of Aleman. —ERL—

For a number of years the Poultry Science Department of A&M College has been holding a Cage Laying Clinic in March. This year the clinic or short course will again be held in March, the 28th. Name of the clinic has been changed this year and it is now called the Commercial Egg Clinic.

The program starts with registration from 8 to 9 a.m. and will be over around five in the afternoon. The program for the day is designed to be of help to the commercial egg producers. All poultrymen of the county are invited. —ERL—

Should you have happened to harvested your cotton last fall when it contained excess moisture, and if you are planning to plant your own seed, it might be advisable to run a germination test on it before planting. Research has shown that seed should not be saved from cotton which is harvested when moisture content is above 8.10 per cent. When moisture is above this level and the seed cotton is held for even a comparatively short time on the trailer, the cotton goes through a heating process which not only lowers the grade but also the quality of the seed. —ERL—

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN—

Highlights and Sidelights

Austin—After the labor unions gave Houstonian Don Yarborough their coveted COPE Commendation, some sections of the Political Association of Spanish Speaking Organizations started worrying about joining the state body in a PASSO pronouncement for Gov. Price Daniel.

First splinter off the block was Hidalgo County chapter—third largest PASSO unit—which voted 44-16 to make no endorsement in the governor's race.

Yarborough made no comment as he rounded the Gulf Coast area to line up more support.

He's been conspicuously absent from his Austin headquarters while all other statewide candidates tough base here frequently to counteract the almost constant presence of gubernatorial candidate Will Wilson and the incumbent who dwells in the mansion.

Daniel almost had trouble getting his campaign off the ground when a Department of Public Safety plane nipped its wing while lifting the governor off Austin ground for a Houston appearance. The party changed to a private plane, and proceeded to inspect the Carla-damaged San Jacinto Monument with representatives from the State Board of Control, Building Commission and State Archives.

Former Secretary of the Navy John Connally also suffered aerial setbacks in his search for support. Bad weather prevented him from landing for San Marcos and San Antonio speaking engagements. When the clouds cleared he carried his campaign to Laredo.

GOP Hopes to Blanket State
After State Democratic Executive Committee officials slung verbal arrows at the Republicans for not holding primary elections in every county and precinct, the GOPs embarked on a campaign to finance a primary in every county.

Paul Desrochers at Republican State Headquarters said "We're working like mad to get a primary in every county." Two obstacles stand in the way. Getting funds in about 235 counties where the party has chairmen and getting chairmen for the other 19 counties.

Some Republican candidates have a regional flavor—like the 12 senatorial candidates who hope to represent 47 counties; or the 76 House hopefuls for 77 counties; and congressional candidates in all but seven districts. Republican party still wants general ballot representation for the winners among its two gubernatorial candidates, two candidates for lieutenant governor, and those seeking posts as congressman at large, commissioner of agriculture, general land office and on the rail road commission.

Water Study Requested
The Texas Water Commission asked Texas Research League to make a study of the commission's operations and the system of dividing the responsibility for Texas' water development among several state agencies.

The problem of water development and conservation in Texas is so great and controversial that the already burdened League researchers estimate it will be 1963 before they can begin such a time-consuming, comprehensive study.

Judge Otha F. Dent of the Water Commission expressed deep concern about meeting water requirements for 1963. Not only is it necessary to develop plans for

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constructing dams and reservoirs to fill the expected need but the business of condemning land and building these projects involves as much as a decade.

Highway Safety Studied
Top engineers and administrators from the state highway department of Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana will gather this week to discuss uniform use of highway and street signs, signals and markings in an effort to increase driving safety.

Governor Daniel announced that traffic deaths over the past five years have averaged 230 below the 1956 toll. There were 2611 traffic deaths in 1956, and the yearly average since then has been 2,381. Daniel created the joint efforts of groups interested in traffic safety with the preservation of many lives.
